I have to go in my local or walk round Oxford just like the rest of you and, obviously, the Swindon result is always the first one mentioned. I want us to go out and


win - at this stage of the season we have to win all our home games, no matter who the opposition are.





windon Town, who had the galling experience of dropping from the Premiership to the Second Division of the Endsleigh League in successive seasons, now look set to take a step back towards the top.

The Robins are currently level on points with Blackpool at the top of the table but they have three games in hand and, on current form, will be favoured to clinch one of the two guaranteed promotion places.

Last Summer player/manager Steve McMahon made two new signings who have been vital to the club's success. He paid Bristol City £475,000 for Wayne Allison and

secured the signature of **Steve Finney** from Manchester City on a free transfer.

Allison, who was top scorer with sixteen goals prior to the weekend, first made his mark as a goalscorer with Halifax in their League days. After finishing second highest scorer with twenty goals in 1989/90 he was transferred to Watford for £250,000.

He did not make much progress at Vicarage Road and moved on to Bristol City a year later. He became a consistent scorer at Ashton Gate, finishing top scorer on three occasions. Over the past two seasons Wayne registered 20 and 13 goals for City.




Mr McMahon had watched Finney in the reserves whilst he was a player at Maine Road. Steve had developed with Preston, making his League debut in 1991. He played only six League matches before being snapped up by Manchester City. He did not get into City's senior side but marked his first game for Swindon by scoring their winning goal at Hull on the opening day of this season. Steve had scored fifteen times.

Peter Thorne, who scored nine times in twenty League outings following his arrival from Blackburn last season, has recently been recalled to the attack. He previously played on loan with Wigan.

When Mr McMahon dropped out through injury, Ty Gooden came into one of the central midfield positions. Wayne O'Sullivan and Paul Allen have filled the other. Mr McMahon started his career with Everton, then served Aston Villa, Liverpool and Manchester City before joining Swindon last season. After gaining England Under 21 honours, he played for the full England side on seventeen occasions. Gooden was playing with Wycombe Wanderers in their non league days. He joined Swindon in January 1994. O'Sullivan is a former trainee who grabbed his chance well when given his League debut on the opening day of last season.

Allen, who joined the club from Southampton in October, made his name with West Ham. He won a record number of 23 England

youth caps and later played for the Under 21s. He was a member of the Hammers' FA Cup winning team of 1980 then, after moving to Spurs in 1985, he helped them win the FA Cup in 1991. Southampton signed him in 1993 and he has since played for Stoke and Luton on loan.

Mark Robinson and Kevin Horlock have been playing on the flanks. When the Robins signed Robinson from Newcastle in the Summer of 1994, the £600,000 fee was a club record. Mark began as an apprentice with West Bromwich Albion. First team opportunities were rare at the Hawthorns so he moved on to Barnsley in 1988. His performance for the Tykes attracted a £450,000 bid from Newcastle in March 1993 but, though he made 25 League appearances for the Magpies, he found himself squeezed out by the big names at St James' Park. Horlock, a junior player with West Ham, joined Swindon in 1992 and won his place in the Northern Ireland team last season.

Martin Ling and Lee Collins have also played in midfield. Ling originally joined Swindon from Exeter in 1986 but soon moved on to Southend. He served Mansfield on loan before returning to Swindon in 1991. Collins joined the Robins from Albion Rovers last month.

Centreback Mark Seagraves, signed from Bolton for £100,000 last Summer, has slotted in alongside Shaun Taylor at the heart of Swindon's defence. Seagraves grew up with Liverpool without getting into their League eleven. He made his League debut during a loan spell at Norwich and was fully transferred to Manchester City for £100,000 in 1987. Mark played some 50 senior games for City, then moved on to Bolton in 1990. He completed more than 150 senior games for the Wanderers. Taylor kicked off his League career with Exeter in 1986, holding a first team place for more than four years before linking with Swindon in the Summer of 1991.

Rightback Ian Culverhouse made a couple of League appearances for Tottenham but really started to make headway after his transfer to Norwich in 1985. Ian

made almost 300 League appearances for the Canaries before joining Swindon, initially on loan, in December 1994.

