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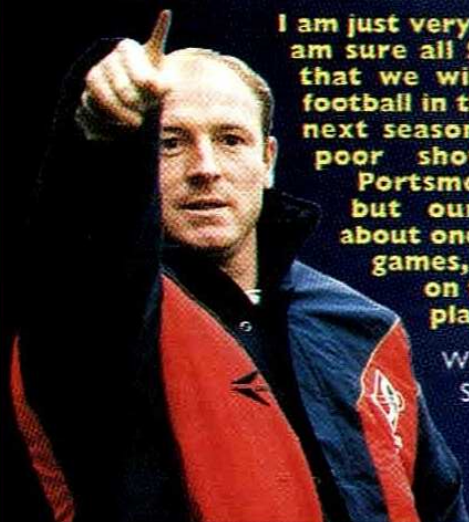
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With **FROM THE TOP** **STEVE McMAHON**

The Youth Team have done really well under John Trollope's guidance it must be said. They have performed well but only as a team. There are no outstanding individuals who would suggest they are going to develop into future first team players, though time will tell.

So it is a total rebuilding programme we have to embark on. It is a tough task but one that I'm looking forward to. I just want to get the people who want to play for me and play for Swindon Town. All I can ask is for our supporters to try and be a little patient and hopefully we can start off on the right track next August. Thank you for your support.

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NOTTS COUNTY *By* JOHN NOLAN



Notts County the oldest club in the Football League, were the first to be relegated to Division Two this season, following a goalless draw at Millwall on April 19th.

It has been a sad and frustrating season, for the Magpies though they have enjoyed the odd glittering moment, none finer than their 2-1 victory over Ascoli at Wembley in the Final of the Anglo Italian Cup. But where it matters, in the League, their form has been disastrous with just eight wins recorded in 43 starts prior to last Saturday's home game with Watford.

Mick Walker was in charge when the season opened at Portsmouth. County had signed just three players, all on free transfers; Michael Emanalo from Molenbeck, Colin Hoyle from Bradford City and Paul Reece from Oxford United, and Hoyle was included at right-back with Reece on the substitutes bench.

Portsmouth won 2-1 but County supporters were encouraged by a 1-1 draw with money bags Wolves followed by an emphatic 3-1 win at Bramall Lane. Gary McSwegan helped himself to two goals that evening, a feat he repeated in the rousing 3-0 eclipse of Tottenham Hotspur in the Third Round of the Coca-Cola Cup, a magical triumph that followed a run of ten First Division games without a win.

Mick Walker had been axed by then, Russell Slade taking charge of team affairs, but the fizz that showered Ossie's Tottenham soon went flat. Notts lost 2-1 at Burnley and 1-0 at Southend before securing only their second League win of the season, on November 5, a 3-2 home victory over Sunderland.

County were struggling 18 points short of the safety line when Howard Kendall was persuaded to take the helm on January 12. The team responded with a 3-0 win over Burnley: Devlin, White and McSwegan scoring the goals for their first win since beating Tranmere Rovers 1-0 on December 6.

Kendall was hailed as the new Messiah as Notts completed a double over Sunderland and returned to Wembley for that Euro triumph over Ascoli. But subsequent rewards in the League were not forthcoming and Kendall's reign was terminated after 79 days, not because of poor results it was claimed but because they did not like the way he was running the club.

The former Everton boss had not been able to influence the club's standing in the First Division but he did leave as a legacy two of his signings. Steve Nicol and Jason Kearton. Nicol along with coach Wayne Jones has assumed responsibility for team matters with Dean Thomas looking after the Reserves.

TONY AGANA - Striker. A former insurance salesman he has been unable to reproduce the scoring form to secure Notts County's presence in the First Division. Dave Bassett signed him for Watford - he began his career with Welling then Weymouth - then took him to Bramall Lane with him. It was with Sheffield United that Tony enjoyed a prolific striking partnership with Brian Dean. In November 1991 County paid a club record £750,000 for his services. He scored only his 6th goal of the season against Ascoli at Wembley in the Anglo Italian Cup Final. Born: London 2-10-63.



TONY AGANA

PETER BUTLER - Midfield. Tenacious grafter who started his career with Huddersfield Town in 1984. Had limited opportunities with Cambridge United (loan) and Bury before establishing himself with Southend United in 1988. Won promotion in consecutive seasons with them then a serious knee injury cost him his place. In August 1992 West Ham United signed him for £170,000. Left the Hammers in October 1994 to join County for £350,000. Born: Halifax 27-8-66.

