



Ithough we need points, the FA Cup is certainly not a burden. Far from it.

It's a great thrill to go through each round and you always keep that piece of silverware in the back of your mind.

But you shouldn't look any further forward than the next match. Although a tie at Manchester United is the prize, we're concentrating solely on Swindon.

All that matters is the match you've just played and the one you're going to play. That's an approach I'll never change.

The Cup is a one-off, a totally different ball-game. You either take your chance or you don't.

As a coach or manager, you do your work beforehand and then leave players time to prepare mentally and attune to their jobs. All I'll do today is have a word with the players before they go out on the pitch. They know what's required, they'll be ready.

Welcome to everyone from Swindon Town. I've watched them a number of times and think they deserve to get promotion. They are well-organised and try to play football.

In fairness to our players, they've done exceptionally well recently. Saturday's match against Chelsea was an example. Despite all the millions spent by Chelsea, the only difference between the two teams was Ruud Gullit.

Peter Shreeves paid us a compliment afterwards by saying Chelsea would have settled for a point. He added that they didn't know whether they were coming or going before Wisey hit that equaliser.

It was a terrific match. People talk of entertainment by Continental clubs, but The Dell saw all the qualities of English football at its best.

Individual errors cost us at the end of the day. We've been trying to sort it out on the training ground.

The three teams who go down will deserve to. They'll have had all season to do something about it.

You create your own luck mainly by adopting a positive attitude. I'm looking to the players to produce bottle and quality; cool heads and calm hearts are needed.





England Flop in Sweden

he sixth World Cup finals were played in Sweden in June 1958 and England were reasonably confident when they arrived there, having drawn with USSR in Moscow, beaten both Portugal and Scotland at Wembley, but lost heavily in Belgrade against Yugoslavia.

Team manager Walter Winterbottom named a squad whose average age was 25 years and the average international experience of the players was 12 caps.

The full squad was:

Goalkeepers - Eddie Hopkinson (Bolton Wanderers) and Colin McDonald (Burnley).

Full-backs - Tommy Banks (Bolton Wanderers), Don Howe (W.B.A.) and Peter Sillett (Chelsea).

Centre-halves - Maurice Norman (Tottenham

Hotspur) and Billy Wright (Wolves).

Wing-halves - Eddie Clamp (Wolves), Eddie Clayton (Blackburn Rovers) and Bill Slater (Wolves).

Wingers - Alan A'Court (Liverpool), Peter Brabrook (Chelsea), Bryan Douglas (Blackburn Rovers) and Tom Finney (Preston).

Inside-forwards - Peter Broadbent (Wolves), Johnny Haynes (Fulham), Bobby Robson (W.B.A.)

Centre-forwards - Bobby Charlton (Manchester United), Derek Kevan (W.B.A.) and

Bobby Smith (Tottenham Hotspur).

England were, of course, without the services of the Manchester United foursome of Roger Byrne, Duncan Edwards, David Pegg and Tommy Taylor who lost their lives as a result of the Munich air disaster and to everyone's surprise, right-winger Stanley Matthews was omitted from the final 22, Tom Finney (aged 36) being preferred, along with one-cap A'Court, the uncapped Brabrook and 24-year-old Douglas.

England were placed in pool 4 alongside Austria, Brazil and USSR. The other pools comprised: Argentina, Czechoslovakia, Northern Ireland and West Germany (1), France, Paraguay, Scotland and Yugoslavia (2) and Hungary, Mexico, hosts Sweden and Wales (3).

Each pool was tightly contested and after some cracking contests, West Germany and Northern Ireland, France and Yugoslovia, Sweden and Wales and Brazil and USSR all progressed through to the quarter-finals, USSR knocking out England after a play-off.

England drew all their three pool matches, while USSR won one, drew one and lost one. Each country finished with three points apiece and also an identical goal-average of 4-4.

England's first game was against USSR on Sunday June 8 in Gothenburg attracted a 48,934 crowd and this team forced a creditable 2-2 draw - McDonald; Howe, Banks; Clamp, Wright, Slater; Douglas, Robson, Kevan, Haynes, Finney.

Simonian opened the scoring for USSR in the first-half and soon after the restart Ivanov made it 2-0. England looked jaded at this stage and with Finney hobbling on the left-wing (following a heavy tackle) they faced an uphill fight. But somehow everyone battled on and slowly but surely they clawed themselves back into the game.

