The results at Bolton and Watford reflect the luck we have had over the last couple of weeks. It is astounding that we lost both games.

We should be putting our chances away to give us a little bit of breathing space. Unfortunately we are not which leaves us under the cosh the longer the game goes on. When you dominate a game as much we did at Watford and don't score they only have to capitalise on a breakaway to

punish you severely and that is what happened at Vicarage Road.

We tried a new formation at Watford which I feel worked very well. It suited the players we had available. I will never be frightened to change our system. I am always looking to play the best possible team I can on the day and the tactics will change against different opponents.

Everyone was disappointed on Saturday but what we have to look at is the positive side of our game. We have to take heart. I keep saying it and hopefully it will come right. We have got to keep our heads up. There is still a long long way to go, a lot of games to be played and a lot of points up for grabs.

If we maintain our commitment and keep that way of playing then we won't go far wrong. On the face of it people will look at the paper and think we got murdered 2-0. But we didn't.

The most pleasing factor for me on Saturday was that there was no sign of any hang-over from the Bolton defeat. I don't think Bolton was in their minds. Bolton is history, they proved that. There is nothing wrong with the players attitude, nothing wrong with the team - we have a good team. It is just a matter of having breaks when we need them.

We have another tough game tonight. But every one is tough isn't it. There is no easy fixture on the list. In our position now every one is a Cup Final demanding our utmost best. Anything less than that and we will get beaten.

Someone suggested to me on Saturday that it is vital for us to win our home games. It is vital for us to win every game - not just at home. Our lifeline is points. I think we deserved three at Watford. One would have been a good point but is wasn't to be.

We must remain positive. The dressing room spirit is good and once we begin to get the breaks I think you will see us playing some good exciting football.

We welcome everyone from Sunderland this evening. It is a long trip and we hope they enjoy the game but not the trip home!



A I-O defeat at Molineux last Wednesday left Sunderland hovering just above the bottom four in the First Division table, a point better off than Bristol City and five points clear of us.

It has been a disappointing campaign for the Rokerites who, like Town, opened the season in confident fashion with sights set on winning promotion to the Premiership. The early signs were good, Sunderland going eight matches unbeaten in the League, though they did suffer from too many draws.


But in November all seemed to go wrong as the draws piled up and those points cost them ground in the League race. The real problem has been their home form because before last Saturday's fixture with Stoke City at Roker Park, Sunderland had claimed just two victories on their own soil. Ten matches had been drawn and five lost!

Indeed, Sunderland's away record has proved much more rewarding with no less than six victories but even that was looking decidedly suspect when they went five away games without scoring a goal. The sequence started at Port Vale (0-0), at the end of November. They then lost 2-0 at Millwall. 3-0 at Luton and 1-0 at Charlton with a goalless draw at Oldham producing the only point.

Sunderland's next away venue was Watford, who were on a club record run of nine consecutive clean sheets. Of course the inevitable happened. Craig Russell headed the only goal in the seventh minute to end the Hornets run and Sunderland's away goal famine which had lasted 479 minutes.

Steve Agnew, signed from Leicester City in January for £250,000 to breathe new life into the team, then scored his first goal for the club at Southend United - a 20 yard shot which took a deflection to secure a 1-0 win, but the Rokerites failed to make it three straight away victories at Wolves.

A 4-1 win at Portsmouth has been their best result of the season and their other away wins in the League were achieved at Stoke (1-0), West Bromwich Albion (3-1) and Reading (2-0).

