

The draw was made on Wednesday for the next round of the Auto Windscreens Shield and we have been drawn away to Rotherham. Whilst we would have preferred a home tie, there is certainly nothing to be afraid of. We showed in the second half last Saturday that we can beat the Millers, we just have to make sure we don't start in the same way.

Back to today though and I extend a warm welcome to Steve McMahon and everybody associated with Swindon for what should be an interesting encounter.

A warm welcome to this afternoon's visitors **Swindon Town** for the first home League game of 1996. The Robins are enjoying a great season, following last year's relegation and have been in the top two all term. City will have to beware as Swindon's away record is actually better than their home one, with too many draws affecting their progress at the County Ground.



The player/manager of the 'Robins' is the former Liverpool midfield dynamo, **Steve McMahon**, who was appointed just over a year ago. Made his League debut for Everton in August 1980 before a £300,000 move to Villa in 1983. Two years later he became Kenny Dalqlish's

first signing as Liverpool manager when he moved to Anfield for £375,000. He spent six years with the Reds winning numerous trophies and seventeen England caps. He moved to Manchester City in December 1991 for £900,000 before joining Swindon. Steve's right hand man is **Andy Rowland**, began his career at Derby, moving to Bury and finally Swindon. Having finished his playing days at the County Ground, Rowland was appointed Reserve Team

Manager in 1985/86 and became First Team Coach in 1994/95.

Goalkeeper Fraser Digby has made over 400 appearances for the club having started his career at Manchester United. Never made the first team at Old Trafford, but spent time on loan at Oldham Athletic and Swindon before making a

permanent move in September 1986. Returned to United for a loan spell in 1992/93.

Understudy is Australian Frank Talia. Blackburn Rovers signed Frank from Sunshine George Cross in August 1992 and he spent some time on loan at Hartlepool that season, making fifteen appearances. Unable to break into the first team at Ewood, Talia signed for Swindon in November 1995 having spent one month on loan there earlier in the

lan Culverhouse was signed from Norwich city just over a year ago for a tribunal fee of £250,000. Ian is a former apprentice of Spurs, making only one full appearance however, before moving to the Canaries in October 1985 for £50,000. He has played at full back and sweeper so

far this season. Jason Drysdale is a former England Youth International who signed for Swindon in March 1995 for a fee of £340,000 from Newcastle United. He began his career at Watford, signing pro in 1988 and going on to make 160 appearances for the Hornets. Left Vicarage Road for St. James' Park in August 1994 but was

unable to command a first team place. Another signing from the Magpies is

defender Mark Robinson for what was then a Swindon record of £600,000. Was an apprentice at West Brom, but after playing in the first team, surprisingly wasn't offered a contract. He moved to Barnsley and became a first team regular in 1989. Four years later Newcastle paid £450,000 for his services but injury problems and the large squad prevented Mark

the County Ground in July 1994.
Experience is a big factor in the Swindon defence with Mark Seagraves, Paul Bodin and Shaun Taylor all figuring prominently. Seagraves is a big strong centre half who signed from Bolton Wanderers for £100,000 in June 1995. A former Liverpool apprentice (one of his only two appearances for the Reds came here at York in the FA Cup Fifth Round), he had a loan spell at Norwich before joining Manchester City in 1986 and then Bolton in 1990. Paul Bodin, arguably Swindon's best known player and now in his second spell at the County Ground was initially signed from Newport County in March 1988. A Welsh International, he

was transferred to Crystal Palace for £550,000

from making the first team. He moved to

but was unable to command a first team place and only ten months later returned to the County Ground. Paul scored a rather fortuitous second goal in the recent victory over Woking. Shaun Taylor has been ever present for the last two seasons. This excellent centre half was signed from Exeter for £200,000 in July 1991. He has just signed a new contract keeping him at Swindon until 1997.

Following a recent injury to Paul Bodin, Edwin Murray was able to break into the first eleven. He first arrived at Swindon in 1988 as an Associated Schoolboy before signing as a professional in 1991. Another full back on the clubs books is the impressive Wayne O'Sullivan. A former trainee with the club, he made his League debut as substitute in the first game of 1994/95. Has since progressed and become a regular first team member and was selected for Eire U-21 in October.





