

You could see that even at half time the lads were not frustrated by the fact that they had not been able to pull back Cambridge's 2-1 load that they brought with them from the first leg.

It was patience. We knocked the ball about, kept playing the same way, and that is what I said at halftime. Be patient and your chance will come. All credit to them, we were, we didn't force the play too much. We kept sticking to our principles of playing and it worked. It worked a treat.

Two headed goals from players not noted for their scoring ability in this respect but is doesn't matter where they come from does it? I was just delighted with the performance over all. I was delighted with the spirit and delighted with the commitment shown by all the players.

There was a tremendous atmosphere and hopefully we are getting a good relationship with the supporters. They understand that it has been hard over the last six or eight months and that we are trying to get things right.

I always said when I first arrived that you have got to be patient.

This is important because we need to get a lot of things sorted out at this club. It has taken time but I feel as though we are getting there slowly, I really do.

We are still not there by any means, and still have a lot of hard work to do. But with the help of the supporters and the players together - because we are all in it together at the end of the day - I think we can get it right.

The sign of a good team is the substitutes. If you look at the bench and see quality players on the side then that is the sign of a good team and our subs did us proud on Wednesday.

Unfortunately the injuries to Seagraves and Thorne look like keeping them out for a while. Thorney, who has hurt the tendon at the back of his knee, has aggravated the same injury and could struggle for a week or two. And big Siggy has had a couple of whacks on one calf that should clear up within a week.

Tonight it is derby time. To our supporters the game with Oxford has just as much charisma as a Liverpool-Everton game and it is very important. A derby is a derby. Passion, pride and yes prejudice, it is not Manchester City v United but I tell you what tonight is just as important to the punters and the players.







## Oxford United the Visitors

It is not so long ago that Oxford United were strutting about in the top division but like us they have fallen from grace and are now seeking to re-establish themselves as a promotion force.

The U's were not far off a Play-Off place last May. A 2-1 home defeat by Swansea City in the penultimate fixture finally dashing their hopes. They had needed to win their last two games and had taken the lead through David Rush.

During the summer manager
Denis Smith made two significant
signings. He plumped for the
reliability and experience of that
seasoned striker Wayne Biggins, a
bargain free signing from Stoke
City, and returned to his old
stamping ground to bring Mark
Angel from Sunderland, again on a
free transfer.

Having released just two players, Paul Wanless, who joined Lincoln City, and Anton Rogan, who moved to Millwall, last season's squad has been given the responsibility of securing the success everyone at the Manor Ground is hoping for.

Quoted at 16-1, Oxford kicked off the new season with a home victory over Chesterfield, Chris Allen scoring the only goal four minutes from time. The winger, who was valued at £1 million last season, vowed he would double that value this season. He said: 'The boss Denis Smith wants ten goals out of me this season. I'll get 15 because I want to impress people and get that valuation up to £2 million.'

A trip to Brentford was not the ideal excursion to open their away Second Division programme and a 1-0 defeat was suffered at Griffin Park on the second Saturday of the season. Gilchrist, Massey and Lewis were grafted in for this game at the expense of Wood, Rush, who came on as a substitute, and Robert Ford.

In the Coca-Cola Cup a safe passage was scored into the Second Round last week, at the expense of Hereford United, when Allen was again on target, his opening strike netted in the seventh minute. Smith and Moody added to a 3-2 win on the night and a safe 5-2 aggregate victory.

Wayne Biggins had opened his scoring account for Oxford in the

first-leg at Hereford when he fired home a 35th minute penalty. Matthew Murphy made it 2-0 with two minutes to go.

#### Chris Allen

- FORWARD. A speedy winger, said to be the quickest in the Second Division, who knows how to finish in front of goal. Was drafted into the side in February 1992, having graduated from the Youth ranks. Made his debut in the Zenith Data Systems and FA Cups before getting his League chance. A regular marksman at Youth and Reserve levels he has not been so prolific in the senior eleven, netting his 13th goal on the opening day of this season his 150th appearance. Scored for the Endsleigh League side in Italy and was in the England Under-21 squad this summer. Born: Oxford 18.11.72

Mark Angel

- WINGER. A new recruit from Roker Park, he made his Oxford debut on the opening day of the season as a sub against Chesterfield. Never got a first team game at Sunderland but has impressed the Manor faithful. Born: Newcastle 23.08.75

#### Tim Carter

- GOALKEEPER. A free transfer capture from Blackpool just prior to the start of the season and only a month after he had joined the Seasiders from Millwall. Started his career with Bristol Rovers - playing over 50 games - and won three England Youth caps . Season 1987-88 was an interesting one. Tim playing for Rovers, Newport County (loan), Sunderland and Carlisle (loan), following a £50,000 move to Sunderland. Was six years at Roker but never became a regular and had further loan spells with Bristol City and Birmingham City. Born: Bristol 05.06.67.