**STEVE AGNEW** - Midfield. Hard working tough tackling central midfielder who began his carrer with Barnsley before moving on to Blackburn Rovers for £700,000. Injury prevented him from establishing himself at Ewood Park and Leicester City snapped him up for a bargain £250,000 in February 1993. Missed the Play-Off Final last year through injury and had only featured occasionally in the Leicester side this season. Moved to Sunderland in January 1995. Born Shipley 9-11-65.

following his debut at West Brom in April 1989. Twice voted Sunderland's 'Young Player of the Year' he is considered to be one of the best headers of a ball at the club. Has now made over 400 appearances and played at Wembley in 1985, 1990 and 1992. Gordon began this season with a testimonial against Bobby Robson's FC Porto. Born: 17-7-67.

revelation last season when moved into a central midfield role alongside Derek Ferguson. Started this season there but had to move back to centre-half when Bennett was injured. A versatile performer, Kevin can also play in both fullback positions. Started as a youngster with Coventry City but did not get a senior game at Highfield Road. Born: Hastings 12-11-64.

**ALEC CHAMBERLAIN** — Goalkeeper. Got back into the side in December after spending the early part of the season in the shadow of Tony Norman. Alec was signed from Luton Town in the summer of 1993 and was an ever-present in the Sunderland side until the last three fixtures — maintaining nineteen clean-sheets, the best

record of any Sunderland goalkeeper for almost 30 years! An experienced campaigner he made almost 200 appearances for Colchester and played for Tranmere on Ioan. Has also been with Ipswich, Everton and Chelsea without playing a first team game. Born: Ramsey 30-6-64.

DEREK FERGUSON = Midfield. Scottish International signed from Hearts in the summer of 1993 in an exchange deal which rated him at £750,000 and took John Colquhoun the other way. Had made over 100 appearances for Rangers, where he partnered Ray Wilkins, and collected two Championship medals and two Scottish League Cup winners' trophies. Born: Glasgow 31-7-67.


PHIL GRAY = Striker. Top scorer last season with 17 goals. He began his career with Tottenham Hotspur and played for Fulham and Barnsley on loan before joining Luton Town. Was the Hatters leading shooter in 1992-93 with 20 goals and that form persuaded Sunderland to part with £800,000 to capture the Northern Ireland International. Born: Belfast 2-10-68.

MICHAEL GRAY - Left-Back/Midfield. Local lad who has now played more than 50 times for the first team. Scored from outside the box in the first minute of his home debut and is expected to go far. Born: Sunderland 3-8-74.

LEE HOWEY = Striker/Centre-Back. A wholehearted player who hit the headlines with a superb winning goal in the Middlesbrough derby last year. An apprentice with Ipswich in 1987 he drifted into non-League circles after injury before being given a fresh start with his home town club. The brother of Newcastle defender Steve, Lee can operate in attack or defence. Born: Sunderland 1-4-69.

Polish International with 40 caps, he joined Sunderland from Aston Villa in July 1994 for £100,000. Had spent the last two months of the previous seasons on loan at Roker Park. First capped by Poland as a 19-year-old Dariusz played with Mielec and Zasta before helping Legia Warsaw win the Polish Cup twice. Born: Kozuchow 6-6-63.

TONY NORMAN - Goalkeeper. Welsh International of vast experience. Has been at Roker Park since December 1988 after making nearly 550 appearances in ten seasons with Hull City - including a run of five-years without missing a game. Began his career with Burnley in 1976 but didn't get a first team game in four years at Turf Moor. Played against Swindon and Liverpool at Wembley but celebrated his 400th League appearance against West Bromwich Albion on 2-9-89 by breaking his arm! Born: Mancol (North Wales) 24-2-58.

**RICHARD ORD** Central Defender. A product of the Roker Park Youth Team, he made his debut in the 7-0 defeat of Southend United in November 1987 - Sunderland's biggest victory for 31-years. An England Under-21 cap he played mainly at left back in 1993 and though versatile enough to operate in midfield as well prefers a central defensive role. Born: Easington (Co Durham) 3-3-69.

CRAIG RUSSELL - Forward. Was Sunderland's mascot against Liverpool on his tenth birthday. Seven years later he was in the first team. Really made his mark in 1993-94 though when he averaged a goal every three appearances despite playing a lot of time on the left of midfield. Born: larrow 4-2-74.