On 65 minutes, Wright curled a free-kick into the penalty-area where Kevan dived forward to plant his header past big Lev Yashin.

USSR back-pedalled and with time running out, Haynes was floored inside the box, allowing

Finney to hit home the equaliser.

Finney was ruled out of the competition and his place for the next game on June 11 against Brazil, also in Gothenburg, went to young Alan A'Court.

England did well to draw 0-0 with the Brazilians before a 40,767 crowd. Kevan and Robson both went close to opening the scoring in the first half and Kevan clipped the crossbar in the second. But two brilliant second-half saves by 'keeper McDonald (from Didi and Vava) and a goal-line clearance by Howe (from Joel) earned a point.

England had to win their final pool game against Austria to stand any chance of going

through to the next stage.

Winterbottom kept an unchanged team for the match which was played in Boras in front of 17,045 spectators. Unfortunately, things didn't go according to plan. In a tedious, sometimes static affair England again had to pull back from 1-0 and then 2-1 down to salvage a point - and they had McDonald to thank once more for not losing!

The Austrians scored with two long-range shots, McDonald having no chance with either, the first from Koller before half-time and the second from Koemar after Haynes had equalised early in the second period.

It took a brilliant and brave goal from the big West Brom striker Kevan to grab a face-saving 2-2 draw.

With USSR losing 2-0 to Brazil (who introduced Pele for the first time) the draw meant that England had to face a play-off against USSR to see who went through to play Sweden in the quarter-finals.

Manager Winterbottom introduced a new rightwing pairing of Peter Brabrook and Peter Broadbent, but there was no place for Charlton.

As it was England simply couldn't get going and although Broadbent twice hit a post and Kevan the bar, it was USSR who stole victory with a shot from Ilyin which flew into the net off McDonald's right-hand post.

England should have won but they didn't and that was that!

In the quarter-finals Brazil beat Wales 1-0, France overcame Northern Ireland 4-0, West Germany pipped Yugoslavia 1-0 and Swden saw off USSR 2-0.

It was goals galore in the two semis - Brazil crushed France 5-2 while Sweden accounted for West Germany 3-1.


After France had whipped the Germans 8-3 in the third-place game, Brazil went on to win the Jules Rimet Trophy by defeating the host nation Sweden 5-2 in the Final in Stockholm before a 50,000 crowd.

Vava (2), Pele (2) and Zagalo scored for Brazil while Liedhjolm and Simonsson replied for the Swedes.

After the cup had been presented, the Brazilain danced around the pitch waving first their own flag and then the Swedish flag to the applause of the crowd - and for once the best team in the competition had won the title!

SWINDON TOWN visit The Dell tonight as Second Division leaders.

It's certainly been a roller-coaster ride for Swindon supporters in the last few seasons with one promotion and two relegations in the last three seasons, though they seem set to even out that score.

A good away record is vital to a successful team, and Swindon can certainly look back at their away record this season with pride. They have suffered just two defeats on their travels.

Under manager Steve McMahon, the Robins have a good set-up. Defensively they are strong with just 18 League goals conceded all this from a side who let in 75 goals last season and scored just 54.

Everything is pointing to the fact that Swindon Town are likely to be tasting promotion at the end of this season. If they achieve this, it will be their fourth league change in as many seasons - breathtaking stuff for the Swindon faithful.

STEVE McMAHON - Player Manager

Appointed player/manager at the end of November 1994. Started his career at Everton and made his League debut at Sunderland in August 1980. Moved to Aston Villa for £300,000 in 1983 and was also part of the England Under-21 side. He was then signed by

Liverpool in 1985 for £375,000 and this was to be the most successful part of his career. As well as winning many trophies at Liverpool, including being part of the double-winning side, he also made the full England team. His next trip was to Manchester City in 1991 for £900,000 before he joined Swindon. His pedigree as a player is now showing through as a manager who has steered the Robins to the top of the division.

FRASER DIGBY Sheffield-born Fraser joined Manchester United straight from school. Failed to make the first team at Old Trafford and after a loan spell at Oldham, first moved to Swindon on loan in 1986 before signing permanently. Has now made over 400 appearances for the Wiltshire club although he did return to Old Trafford on loan during the 92/93 season.

MARK SEAGRAVES Signed last summer from Bolton after playing a major part in the Trotters' promotion. Started his career as an apprentice at Liverpool before going on loan to Norwich where he made his League debut before signing for Manchester City. Then joined Bolton.

