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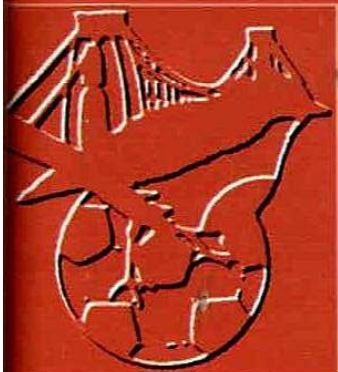
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he visit of Swindon Town is always a big occasion at Ashton Gate and this afternoon's game means a lot to both clubs.

Having said that, the goal everyone went home talking about was Brian Tinnion's. It showed confidence, vision and ability to control the ball and net from distance while under challenge.

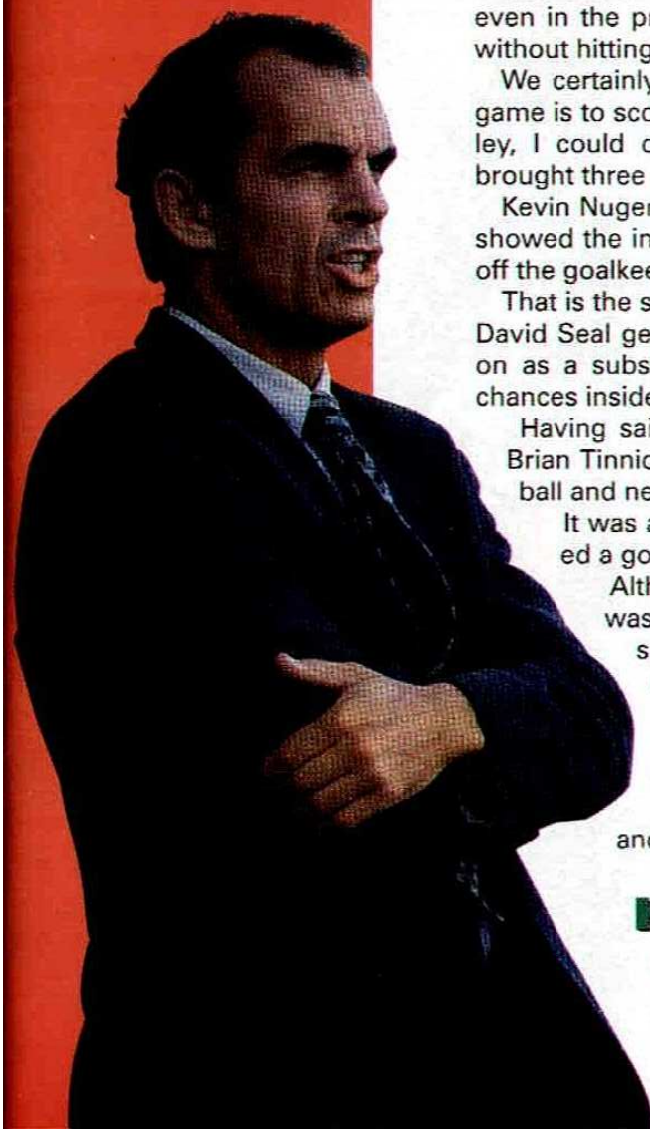
It was an open entertaining game against Wrexham and completed a good week for us following the goalless draw at Stockport.