Jason Drysdale and Paul Bodin have been in competition for the leftback spot. Drysdale had the misfortune to suffer an injury in his first game for Swindon, following his £340,000 transfer from Newcastle last March, and did not play again until the opening day of the current campaign. Jason was a graduate of the FA School of Excellence, spending his early days with Watford. He was transferred to Newcastle in the Summer of 1994.

Paul Bodin remained in the reserves with his first two clubs - Chelsea and Newport - and eventually got his League chance with Cardiff in 1982. He later went non league with Bath City before returning to the League with Newport. Swindon signed him in 1988 but he moved on to Crystal Palace two years later. Paul, who has played for Wales on 23 occasions, later went on loan to Newcastle before returning to Swindon in 1992.

Frank Talia and Fraser Digby have both enjoyed runs in goal. Talia signed from Blackburn earlier this season, joined the Lancashire club from Australian side Sunshine George Cross and later played on loan with Hartlepool. Digby was signed from Manchester United in 1986 and later won five England Under 21 caps.

The image on this page gives a view of the South Stand and specifically details where the Club will create a conference, exhibition and banqueting centre.



We continued our climb away from the First Division's relegation zone with a 2-1 win at Luton. It was our third successive victory. We went behind to a David Preece goal after only fifteen minutes, but John Aldridge equalised from the spot three minutes into the second half with Jeremy Charles hitting our winner some ten minutes later.

The Oxford team was: Judge, Trewick, Slatter, Phillips, Briggs, Shotton, Houghton,

Aldridge, Charles (Thomas), Hebberd, Rhoades-Brown

Swindon, who were running away at the top of the Fourth Division, equalled a club record by registering their eighth consecutive League victory. Goals from Charlie Henry, Dave Bamber and Colin Gordon gave the Robins a 3-1 home win over Burnley

An equaliser from Kevin Sheedy enabled First Division leaders Everton to draw 1-1 at home to Chelsea.

Liverpool established themselves in second place with a 2-1 win at Southampton, where John Wark and Ian Rush were their marksmen.

Newcastle were trailing at home to Ipswich to a Kevin Wilson goal until eleven minutes from the end. Then Peter Beardsley, Billy Whitehurst and Paul Gascoigne all scored to give the Magpies a 3-1 win. Gary Stevens and Chris Waddle were the scorers

in Tottenham's 2-1 win at Birmingham.

Nigel Clough gave Forest the lead at home to Aston Villa with a 62nd minute penalty but Mark Walters equalised to carn Villa a point.

Goals from Colin Clarke and Peter Houseman gave us a 2-0 interval lead at home to Notts County. Though John Sims pulled back a goal for County shortly after the break, we held on for a 2-1 win which kept alive our hopes of pulling clear of relegation in Division Two.

Swindon ended a run of six games without a win with a 2-0 success at Halifax, both goals coming from Dave Syrett.

Queens Park Rangers retained their two point advantage at the top of Division One by winning 2-0 at Everton with goals from Stan Bowles and Mick Leach.

The three clubs level on points immediately behind Queens

Park Rangers all won to keep up the pressure.

Phil Neal's penalty settled Liverpool's game at Birmingham. Stewart Houston, Stuart Pearson and Gerry Daly got the goals in Manchester United's 3-2 home win over Leeds.

Archie Gemmill, Bruce Rioch and Leighton James were the scorers in Derby's 3-1 home win over Norwich.

Ken Hale's 25th minute goal was enough to give us victory over Bristol Rovers in a Third Division game at the Manor where we lined up: Sherratt, Beavon, Quartermain, Atkinson R, Kyle, Jones, Morris, Hale, Fahy, Atkinson G, Harrington (Spelman)

Swindon went down 0-1 in a Third Division game at Bournemouth.

Manchester United's visit to Chelsea drew the biggest crowd (60,269) for any League match

this season. Three days earlier United had achieved a marvellous 5-1 victory over Benfica in Lisbon to win their European Cup Quarter Final by 8-5 on aggregate. But they lost 0-2 at Stamford Bridge, Bobby Tambling and George Graham scoring in the opening four minutes for Chelsea.

An own goal from Eddie Clayton enabled Liverpool to defeat Tottenham 1-0 at Anfield and remain on top of the First Division on goal average over Leeds and Burnley.