IAN CULVERHOUSE Signed for Swindon last December for £250,000 from Norwich. Started his career at Tottenham where he made just two league appearances in 1984 before moving to Carrow Road for £50,000 in October 1985 where he totalled 296 league appearances and starred in the Canaries' UEFA Cup successes. Made nine appearances for Swindon last season.

PAUL BODIN Cardif-born Paul started his career at Chelsea, before joining Newport County. Moved along the South Wales coast to Cardiff where he made his league debut before dropping into non-League football with Bath City. Returned to Newport before signing for Swindon in 1988. After 93 league appearances he moved to Crystal Palace for £550,000 but found first team appearances limited. After a loan spell at Newcastle, rejoined Swindon just ten months after leaving them. Has gained international recognition with Wales and is Swindon's regular penalty taker.

WAYNE O'SULLIVAN Has worked his way through the ranks at the County Ground to grab a first team spot. Made his debut at home to Port Vale in the first game of last season and went on to make over 30 appearances. Scored his first goal for the club in the 2-0 win at Brentford this season.

MARK ROBINSON Rochdale-born defender who joined West Brom from school in June 1985 and made his league debut in April 1986 and made just one more before joining Barnsley where he totalled 137 League appearances before moving for a spell at Newcastle for £450,000. The vast squad at St James Park denied Mark an extended first team run and he joined Swindon for a club record £600,000 in July 1994. Scored his first goal for Swindon this season.

WAYNE ALLISON Wayne signed last summer from Bristol City for £475,000. Started his career at Halifax before moving to Watford. After just a year at Vicarage Road moved to Bristol City where he made 195 League appearances scoring 48 goals, including 13 last season which made him leading scorer. Has regularly found the net this season and has become a fans' favourite.

STEVE FINNEY Steve made a superb start to his Swindon career after signing from Manchester City in the summer. He only started the first game of the season at Hull due to Peter Thorne failing a fitness test and scored the winning goal. Has regularly hit the net since then including a brace against York and one against Blackburn in the Coca-Cola Cup.

SHAUN TAYLOR Signed for Swindon from Exeter for £200,000 in July 1991 after originally being at Bideford Town. Ever-present for the last last two seasons, this defender knows where the net is.

TY GOODEN Ty was released from Wycombe at the end of the 92/93 season and was signed by Swindon in December 1993 after a trial period. He made his Premiership debut against West Ham in March 1994. Made 16 league appearances last season, scoring twice and hit the winner against Rotherham this season.


EDWIN MURRAY Joined Swindon in 1988 as an associate schoolboy. This defender signed professional forms in 1991 and made his League debut in the same year at home to Oxford.

PAUL ALLEN Signed on a free transfer this season from Southampton. Started his career at West Ham where he gained an FA Cup winner's medal at 17 and made 152 League appearances before joining Tottenham where he appeared in 292 League games, scoring 23 goals. Moved to The Dell where he also spent time on loan at Luton and Stoke before switching to Swindon. His experience is a great asset to Steve McMahon's side.


KEVIN HORLOCK Scored Swindon's goal in the recent 1-1 FA Cup draw with Saints. Signed from West Ham on a free transfer in the summer of 1992 and made his debut at Portsmouth that year. Before this season scored just twice in 90 League appearances for Swindon, but has boosted his goalscoring record this season including a hat-trick at Twerton Park in the 4-1 win over Bristol Rovers.

MARTIN LING Now in his second spell with Swindon after starting out as an apprentice and then playing for Southend. Replaced the injured Steve McMahon in Swindon's midfield for the original FA Cup-tie against Saints.

PETER THORNE The 22-year-old Manchester-born striker proved a big hit at Swindon following his transfer from Blackburn. Before that, made his League debut while on loan at Wigan. This season has been disrupted by injury.









Fans See That!

'A HOME DRAW - you can't ask for anything more in the sixth round of the Cup.'

I dispute those concluding remarks (or words to that effect) by Alan Hansen, after the draw for this season's sixth round. Will idle TV experts kindly refrain from mouthing this annual nonsense about home 'advantage' in the FA Cup 6th Round?

When I say 'idle', I mean that they are paid well-paid, I'd guess - to make accurate comments, supported (I guess) by researchers who could check out myths.