#### Matthew Elliot

- CENTRAL DEFENDER. Learned his trade in non-League football with Epsom & Ewell before Charlton Athletic gave him a go. Only got one senior game for them however, in a League Cup tie in 1988, but a move to Torquay United in 1989 provided the turning point. Was a regular at Plainmoor helping the Gulls win promotion via the Play-Off Finals in 1991. They beat Blackpool on penalties and Matt was back at Wembley the following year, this time with Scunthorpe but as runners up this time to Blackpool. Skippered the Irons and was Player of the Year before signing for Oxford in November 1993.



Mike Ford

- DEFENDER/MIDFIELD, Hails from Bristol but spent his early days with Leicester City. They released him and in 1985 he signed for Cardiff City with whom he played 162 games. Oxford paid £150,000 for his transfer in the summer of 1988 but injury in pre-season resulted him in not making his debut until January 1989. Born: Bristol 09.02.66.

#### Robert Ford

- MIDFIELD. A 20-year old who won England Youth caps in 1992-93 and is very highly rated by the Manor management. Played for the Endsleigh League Under-21 selection last season having made the breakthrough into the Oxford team in the Anglo-Italian Cup in 1993-94. Started this season with his 46th appearance.

Born: Bristol 22.09.74.

Phillip Gilchrist

- MIDFIELD. A trainee with
Nottingham Forest he was offered
Professional terms but did not play
in the first team and was released.
He joined Middlesbrough, but
again could not make the
breakthrough, until he joined his
local club Hartlepool United, who
gave him his League debut against
Stoke City in December 1992.
Joined Oxford for a small fee in
February 1995 and was an instant
success, scoring his only senior
goal for United vs Chester City.
Born: Stockton-on-Tees 25.08.73.

Mickey Lewis

- MIDFIELD. Started his career with West Bromwich Albion for whom he made 33 appearances before moving to Derby County in a £25,000 deal. A ball-winner, Mickey chalked up 49 games for the Rams before signing for Oxford in the summer of 1988 in a part-exchange deal. Always committed he is a firm favourite with the fans and an experienced competitor with over 400 senior appearances. Born: Birmingham 15.02.65.

Stuart Massey

- DEFENDER. Now in his second season at the Manor after Crystal Palace released him in the summer of '94. Gained most of his experience in non-League circles with Sutton United and Carshalton. Crystal Palace spaid £20,000 for him in 1992 but he only got a handful of games for them. Can play midfield or fullback. Born: Crawley 17.11.64.



#### Paul Moody

- STRIKER. Signed from
Southampton in February 1994, the
6'3" striker had scored 33 goals in
81 appearances prior to the start of
this campaign. Southampton paid
Waterlooville £50,000 for him and
he made his Saints bow on the
opening day of the 1991-92 season
but could never establish a regular
selection. Scored his first League
goal against Stockport, while on
loan to Reading. Made a great
impression at Oxford with 8 goals
in just 15 games at the end of
the 1993-94 season.

Born: Waterlooville 13.06.67.




Matthew Murphy

- MIDFIELD. A £20,000 signing from Corby Town in February 1993 he is a former building society clerk. Was one of the top shots in the Beazer Homes League and made his Oxford bow at the end of the 1992-93 season against Newcastle United. Did not get a first team game the following season but came into the side again last term.

Born: Northampton 20.08.71.

Les Robinson

- DEFENDER. Started his career as a midfielder with Mansfield Town making his debut in March 1985. In November 1986 he joined Stockport County where he was an ever-present until a £10,000 move to Doncaster Rovers in 1988. Injuries interrupted his progress but a move to fullback proved highly successful and attracted the attention of Oxford who paid £15,000 for him just prior to the 1990 transfer deadline. Did not miss a game last season when he was crowned Player of the Year. Born: Shirebrook 01.03.67.



#### David Rush

- STRIKER, Became the third member of Sunderland's 1992 FA Cup Final team to follow Denis Smith to the Manor Ground when he signed for £100,000 in September 1994. A trainee with Notts County he moved to Sunderland to finish his apprenticeship and made his first team bow for them in the League Cup in September 1989. His best spell was in 1991-92 when he played 32 games. including the Cup Final vs Liverpool. Had loan spells with Hartlepool, Peterborough and Cambridge before settling down

Born: Sunderland 15.05.71.

#### David Smith

- MIDFIELD. Starts his second season for Oxford following a £100,000 move from Norwich City in the close-season of 1994. Served his apprenticeship at Carrow Road, making his debut, as a sub, at Derby in April 1990. only got a further 23 outings in four years with Norwich and jumped at the chance of regular football with the U's. Born: Liverpool 26.12.70.

