

Well I said everyone should go out and enjoy the game with Blackburn Rovers and I am sure you all did. It was a cracking game but I still can't believe we lost it.

If any neutrals were watching and didn't know which team was which they would not have been able to tell who were the Premiership Champions and who had been relegated. For half-an-hour we were brilliant, our passing and movement was tremendous, it was a bit like a repeat of the Bradford City game in some respects.

We have a free week after this so we want to enjoy it on a winning note. That's it from me for today all I can add is that it is a pleasure to be playing at the moment - all the players feel that - things are bubbling, the players are happy. It is a bit like the old days for me.

# Rothernam U

The Millermen splashed out more than £250,000 on their summer signing in an attempt to improve the side which finished last season in a disappointing 17th place in Division Two.

The joint management team of Archie Gemmill and John McGovern have a wealth of experience behind them and optimism in this Yorkshire steel town was much higher than the odds of 25-1. laid by the bookies, gave credit for as much as they set their plans for an assault on promotion to Division One.

The most notable capture was that of Paul Blades, who cost £110,000 from Wolverhampton Wanderers. the six-foot central defender adding a touch of class to the back four. Another important recruit was midfielder Mike Jeffery at a cost of £100,000 from Newcastle United: while Darren Garner was picked up from Dorchester Town for £30,000 and Steve Farrelly made the trip from Macclesfield for £20,000.

Not since the days when "Crazy Horse" Emlyn Hughes, ploughed a playing furrow across the Millmoor Ground have hopes been so high. but a return of just two wins and three draws from the opening eight fixtures in Division Two has left them some eleven points off the pace.

It is early days yet of course but Mr Gemmill and company must be concerned about their away form which has brought them just one point, and that from a 1-1 draw at Oxford United was courtesy of an own-goal from Murphy.

The opening contest of the season was at Turf Moor where 11 years earlier the Clarets thrashed the Millers 7-0. It wasn't as bad as that this time although the 2-1 defeat reaped just as many points.

Shaun Goaters' 87th minute penalty earned a draw against Hull City, and it was Goater again weighing in with two goals - one from the spot in the 82nd minute who forced a 2-2 draw at home to Carlisle United. A good fighting show this with Rotherham coming back from two down after David Reeves had netted two goals in two minutes for Carlisle early in the second-half


With that seen very much as a point won rather than two dropped the Yorkshire side then travelled to Dean Court where they lost to AFC Bournemouth 2-1 (Goater again on

the score-sheet), and a tightly contested game. Then came the best of the season so far with two straight wins - both 1-0 - over Brentford and Bristol Rovers.

The victory over Brentford was a triumph for another new recruit. Trevor Berry, a pint sized Premiership hopeful on loan from Aston Villa, who made a giantsized contribution on his League debut, and crowned it with the winning goal! It was Mike Jeffrey who won the points from Bristol Rovers with his first goal for the Millers.

Just when it seemed Archie Gemmill had a platform to build on. his team slumped sadly at Chesterfield last Saturday where they were beaten 3-0, hardly the best boost for their midweek trip to the new Riverside Stadium and a Coca-Cola Cup meeting against a Jan Aage Fjortoft inspired Middlesbrough. 

# Trevor Berry

- MIDFIELD Former AFC Bournemouth starlet looking to kickstart his career after not getting a senior game with Aston Villa last season when he was hoping to break into the first team. Served his apprenticeship at Dean Court after signing for them in September 1990 and though he had not made a League appearance Aston Villa paid £50,000 for him in April 1992. A right-sided player with great stamina and a box full of tricks. he joined Rotherham on loan this month and made a scoring League debut against Brentford. Born: Haslemere 1-8-74.



# Gary Bowyer

- DEFENDER. Signed in the summer of 1995 on a free transfer from Nottingham Forest. Stands six-foot tall and started his career with Hereford United, for whom he made 14 League appearances (2 goals) before joining Nottingham Forest in 1991. He made his League debut, as a sub for Hereford at Southend United, 20 March 1990. Failed to establish himself at the higher grade with Forest. Born: Manchester 22-6-71.


# lan Breckin

- CENTRAL DEFENDER.
Established himself as a regular in the side last season when he missed only five of their 46 League engagements, and contributed two goals. Ian is local lad who has graduated through the ranks at Millmoor. He stands six-foot two and is always a threat from set

pieces. Born: Rotherham 24-2-75.