Another capped player is Northern Ireland full and U-21 international **Kevin Horlock**. He was signed from West Ham on a free transfer in the summer of 1992 and made his League debut in the 3-1 defeat at Portsmouth that year.

The midfield of Swindon revolves around two very experienced top-level players, player/manager Steve McMahon and Paul Allen. Paul was signed by Town on a free transfer in October, having been released by Southampton. He started as an apprentice in August 1979 and went on to make 197 starts, scoring eleven goals. In June 1985 a £400,000 transfer took him to Spurs where he made 377 appearances. In September 1993, he transferred to Southampton for £550,000, but the departure of manager Ian Branfoot meant that Paul was only to make forty-three appearances for the Saints. During his time at the Dell, Paul also went on loan to Luton Town and Stoke City. He is an England B, U-21 and Youth International.

Martin Ling is currently in his second spell at Swindon following his £15,000 move from Southend United. A former Exeter City apprentice, he initially signed for £25,000 in July 1986 but three months later he left for Southend, where he made 138 League appearances. Lee Collins is another midfield man, who signed in November 1995 for a fee of £15,000 from Scottish Third Division side Albion Rovers. He made his debut in the surprising AWS defeat by Hereford in late December. Ty Gooden was released by Wycombe Wanderers at the end of 1992/93. He subsequently had a trial at the County Ground, and was signed by John Gorman in December 1993. He made his Premiership debut for Town in a draw against West Ham in 1994.

Lee Middleton is a quality passer of the ball signed by Swindon having been released by Coventry in July 1992. Has yet to make his League debut, with progress being hampered by a broken leg.

Dean Hooper, Jamie Pitman and Ben Worrall are all in the early stages of their Football League careers. Pitman and Worrall have both only just turned twenty and were regulars in the reserve side throughout 1994/95. Their excellent progress was rewarded, with both making their debuts against Portsmouth in April last year. The two players have both come through the ranks following periods as YTS lads. Dean Hooper is a few years older and was signed from non-League Hayes in March 1995 for an initial fee of £15,000. All three players ply their footballing trade in the midfield. The regular, and very fruitful strike partnership this season has been Wayne Allison and Steve Finney. A Football League tribulan decided Town should pay Bristol City £475,000 for Allison's signature in July 1995. Wayne began his career at Halifax Town for whom he once scored an excellent brace of goals

here at Bootham Crescent, in a 3-5

reverse for the Shaymen. £250,000 then

took him to Watford before, a year later, Bristol City paid £300,000 for his services. He was top scorer at Ashton Gate in 1994/95. Wayne slid home the opening

goal against Woking last Saturday. Steve Finney was signed on a free transfer last summer from Manchester City, having known Steve McMahon from his time there. An injury to **Peter Thorne** gave Finney his chance in the first team which he has grasped with both hands. Thorne was signed from Blackburn for an undisclosed fee a year ago. Started as a trainee at Blackburn in 1989 before signing pro-forms in 1991. First team opportunities were obviously limited with the likes of Shearer, Newell and Sutton at the club so the Swindon move was a great chance for first team football.

Another striker at the club is former Wolves stalwart Andy Mutch. He signed for Swindon from Molineaux in 1993 following a prolific partnership with Steve Bull in which he contributed a fine ninety-seven goals in 289 League games. Andy was put on the transfer list in April 1995. Three other professionals at the club, all still to make their first team debuts are Jonathon Hollway, Gary Thorne and Jamie Laidlaw.

Formed in 1879 **Swindon Town** operated in the Southern League until their election to the newly formed Third Division of the Football League in 1920. Whilst a non-League club they twice reached the semi-finals of the FA Cup – 1910 and 1912.

They were continuous members of the Third Division until 1963 and then over the next twenty three years had two spells in the old Second Division (1963-65 and 1969-74) plus a period in the Fourth (1982-86). Champions of that Division in 1985/86 they won promotion to the Second the following season and in May 1993 won their way to the Premier League via the play offs. Their stay at the top level was, however, to be the shortest possible and last season they again suffered relegation.