**MARTIN SMITH** - Midfield. England Under-17 International, Martin made a scoring debut in October 1993. Impressed enough to hold a regular place and finish the season with nine goals. Born: Sunderland 13-11-74.

## THE MAN IN CHARGE



Manager Mick Buxton

Raised on Wearside, and naturally enough as a schoolboy followed Sunderland's every move with enthusiastic appreciation.

He proved a more than capable player himself though it was not Sunderland who gave him a break but Burnley, who honed him into a competent competitive left-fullback. Mick made 16 League appearances for the Turf Moor club plus three as a substitute.

Moved on to play for Halifax Town where his playing career was cut short by injury after 34 League appearances (2 goals); the last being in a I-I draw at Aston Villa on I3th March 1971. Mick had come back after missing 19 games but broke down again.

The lad from Hexham had to call it a day and so turned his attention to coaching with Southend United and Huddersfield Town.

In October 1978 Mick was appointed manager of Huddersfield Town, in succession to Tom Johnston, and achieved great success on a very limited budget at Leeds Road, leading them to the Fourth Division Championship in 1980; and into the Second Division by 1983.

But in 1987 Buxton parted company with the Terriers and took on the managerial role at Scunthorpe United. When Peter Withe became manager of Wimbledon he recruited Mick as his assistant.

A well respected coach who has also served England in this capacity, he joined Sunderland as Reserve Team coach in 1993 and took charge of the first team after the sacking of Terry Butcher in 1993-94.

# UNDER THE SPOTLIGHT

#### Defender Gary Bennett

Long serving player who has been a model of consistency since his arrival from Cardiff City in July 1984 for what has proved to be a real bargain £65,000.

A Manchester lad, Gary was playing amateur football before his name was put on the books of Manchester City in 1979. Spent two years at Maine Road and was then allowed to move to Cardiff City on a free transfer in the summer of 1981.

Was one month, to the day, short of his 20th birthday when he made his League debut for Cardiff City in a 3-2 win at Ninian Park on November 4, 1981, against Wrexham, Made 87 League appearances in all for the Welsh club (11 goals) and was a key member of the side that won promotion to Division Two in 1983.

In his first season in the North-East he helped Sunderland reach the Milk Cup Final in 1985 where they were beaten by Norwich City. It was the first of three Wembley appearances for Sunderland, the others being against Swindon Town in that never to be forgotten Play-Off final and of course in the FA Cup Final of 1992 when Gary failed to emulate his older brother, David – who helped Coventry beat Spurs in the 1987 Final – as he suffered a third Wembley defeat, this time at the hands of Liverpool. Captained Sunderland to the Third Division title in 1988 and enjoyed a successful testimonial against Rangers last season.

Gary, 33, still has a lot to offer. He started this, his eleventh season at Roker Park, at number eight in the list of all time appearance makers for Sunderland.





It wasn't a good week for us. After the disappointment of losing out on a Wembley Final in the Coca-Cola Cup we lost further ground in our fight for survival in the First Division with a 2-0 defeat at Watford.

The stark reality of the scoreline suggests we were well beaten yet in truth Town had seventy per cent of the play at least and dictated the game.

The gaffer was most annoyed about Watford's second goal, when the referee ignored a linesman's flag for offside, suggesting that the man who scored the goal was not interfering with play! Well if scoring is not interfering what is?

That effort from Phillips came in the last minute it must be said and probably didn't alter the course of the points but at the end of the day goal difference could well be vital.

Had luck favoured us better we could easily have taken all three points from this game. Jan Aage Fjortoft conjured up the highlight of the afternoon with a rasping 30-yarder that crashed against the angle at the post and bar.

To round off a depressing week for Swindon fans only Bristol City, of the struggling pack, lost on Saturday, and they were beaten by Port Vale who fitted themselves clear of the relegation zone courtesy of that victory.