# Matthew Clarke

- GOALKEEPER. Missed only one Second Division game last season and is another one club man. Still only 22, which is relatively young for a custodian. Matthew is firmly established as the first choice number one and has kept three clean-sheets this season. Born: Sheffield 3-11-73.



# Steve Farrelly

- GOALKEEPER. Recruited from non-League Macclesfield Town in the summer of 1995 at a cost of £20,000 but has yet to make his League debut. Stands six-foot four tall.


## Darren Garner

- MIDFIELD. Another summer signing from non-League circles. Darren was transferred from

Dorchester Town in 1995 for £20,000. Made his Football League debut on the opening day of the season at Burnley and has retained his position. Formerly with Plymouth Argyle.

## Shaun Goater

- STRIKER. Bermuda born striker who started his career with Manchester United but did not graduate to senior selection and moved to Rotherham in 1990. Topped the score chart last season and is leading the way again with seven goals in the opening ten games of this season. Stands over six-foot tall and claimed 25 goals in the season of 1994-95 - 19 of them in the Second Division. Missed only one League game last season. Born: Bermuda 25-2-75.



# Andy Hayward

- FORWARD. Second highest scorer last season with seven goals. Six in the League, he comes to the County Ground with two goals to his name this season having netted in both legs of Rotherham's first round Coca-Cola Cup tie with Scunthorpe United. Previously with Frickley Colliery. Born: Barnsley 21-6-70.

# Paul Hurst

- FULLBACK. A diminutive defender of five-foot-five. Paul has worked his way up through the minor ranks after joining the trainee staff at Millmoor from school. Made 14 League appearances last season, starting in eight Second Division games and also got on the score sheet in an FA Cup tie. Born: Sheffield 25-9-74.

# Mike Jeffrey

- MIDFIELD. Cost Rotherham
United £100.000 to sign from
Newcastle United in the summer of
1995 and made his debut for them
at 5-0 defeat of Scunthorpe United
in the Coca-Cola Cup and his first
strike in the Second Division was
the winner against Bristol Rovers
but he never established himself
at St James' Park and made no
Premiership appearances last
season. Born: Liverpool 11-8-71.

# John McGlashan

 MIDFIELD. An experienced campaigner John arrived in English football from Montrose when he joined Millwall in the summer of 1990. Made his League debut for the Lions against Charlton Athletic in September 1990 but never really established himself at the Den. making just 16 League appearances. A powerfully built sixfooter he moved to Peterborough United in March 1993 and last season played 27 Second Division games (3 goals) for Rotherham. Started his career with Dundee Violet before making 68 Scottish League appearances (11 goals) for Montrose, Born: Dundee 3-6-67.

## Neil Richardson

- LEFT BACK. Another one club man Neil joined Rotherham United from school and made the breakthrough into senior soccer on May 1st 1990 in a 1-1 draw with Walsall. His career has been interrupted by injuries but when fit he is an established member of the side. Born: Sunderland 3-3-68.

# Andy Roscoe

- MIDFIELD. Contributed four goals in 21 Second Division appearances for Rotherham in 1994-95 but has yet to find the net this season. Andrew joined Liverpool from school but was released on a free transfer before he made the first team and signed for Bolton Wanderers. Made his League debut for the Wanderers in a 1-1 draw with Portsmouth, in April 1994, and made a further two appearances that season. Did occasionally play left-back for Bolton's reserves. Joined Rotherham last year. Born: Liverpool 4-6-73.

## Chris Wilder

- FULLBACK, a crowd pleaser and Rotherham United's Player of the Year last season when he missed just one Second Division fixture. Chris served his apprenticeship with Southampton but they released him and he was given his break by Sheffield United who blooded him in a Second Division game at Shrewsbury, in January 1987. Made over 100 appearances for the Blades and served loan spells with Walsall, Charlton Athletic and Leyton Orient before transferring to Rotherham. Born: Wortley 23-9-67.

Archie Gemmill & John McGovern

Archie Gemmill and John McGovern have renewed their partnership which brought fame and success as players with Derby County and Nottingham Forest.

Archie was appointed manager of Rotherham United in September 1994. As a player the little Scot made his name as one of the most competitive midfield men in the game, his aggression and skill winning him 43 caps for Scotland.

He started his career as a parttimer with St.Mirren - he was an apprentice electrician at the time but moved South to Preston, where he had three years before really making sparks fly following his link up with Brian Clough.