They won the FL Cup as a Third Division club in 1968/69 when they beat Arsenal at Wembley and last season reached the semi-final of the competition losing at that stage to Bolton Wanderers. In 1970 they won the Anglo Italian Cup.

The clubs first met at Bootham Crescent on 23rd January 1960 when 6,031 saw City win thanks to a Colin Addison goal. In Town's side that day were Walter Bingley and Jack Fountain who the following season moved to City. Earlier that campaign a Norman Wilkinson header earned a point in a 1-1 draw at the County Ground. City have lost on their six subsequent trips to Swindon, conceding twenty three goals. The heaviest reverse was in October 1965, when Don Rogers hit a hat trick and John Trollope, Dennis Brown and Jimmy Lawton also scored in Town's six goal victory.

Town completed a double that term having won at Bootham Crescent thanks to goals from Rogers and Brown. Joe Neenan made his debut in goal in the 4-2 win in April 1977. Scorers that day were Chris Galvin, Jim Hinch, Brian Pollard and George Hope. City's other success in the series was in March 1984 when in a Saturday morning game, which avoided a clash with York RLFC's cup semi final appearance against Wigan, they won 2-Under atrocious weather conditions a crowd of 3,341 saw Keith Walwyn and Gary Ford score the goals which kept City clear at the top of the Fourth Division. In goal for Town was Scott Endersby, later to join City. The goalless draw in March 1983 ended a run of thirteen successive home League and Cup wins and the first time City had failed to score at Bootham Crescent in thirty one matches dating back to February 1982.



Five Second Division clubs have won their way into the Fourth Round of the FA Cup and three others will be involved in replays next week. Congratulations to Brentford and Crewe Alexandra who beat First Division opposition. The Bees, without an away win in the League this term, were successful at Norwich 2-1 and Alexandra were involved in a 4-3 thriller at home to West Bromwich Albion. In the all Second Division clash at London Road, Peterborough United notched the only goal of the game against Wrexham and a Kenny Wilson goal eased Walsall through at the expense of Wigan Athletic. At the County Ground, Swindon beat off the challenge of non-League Woking with Wayne Allison and Paul Bodin on the mark. Stockport County put up a tremendous performance to hold the cup holders Everton to a 2-2 draw at Goodison Park. Former City player Ian Helliwell headed their second equaliser.



Adrian then spent three months on loan at Aldershot before signing on a permanent basis in December 1988. Almost exactly three years later Burnley came in for him and paid out a £50,000 fee to secure his services. Adrian spent four good years at Turf Moor, establishing himself as a real crowd favourite. Last season, with Burnley struggling in the First Division, Randall was named Player of the Year.

Now of course, City have broken the transfer record to bring Adrian to Bootham Crescent for what we hope will be a long and successful time here.

I am sure we can call on all fans to be patient and give Adrian time to settle in, if he needs it, and give him all the vocal support to help make his York City career a happy one.












where are they

Featured today is another former goalkeeper BOB FERGUSON who made most of his appearances for the club during the Second World War.

Born in Darlington in 1917 Bob was spotted by Middlesbrough playing in junior football and joined the Avresome Park club as a seventeen year old. He made his Football League debut at the start of the 1936/37 season in a First Division home game against Manchester City who had the legendary Frank Swift in goal. Boro won 2-0 and Bob earned much praise as he kept his place for a few matches and the side went top of the table. He remembers trips to Portsmouth and Stoke City, who had the great Stanley Matthews in their line-up and other matches included Chelsea and Grimsby Town. These two sides had experienced keepers Vic Woodley and George Tweedy whom Bob much admired. "On reflection the first team chance just came a little too soon for me and when Middlesbrough signed Scottish International keeper Dave Cumming I stepped back down to the reserves"

Bob was saddened last year when Middlesbrough left Ayresome Park. "I have many happy memories of the old ground and it was a marvellous

