ON THE BENCH WITH MANAGER

Mick Halsall

Season's greetings and a warm welcome to London Road as we move into a fresh year and one which I fervently hope will bring the success on the field for Peterborough United that everyone on the playing staff and management is so eager to achieve. We could hardly begin 1996 with a more attractive and testing fixture than a visit by Swindon Town, the side that has been setting the pace at the top of Division Two since the very beginning of the season. Consistency has been the key to Swindon's success and, listening to people who have seen them in action regularly, they are always a side that is extremely difficult to play against. But as always - and especially here at London Road - it is really down to us and the way we approach the fixture. At the time of writing I don't know how the Christmas period away games at Chesterfield and Crewe will have gone but after the home displays



against Rotherham United and Stockport County which were disappointing in some respects it is probable that we will be adopting a rather different tactical formation today in a bid to be more forceful going forward. Against Rotherham it was encouraging to keep a clean sheet and I was pleased with the way Tony Spearing came back into the side after lengthy absence and not only completed the full 90 minutes but also scored the vital goal. Unfortunately we did not maintain the momentum against Stockport the following Tuesday and while the points were settled by a penalty, we simply did not put them under pressure and this is why I am having a rethink about our style of play. In away games teams tend to come at you and it is possible to be creative out of defence, as we were at Bradford, but in the last two home performances the visiting sides have come at us and we have not been getting the ball wide or having people break from the back to support the front players. Everything seemed to be going to the forwards and coming straight back with our whole game very predictable. Now we have to be willing to make changes in our approach and to ensure that sides coming to London Road in the next couple of weeks will find their goals really being threatened. Mick Halsall



LOOKING AHEAD INTO 1996

with Posh Chief Executive CHRIS TURNER First, I hope everyone had a very good Christmas and wish you all the very best for 1996. It has certainly been an eventful 12 months for Peterborough United as well as an interesting one in many respects. I think we have gone forward, probably not as much as we would have liked on the field of play, but off the field there has been very definite progress. Looking at our playing performances, while we can point to the money brought in by selling some players over the last year, we have spent in excess of that - and probably the most the club has ever spent - to bring in new faces. But transfer money has to be spent wisely and we need to remember that big spending doesn't guarantee success. I heard someone shout out at the game against Stockport County that the club should get its cheque book out and now it actually makes me laugh when I hear people say things like this. I used find such comments annoying but we have to carry on with sensible business thinking and be aware that even when money is spent it has to go on good players. We parted company with John Still during the year and I suppose I was more instrumental than anyone in bringing him here in the first place. At the end it might have looked as if John was driven out by the fans but I don't think this was really the case. I don't believe our supporters are any harder to please or more anti-manager than at any other club. Responsibility always starts with the manager, then the chairman and on down the chain but it never seems to rest with the players and often they are as just as much to blame. Clubs do exist with coaches or caretaker managers and while great emphasis is usually placed on managers, they are not always successful all the time and I firmly believe that what makes a good manager is good players. We were sorry to see John Still go but things like this happen in football and both before and since the appointment of Mick Halsall we, as a club, have once again been accused of being frightened to appoint a big name manager. To be fair, there were no big names among those who applied for the job but Peterborough United have had big name players as manager in the past, none bigger than Mark Lawrenson or John Wile, yet it did not bring success. Having thoroughly discussed the position we felt that Michael had learned enough and gained the bit of experience needed to do the job, ably assisted by Bob Higgins who had 15 years of experience with Southampton and has also coached abroad. I think the majority of supporters back our decision and only time will tell how it goes. You have probably already have heard the news that the new Freemans Family Stand, which we hoped to have in use today, is running two or three weeks behind schedule. This is a disappointment but we want everything right when we do open it and the most impor-

tant thing is that it is finished to the standard you will all expect. I am sure everyone will be delighted with what they see and the new stand provides a positive start for us in 1996 and now the next improvement we want is on

the field of play.

MICK HIS

Mick Halsall today starts a fresh year as manager of Peterborough United and is thoroughly committed to bringing soccer success back to London Road. The popular Merseysider may only have been confirmed in the post at the beginning of last month but already there have been significant behind the scenes moves as he creates his own regime. Although Mick made no secret of his desire to stay in the game after injury cut short a highly successful playing career, he admits that he did not expect to be able to fulfil ambitions of becoming a manager quite so soon and at 34 he is the fourth youngest manager in the Football League after Grimsby's Brian Laws, Ronnie Whelan of Southend and Steve McMahon, player manager of this afternoon's visitors Swindon Town.