Derby County paid £60,000 for his services and in seven highly successful years at the Baseball Ground, Archie collected First Division Championship medals in 1972 and 1975 as well as an FA Charity Shield Winners' trophy (1975) and European Cup experience. In 1977 he followed Clough to Nottingham Forest where his career continued to blossom in the side that won the First Division

title for the first time in Forest's history in 1978. Played in their League Cup winning side in 1979.

After the City Ground, Archie had spells at Birmingham City, Jacksonville, Wigan and Derby County again (he made 404 appearances in all for the Rams - 33 goals), before hanging up his boots at 37 and taking over as Reserve and Youth Team coach under Clough.

John McGovern, who hails from Montrose and first played for Hartlepool, of course shared in the success at Derby and Forest and also picked up European Cup Winners' medals in 1979 and '80. John made 253 appearances for Forest and 237 for Derby County.


# Under the Spotlight

The £110,000 signing of Paul Blades from Wolverhampton Wanderers this summer, was indeed a big scoop for Rotherham chief Archie Gemmill.

Derby County spotted Paul as a Peterborough schoolboy and offered him an apprenticeship in 1982. He was an outstanding young defender with poise and skill that earned him International honours with the England Youth team.

On the 18th September 1983 he made his Football League debut in a 2-1 defeat at Elland Road and added a further five Second Division appearances to his record that season. The following year was not so fruitful for the youngster then in 1984-85 he established himself as a regular in the Rams line-up.

Paul was a cornerstone of the Derby back line as they emerged



from Division Three to win successive promotions to the old First Division in 1986 and 1987. winning a Second Division Championship medal.

When Andy Garner was transferred to Blackpool in August 1988. Paul. at the age of 23. became the only survivor at the Baseball Ground from the days before Arthur Cox. Then in 1990 he lost his place and signed for the Canaries after 161 League games for Derby.

Was the regular number five in the Norwich City side until January 1992 when he lost his place through injury and he eventually transferred to Wolverhampton Wanderers after a successful loan spell in 1993.

Paul prefers to operate in the centre of the defence but played much of his football for Derby County at right-back. His pace, strength in the air and passing ability, helped him become an excellent top class defender. Doesn't get too many goals however, his first, a spectacular effort, came in his 167th senior appearance for the Rams, it was the winner against Coventry City in April 1989.

# ENDSLEIGH LEAGUE CONTRACTOR OF THE PROPERTY O

After the razzmatazz of the Coca-Cola Cup, clubs return to Second Division business this afternoon and what an important fixture list we have.

With eight games played now only Bristol City and Crewe have completed one less - the Second Division table is truly beginning to take shape with Town back in poll position after that rousing 4-1 win at Bristol Rovers last week.

A great performance from all the lads, and in particular Kevin Horlock - netting his first ever hattrick - to establish the best win in the Division on the day.

Crewe Alexandra also scored four goals away to keep within three points of us. with a game in hand, but their achievement was not all of their own doing at AFC Bournemouth. Rookie referee Barry Knight virtually handed Dario Gradi's team the points after red carding two AFC Bournemouth players.

Knight - in his first season on the League list - was pelted with cushions by the home fans after dismissing Adrian Pennock and Neil Young for two bookable offences. The score was 0-0 when Pennock took his early bath!

Today Crewe travel to Blackpool, third in the table after a fine 2-1 win at Brighton and hopefully will not find life so easy this time. The Northerners have won three and lost four at home so perhaps they are due their first draw.

Bradford City, despatched 4-0 by us, bounced back on Saturday with a 3-0 home win over Bristol City, to maintain fourth place behind Blackpool on goals scored. Carl Shutt scored two of the goals and will be hoping to add to his collection at Peterborough United this afternoon.

The Posh have their own scoring hero in the shape of Gary Martindale who promised a stack of goals when he arrived from Bolton Wanderers. He is proving as good as his word, his winner beat Wrexham 1-0 last week and was his third strike of the season and second within a week.


Notts County remain very much in the frame as their 1-0 win at Shrewsbury suggests. They play hosts to Bristol City today and should be good for another three points. It is interesting to note that all three clubs locked on 16 points - Blackpool. Bradford City and Notts County - have won three and lost one at home.

Oxford United head the chasing pack - a solid 4-0 beating of Carlisle United taking them to 13 points. The U's travel to Swansea City today in search of their first away win of the season. The Swans were victims of the Division's biggest upset last week when they lost at home to bottom club York City. It is doubtful that they will lose again so put that one down for a draw. If it is, it will be Oxford's fourth on foreign soil.