STEVE CHERRY - Goalkeeper. In his sixth year with County this former England Youth International commenced his career with Derby County, making his League bow in a 2-2 draw with Southampton in February 1980. Played for Port Vale on loan (80-81), and in 1984 signed for Walsall. Two years later he joined Plymouth Argyle and in February '89 switched to County for £70,000; and has now featured in well over 300 games. Born: Nottingham 5-8-60



STEVE CHERRY

PAUL DEVLIN - Midfield. Signed from non-League Stafford Rangers for £40,000 in February 1992 after taking part in trials with Liverpool and Leeds United. Plays wide on the flank and is not a bad crosser. Made his 125th appearance for County at Sunderland in January. Has contributed 11 goals this season. Born: Birmingham Age 22.

MICHAEL GALLOWAY - Midfield. Exciting young discovery who has emerged through the Youth ranks. It was Howard Kendall who recognised his potential by including him in the senior squad but it was the new management team who gave him his debut, as a substitute at Luton on April 8th. Has started in the last three games. Born: Nottingham. Age: 20

GRAEME HOGG - Central Defender. A Scottish Under-21 International who learned his trade with Manchester United. Was five years at Old Trafford, making 83 League appearances (1 goal), before moving to Portsmouth in August 1988 for £150,000. Clocked up another 100 League games for Pompey, and 7 on loan to West Bromwich Albion, before leaving Fratton Park in August 1991 to play for Hearts. In January 1995 he was transferred to County for £75,000. A tough rugged competitor. Born: Aberdeen 28-7-66.

ANDY LEGG - Midfield. His slight stature belies the power within - for Andy, who joined County from Swansea City in July 1993 for £275,000, is in the Guinness Book of Records with the longest throw-in in League football. Turned down West Brom and Portsmouth to join County and was crowned Player of the Year by the young supporters in 1994. Started his career with Briton Ferry. Born: Neath 28-7-66.



ANDY LEGG

CHRIS MARSDEN - Midfield. A £250,000 capture from Wolves, where he was unable to secure a regular place, in November 1994, he scored on his County debut in a 3-3 Anglo Italian Cup tie with Venezia. Previously with Sheffield United And Coventry City. He was out with a broken toe in January. Born: Sheffield Age: 26.

SHAUN MURPHY - Central Defender. It was Shaun's performances for Australia in the 1992 Summer Olympics (they won through to the Semi-Final) that attracted attention from Meadow Lane and the Sydney born footballer was quickly signed up from Perth Italia. Made his bow in English football in September 1992 as a sub against Barnsley but took time to adjust to the pace and the passion of our game. Shaun, who has an Irish father and Anglo-Indian mother, prefers playing centre-half though Neil Warnock had him earmarked for a midfield role. Born: Sydney 5-10-70.

PAUL REECE - Goalkeeper. Signed on a free transfer from Oxford United in August 1994, he made his County bow in an Anglo Italian Cup tie with Lecce in September 1994 and kept a clean sheet. He got his League chance the following month against Derby County (0-0) and played in seven games before Steve Cherry returned to the team. Has recently been in favour again. Played for the County Youth Team but served his apprenticeship with Stoke City. Has also served Kettering Town, Grimsby Town and Doncaster Rovers. Born: Nottingham 16-10-68.

KEVIN RUSSELL - Forward. A £60,000 capture from AFC Bournemouth in February 1995 this 28 year old former Leicester City star provides a lot of forward movement. Served his apprenticeship with Brighton but was introduced to League football by his hometown club Portsmouth, in a 4-0 win over Bradford City in May 1986. In the summer of 1987 he signed for Wrexham and then moved on to Leicester City. Has played on loan with Peterborough, Cardiff, Hereford and Stoke. Born: Portsmouth 6-12-66.

CHRIS SHORT - Defender. Has made around 100 appearances since being introduced to the County side on New Year's Day 1991. Signed from Scarborough for £100,000 he did have a trial with Manchester United. Best position is right back but has not featured too often this season. Born: Munster, Germany 5-5-70

MICHAEL SIMPSON - Midfield. Was on Schoolboy forms with Nottingham Forest but when they did not offer him an apprenticeship he crossed the Trent to Meadow Lane. Progressed well and was given a professional contract in the summer of 1992 making his debut the following season. Still relatively inexperienced he has been given a chance by the new management team. Born: Derbyshire 28-2-74.