A rare two goal hit from Jack Charlton helped Leeds to their 3-2 home win over Leicester. Norman Hunter got their winner. Willie Morgan's goal produced Burnley's 1-0 home win over Newcastle. Graham Leggat and Steve Earle both netted twice in Fulham's 5-2 win away to Aston Villa in Division One, Les Barrett getting the Cottagers' other goal.

Good evening. Well, it has finally come around - the derby game against our fiercest and closest rivals from up the A420. The game you, the supporters, and us, the players, have been waiting for. In the first game at the County Ground we got a bit of a run around in the first half to trail 0-1. But we sat down at half time and realised we had not done ourselves justice. So we came out in the second half in determined mood, stopped them from playing their normal game and achieved what we thought was a deserved draw. That game and our recent good run has filled the side with confidence and, at the moment, we are battling for every point we can get which all successful sides need to do.

Lets hope above all that tonight's game will be a good advertisement for football in Division Two and that the players play with commitment and passion, but also respect for their opponents and that this goodwill reflects on to the supporters of both sides, and the headlines in the papers tomorrow morning will be about the game and not anything that may have happened off the field.

I normally say enjoy the game, but I would assume enjoyment would come tonight by the end result and, obviously, that for us would be a home win. It is sometimes difficult to enjoy games as they are actually taking place, the time for enjoyment is during reflection over what has happened over the ninety minutes.


between our clubs.




## Life Mounon

### SEASON 1984-85

Twelve months after lifting the Championship of the Third division, the U's went on to top the Second Division and earn a place in First Division football for the first time. And John Aldridge set a new club record with 34 goals in all competitions.

Manager, Jim Smith, had strengthened our Third Division promotion winning team with the Summer signings of the experienced Northern Ireland International striker Billy Hamilton, from Burnley, and Republic of Ireland fullback David Langan, from Birmingham.

The new attacking duo of Aldridge and Hamilton was to play a key part in our second successive promotion. We won six of our opening seven League matches and, by the end of September, we were second in the table - two points behind Birmingham but with a game in hand.

The goals were flowing freely and, following our 5-1 home win over Sheffield United, we had scored eighteen in six League games at the Manor.

By now we had taken over from Birmingham at the top of the table and our first serious test came when we visited the Blues in our next game. We came away from St Andrews with a creditable goalless draw.

Aldridge netted his first hat trick as we defeated close challengers Leeds by 5-2 at the Manor towards the end of November but, though we had been beaten only once in fifteen games we led the table by only one point from Blackburn with Portsmouth, Barnsley, Birmingham and Leeds all in hot pursuit.

Though we were to lose our next two away games at Notts County and Portsmouth, home form continued to excite. Following that 5-2 success over Leeds, we defeated Charlton 5-0, Cardiff 4-0 and Crystal Palace 5-0 in our next

three games at the Manor.

By the turn of the year we had dropped only one point in eleven games at the Manor and, with 38 goals, we were the highest scoring home team in the country.

We were then to suffer a major blow when Hamilton picked up an injury that was to limit him to only a few matches during the second part of the season, for a while the goals supply dried up, with Aldridge missing his support, and a run of five games without a win saw us forced out of the top three places.

In a bid to revitalise his attack, Jim Smith signed Welsh International Jeremy Charles from Queens Park Rangers.

A flourish of three wins in four games saw us back in contention and, with confidence restored, we went into the closing phase of the campaign in exhilarating style.

Another hat-trick from Aldridge gave us a 5-2 home win over Oldham, leaving us needing two points from our five remaining games to be absolutely sure of promotion.

Our biggest League crowd (12,433) of the season so far turned up in anticipation of our achieving that objective in our next game at home to Shrewsbury.

A goal from David Langan ensured that First Division football would be coming to the Manor for the first time.




Business as usual for John Aldridge, in the important win over City

Now the objective was to go up as Champions. But a late attack of nerves almost cost us dearly. We lost 0-1 at Leeds, then draw 1-1 at home to Notts County and 3-3 at Charlton.

So it was all down to our final match. The crowd rose to 13,196 for the visit of Barnsley and the U's were in no mood to play around. Aldridge opened the scoring in the fifth minute and by half time we were four goals to the good!

The score remained 4-0 and so we took top place with two points to spare over Birmingham.