However he is not the youngest Posh manager, that distinction falling to one time Liverpool midfield star Mark Lawrenson who was 32 when installed by then chairman John Devaney just after the start of the 1989-90 season. 'I never imagined I could be a manager so soon but after enjoying coaching and acting as assistant manager I hope I can get the same sort of pleasure after moving into the hot seat. My commitment to Peterborough United as a player was total and it is no different now I am manager,' Mick commented.

He has been encouraged by the way the players have responded to additional training and experiments with different tactics and firmly believes that the basis for all achievement both on and off the field is hard work. 'I want to see the club make progress and win things but like every other manager I will be judged on results and I hope I will be successful and here for a very long time,' he added.

Mick Halsall was born in Bootle only a short distance from Liverpool's Anfield home where he started as an apprentice moving into the professional ranks and

figuring regularly at reserve level before finding the path to first team soccer blocked by the abundance of playing talent. He moved to Birmingham making 36 senior appearances and hitting three goals before going to Carlisle (92 games, 11 goals) and then to Grimsby Town, figuring in just a dozen games before being targeted for Posh by Noel Cantwell in the summer of 1987.

Part of the £25,000 fee that made Mick a Posh player came from money raised by supporters as part of the 'Cantwell's Crusade' scheme and his debut was in a 1-0 home win over Carlisle. After figuring in 312 league and cup games and three Third Division play-off matches in 1992, Mick's final competitive appearance came as a substitute - the only occasion he came off the bench - in a 2-1 defeat by Watford in December 1993 and it was the following March when he was officially forced to announce his retirement as a player due to a persistent calf injury but was immediately given a coaching role.

He became assistant manager during John Still's spell as manager and took over the reins in a caretaker capacity following John's resignation at the end of October. Mick's appointment as manager was confirmed on 12th December by Posh chief executive Chris Turner who was himself manager when sides captained by Halsall achieved promotion in the 1990-91 and 1991-92 seasons, the later after that never to be forgotten Wembley Stadium triumph over Stockport County thanks to two goals from 'king' Ken Charlery.

Chris Turner is one of only three men to steer Posh to promotion during their 35 years as a Football League club, Jimmy Hagan starting the ball rolling in the very first season, 1960-61, with Cantwell taking Posh back into the old Third Division during the first of his two spells in charge in the 1973-74 campaign.

ONE TO BEMENBER

Matt Hill recalls when Posh and Swindon shared the points in a televised thriller

Live television cameras came to London Road for the first time for a Division One meeting between Peterborough United and Swindon Town and viewers in the Central region were served up a Sunday treat as the sides shared six goals. Posh, under manager Chris Turner, were competing in Division One for the first time and went into the game comfortably placed in

mid-table while Swindon were riding high in second place behind runaway leaders Newcastle United and, under the leadership of player manager Glenn Hoddle were fancied by many for promotion to the Premier League. The ex-Spurs and England ace had assembled a team noted for its stylish football and aside from Hoddle himself the swindon side included free scoring Craig Maskell, highly rated defender Colin Calderwood and another former Spurs star Mickey Hazard in their line-up. Posh were determined not to be

overawed and were given a dream start when Tony Adcock netted in just three minutes. Gary Cooper combined with Tony Philliskirk to send Adcock and Posh's leading scorer skilfully lifted the ball over the advancing Nicky Hammond. Stunned by the home side's early strike, Swindon began to play and their quality passing was evident throughout. From a brilliant Hoddle chip, Maskell was presented with his first sight of goal but the prolific marksman's control let him down and the chance was missed. Maskell's striking partner Dave Mitchell then forced Posh goalkeeper Ian Bennett into a fine reaction save to turn away the big Australian's well struck drive. Bennett had performed hero-

ics in the Peterborough goal since the season began but was powerless to a fierce header from Shaun Taylor in the 21st minute. From a Hazard corner Taylor climbed above the Posh defence and sent a bullet header past Bennett. In the 37th minute, after Bennett had saved efforts from Maskell and defender Kevin Horlock, Taylor turned villain when he headed a