Shrewsbury Town are now holding the wooden spoon and could still be in this position come 4.45pm following the visit of Stockport County, Stockport were held 1-1 at home by Wycombe Wanderers on Saturday and Alan Smith's combination, now boosted by the signing of David Farrell from Aston Villa, should be good for a win today over visitors Wrexham.

And how about York City. After that first win of the season at Swansea can they pull off their first home

victory over Walsall? It would certainly be a treat for home fans and could be just the boost they need with struggling Carlisle United - who have already conceded 14 goals - likely to be held by Hull City.





# Training Ground &


After the excitement of the Coca-Cola Cup against Blackburn on Wednesday, we return today to the bread and butter of the League action this afternoon with the visit of Rotherham United. # Treatment Room (\*)

With Club Physic Jonathan Trigg

This afternoon we leave behind the few injuries we have here at the club and start to take a look at some of the injuries you can pick up playing sport and ways of avoiding them.


There are two basic categories of injury-traumatic and overuse. Traumatic injuries are sudden happenings in which you know something has gone wrong straight away. You will feel instant pain, swelling, bruising or maybe an open wound.

Overuse injuries are much more subtle in so much as they come on gradually increasing in pain. These are usually easy to diagnose but need more careful assessment, because some diseases or inflammatory conditions can mimic others.

Obviously the way to avoid traumatic injuries is to minimise the risk factors.

Make sure all the conditions where possible are right for whatever sport you are undertaking and that you have the correct equipment. To avoid overuse injuries you should allow your body to adapt to repetitive stress. A sudden change in your training routine, maybe by doubling your distance you can run or doing twice as much in two days as you used to, will bring on overuse injuries.

For any sport or exercise you should always warm-up completely before starting. You should do passive stretching for your muscles, bouncing movements for your joints, pulse-warmers consisting of 6-10 sets of half minute intervals of hard exercise.



like sprints or thrusts and finally skill rehearsal, which you should practice specific movements for, related to your sport.

Diet is another important factor and we will take a look at this in another programme.



CB: Congratulations Kevin on your brilliant hat-trick against Bristol Rovers. Is it your first ever?

KH: No. I did get one in Youth football with West Ham United, in an FA Youth Cup Preliminary Round tie against a non-League club. But we beat the team 21-0 and I wasn't the first to score three goals so I didn't get the ball.

CB: So we can establish for the record that this is your first in senior football?

KH: That is right. I don't score many do 1?

CB: Being such a memorable and significant milestone in your career I think we should record it properly Kevin. Can you take us through the goals?

CB: Any thoughts on why the goals are suddenly flowing your way. Are you playing in a more advanced position or timing your runs better?




CB: Well it was a very good win Kevin and was specially pleasing coming after the conclusive victory over Bradford City. Then of course

context of the overall team performance. The most important thing is to get the three points.




We did that at Bristol Rovers so really the three goals were just a bonus for me and I am obviously very happy.



We more than made up for it by running out comfortable winners by four goals to one.


The first half an hour of the game was as good as anything we have produced so far this season. playing some good football and matching Barnet for workrate.



# Eurocrats PANIC! By Colin Benson

The days of the football transfer market as we know it could be numbered after a case in the European Courts of Justice brought by Belgian footballer Jean Marc Bosman seems to have gone in favour of the former captain of the Belgian Youth team.

Some people have suggested that the 31 year-old player is simply after money and will take a big pay-off to drop the case before the official ruling is made later this year but Bosman has been fighting his case for five years and is unlikely to quit when it seems he has won his crusade.

It all came about when he had a difference of opinion with his club coach. He asked for a transfer, his club then slapped a ridiculously high transfer fee on his release and he was lumbered. Stuck with a club that didn't want to play him and unable to move because nobody valued him that highly.

Abroad there is a UEFA rule which entitles a club to claim a "training and promotional fee" even if the player is out of contract and wants to join a club in another European Union country. The situation in English football is very different of course. Clubs are compensated when players break their contracts and decide to go to other clubs and when players are at the end of their agreement they are free to go following the introduction of "Freedom of Contract."

It has worked quite well for both clubs and players alike but it seems that as a result of Bosman's action we could also suffer.

Transfer system has been the lifeblood of League football since

the turn of the century. Oh yes, it has courted controversy and condemnation through the years - the first £1,000 deal receiving the same sort of shock-horror media coverage as did the initial £1 million pound deal and the current £7.9 million moves that are becoming common place now. But remember this is cash that is being kept in the game and distributed within.