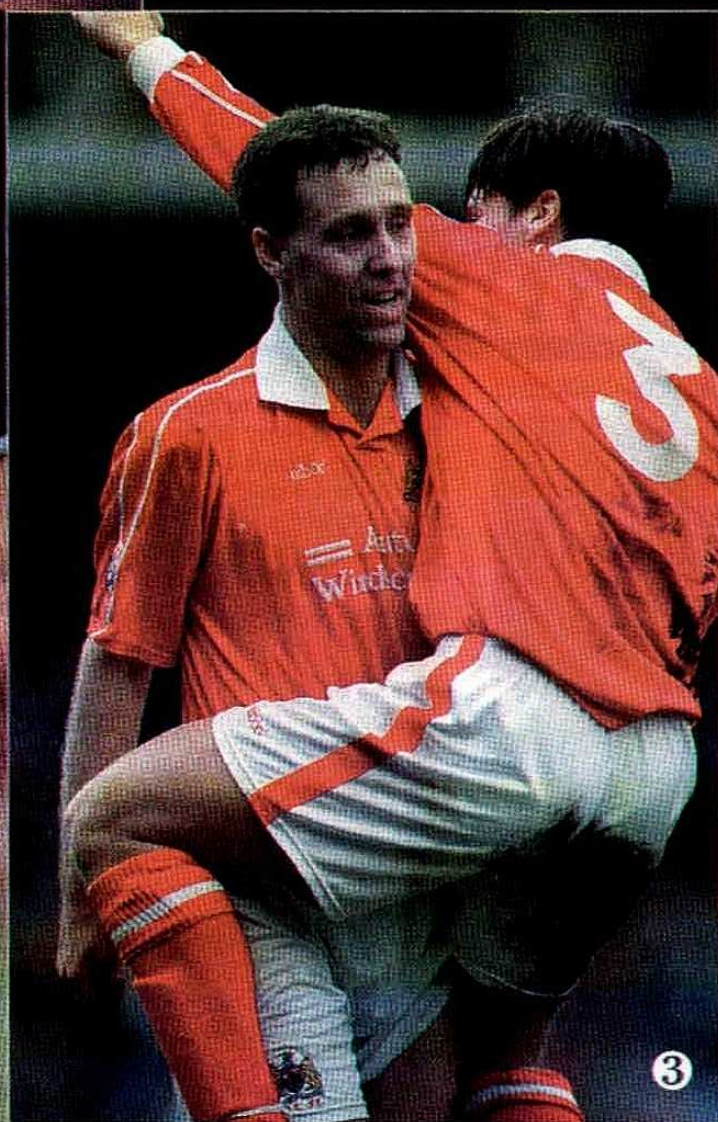




① Brian Tinnion and Wayne Phillips in aerial combat.

Swindon Town supporters must have the feeling that they are on a roller-coaster ride — given the way that recent seasons have gone at the County Ground. If, as looks likely, they gain promotion come May, it will be their fourth consecutive change of Division. Manager Steve McMahon is the sort who will be looking to make it five a row — with a place in the Premiership as the target.

The Robins hit a bit of a sticky patch a couple of weeks ago, picking up only two points from a possible nine — a 3-0 defeat away at Oxford followed on from two successive draws. However, the 2-0 win over Peterborough last Saturday will have settled any nerves — and set their season back on track.

Swindon, since the days when Lou Macari was in charge, have had a reputation for playing bright and attractive football. Steve McMahon has continued this progressive trend since assuming the reins in November 1994. The former Villa, Liverpool and Manchester City star has brought an air of discipline to the club — and has also taught his players the virtues of a patient approach.

The player-manager has been out with a hamstring injury for the last ten games, and Swindon have definitely missed his experience and skills. In order to fill the gap, McMahon has drafted in David Preece from Derby County — in a loan deal that will keep the 33 year-old midfielder at the County Ground until the end of the season at least.

The boss is convinced that Preece is the sort of player who can fill the central midfield role: "David will add some experience and he is a very good player. I see him doing a similar job to myself, sitting deep and getting us passing and moving. We have needed a little extra spark in recent games and I'm sure that David will provide it."

Preece was persuaded to join Swindon partly through admiration for the manager and partly through his admiration of the way the team play the game. "The manager persuaded me to come," said Preece, "because I had a huge amount of respect for him as a player. Also, I like the way they play football. I even like their training methods, because players are encouraged to work on their skills and to play good football."

Another on-loan signing to arrive at the County Ground in the last fortnight is 21 year-old Steve Cowe. He is a small, highly mobile striker who is likely to fit in extremely well with the pattern that Swindon adopt. Like Preece, he is another who is hoping that the deal will be made permanent in the summer. The manager's comment: "We are pleased to have signed him — he is one we have been looking at for a long time," will, surely, encourage the youngster to believe that this is possible.

Steve joined Villa at 15, on schoolboy forms and progressed through to the reserves — where he averaged a goal every two games. Although he made the first team squad on five occasions, he found further progress blocked — it is, of course, difficult to displace the likes of Dwight Yorke and Savo Milosevic. Although it appears that he has been brought in, primarily, as cover for the two main strikers, he will be hoping to see more first-team action than looked likely at Villa Park. His appearance as a substitute in the home win over Peterborough last Saturday seems to confirm that view.