Phillip Whitehead

- GOALKEEPER. Came into the game with Halifax who blooded him against Burnley in September 1986. Did not establish himself as first choice until his final season at the Shay and moved to Barnsley for £60,000 in 1990. In four years at Oakwell, Phil got just 16 games but had loan spells back with Halifax, Scunthorpe (twice), Bradford City, Stockport and Oxford. Finally joined United in November 1993 and had played 192 games by the start of this season. Born: Halifax 17.12.69.

#### Steve Wood


- CENTRAL DEFENDER. Enjoyed his best times with Millwall whom he helped win promotion to the old First Division as Champions, after joining them from Reading in the summer of 1987. Steve had already won a Third Division Championship medal with Reading for whom he made 250 appearances. In October 1991 Southampton bought him for £400,000 but he never really settled at the Dell and in the summer of 1984 he was released and signed for Oxford.

Denis Smith was born in Stoke in 1947 and played over 450 games for his home town club as a stalwart centre-half. Most of his career was in the top Division and in 1972 he helped Stoke win their first ever major honour with a League Cup win at Wembley.

In 1982 he had a brief loan spell with York City where he was appointed player/manager in the summer of 1982. In his second season he took York up as Champions with a new record points total.

In 1986 Denis was appointed manager of Sunderland, who were in the Third Division for the first time in their history. It took one season for him to clinch the Third Division title and in 1990 he

guided them through to the Play-Off Final at Wembley, where they lost to us.

However, Swindon were penalised for offences unrelated to the playing side and the Wearsiders were handed our place in the top Division.

It was not a happy time for Sunderland however, who could not compete at this level and they were relegated after a 3-0 defeat at Oxford. Denis was dismissed and Malcolm Crosby, now his number two at Oxford took control.


Two months later Denis was in charge of Bristol City but was dismissed after a year and took the Oxford post in September 1993.

## Under the Spottight

A real journeyman who has proved a success nearly everywhere he has played. He is 33 now but still has much to offer and of course has a pedigree of over 150 goals to his credit in first-class football.

Born in Sheffield on the 20th November 1961, he joined Lincoln City's apprentice ranks in 1979, getting his first real break when he made a scoring debut in a 2-0 home win over Hartlepool United in March 1981. It was to be his only goal for them in 8 Fourth Division appearances.

At the end of that season he was released and went non-League with Matlock Town (twice) and Kings Lynn before getting another chance with Burnley, who invested £7,500 in the deal. He was working as a hod carrier on a building site at the time. Wayne enjoyed two



successful seasons at Turf Moor he was ever present in 1984-85 when he scored 18 goals in 46 Third Division appearances - not a bad return in a side that was relegated.

There more goals in 12 Division Four outings were followed by an exciting move to Norwich City in October 1985. The Canaries paid £35,000 down plus £5,000 more

after 20 games and 'Bertie' a nickname held since the age of nine - did the business helping them win promotion to the old First Division in 1986.

After nearly 100 outings for Norwich he was signed by Mel Machin at Manchester City. Another promotion to Division One was achieved in his one season at Maine Road before Stoke City paid £250,000 to secure his services. In just over three years in the Potteries, Wayne scored over 50 goals before re-joining Mel Machin, this time at Barnsley.

A year later he was off to join Lou Macari at Celtic but did not settle and followed Lou back to Stoke in March 1994. He hit four goals in ten games in 1993-94 but could not find his scoring form at the start of last season and joined Luton on loan. He was given a free transfer in the summer of 1995 and was snapped up by Oxford United.

Anyone with any experience of football will know that there is no such thing in this game as a foregone conclusion. Thus one need not take too much heed of the early season betting and favourites.

In the end it is all down to what you do on the day as witness to countless upsets the pundits and experts predicted would never happen. What chance Wimbledon in the FA Cup Final against Liverpool in 1988? What odds would you have got on the USA beating England in the 1950 World Cup Finals, or indeed again in the friendly in 1993?

It is the same principle in the League of course. Before the big kick off Carlisle United were 7/1 favourites to take the Second Division title next May. Burnley 8/1 second favourites. Come the first League table and Carlisle are lying bottom without a point! Burnley better placed in eighth slot with one win and a draw.

Need we say Swindon Town were top with Swansea City, quoted at 25/1 by the bookies, second. A real surprise this after they drew 2-2 at highly fancied Bristol Rovers.

Such statistics are quite irrelevant so early in the campaign but they make interesting reading. What we do know is that if you are to be successful then you have to produce consistency throughout nine months and this is what Steve McMahon is striving to achieve.