Mitchell for City. He played in the opening three games of the 1939/40 campaign and remembers well the last match to be played before the outbreak of war when the side went down to a late goal at Rochdale. Like most of his contemporaries the war years were to take a big slice out of his career but he was to play regularly for the club between 1939 and 1945 and made well over 100 appearances in the various wartime competitions. "There was a lot of good football played during this period and at York, with a number of guest players, we assembled a fine side." Those he recalls were Bert "Sailor" Brown (Charlton Athletic), Frank O'Donnell (Aston Villa), Joe Wilson (Reading) and Dixie Dean of Everton and England fame who made one appearance in City colours. "One of the most talented players was local lad Gordon Jones who was a fine left back. Sadly he died from illness at an early age. For a couple of years City had the services of Sam Bartram of Charlton who was rated as the best uncapped keeper in the country. "Although during this period I had to play second fiddle there was no animosity between me and Sam and we were very good friends." In 1945/46 City had an FA Cup run and he recalls a thrilling Third Round match at Bootham Crescent when Chesterfield, then a leading club, were beaten 3-2 with local lad lan Winters scoring twice. Bob played in the first peacetime season for the club and a match at Rochdale that term which springs to mind was one in which he saved two penalties and City won 1-0. He moved to top Midland League side Peterborough United in 1947 and



"We played in front of big crowds and there was a good deal of enthusiasm at the club who were eventually, of course, to gain League status. The travelling became a problem, however, as I continued to live in York and my next move was to Goole Town. After three seasons there a collar bone injury ended my footballing career."

thoroughly enjoyed his three years at

London Road.

An all round sportsman Bob admits to cricket as being his first love. He was a very good wicketkeeper/batsman and played as a professional with Bankfoot in the Bradford League for fifteen seasons. During this time he played against a number of Test and County stars including Learie Constantine,



George Pope, Arthur Booth and Ray Illingworth. Locally he played for Dringhouses in the York Evening League and still holds the record score in that competition. After leaving Bankfoot he played in the York Senior League for Woodhouse Grange before finishing his cricketing days in his late 40's. Before the war he had played for County Durham a couple of times and but for the outbreak of hostilities, could possibly have joined Warwickshire. He played table tennis in the York League for many years and then in later life took up bowls along with his wife Vera. In July they will celebrate their fifty-fifth Wedding Anniversary and have a son and two grandsons and have lived in York all their married life.

Vera represented Yorkshire for many years at bowls and in 1977 was the County's Ladies Singles Champion. She and Bob have won many trophies over the years and still play regularly both indoor and outdoor. A good friend who is also a keen bowler is former City centre forward Alf Patrick. Bob and Vera also enjoy playing whist and like to holiday abroad.

Bob was a part-timer throughout his footballing days and spent nearly all his working life with Cooke, Troughton and Sims (Vickers Instruments) retiring as a toolroom foreman.

A very fit and active seventy eight year old, he looks back with happiness on a full and enjoyable sporting life. He still closely follows soccer and cricket chiefly on television and he does get to the occasional City game. "Players do not seem to get the same enjoyment nowadays – perhaps it is the money and extra pressure but I don't see many smiling faces. There are also too many yellow and red cards and referees do not appear to have the same rapport that they had with players in my day. Goalkeepers are now very much a protected species. There was many a time I finished up in the back of the net - all part and parcel of the game then!"

This important question (posed by my son's nursery rhyme video) can now be answered, as when the north wind did blow and it indeed snowed, the team formerly known as the Robins did nothing much as most of their games were called off. So it was that the busy festive period saw only one City game played of the four scheduled, and some may say it was one too many as the lads literally slid to defeat against Bradford City in a game apparently refereed by Willie Thorne's twin brother!