When I say 'myth', I'm no longer guessing. I felt fairly sure that teams drawn at home in the quarter-final had failed, more often than not, to reach the semi-final. Indeed, in 1993, no home team went through, thanks to the two Sheffield, and two North London, clubs.

So I ran a manual check - back to 1925-26, when the sixth round began. That meant 14 such rounds before the War and 49 since (not counting the two-legged affair of 1945-46).

So we're talking 63 seasons and 252 ties. As I suspected, the majority of those ties have gone to the side drawn away. True, there was a period - 1928-36 - when, on three occasions, all four home teams triumphed. But that has never happened since. In fact, in the 49 post-war seasons, there have been only 10 occasions when three of the home teams prevailed (sometimes with a replay), 20 even seasons (two home winners and two away), 16 when only one home team survived and three when there were no home winners.

Those last three included, as I say, 1993 - plus 1987 and 1953, when Saints were looking forward to a sixth round trip to Highbury, once they had seen off Blackpool in a 5th Round replay at The Dell. But they surrendered a 1-0 interval lead to go out 2-1. So, with a win at Highbury and late help from a Ramsey passback in the semi-final, Blackpool were on their way to the historic 'Matthews Final'.

Their captain, Harry Johnston, reflected in his record of that cup run - the aptly-called Rocky Road to Wembley - that Saints should have been 'three or four up at half-time'. Stanley Matthews put the figure at five when he recently relived this game for me. And goalscorer, Johnny

Walker, and goalmisser, Frank Dudley, say much the same about this Fifth Round replay arguably the most talked-about in the club's history until Ronnie Rosenthal went crazy last year.

Hoping for no such craziness tonight,
Saints fans will be anticipating a sixth round at
Old Trafford. A home banker according to
Hansen and the bookies. But not according to
the sixth round statistics. If my hand-recording
is correct, then 110 of the 196 post-war ties
have gone to the side drawn away. The prewar years are a little more supportive of
Hansenism, but the all-time total is still only
116 out of 252 for the home team.

Sod's Law says that Hansen will be proved right this season. Four home teams will romp through. Yet, if Saints win tonight, it would be a complete break with their record, in eight previous sixth round ties, for them to go out to United.

On the three occasions that Saints have been the home ball - v Spurs in 1948, Arsenal in 1979 and Norwich in 1992 - they've lost. Yet they've won five out of five away draws. Details of those passports to the semi-final will be familiar, but let's indulge ourselves.

A few eighty-somethings will remember Saints drawing at The Den in 1927 and winning the replay here. Fast forward to 1963, with all that snow and all those postponements (superstitious?), when a draw at the City Ground set up that amazing 3-3 draw at The Dell, an unbelievable 5-0 win at White Hart Lane (a plague on your penalty shoot-outs!) and an anti-climactic fluke by Denis Law at Villa Park.

Then we had 1976 and McCalliog magic at Valley Parade - to set up a Stamford Bridge rebuff for Big Mal's famous fedora and revenge, of the best possible kind, for that United fluke of 1963. Then came the 5-1 drubbing of Sheffield Wednesday (after a draw at Hillsborough) in 1984 - only for Adrian Heath to become Denis Law at Highbury - and the 1986 win at Brighton that sent us to White Hart Lane for a stunning display of professional fouling by Mr Hansen's lot.

Ah! Memories! They're important in football, not only for feeding romance and superstition, but also, we might expect, for informing the experts. Especially when it comes to the much-mythologised sixth round which I hope we're about to enter for the ninth time.



Turkish Delight!



mir Gumus, a 49year-old business man from Turkey, is among Saints' most devoted supporters!

Born and bred in Istanbul, he has missed just one League match at The Dell in the past decade.

"I've followed the Saints for almost 25 years and, yes, I'm fanatical," grins the man who has been a Dell season-ticketholder since 1984. "I'll love this club till I die."

Although business commitments severely restrict Emir Gumus's appearances at away matches, he was at Swindon for the 1-1 FA Cup fifth round draw.


Now, he has his sights set on Old Trafford for the quarter-finals!

"If the team play as they can there's no reason at all why we shouldn't beat Swindon," he declares. "And I'm quietly confident that we can then get past Manchester United. It might need a replay, though.

"I would do everything possible to get to Manchester. But the business helps to pay for my football, so that comes first." In 1971 he emigrated to England, working first as a waiter at The Savoy Hotel in London. Within a year he moved to Hampshire - "the sea and New Forest were the big attractions" - to take jobs as a head waiter and then restaurant manager.