PHIL TURNER - Midfield. Has been a part of the Notts County scene since March 1989 and has been to Wembley four times with the team. Formerly with Lincoln City, Grimsby Town and Leicester City, Phil made his County bow at Reading and has now chalked up nearly 300 appearances. Can also operate in defence or attack he was valued at £125,000 on the part-exchange deal that took Gary Mills to Leicester. Born: Sheffield 12-2-62.

DEVON WHITE - Striker. At six-foot-three is a handful in the air. A Nottingham lad he was playing for Arnold Town when Lincoln City spotted him and gave him his chance to play League Football. Scored 4 goals in 29 appearances and was released to join Boston United. Bristol Rovers then took him on in 1987 and Devon became a firm favourite scoring 53 goals in 202 League outings. In March 1992 he was bought by Cambridge United and in 1993-94 was snapped up by QPR. Was unable to establish himself with the Rangers and after making just one appearance for them this season signed with Notts County in a £100,000 deal. Born: Nottingham 2-3-64.

THE MEN IN CHARGE



Wayne Jones, Steve Nicol & Dean Thomas

Since the departure of Howard Kendall first team affairs have been jointly controlled by Wayne Jones, Steve Nicol and Dean Thomas.

Jones who was formerly the coach, is the senior partner. He is no stranger to the West Country having played 250 games for Bristol Rovers before he was forced to quit through injury at the age of 24. Stayed on as physiotherapist and later became assistant manager before joining Shrewsbury Town as physio and Youth Team boss.

After a spell in the Middle East Wayne became physio at County under Jimmy Sirrel then worked with Huddersfield Town in a similar capacity before Mick Walker brought him back to Meadow Lane in 1994. This season he started as Reserve Team coach, became assistant manager to Russell Slade, then Youth Team manager under Kendall and now heads the management team.

Steve Nicol needs no introduction. Kendall secured him on a free transfer from Liverpool in January 1995 as a player-coach. An outstanding utility player he started his career with Ayr United, joining Liverpool in 1981.

Steve's first triumph with the Reds was a Central League Championship medal and he went on to claim League Championship and FA Cup gold with winning appearances at Wembley in 1986, 1989 and 1992. Was an automatic choice for Scotland between 1985 and '90 when he was capped 23 times but he missed the World Cup Finals in Italy because of injury.

Dean Thomas who played with Middlesbrough, Wimbledon, Dusseldorf and Northampton Town before settling down at Meadow Lane in 1990 had been a regular selection in midfield until this season. A cruciate ligament injury has limited him to just one Reserve Team outing in 1994-95 and Dean is now concentrating on coaching the Reserves.

UNDER THE SPOTLIGHT

Defender/Midfielder **Gary Mills**

Returned to Meadow Lane, for his second spell with the club, in September 1994, following a £50,000 move from Leicester City.

A former England Schools double International - capped at both football and rugby - he served his apprenticeship with Nottingham Forest, making his League debut in a 2-1 win over Arsenal on the 9th September 1978.

Gary played 58 League games for Forest before moving to Derby County in 1987. Made just 18 Second Division appearances for the Rams in a year and returned to play under Brian Clough in the summer of 1983 having spent that and the previous summer in the NASL with Seattle Sounders.

John Barnwell first signed him for Notts County in July 1987 at a cost of £57,000. In March 1989 he was sold to Leicester City for £275,000 after 96 appearances and established himself as a classy right-sided midfielder.

Shouldered much of the responsibility in the Leicester team after the departure of Gary McAlister to Leeds, and as captain he encompassed auxiliary duties at both right-back and on the wing.

A good tackler, accurate passer and sweet striker of the ball he is always comfortable in possession and a consistent performer. Played at Wembley in the Play-Off Finals for Leicester and in the Anglo Italian Cup with County. Was rewarded with two England caps at Under -21 level.

Born: Northampton 11-11-61.





ENDSLEIGH LEAGUE PREVIEW

It's all over for us. That 2-0 home defeat by Portsmouth last Saturday confirmed our future is in the Second Division next season. To suffer the ignominy of relegation is hard enough: to experience it twice in two years is almost unbearable.

It is no good crying over spilt milk. It is roll your sleeves up time, time to start turning the corner and battle back. Alas, following the sequence of results on Saturday, tonight's joust with Notts County has little significance other than personal pride.

No doubt County will be eager to get a win, for if they can beat us tonight and follow that up with victory at Port Vale on Sunday there is a chance they could finish the season one place off the bottom rung. Bristol City have a tough assignment at Millwall to come and if they fail there and County pick up six points it will be the Ashton Gate club who collect the wooden spoon.