# Recollections with Nathan Cooper

#### This week Nathan Cooper catches up with Malcolm Crosby.

In his vast football experience, Crossa has been involved in several of the biggest derbies - the North East, Newcastle against Sunderland; the Rokerites and the Toon Army.

However, no matter where it is on the footballing map, a

derby is a derby, as Malcolm quickly pointed out: "The only difference between them really is the attendance. Obviously, the North East attracts a larger crowd, and

consequently more noise than an Oxford/Swindon match but the passion is exactly the same."

"When it comes to football, Oxford hate Swindon and vice versa. The supporters want their team to do well and if you do win it gives the whole area a great lift. It is the same in any game with two local sides, as I said the only difference is the size of the crowds. Having said that, our fans were fantastic at the County Ground and made a super atmosphere and plenty of noise.

One of the most important derbies that Malcolm has been involved with was the Newcastle/Sunderland play off semi final.

"Denis was in charge at Sunderland then and I was his assistant. We had two games and the first one at Roker Park

was a goal-less draw. In fact, we missed a last minute penalty which would have given us a goal advantage for the second

leg."
"However, we went to St James' Park and won 2-0. I think Jim Smith was the Magpies manager then and everyone fancied them to beat us, but we played really, really well. That was a big, big win for Sunderland which took them into the play off final.

Managers will always say that preparations for a derby are no different to those made for any other fixture, but is that

really the case?

"My idea of derbies is the same as Denis'. Don't talk about them, don't get too excited about them, because it is easy to lose your way and lose sight of what you are trying to achieve, which is obviously three points."

"You approach every game with that attitude though, and at the end of the day you only get three points for beating your rivals. You do not get seven or four or ten, you get the usual three and the main thing is to focus on the game, no matter who the opponents are.'

"Obviously, the atmosphere is different, and that in itself helps the team. If every game was like it, it would be like playing a cup final every week."

Crosby, of course, led Sunderland to an FA Cup Final, and was delighted for the fans at the time.





#### TRIVIA TEASER:

Malcolm mentioned both North East derbies and Cup finals so, true or false, Sunderland beat Newcastle 1-0 in the 1973 FA Cup Final?

"We beat three Premier League sides on the way and it was a great run, and when you are a manager or coach you always feel for your supporters when you are not doing well. It's great then when you have a run, like our Cup run, and you see the joy it brings to people, people in shops, in the street, in factories, whatever, the whole town is buzzing. It makes life so much better for so many people and that is great to see."

So what about that Cup Final against Liverpool, it was

surely a dream come true for Crossa.

"People say it was a dream, and looking back they are right. It was a hell of an achievement for a team who were down the bottom of the First Division at Christmas. To go on that run showed a lot of guts and the more games we won, the more the lads believed in themselves."

"We had a tough time getting there, played matches quite close together and we could have done with some more rest before the Final. But we believed we could beat Liverpool, and we had the chances in the first half to have got something. Once they scored the first goal though, that was it and we found it very difficult to get back in the game.'

The pressure of football management is no doubt intense, but was it harder in the North East, especially with the

expectations of supporters and the hungry press?

You put pressure on yourself, I am as desperate to do well with Oxford United as I was with Sunderland and so the majority of pressure is self inflicted. Yes, there are more press up there and if you miss a day in the office then they immediately think that something is wrong, or you're out signing someone, but that is simply part of their job.'

"I wanted to be successful Sunderland, maybe I did not get long enough to prove myself. It was also a big job to go into as a first timer if you like, but I had the oppor-Maybe it tunity. came too soon, but

for the first few months we did well getting to Wembley."

When he left Roker Park, Crossa was given a somewhat unexpected lifeline in the game by none other than -

Newcastle!


'Kevin Keegan and Terry McDermott offered me the chance to go and train with them and do a bit of coaching with them. They were very helpful and they were a big help to me. Despite the fact I had been a Sunderland manager, they showed a lot of sympathy for me and that does not often happen between two local sides."

Needless to say there will be little sympathy shown by

either side tonight come 7.45!

"I have respect for Town, they are a good side and have done well. Having said that, they were a Premiership side two seasons ago and so should still have a pretty good side, but make no doubt about it, we want to win this game, just as we want to win any other. If we do, no one will be more happy for our fans than Denis, the players and myself."