The Christmas period can be a difficult time for all connected with programmes, whether it be from the aspect of a contributor, issuing club, or collecting dullard. A contributor faces printing deadlines prior to the holiday period of up to a fortnight before the games are due to be played, making reference to current affairs almost impossible. The usual pair of upcoming home games also means that several articles have to be penned in the pre-Yuletide spell which is already busy enough with shopping, wrapping and partying, and on top of all this there is always the distinct possibility that the fruits of your pen never see the light of day due to postponements! The club has to contend with similar problems, only manyfold, and potentially incurs several thousand pounds of printing costs for issues covering games which do not actually take place on the scheduled date. This leads to the difficult choice between whether to take the unpopular but economically sensible decision to use these programmes with some kind of insert when the game is played or to completely reprint at a loss as, after all, who wants to read of seasonal greetings in March! A collector's dilemma comes if a game falls victim to the weather, with it being almost certain that a programme has been produced. Should he make every attempt to obtain a copy in the knowledge that it may possibly re-appear with an insert several weeks later, or await the re-arranged match which may then have a whole new issue produced with the originals having been destroyed? Talk about 'Crisis at Christmas'!





The coverage of City is excellent and runs to around five pages, featuring up-to-date club news which even mentioned the previous week's 3-0 win at Worksop and a couple of novel features, 'Best Ever Season' (1973/74), and 'Great Names'. With a host of other reading, a good use of colour, relatively low advertising, and a far fresher appearance than its Gay Meadow counterpart this is well worth the relatively expensive outlay.

Programmes were definitely produced for the postponed games at Carlisle United on the Friday before Christmas, City's home encounter against Bournemouth on the 30th, and at Notts County on New Years Day. The Carlisle programme is excellent, costing £1.40 for thirty two glossy pages, although I will resist any further review until after the game is actually played, whilst the County issue is not yet to hand. No decision has been made so far regarding whether these programmes will be used on the re-arranged dates, but in any event each collector will have to decide whether to make the effort to obtain copies of these issues, the pros and cons of which were outlined earlier!



40 Years Ago

Owing to a snow-covered pitch City's home game against Scunthorpe United on 14th January 1956 was postponed. Swindon Town travelled to Walsall and were beaten 4-0 at Fellows Park watched by 10,961. The defeat left the Wiltshire club three points adrift at the bottom of the Third Division South.

Manchester United beat Sheffield United 3-1 at Old Trafford and led the way in the First Division whilst Sheffield Wednesday came from two down to beat Doncaster Rovers 5-2 at Hillsborough to stay at the head of the Second. Grimsby Town's home match against Southport was postponed but the Mariners remained Northern Section leaders – City were ninth. Ipswich Town were at the top of the Southern Section and their latest win was 4-1 at home to QPR.

The following week City were back in action and figured in a 2-2 draw at Oldham. Within twenty minutes City led 2-0 with goals from Billy Hughes and Norman Wilkinson and shortly afterwards Jim Prescott hit a post. Athletic reduced their arrears from the penalty spot and then against the run of play equalised in the second half. The attendance at Boundary Park was 5,224 and the City team was: Forgan, Phillips, Howe, Brown, Stewart, Spence, Hughes, Prescott, Wilkinson, Storey, Colbridge. Arthur Bottom missed the game through suspension.

30 Years Ago

City plunged deeper into relegation trouble when they lost 4-1 at the Old Show Ground to Scunthorpe on a snow covered pitch watched by 3,507. City made a bright start and forced a number of early corners. Derek Weddle missed an easy chance and then against the run of play United opened the scoring in the seventeenth minute. Poor defending led to a second Scunthorpe goal but City continued to attack and did not deserve to be in arrears at the interval. Two early second half goals sunk City's hopes and only desperate defending kept the home side at bay. Near the end City gained a consolation goal when George Hamstead saw his shot deflected into the net by a United defender.

The game marked Eamonn Dunphy's last match for City and a few days later he was transferred to Millwall. The team lined up: Fallon, Baker, Wealthall, Woods, Jackson, Dunmore, Weddle, Dunphy, Aimson, Rudd, Hamstead.

City remained in twenty third position in the Third Division with fourteen points from twenty four games. Swindon Town won 3-2 at Peterborough and were seventh in the table. Leaders Millwall beat Shrewsbury Town 4-2 at the Den.

Liverpool were held at home by West Bromwich Albion but remained top of the First Division and Manchester City took over the Second Division leadership following Huddersfield's defeat at Wolverhampton. Tranmere Rovers stayed top of the Fourth although losing at home to Southport.