Steve Welsh cross into his own net to hand the lead back to Posh. In the second half the Robins put the Posh defence under enormous pressure and a second Swindon goal seemed likely. Hazard thought he had scored in the 56th minute but the referee ruled the effort off-side although Swindon were level two minutes later when Maskell volleyed home a David Kerslake cross from 12 yards. Swindon were now in total control and some of their football was a joy to watch as Posh battled gamely to hold on to a point. It appeared their

efforts were to go unrewarded when, after 77 minutes, Taylor gave Swindon the lead - and completed a bizarre hat-trick of headers already having scored both ends. This time he got on the end of a Hoddle free kick to send a lopping header over Bennett. Taylor returned to the centre circle celebrating what they must have thought was the winning goal. Yet this was a Posh side respected for its fighting qualities and prompted by Mick Halsall and Cooper in midfield Posh kept going and on 83 minutes gained their reward. Hammond, receiving a back pass from Hoddle, miskicked his clearance straight at Adcock who calmly sidefooted into an empty net from 25 yards.

THE MAN IN THE MIDDLE Richard Poulain now based in Huddersfield started refereeing in Dagenham in 1971 and then moved to Yorkshire in 1974 and restarted refereeing in the Northern Counties East and Northern Premier League in 1976. He refereed a quater final of the FA Vase competition and was a linesman of the FA Trophy semi-final. 

STILL A TARGET



Swindon Town arrive at London Road determined to continue their bid to regain at the first attempt the Division One status they lost when relegated at the end of last season. They have topped the Division Two table from the very beginning of the campaign and, going into the Christmas programme, had lost just two games - an away reverse at Wrexham by the odd goal in a high scoring Racecourse ground clash and then a 1-0 home defeat by fast emerging Shrewsbury Town. This afternoon's game is the first meeting of the sides since Posh's 1992-93 debut season in the then newly created Barclays League First Division and in Sunday afternoon London Road encounter in late November that was screened live by Central Television, the points were shared 3-3 with two goal Tony Adcock voted Posh 'Man of the Match' while the Swindon star rating went to player manager Glenn Hoddle who gave a masterly display of creativity from midfield. The return game at the County Ground was equally closely contested with Swindon edging to a 1-0 win that kept them in contention for a place in the play-offs from which they duly progressed into the Premiership. After losing Hoddle to Chelsea, Swindon failed to survive beyond that first season in the top section and their decline continued last year when, despite a spirited rearguard action after Steve McMahon was appointed player manager in November, they finished fourth from bottom in Division One and were relegated again.


Steve McMahon's appointment followed the departure of Hoddle's successor John Gorman and the outstanding midfield man has played a major role on the field this season as Swindon have set a cracking pace from the outset. After starting as an apprentice with Everton he made a league debut in 1989 and scored 11 goals in 100 first team outings before a £300,000 transfer to Aston Villa in the summer of 1983. By then Steve was an established member

of the England Under 21 squad and he was part of the side that won the European Championship in 1984. His displays as Villa's midfield general attracted equal notice and in September 1985 he became the first major capture of Kenny Dalgleish after he was appointed manager at Liverpool, heading for Anfield for a £375,000 fee as the replacement for Graeme Souness. By the end of the season he had collected league and League Cup medals as Liverpool achieved a 'double' and, in addition to further honours at club level, Steve was drafted into Bobby Robson's 1990 World Cup squad as understudy to Bryan Robson and was capped 17 times. On Christmas Eve 1991 he left Anfield for Manchester City in a £900,000 move and continued to demonstrate his ability and authority at the top level until joining Swindon. McMahon's right hand man at the County Ground is first team coach Andy Rowland who was with Derby County and Bury before a £85,000 move to Swindon in 1978. After finishing his playing days he was appointed reserve team manager and then took over as first team coach under John Gorman at the beginning of last season. Swindon's response to relegation was positive and McMahon paid £465,000 to secure last season's Bristol City top scorer Wayne Allison and £100,000 for Gary Martindale's former Bolton clubmate Mark Seagraves. More recently one time West Ham and Spurs midfielder Paul Allen joined Swindon after being given a free transfer by Southampton.