When the first change of date was announced for the Manor game I would have been away but god bless the fixture congestion because a further change meant I was at home.

I do not really understand why the Swindon game is so much more important than other local derbies but it is. After all, Wycombe is certainly nearer and there have been some tremendous battles with Reading, and especially when Maurice Evans was both a player and then a manager for the Berkshire club. For some reason the games with Swindon are different. Certainly, while growing up in Cumnor there were plenty of people from the village and surrounding areas and especially Witney who went to Swindon to watch League football as United were climbing their way through the Southern League. We certainly resented

the big brother League side and so when the chance finally came to play them on an equal footing it was a very special occasion.

That was a long time ago but still the great rivalry exists. Perhaps the fact that United have a poor record against the Wiltshire side has a great deal to do with it. I have witnessed some really poor United performances, especially down at the County Ground, and have come home numb with disappointment. Perhaps the fact that Swindon won the League Cup before United's great triumph at Wembley still hurts although it was United who appeared in the Premier Division (then Division One) before their Wiltshire rivals.

Over the decade the fortune of both clubs has ebbed and flowed which meant often they missed playing each other in League games and that adds

even more spice to this evening's encounter.

the finals of the League Cup

The competition was inaugurated in 1960-61 and attracted all but Arsenal, Tottenham Hotspur,

Wednesday, Sheffield West Bromwich Albion and Wolverhampton Wanderers in its Second Division first season. Rotherham who had disposed of First Division Leicester and Bolton among others, lost the Final 3-2 on aggregate after extra time to Aston Villa. The following season, Rochdale disposed Southampton, of Doncaster, Charlton, York and Blackburn to meet Norwich in the Final. Norwich won the first leg at Rochdale 3-0 and triumphed by four clear goals. The 1962-63 Final featured deadly rivals Villa and Birmingham, the Blues winning 3-1 on aggregate. Leicester featured in the next two finals, beating Stoke in 1964 and losing to Chelsea in 1965.

West Brom won the last two-legged final in 1966

when they beat West Ham.

#### Two Third Division Winners

The first Wembley Final featured holders West Bromwich Albion and Third Division Queens Park Rangers, who triumphed by 3-2. A rare Terry Cooper goal gave Leeds their first Wembley success in the 1968 Final versus Arsenal. Swindon became the second and last Third Division winners when they beat Arsenal 3-1 thanks to goals from Roger Smart and Don Rogers (2). Manchester City won their fourth major trophy in three years when beating West Bromwich Albion in the 1970 Final and Third Division Villa lost to Tottenham in 1971 (a year in which all three major domestic trophies went to North London).

Denis Smith picked up a winners medal when Stoke beat Chelsea (including Houseman) in 1972. Norwich lost to Spurs in 1973 and, in an all Second Division clash, to Villa (including Graydon and McDonald) in 1975. These matches

sandwiched Wolves' victory over Manchester City in 1974. City returned two years later to beat The competition's Newcastle. first replayed Final occurred in 1977 when Villa needed three matches to overcome Everton through goals from current managers Little (2) and Nicholl. Forest appeared in three consecutive finals 1978-80, beating Liverpool then Southampton prior to losing to Wolves. Liverpool won four consecutive finals between 1981 and 1984, needing at least extra time to triumph over West Ham, Spurs, United Manchester Everton. Two clubs who were eventually relegated contested the 1985 Final, the game's only goal being an own goal for

Norwich against Sunderland whose Clive Walker missed a penalty.

Oxford's Record Margin

United won the 1986 Final by a record three goal margin for a Wembley League Cup Final. Clubs such as Newcastle, Everton and West Ham have not won this trophy and Oxford won it before Manchester United and Arsenal had done so. Arsenal, Luton and Forest were the next three winners, the first two of these, as holders, losing in the next year's finals, whilst Forest retained the trophy in 1990 (beating Oldham). Sheffield Wednesday, managed by Ron Atkinson, won the 1991 Final over Manchester United who finally got their name on the trophy in 1992. Arsenal, Aston Villa and Liverpool were the last three winners. Liverpool (5), Aston Villa (4) and Forest (4) have triumphed the most times. Arsenal and Manchester United have lost a record three finals whilst Villa equal Liverpool's record seven appearances next Sunday.