Already a big Saints fan, he was on duty in Lyndhurst at a dinner-dance on the day in 1976 when Saints won the FA Cup. "I watched the match on television - and what a night it was afterwards," he recalls. "The band kept playing 'When the Saints Go Marching In!"

He and his English wife Judith bought a fish-and-chip shop in Southampton's Commercial Road in 1980. Married with two daughters, Emir later took a milkround job to supplement his income. Then, in 1989, he bought a newsagent business in Commercial Road - overlapping for ten months with his dairy duties - and has developed that into a thriving concern complete with sandwich bar.



An ardent Besiktas supporter in his boyhood days back in Istanbul, he is now a fully committed Saint.

"This club have given me so much pleasure over the years, with great players and great matches," he says. "I was born into football and, to be honest with you, if Saints win I'm the happiest man alive, but if they lose it completely spoils my weekend.

"My wife would tell you that when there's been a bad result people coming into the shop give me hell on a Monday morning!" Fittingly, Emir and his family live barely a goalkick from The Dell.



PAST ENCOUNTERS

There have been four previous F.A. Cup games between the teams.

 The first was a 4th qualifying round clash on January 2 1897 before a crowd of 5,000 at Saints' former home, the County Cricket Ground.

Southampton, wearing red and white striped shirts and blue shorts, recorded an emphatic 8-2 victory with Farrell (3), Littlehales, Hodgkisson, Keay, Turner and Buchanan scoring our goals. Saints went on to reach the second round proper before losing 3-1 in a replay to Newton Heath (now Manchester United).

• The second meeting was a 4th qualifying round game at Swindon on November 20 1898 when the turnout was again recorded as 5,000. This time Saints won 3-0 with Farrell (2) and Buchanan on the scoresheet. The home side were never in the match and the margin of victory could - and should - have been much wider.

Saints went on to reach the semi-final stage but were ousted by Nottingham Forest who won 2-0 at the Crystal Palace.

- The third time the teams met in the F.A. Cup was on February 7 1948, when goals by Charlie Wayman, Ted Bates and Tom Rudkin gave Southampton a relatively comfortable 3-0 win. Swindon were reduced to 10 men after just eight minutes' play when their right-half Harry Kaye limped off with an injured leg. Thereafter there was only going to be one result - and 29,134 fans were present to cheer Saints on to victory. In the next round, Second Divsion Tottenham Hotspur visited The Dell and won 1-0 to end Saints' Wembley
- The fourth encounter was, of course, played at Swindon earlier this month when over 15,000 fans witnessed the 1-1 draw. Gordon Watson headed home Saints' equaliser 14 minutes from time after Kevin Horlock had given Swindon a first-half lead.

Saints knocked Swindon Town out of the Littlewoodssponsored League Cup in 1986-87, winning a twolegged 2nd round tie on aggregate. The first game at The Dell ended in a 3-0 win for Saints with George Lawrence (2) and Joe Jordan the scorers before 10,458 fans.

The second leg finished all square at 0-0 with 9,453 present.

Saints went on to reach the semi-final before losing to Liverpool 3-0 on aggregate.

LAST VISIT HERE

The last time Swindon visited The Dell was for a Premiership game in August 1993 when a crowd of 12,505 saw Saints romp to a 5-1 victory; Matt Le Tissier (2), Iain Dowie, Jeff Kenna and Neil Maddison on target against a late penalty for Swindon by Craig Maskell.

The return fixture at Swindon ended in a 2-1 win for the home side; Paul Bodin and Keith Scott (Swindon) and Le Tissier the scorers before 13,284 fans.

HAT-TRICK HEROES

Derek Reeves scored four goals in Saints' 5-1 Second Division victory over Swindon Town at The Dell in October 1959.

And five years later - in April 1964 - Martin Chivers netted a hat-trick when Saints again whipped Swindon 5-1 at home in a Second Division fixture.

BIG DEFEATS

Both Saints and Swindon have suffered their heaviest F.A. Cup defeats against the same team - Manchester City. Saints were beaten 5-0 at Hyde Road in February 1910, while Swindon were hammered 10-1 at Maine Road in Janaury 1930.

PLAYED FOR BOTH CLUBS

Over the years several players have served with both clubs, and among those since World War Two we have strikers Craig Maskell and Paul Rideout, full-back and penalty expert David Peach, Welsh international midfielder Alan McLoughlin, who was a record signing by Saints at £1 million in December 1990, Glenn Cockerill and goalkeeper lan Andrews.