Notts County amazingly took three points off Sheffield United with a 2-1 win and Burnley beat Oldham Athletic by the same scoreline.

Portsmouth, on 40 points, West Brom and Stoke City on 41 points, Southend United and Port Vale on 42 points plus Oldham on 43 points are all still very much involved. We are now four points short of fourth bottom Bristol City but we have games in hand.

Port Vale played hosts to Lou Macarl's Stoke City last night; Derby County are home to Burnley tonight.

The Rams still have their sights set on the play-offs and last Saturday's 3-2 home win over Millwall was a shot in the arm. Mark Pembridge, who had been out for five months with a crippling knee injury, scored a stunning goal to set up Derby's win.

These are anxious times for Derby boss Roy McFarland who is under a great deal of pressure after the club boss Lionel Pickering refused to clarify his manager's future before the game. Derby simply have to win this evening which suggests that bottom club Burnley are in for a hard night. Certainly from our own point of view we wish the Rams well.

At the other end of the table the big game this week was Middlesbrough v Barnsley last night. Boro badly needed a win to maintain their challenge for the Championship after losing 1-0 at Bolton on Saturday. The Tykes were still celebrating after an emphatic 3-0 triumph at Reading - their first away win of the year.





The dates for our Easter Funweeks have now been finalised.


We will be at The Marlborough Sports Centre from 10-13 April and at Greendown School from 19-21 April. Both courses are outdoors.



# TOWNTALK

### Tonight Wayne O'Sullivan talks to Colin Benson.

#### Q. You must have been very excited to be involved in the Coca-Cola Cup semi finals?

A. Yes, very much so. They were the biggest games I have ever played in - actually the biggest games for the club so it was very important the fans got right behind us. Down here the boys did the business but couldn't quite hold out at Bolton.

#### Q. Any nerves beforehand?

A. Yeah. If you don't get nerves I think there is something wrong with you on a big night like that. The butterflies were there but I think it is mainly adrenaline. Myself and Eddie (Murray), the two youngest lads in the team were really hyped up for it and went out to try our hardest.

#### Q.Did the gaffer give you any specific instructions?

A. Actually he just told us to go out there and enjoy the games. He told everybody go out there and enjoy them. If you can't enjoy an occasion like that then there is something wrong with you.

## Q. Did you face any particular problems against

A. Not really. Everyone was raving about them before them before the game at Swindon and saying what a great team they were but although we had only done half a job here I thought we more than matched them in most respects I thought we were the better side.

## Q. Did the fact that soccer pundits backed Bolton as the firm favourite help to get you fired up?

A. Yeah, definitely. Everyone had written us off before the first game but we have beaten some of the best teams in the division, such as Middlesbrough and Wolves, so we knew that on our day we are good enough to beat any team. And after the first leg we proved our League position is somewhat misleading.

We know we have had our bad days but we have tried to put a few things right and show everyone that we can be quite a good team. It is just a matter now of finding the consistency to maintain that form week in week out.

## Q. Bolton scored early in the first game to emphasise what people were saying. Did you feel then it was all going to go sour?

A. No. It was a hard goal to give away and we were disappointed. We did not pick them up on the set piece. But we showed a lot of character in the way we came back at them and by the end of the first game I thought we could have been two or three goals up. You need a bit of luck now and again and we haven't had a lot of good fortune lately.

# Q. The semi final of a major competition was a high profile match with the first leg screened live on national television. Are you conscious of just how many people are studying your every move?

A. No not really. At the end of the day we are just grateful to have the chance to play in a game like that. The gaffer gave us a chance and we just tried to produce the goods.

On the field your only concern is to get your own game right and make sure you don't allow the opposition to get the better of you. Not because there are so many people watching you on television but because you want to do your best and help the team win the game.

## Q. The immediate results following the first leg win over Bolton were desperately disappointing. Do you feel there was a sub-conscious reaction?