In many cases money not splashed on transfer fees would only end up in the exchequer - so the transfer system not only helps finance our game but it also wets the appetite of the fans and keeps clubs buzzing.

Most of us are dependant on grooming the odd player who we can flog for a fortune. Jan Aage Fjortoft's departure to Middlesbrough brought in much needed capital and clubs like Wimbledon and Norwich City have been totally dependant on their dealings in the market. To make such a system illegal would revolutionise the financial structure of the game and result in most clubs outside the Premiership going part-time.

Bosman launched his crusade to have UEFA's transfer rules declared illegal and the European Advocate General has expressed a personal view that such a football transfer system is in contravention to the Treaty of Rome. If this is the case and the usual EEC juggernaut ploughs through with legislation to ban the transfer market across the board our game, as we know it, is dead. Not that this hurts everyone. That over publicised players' agent Eric Hall said on radio; "The smaller clubs will have to back their judgements more. Give an 18-year-old lad an eight year contract." What a jerk. When told that club's can not afford to, he simply replied; "If clubs go to the wall I will be sorry. But that's show business."

If too many go part-time or worse it could be the end of your fat-cat rake-off from football too Eric!

It is not all doom and gloom however for as Graham Kelly rightly points out, our system protects the interests of all clubs, not just the big clubs and of all the players, he says; "There is a good labour market which is maintained by the present transfer and compensation system in England. So if there can be agreed modifications to the transfer system, implemented by UEFA across the board, across European football, that can be for the good of football generally."

We hope so for it would be a real travesty if the name of Bosman was associated with those of Alf Common, David Jack, George Eastham, Jimmy Hill and Trevor Francis, as being influential in the development of English professional football.

The Premiership Champions have been and gone and we live to fight another day at Ewood Park but glamorous as that occasion was, as exciting as any David v Goliath contest inevitably is, the underlying concentration here at the County Ground is definitely centred on winning promotion.

This is why after the disappointments of successive home draws with Oxford United and Chesterfield the home win over Bradford City was so encouraging. A 4-1 scoreline against any side is creditable enough, against opponents literally breathing down our necks it was a mammoth victory.

Skipper Shaun Taylor has no reservations when he says that without a doubt they are the best side we have played in Division Two this season. Shaun says: "We did have a few more of the chances in that game even if maybe the score flattered us a little bit. But people have come to me and said that it was one of the best games they have seen here for many a year which suggests that the Second Division is a good League to watch".

A good point, for Swindon fans have always been appreciative of quality football and though perhaps the overall standard at this level is not as good as the First Division, which when all said and done is only a stepping stone to the Premiership, there is a genuine belief about the place that this is where we are heading; and Shaun so rightly spotlights we are doing it in a style which our public are happy with.

Shaun points out "We all know the gulf between the Football League and the Premier League is quite big now, but there are still a lot of quality players and teams around at this level and as long as this is the case attendances will keep rising which it seems to me they are."

This is certainly the trend here at the County Ground where we opened our home programme against York City. The attendance was 7,746, only bettered by Stockport County's 8,463. Then 13,041 turned up for the derby clash with Oxford United and 8,687 for the Chesterfield match on Saturday 9th September. There wasn't a Second Division crowd to better this that Saturday and for the midweek encounter with Bradford City we still held it at eight thousand plus - 8,203.

So not only are we the best team in Division Two at the moment but we are also the best supported and thus we owe you the fans a great big vote of thanks.

There was a lot of fuss made about Tony Yeboah's second goal for Leeds United in Monaco in the UEFA Cup. I grant you it was an absolute corker of a shot and this guy really looks the part. But I wonder how many Swindon supporters said to themselves, as I did, when they watched it on TV. "Great goal but I have seen Jan Aage Fjortoft bend them in like that a few times."

I don't know whether he has pulled one out for Middlesbrough like that, certainly not this season - but the Norwegian star put up a few of our games with the tightest of turns on the corner or the box and the flashiest of finishes into the top far corner.

Remember the Millwall game here last season? Mick McCarthy, the Lions boss dismissed it as a "fluke" but we know better. By the way I was talking to Jan the other week after he had scored another belter against Coventry City. He is really enjoying the atmosphere at Middlesbrough's Cellnet Riverside Stadium and sends his regards to all at the County Ground and wishes us luck in our quest for promotion.


You have to be confident the way things are going otherwise there is no point in being out there really.




pleased to be associated with such


In the first instance to be considered for a place is an honour itself but to be offered a place at the Centre is an even greater honour and should not be taken for granted.