YOUNGEST PLAYER

Paul Rideout, in fact, is the youngest player ever to appear for Swindon Town in a League or Cup game. He was 16 years 107 days old when he made his debut against Hull City in a Third Division game on November 29 1980.

F.A. CUP SEMI-FINALISTS

Swindon have reached the semi-finals twice, losing in 1910 to Newcastle United and 1912 to Barnsley. In contrast Saints have played in ten semis, going through to the Final three times in 1900, 1902 and 1976, winning the trophy in the latter year, 1-0 v. Manchester United.



CUP WINNERS CUP SHOWDOWN

Spain have two teams left in this season's European Cup Winners Cup competition - and they have been drawn against each other in next month's quarter-final. Real Zaragoza, the holders, who broke Arsenal's hearts in the Paris final last year with that amazing last-minute goal from the former Tottenham star, Nayim, take on John Toshack's Deportivo La Coruna side, who gained their first-ever trophy when defeating Valencia in the rain-interrupted Spanish Cup Final last June.

La Coruna, who stage the first leg on march 7, have yet to concede a goal in Europe this season after eliminating Apoel Nicosia (0-0 and 8-0) and Trabzonspor of Turkey (1-0 and 3-0).

Brazilain World Cup striker, Bebeto, leading goalscorer in Spain at present, remains Deportivo's most potent weapon in a side who have failed to live up to expectations after

their consistency of the past couple of years. Zaragoza, at the moment struggling to pull out of the bottom half of the Spanish First Division, transferred their Argentinian marksman Juan Eduardo Esnaider back to Real Madrid during the summer - at a huge profit add - and they have never replaced him. They have missed his sharpness in and around the penalty-area and are already marked down as outsiders in the competition despite being the holders.

In reaching the last eight, Zaragoza have beaten Inter Bratislava (5-1 on aggregate) and a very good KV Brugge side, the current Belgian League leaders, whom they destroyed both at home and away in the second round. Before meeting La Coruna, however, Zaragoza have to play their second leg of this season's Super Cup against the reigning European champions Ajax of Amsterdam in Holland. Ajax are favourites to take the star prize having drawn the first game in Spain 1-1.

The pick of the three other quarter-final ties is that between Parma, who were beaten in the Italian Cup final by Serie 'A' champions Juventus, and the French giants, Paris St. Germain, who suffered a rare home defeat recently when losing to Montpellier. P.S.G. qualified for the 1995-96 European Cup Winners Cup by winning the French Cup Final, 1-0 against RC Strasbourg.

Parma, the UEFA Cup holders and 1992 Cup Winners Cup winners (v. Antwerp at Wembley), lost in the Cup Winners Cup final to Arsenal the following year in Copenhagen, and they were given an almighty scare in the last round before accounting for the amateurs of Swedish club Halmstad 4-3 on aggregate, coming back supremely well following a 3-0 away leg defeat.

AC MILAN IN COMMAND

A narrow 3-2 win over lowly Bari has put AC Milan seven points clear at the top of Serie 'A' and with games fast running out, the Italian giants are now looking odds-on to clinch the championship.

Second-placed Fiorentina, without injured striker Battistuta, could only draw with bottom club Cremonese and now seem content on chasing home Milan.

Parma, Juventus, Lazio, Inter Milan, AS Roma and even Udinese and Vicenza are all chasing UEFA Cup places, while at the other end of the table, Bari, Torino and Padova join Cremonese in the fight against relegation.

CHEERS IN PORTO!

Bobby Robson's FC Porto have all but clinched the Portuguese championship. Following a 1-1 away draw against the nearest challengers, Boavista, Porto are now 13 points clear and only a disaster will prevent them from carrying off their 15th League title. Contesting the runners-up spot with Boavista are two big names from the past, Sporting Lisbon and Benfica.

TOP DOGS IN THE BUNDESLIGA

Borussia Dortmund have edged clear of Bayern Munich at the top of the German Bundesliga. Bayern crashed 4-1 at home recently to middle-of-the-table Karlsruhe and with a game in hand, Dortmund are looking good to win only their fourth League title - the others coming in 1956, 1957 and 1963.