In a way though all four demoted teams have equal shares in the wooden spoon come what may. It's Burnley, Bristol City, Notts County and ourselves for the drop and there can be no satisfaction in that whatever the final standings.

With the relegation issue settled interest now focuses on the battle at the top. Middlesbrough are clearly in the driving seat for the Championship and automatic promotion to the Premiership and they climax their campaign with a fixture of great significance at Tranmere on Sunday. Only Bolton can topple Bryan Robson's charges and to do this they have not only to win both their remaining fixtures, and hope 'Boro lose their one outstanding game, but in the process of all this also score two more goals than the Ayresome Park leaders.

It seems certain you can put your money on 'Boro taking the title.

Meanwhile Tranmere have not only blown their own table aspirations but their qualification for the Play-Offs is in jeopardy as well. Beaten 5-1 by West Bromwich Albion they face a crucial encounter with Wolverhampton Wanderers at Prenton Park tonight. They badly need three points to stave off the challenge of Barnsley who have a tricky trip to Southend as their finale to the League programme.

Wolves, disappointingly held to a 0-0 draw at Grimsby Town could well be equally as desperate for the

points. If Barnsley managed to beat Oldham Athletic at Oakwell last night they will remain a serious threat to both Tranmere and Wolves and could edge one of them out of the Play-Offs. It certainly looks likely that Wolves will be needing a win when we visit Molineux on Sunday. It will be a real test of character for our lads.

It now seems as if Bolton Wanderers will need to reach Wembley for the second time this season if their dreams of Premiership football next season are to become reality. A 3-1 defeat at Oldham on Saturday placed Bruce Rioch's men back on their heels. The Burnden Park outfit are suddenly finding goals hard to come by, a situation they must put right at Stoke City tonight, they will be red hot favourites to win.

It must be said that on paper Bolton have the easiest finish with Stoke tonight and a home game against doomed Burnley on Sunday but as we all know football hardly ever keeps to the script.

The surprise package this season has been rampant Reading. A 2-1 win at Ashton Gate on Saturday pushed them into second place, just two points short of Middlesbrough. They had played a game more than their immediate rivals, and two more than Tranmere, but as at the bottom points in the bag are better than games in hand at this stage. Their final fling on Sunday is home to Charlton and a win, maybe even just a draw, will clinch them a Play-Off place.

Southend are on a great run under acting manager Steve Thompson. Their 2-1 win at Derby County on Saturday continued their success to just two defeats in eleven games. It was genuinely felt that Gary Jones' winner was way offside at the Baseball Ground, a goal that cost Derby boss Roy McFarland his job.