## Training Ground

The trip was made all the better knowing that at the time we were League leaders after victories over Hull City and York City in our first two games and safe in the knowledge that we have two games with Blackburn Rovers to look forward to in the next round of the Coca-Cola Cup after last weeks win over Cambridge United. The lads knew they had everything to go for last Wednesday. We went into the game 2-1 down after the first leg but only had to win 1-0 in the knowledge that we would go through on aggregate.

Our plans were totally disrupted though with a crop of injuries following the York City game and we found ourselves without Ty Gooden, Mark Robinson and Wayne Allison. It is not good news either for Jason Drysdale who had only just returned to full time training after his long lay-off at the end of last season following his transfer from Newcastle United.


















## Shearer and Co. In Next Cup FIZZER.

SF: Don't ask me. I honestly can't tell you. I don't think the manager fancied me.


### A closer look at Steve Finney




The game at Norwich last year saw us on the wrong end of a 7-0 drubbing and I was hopeful to escape such a score-line this time round.


We put some reasonable moves together and more than matched Luton in an even first half.

Unfortunately we could not maintain this promise and fell back to more like the performances of pre-season and Barnet.


We allowed Luton to dominate for much of the second half especially in midfield and this gave their forwards much more of the ball and they used it very effectively, giving our defenders a hard time.



### Says the National **Federation of Football** Supporters Clubs.



Football is the sport of the masses but was in the spotlight as never before last season, with allegations of match-rigging, drug abuse, bribery and iflegal incentives overshadowing some excellent performances on the pitch. The spotlight focused on two violent incidents by players but these were no excuse for the admittedly isolated incidents between supporters at domestic matches, nor infiltration by extremists when our national and club sides go abroad.

We ask supporters to conduct themselves properly, to be a credit to their club and the game.

Responsible behaviour on the way to and from home and away games - win, lose or draw - is asked for. Yes, be proud to be associated with your club and its home town or city - but respect other fans' pride in their club!

Arrive early at the ground; beat the queues, buy a programme before they sell out, visit refreshment and sales areas and be settled in to avoid causing distractions by being a late-comer.

Don't forget our great game attracts families more and more; your club needs those fans to keep coming so please: Do not swear, spit or use abusive language.

Shout, sing and chant encouragement for your team nothing better than roars of support around the ground and you try and outdo each other. Let's have some new songs etc. Keep it clean.

Don't be aggressive to other fans be friendly. Don't make your club ashamed of you.

Match officials can hear what comes from the side-lines! They've heard it all before but bear in mind that they cannot see everything you can and at your angle - you are normally higher up and still; they move with the play and can have their view blocked at crucial moments.

Most of us like a drink now and again but don't let is spoil the enjoyment of others. Be particularly responsible at away games; support your side constructively. The NFFSC is campaigning for a minimum allocation of equal facilities for away fans at every ground; make clubs want to welcome you (after all, the home club keeps your admission money).

Be a recognised supporter and proud of it: 'Join Your Supporters Club'. Travel on organised transport when going away; become involved with your supporters' club activities.

Support the Campaign to Kick Intimidation and Racism Out Of Football.

Football will rise above problems as they come and go; after all it's been alive and kicking for a long time and is still the greatest!

The Institute of Professional Sport tells players there is no place for cheating, lack of discipline, abuse and offensive actions - follow their example - don't let your club down.

Go out there and enjoy yourself and make sure others do as well.







### of Excellence



With Youth Development Officer Tommy Wheeldon

A question often asked is "What exactly is the Associated Schoolboy Scheme?". Players who will reach the age of nine, ten, eleven, twelve or thirteen during the next educational year may only play football for a Club if they attend a licensed Centre of Excellence.

Clubs may register a boy as an Associated Schoolboy on or after his 14th birthday if he is receiving full-time education in accordance with the Education Acts.

If a boy is approaching his 14th birthday and signs for a Centre of Excellence run by a club, he cannot sign Associated Schoolboy forms for any other club until his registration ends as a Centre of Excellence registered player.



The maximum number of Associate Schoolboys a club may have registered at any one time is 30.


Any boy who receives full time education and who attends a Club for regular training and coaching or who plays for a Club must be registered as an Associated Schoolboy. Clubs have to write to an Associated Schoolboy before 1 March of the school year in which the boy is due to leave full-time education indicating whether or not they will be offering him a Trainee Contract.

If the Club does not wish to offer the boy a contract he is then free to sign for any Club of his choice. However if he is offered a contract but does not wish to accept, any other club registering him will be liable to pay compensation to the boy's previous Club who made the offer.

Once the boy accepts the offer of a Traineeship he is then given a contract for 104 weeks usually beginning at the start of July in the year in which he leaves school.

So basically being an Associated Schoolboy ties a boy to the club of his choice and restricts 'poaching' from other clubs.

Very strict regulations also prevent a boy playing too many games for his club.