Meet the Swindon Town squad

FRASER DIGBY (Goalkeeper - 23/04/67)

Joined Manchester United from school but did not make the first team and had loan spells with Oldham and Swindon before a permanent move to the County Ground in 1986. He has made over 400 first team appearances and did return to Old Trafford for a loan spell in 1992-93.

FRANK TALIA (Goalkeeper - 20/7/72)

Australian Frank arrived at the County Ground back in November after a period on loan earlier in the season. He was also on loan to Hartlepool for a spell in 1992.

PAUL BODIN (Defender - 13/9/64)

A Welsh international now in his second spell at the County Ground, Paul first joined Swindon from Newport County in 1988. Three years later he was transferred to Crystal Palace but failed to command a place and returned to Swindon after just 10 months.

SHAUN TAYLOR (Defender - 26/02/63)

An ever present last season for the second successive campaign he did not make his professional debut until 23 when joining Exeter. He cost Swindon £200,000 in the summer of 1991 and has signed a new contract which will keep him at the County Ground until 1997.

MARK SEAGRAVES (Defender - 22/10/66)

Tall, strong central defender signed from Bolton for £100,000 back in June who has formed a solid partnership with Shaun Taylor. A former Liverpool apprentice he joined Manchester City for £100,000 in 1986 and was transferred to Bolton four years late

WAYNE O'SULLIVAN (Defender - 25/2/74)

A former trainee who has progressed into the first team squad, Wayne was selected for the Eire Under 21 squad, including Posh's Gary Breen, for the October match with Latvia in Galway.

KEVIN HORLOCK (Defender -1/11/72)

A Northern Ireland International who also played at Under 21 level, he was signed on a free transfer from West Ham in the summer of 1992.

MARK ROBINSON (Defender - 21/11/68)

Cost Swindon what was then a club record fee of £600,000 when bought from Newcastle United in July 1994, having joined the Magpies from Barnsley for £450,000 in March of the previous year. Began his career as an apprentice at West Bromwich Albion.

MARTIN LING (Midfield - 15/7/66)

Also in his second spell with Swindon,

Martin spent just 93 days at the County Ground after a move from Exeter City in 1986 before going on to Southend. He had loan spells with Mansfield and Swindon before Glenn Hoddle made his return permanent for a bargain £15,000 in 1991.

TY GOODEN (Midfield - 23/10/72)

With Wycombe Wanderers until they gained league status but then surprisingly released, Essex-born Ty was signed in December 1993 by John Gorman after a spell on trial.

JASON DRYSDALE (Defender - 17/11/70)

A former England Youth International, Jason was signed from Newcastle for £340,000 on deadline day last year. Originally a Watford trainee, he spent only seven months at St.James's Park after a £425,000 1994 move.

PAUL ALLEN (Midfield - 28/8/62)

A member of one of football's best known families Paul joined Swindon on a free transfer from Southampton back in October. He signed as an apprentice for West Ham in 1979 and went on to make almost 200 senior appearances before a £500,000 move across London to Spurs in 1985 to clock up 377 appearances. He was transferred to Southampton for £550,00 in September 1993.

IAN CULVERHOUSE (Defender - 22/9/64)

Norwich originally asked £900,000 but Swindon eventually got their man in December 1994 for a £250,000 fee decided by a Football League tribunal. Starting as a youngster with Spurs, Ian figured in the Norwich side that enjoyed some UEFA Cup success under manager Mike Walker.

WAYNE ALLISON (Forward - 31/10/73)


A tribunal also decided that Swindon had to pay £475,000 for last season's Bristol City top scorer. Born in Huddersfield, Wayne began as an apprentice at Halifax and joined Watford for £250,000 in 1989 with a £300,000 deal taking him to Ashton Gate a year later.

STEVE FINNEY (Forward - 31/10/73)

Steve McMahon knew Steve when they were both at Manchester City and took him on a free transfer from Maine Road last summer and an early injury to Peter Thorne gave him an early first team chance.

PETER THORNE (Forward - 21/6/73)

Young striker signed from Blackburn for an undisclosed fee at the beginning of 1995 who made an impressive Swindon start with four goals in his first two games. He hit all five against TP Seinajoki in Swindon's pre-season tour to Finland.