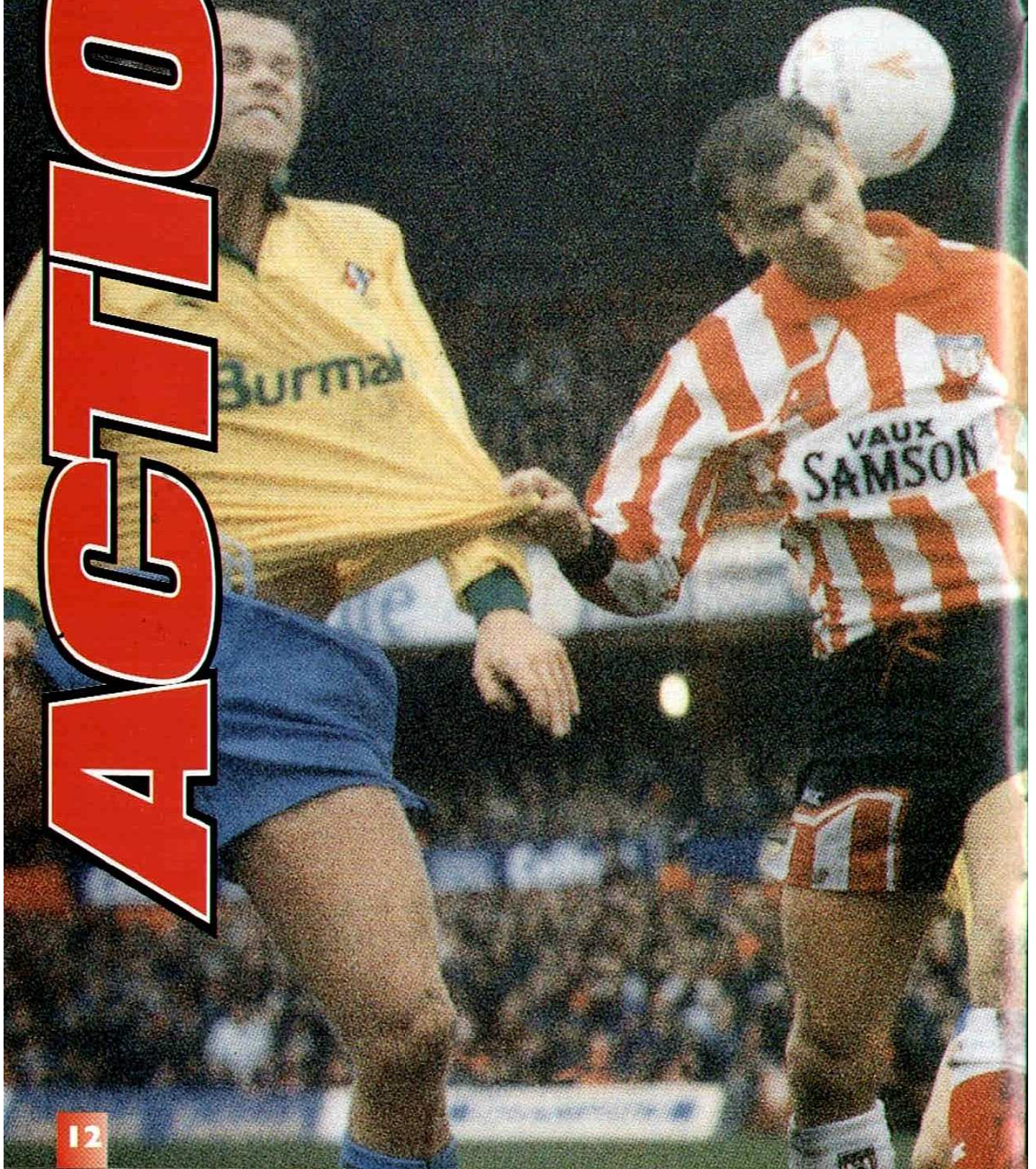
In eighteen months McFarland had raised more than £6 million in transfer sales to stave off the Rams financial crisis but he has had to pay a high price himself for failure to make the Play-Offs.

On Thursday 1 June we are having our first Funday at Highworth's Blackworth Playing Fields and the following day will be at Greendown School.

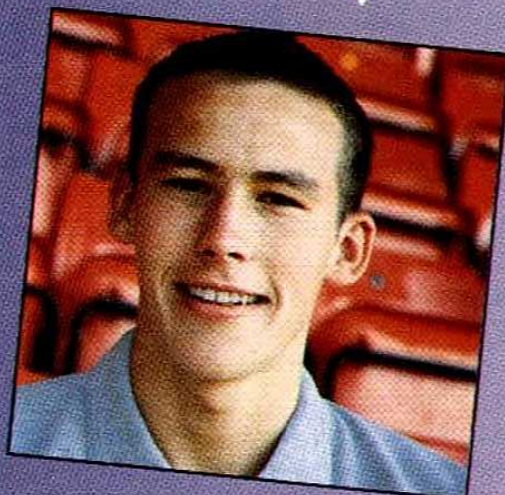
Both courses are outdoors and again will be from 10.00am until 3.00pm. Please bring suitable clothing and a packed lunch.

We are then faced with the mammoth Summer Funweeks throughout July and August. Venues already confirmed include Swindon, Devizes, Chippenham and Highworth.

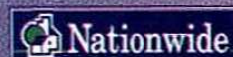
Full details will be available from the Community Office next month.

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TOWN TALK

This evening Colin Benson talks with Shaun Taylor.

Q. How would you sum up this season Shaun?

A. I don't think we were ever out of the top five for the first couple of months and at that time we looked like serious contenders for promotion. Then we hit a bad patch and all of a sudden we seemed to drop down the League very quickly.

Q. Was it a situation that you were really not aware of the dangers until the stark reality of relegation loomed large against our position?

A. I think you are probably right Colin. When we were in the top five we were content thinking that we were good enough and at least worth a Play-Off position. And when we didn't win we were perhaps not too alarmed because a lot of those games were drawn and could have gone our way with a little bit of luck. But of course every time we draw we lost two points and then suddenly our standing in the League was not so good. We beat Wolves in early October and didn't win another League game until mid January when we beat Middlesbrough 2-1.