Meanwhile, three big names in German football and all associated with Bayern Munich - president Frans 'Kaiser' Beckenbauer, skipper Lothar Matthaus and coach Otto Rehhagel - have been involved in heated arguments surrounding team selection. Beckenbauer wants to sign certain players, Matthaus says he shouldn't and the coach believes the present squad is good enough. Vice-president Karl-Heinz Rummenigge and team manager Uli Hoeness have also had their say in the matter but don't want to get too involved.

Key defender Juergan Kohler is wanted by Beckenbauer, who is also keen to sell French striker Jean-Pierre Papin for whom Newcastle are understood to have bid over £2 million for him before Christmas). But nothing has materialised - yet - and if Bayern fail to overhaul Borussia Dortmund then the summer activity at the Munich club could be worth writing about.

GENOA IN FINAL

Italy's Serie 'B' side, Genoa, have qualified for this season's Anglo-Italian Cup Final, to be played at Wembley on either March 16 or 17. Their opponents will be either Port Vale or West Bromwich Albion, who have yet to decide the English Final owing to the weather.

KINGS OF SPAIN

Atletico Madrid are seemingly racing away from their challengers in the Spanish First Division. Following a fine 2-0 away win over fourth-placed Espanol, They have now stretched their lead at the top of the table to eight points over Barcelona, with Compostela third and Valencia now fourth. Atletico bounced back in style after suffering a shock home defeat at the hands of Seville and they are now bang on course to lift their first championship trophy in nine years.

Atletico are also on course to reach the Spanish Cup Final after eliminating Tenerife 3-0 in convincing fashion.


Atletico's arch rivals and reigning Spanish champions, Real Madrid, are now 16 points behind their neighbours and realistically have no chance of retaining their title.

TWO-HORSE RACE



The teams have to play each other soon and that will be a crucial contest. If Brugge win, then the race for glory is surely over, but if Anderlecht can pull off a victory, then the race for the silverware could go right down to the wire.

OVERTIME WIN

A crowd in excess of 60,000 witnessed the recent Brazilain League game between Juventus and Botofogo which ended in a 1-0 win for the former club. During the match two penalties were awarded, one to each side and both were missed, seven players were cautioned and the respective trainers were called on to the field no fewer than 12 times resulting in all six substitutes being used. After all this activity, the refree added on 12 minutes of 'extra-time'!

Laws of the Game



When is a "back pass" not a back pass?

When changes are made to the Laws of the Game there is a tendency to focus all attention on the new modifications and neglect earlier alterations. Many spectators will recall the apparent culture shock which reverberated through much of football when, just a few years ago, it became an offence for a goalkeeper inside his own penalty-area to touch the ball with his hands after it had been deliberately kicked to him by a teammate.

Immediately, the wrongly-named "Back Pass Rule" became the centre of attention and the supposed cause of massive changes having to be made in defensive skills.

It was, of course, wrongly-named because the deliberate kicking of the ball by a player to his goalkeeper may be directed in any direction, forward, backwards or even sideways!

The International FA Board decision in this respect was introduced three years ago to help reduce the annoying practice of wasting time by passing the ball between defenders and thence to the goalkeeper so that he would eventually pick it up and kick upfield. The amendment has generally proved to be immensely popular. Exciting goalmouth tussles, more goals and the encouragement of defenders to become more adept at playing themselves out of trouble have all been healthy biproducts of the modification.

Initally, of course, the most affected people were probably goalkeepers and referees, but each has adapted extremely well to the changed demands.

Defenders under pressure near their own goal need to remember that while they may deliberately kick the ball to the goalkeeper, he may not collect the ball with his hands, but has to rely alone on his skills with feet and body, like any outfield player in the same circumstances.

If the goalkeeper handles the ball in these circumstances, the opposing team are awarded an indirect freekick.

Referees were, and continue to be, required to show extra vigilance in respect of this new area of possible offence. They had to learn to decide quickly whether the ball had been deliberately kicked to the goalkeeper because only such intentional action, followed by the goalkeeper handling the ball, resulted in an offence. Involuntary deflections caused by defenders miskicking the ball do not, of course, lead to an indirect freekick if the goalkeeper handles the ball.

Discussions involving the pros and cons of that change in the Laws of the Game, naturally, continue. Defenders have to concentrate even more fully and referees, too, but the introduction of the "Back Pass Rule" that really wasn't just for back passes has certainly added to the excitement of the game.




Tommy Widdrington put Saints 1-0 up from the edge of the penalty-area.