A. A lot of people have suggested that the possibility of getting to Wembley was playing on our minds and effecting our League form but from a personal point of view I don't think it had any bearing on my game. Until the draw at Grimsby we were just not doing the right things as a whole. We didn't create and we didn't defend well and we suffered accordingly.

It has to be remembered that we played exceptionally well against Bolton in the first game.

# Q. The home defeat by Bristol City was a particularly hard pill for the team to swallow and seemed to set off a negative reaction?

A. Yes. To go that flat after such a good weekend was bitterly disappointing and highlighted one of our problems. A lack of consistency. We can, as we have shown, beat the best teams in the division, but we are just as likely to come unstuck against more modest opposition.

## Q. It must be difficult for a young player trying to establish himself?

A. If we are in the team it is because the gaffer thinks we can do a job. Age does not come into it. Whether you are 21 or 31 you want to win and at the end of the day our performances will be judged on the results.

There is no lack of spirit. Everyone is training very well and backing each other up. We know that we are a lot better than the majority of sides in the First Division but of course we can only prove that by going out and beating them.

There are a lot of good players at the club and I am confident we will pull clear of the relegation zone before too long. We are learning every day and hopefully we will be able to put that knowledge into practice on a match day.

#### Q. You have operated in one of two positions Wayne. Which do you prefer?

A. I like playing in the centre of midfield the best, but I don't really care where I play as long as I do. The manager decided to move me into defence. Right back was something new to me, but I seemed to cope. Right midfield is another position I have occupied but I am just turned 21 and I don't mind experimenting. If I can play in several positions then I obviously will have more chance of getting in the team.

There is no bigger heartache in football than losing a semi-final, and certainly our lads could come no closer to reaching Wembley than actually getting there than they did last Wednesday at Burnden Park.

One last reflection though before we forget this season's Coca-Cola Cup must be to congratulate Jan Aage Fjortoft. His goal at Bolton was his ninth which establishes him as the highest scorer in the competition this season.

Keep Your Shirt On - This is the message from the Football Association's Chief Executive, Graham Kelly, in response to the latest trend among goal scorers to whip their shirts off and whirl them around their heads.

Mr Kelly has written to all the managers in the Premiership and Football League in an attempt to discourage these Tarzan-like displays.

The trend was started by Wrexham's FA Cup hero Gary Bennett and among the latest mimics have been Uwe Rosler of Manchester City and Everton's controversial striker Duncan Ferguson: but Kelly describes this form of celebration as "undignified, unprofessional and silly."

For my part I think they have to be crazy stripping to the waist on a cold winter's afternoon whatever the oceasion!

Whatever happened to the Eleven-Man Game? It is not so many years ago that we considered it unsporting to have one substitute. Now the law makers have just given the thumbs-up to three outfield substitutes.

As from July I, teams will be able to use three substitutes and it will be their choice whether one should be the goalkeeper.

It means that a lot of managers will not bother taking a second 'keeper along so as to give themselves more tactical options outfield.

On the face of it this does not seem a bad suggestion but long term I have many doubts. Within three decades we have swung from basic eleven-man to first twelve-man game, then thirteen and fourteen. Where will it end?

With FIFA now electing to give time-outs a trial our beloved game is fast on the way to becoming truly Americanised and I am fearful that should America's influence become any stronger we could end up with 22 players a side. One team for defensive situations - the other for attack!



# WHERE ARE THEY NOW? TONY GOUGH BYPAUL PLOWMAN

The visit of Sunderland to the County Ground evokes thoughts of both happiness and sadness for the former Town Midfielder Tony Gough, now 54. There was joy in August 1970 when he scored on his debut against the Wearsiders, but anguish at Roker Park seven months later, when a knee injury effectively brought to an end his career in top class football.

Tony had first joined the professional ranks back in 1957, when Bristol Rovers signed him from Bath City. Alan Skirton (Arsenal and Bristol City) and Tony Book (Plymouth and Manchester City) also followed him into League football. But after making just one League appearance for Rovers, Tony fell out with manager Bert Tann and was released.