That victory and the ones over Millwall and Bolton in the Coca-Cola Cup suggested we were a much better side than our position in the First Division table indicated. In fact just a few weeks ago we didn't feel threatened, we thought that if we got a few more points we would be okay. But suddenly the games and points were gone and we found ourselves depending on others to slip up to save us.

Q. The defeat at home by Stoke City was really the killer wasn't it?

A. I think you can look at the games we have lost 1-0 at home. It started with Charlton, we completely dominated the game and lost 1-0. We played very well against Bolton at home and lost 1-0. If we had got something out of those games, and the one with Stoke of course, we wouldn't be in the situation we are in now.

The Stoke game was particularly disappointing because of their lowly position and the fact that we had just achieved a very good draw at Sheffield United on the Saturday. We were all very keen to get another good score to put us in a position to climb out of the bottom four.

Q. Can you put your finger on what is wrong. Only once this season have we put together two League wins back to back. Then we lost the next four?

A. Injuries and suspensions have meant that we have hardly been able to get a settled side out. Over the season we have had some long-term injuries that have affected us badly. Paul Bodin with his back. Myself and the Gaffer have both had broken arms; Ian Culverhouse and Adrian Viveash. These have all been very disruptive. I don't think the team settled at all this season.

Q. There is a theory that teams get used to losing and it becomes a habit. I think you could say that of us last season in the Premiership. Do you think this mental attitude has maybe carried over?

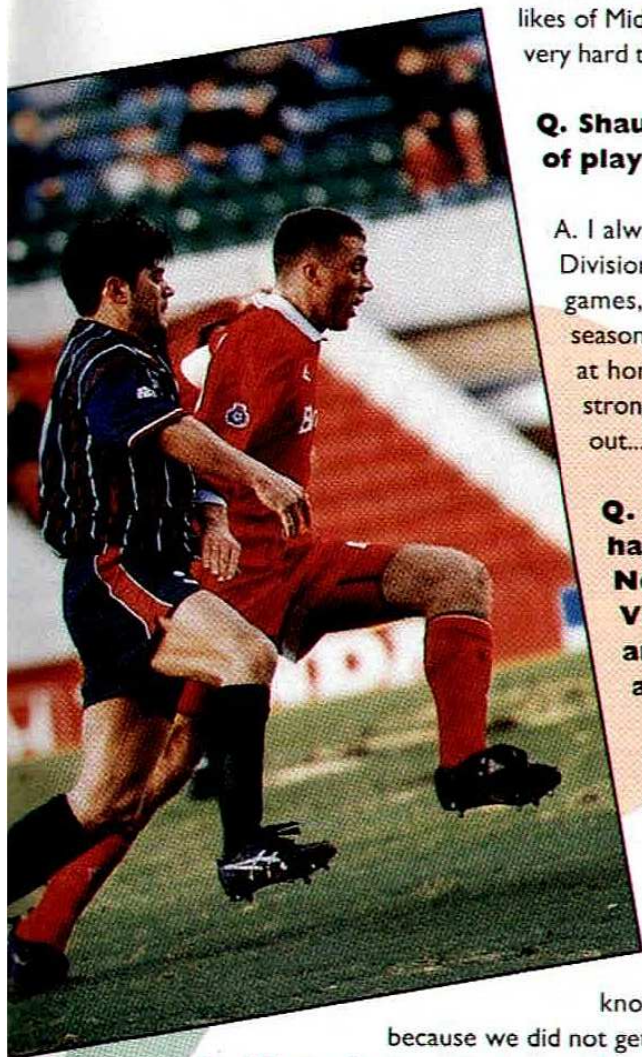


A. Yes, it is quite possible. You can get into habits, a good habit is a winning one a bad habit is losing. We seem to have hit a rut where we are losing far more games than we should and this shows in the statistics for the last two seasons.



Looking back at the Premier League we were not that bad a side really. The sides coming down this year are probably going to get less points than we did. The gulf is now getting even bigger. We felt we were good enough, not necessarily to go straight back up, but to contest a top half of the League position. To be in the bottom four two years running is not a pretty thing.

There are a few of us who have actually played in the lower Leagues and it is a lot different. It will not be easy at all next season. The crowds for one thing are smaller, the stadia as a whole are not as grand, places like Huddersfield and Scunthorpe excepted, and the quality of the teams is poorer. Clubs have individuals but nothing to compare with the Blackburn's and Manchester United's and even in our Division the likes of Middlesbrough and Wolves. I have nothing against it but it will be very hard to get players motivated.



Q. Shaun do you think we will have to alter our style of play to be competitive in Division Two?

A. I always go back to my days at Exeter when we won the Fourth Division Championship. We won 21 and drew two of our 23 home games, and played football, passed the ball about. But I think that season we only won four away. It showed that you could play football at home but not so much away. I think you need to be that much stronger and determined to get results away. You have to slug them out...Yet in the end we won that Championship by ten clear points.

Q. Successive demotions are not unique. It has happened to Wolves and to our visitors tonight, Notts County. Sheffield Wednesday and Aston Villa have been down to the old Third Division and come back gloriously, obviously this is the ambition now for Swindon Town?

A. I think everyone, from the players right through, we have got to sit down and plan and support each other. We know what it is like to play in the Premiership, we know what the standard of the First Division is and we need to get out of the Second Division as quickly as we can.

No one has a divine right to be in any Division but we all know that we should not be in this position. we went down because we did not get enough points and that is down to the players really, no one else. We are the ones out there on the pitch. It is down to us.

Q. So you feel you have let the fans down?

A. When you get relegated as players you have let everybody down, including yourself. Every individual wants to play at the best standard they can and this time last year we were in the Premiership. I'm not saying we won't come back but it is a lot harder than people think to get out of the lower Divisions.

If we can't do it by winning the League then we have to do it through the back door, through the Play-Offs. I don't think they are a bad thing. They have their detractors but I think they are good for the game. The crowds come and you can play at Wembley which is good. I'm all for them. We owe the fans a few good results.

Talking to Steve McMahon the other day about the current situation, the manager's plea to the fans was to bear with us. To judge him in twelve month's time.

"Three years", was the interjection from Andy Rowland. "All right then. Three years." agreed Steve with a chuckle.

Andy had raised a laugh when few were audible yet it is not so very many moons ago that the accepted period for a manager to take control of a club and build a winning side was seen as three years minimum.

To be honest this is a far more realistic time-scale than is currently the mode. We have manager's these days sacked after six-months, some even quicker, as the desperate search for instant success is sought by directors and fans alike.

Where is the stability? Even established winners such as Ron Atkinson and George Graham have not been safe. Men with big reputations such as Howard Kendall and Jim Smith have bitten the dust. So maybe Steve is being more realistic to the demands of the people than to the logical mechanics of the job.

These days manager's are not given the time because the public, who in the end influence the directors, want immediate results.

It is very difficult as Steve agrees. He points out: "You can't just change things over night. You can have a reaction, but then you level out again. The initial response from the players can be great. I think we won three out of four games when I arrived, then we got back to our level.

Unfortunately for Steve the motivation of a new gaffer at the

helm corresponded with Cup games. As he says, if they had been League games we would not be facing life in Division Two next season.

Says Steve: "The Coca-Cola Cup though it was a big thing for the supporters did not really help at all. It is a sad fact that it got in the way of the important issue.

"At the time of the Coca-Cola Cup run we had five players on 20 disciplinary points. They all wanted to play in the Semi-Final with Bolton Wanderers so in order to do that they protected themselves in League games - which is only natural - so that they would not incur further yellow cards and suspension."

The fact that a drop of Coke did nothing to send a sparkle through our First Division campaign was perhaps more indicative of the true quality of our League standing. It bubbled at times without fizzing over.

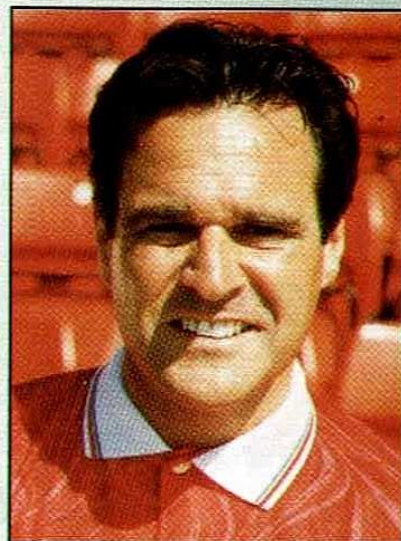
But as the gaffer rightly points out our demise has been the product of a catalogue of circumstances. The line between success and failure is very fine. The lads could have run out at Wembley to take on Liverpool in the Coca-Cola Cup Final. And on the overall play certainly could have been safe from relegation.

As it is "they have done nothing," says the gaffer who adds: "It is that fine line the players have to be conscious of. It is just that little bit more that is called for. Up the tempo a bit and make things go your way".