He returned to the non-League circuit, at first with Trowbridge Town, but that soon posed problems. "I had completed my apprenticeship as an engineer and after a hard day's work, I got fed up with all the long trips to Kent in the Southern League". And so he dropped down to the Wiltshire Premier League with Frome Town.

In 1963, Tony went back to Bath, when Malcolm Allison took over as manager. From an inside-forward position, he was switched to full-back and missed a few games in the seven seasons he stayed at Twerton prior to his recall to Football League action.

The late Fred Ford - who had been assistant manager at Eastville during Tony's brief stay there - brought Tony to Swindon in July 1970. "Technically, I only came to help out with the Reserves", said Tony, "but I told Fred that I wanted to prove that I could play at Second Division level".

He was granted that wish and in due course one of the longest periods of 'exile' for a Football League player came to an end. Eleven years and 121 days had elapsed between Tony's solitary appearance for Rovers and his debut for Town.

As far as debuts go, Tony's was one of the more eventful. Slotting into a midfield berth, he helped Swindon to a 2-0 victory by notching the second goal himself. And for added entertainment for the 17,000 plus crowd, mid-way through the second half Sunderland's Bobby Kerr - one of the few professionals who, at 5'4" was smaller than Tony - brought the crossbar down at the Stratton Bank End.

If it had been a dream debut, the trip to Roker in the following April was something of a nightmare. Sunderland had managed just one goal in their last eight games and were watched by a crowd of only 8,500. But they ran riot, hitting five games before half-time and ending up 5-2 winners. Kerr scored twice and Tony was chaired off with a twisted knee.

But the big time was not quite over for Tony. He was released in July 1971, but joined Hereford - still in the Southern League then - and was captain of the side which reached the Fourth Round of the FA Cup. Media attention was focused on Edgar Street following their Third Round victory over Newcastle.

Tony made a very brief reappearance in the League with Torquay before linking up with Bath for the third time in September 1972. And by the time he had moved on again, to Welton Rovers in 1975, Tony had notched up more than 500 appearances for the Twerton Park club.

A further move took Tony to Melksham Town and he was still playing Sunday morning football in the Bath and District League up to the age of 49!

Tony still lives in Bath and was working for the same engineering company until last September when he was unfortunately made redundant.

I am absolutely thrilled to be playing for Swindon Town. Having been in the first team at Middlesbrough for much of the first-half of the season I lost my place to more senior players and after a while in the Reserves went along and asked Bryan Robson if I could go out on loan somewhere to gain experience.

I felt I needed first team football and he said he would put a few feelers out for me. The following Friday he came back and said Steve McMahon wanted to take me on loan. So I jumped at the chance.

This is the first time I have been away from Middlesbrough since I joined them at 16 and I am enjoying it very much.

You can't get experience like this in the Reserves. I am playing here with good players against good players so it is an invaluable education as far as I am concerned.

My family come from the North-East, Chester-le Street, so Sunderland and Newcastle are our local sides, but my father was manager and coach at Middlesbrough so it was inevitable that I would sign for them.

We have had two managers since he was there in Lennie Lawrence and Bryan Robson who has really got the town buzzing. It is good working under Bryan Robson - you couldn't ask for better - particularly at the level he has played at. He is a good manager and everyone has the utmost respect for him.

Dad is now with Bolton so I don't see him that often and when I do see him we tend to relax and put football away. You need to be able to switch off at times and the family is the best place to do this. We do have a chat about the game of course but nothing too deep.

I am 20 and still have another year left on my contract at Middlesbrough which I will probably see out. We will see what happens after that.

It is a different situation to here. I think Boro have the strength in depth to go all the way and clinch promotion - they will certainly take some stopping. But I would still rather be battling and scrapping for points at the other end, as long as its first team football, than sitting in the stand at Ayresome Park.