Competing is second nature to a man like Steve McMahon, and it must be hard at times for him to tolerate performances that are less than total and absolute commitment. His passion and pride in the game is contagious but not all are able to respond in a likewise fashion. It is something he has had to come to terms with as a player but as a manager it can be even more frustrating and certainly more disruptive.

So now he has to start virtually from scratch again. I agree with Andy that it takes a minimum of three years for a manager to get things the way he wants. Patience and time will bring their rewards.


Two demotions in two years is hard to stomach but remember the harder you fall the greater the joy of success when it does come. I'm sure come this time next year we will have more positive things on our mind.

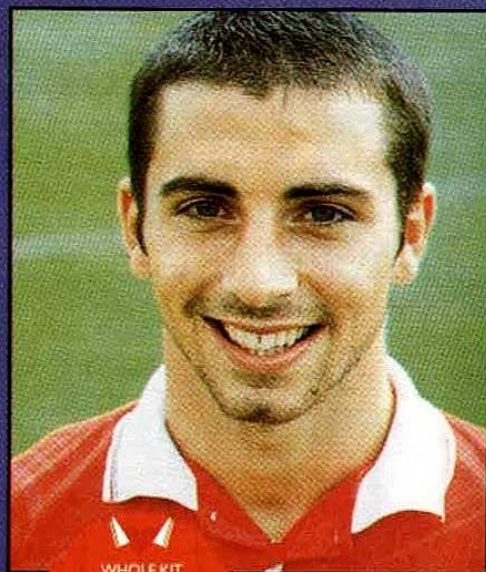
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WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

ERIC WEAVER

Eric now lives in a quiet village in North Yorkshire. He has no regular contact with his colleagues of the 1960's, but keeps in touch with an old friend who is now club physio at Meadow Lane, Dennis Pettitt.

Eric grew up in the Welsh valleys at Rhymney and played rugby for his school. At sixteen he joined the RAF, where he first met Dennis. From Cosford, near Wolverhampton, Eric was transferred to RAF Rudloc Manor at Box - and it was while playing for the representative side there that he was offered a trial by Town manager Bert Head.

That trial was in a Combination game at Reading on November 29 1961 and Eric made an immediate impression. "On this display he looked as good a left-winger as I have seen for quite a time", enthused the Town boss. It was praise indeed from a man who had just unearthed another youngster named Donald Rogers.

Just eleven days later, Eric found himself in the Town's Third Division line-up against Southend. He was still only 18, but in good company as there were no less than five other teenagers in the side - Ernie Hunt, Mike O'Hara, Mike Summerbee, John Trollope and Terry Wollen.

Eric remained on amateur forms and when he was not in a Swindon shirt he could often be found assisting Trowbridge Town, where Bert's son David was manager. In Town's first ever promotion campaign - 1962/63 - Eric appeared just three times, over the Easter period. And while they were enjoying their first taste of life in the

Second Division, Eric was posted to Nairobi in Kenya. During his time out there he again took up rugby - and represented East Africa against Wales!

But he bought himself out of the RAF in August 1965 and soon afterwards signed professional for the Town. In a pre-season friendly at Bristol City, Eric took over from Summerbee on the right-wing and did enough to convince Danny Williams to give him a regular place when "Buzzer" left for Manchester City on the eve of the new season. It proved to be Eric's best spell at the County Ground.

That autumn Swindon went goal crazy. In five home games, Town hit 6,3,5,5 and 6, With Eric supplying a string of crosses for Keith East and company to knock in. A typical goal spree came in an F.A. Cup tie at Grantham, where it was 0-0 for almost an hour. Then Eric struck and the flood gates opened, with another five coming inside twenty minutes!

He could not have started 1966/67 any better, with one of the fastest goals of the season, in the third minute. But it was over for Eric almost before it had begun when, on September 13, he suffered a knee injury in the first ten minutes of a League Cup tie against Portsmouth. A cartilage operation followed and Eric played just three more senior games for the club.

In the 1967 close season, Northampton Town manager Dave Bowen showed interest in signing Eric and he played in a friendly against Notts County. The Magpies promptly signed him! But, just four months later, Mr Bowen got his man and Eric stayed at Northampton until 1970. Persistent injury problems persuaded him to hang up his boots after spells with non-League Boston and then Telford.

He took up a career in insurance until 1979 and then moved on to chartered surveyors and estate agents, but is now taking life more leisurely. "Like a few of the old pros, I've got an arthritic knee which gives me a few problems", said Eric, 51. "I'm semi-retired now - but I can look back on some brilliant times with Swindon." Can't we all?