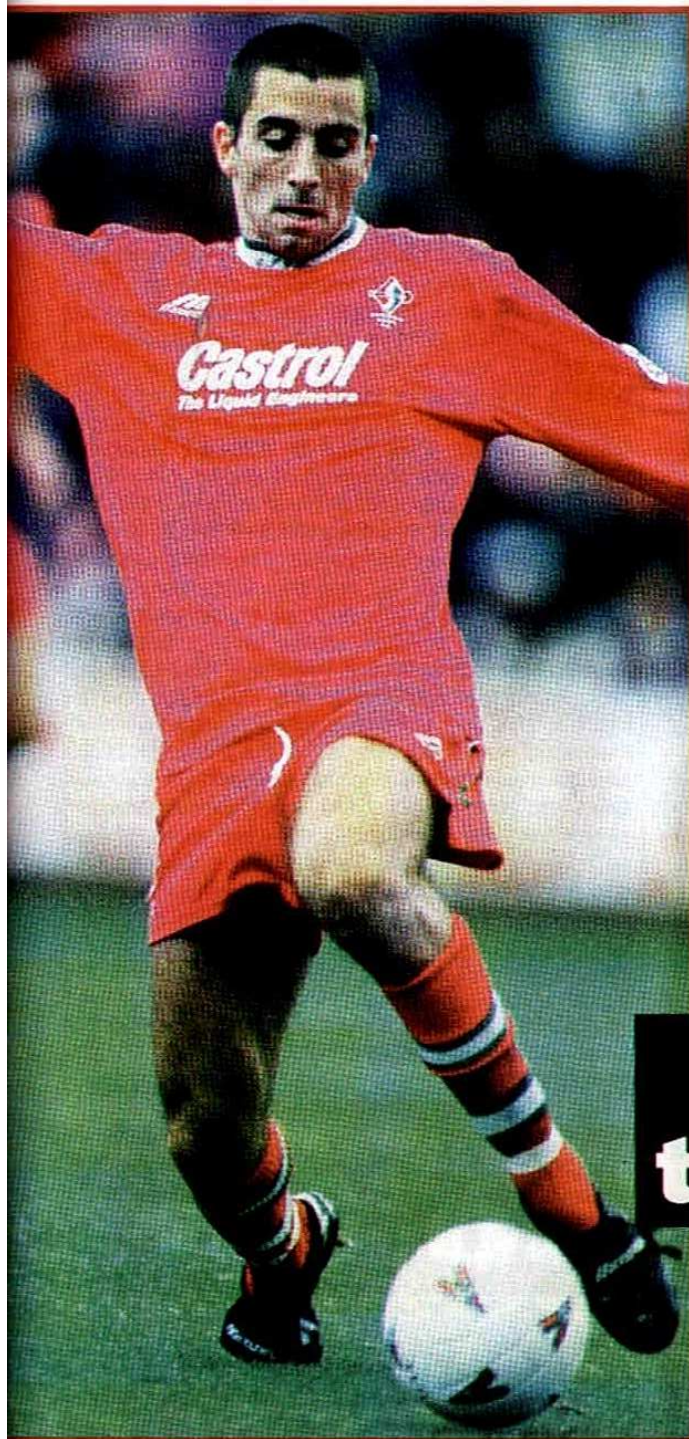
Former Bristol City star, Wayne Allison is the teams top-scorer with 17 goals so far and big Wayne has already established himself as the darling of the fans at the County Ground. His goal on Saturday moved him above Steve Finney in the goals-ranking — and with the injured Finney ruled out for the

33 year-old midfielder David Preece moved to Derby at the beginning of the season, having spent ten years at Luton Town. He was brought to the Baseball Ground on a month-to month basis but was granted a two year contract in early September. However, manager Jim Smith changed the team's formation and Preece found himself out of favour — hence the deal which brings him to Swindon until the end of the season.

On his debut against Peterborough last Saturday, Preece shone — and was voted man-of-the-match by the sponsors. He bears a physical resemblance,



remainder of the season, McMahon will expect the £425,000 summer signing to keep on finding the net.

Alongside Allison, Peter Thorne has been playing well lately, after having much of his early season disrupted through injury. The Manchester-born 22 year-old is returning to the sort of form that delighted the Swindon fans last year.

In defence Swindon have been far meaner than the side that were relegated last time. They have conceded only 26 goals — the second best defensive record in all four Divisions. Club captain, Shaun Taylor, can take a lot of the credit for that — he has had an outstanding season at the heart of the defence. Signed from Exeter City in July 1991, Shaun was ever-present over the last two seasons and is capable of scoring a goal or two. Also instrumental in the defensive turn-around is Ian Culverhouse, the former Norwich star. A cultured player who reads the game well, he plays just behind the central defenders; tidying up and setting off attacking moves.

Swindon have two games in hand over the leaders Blackpool, but they do, however, have some tough fixtures coming up. Over the Easter weekend they face fifth placed Notts County at home and then have to travel to third placed Crewe on Easter Monday. And if those games are not a daunting enough prospect, they also have to meet Blackpool away on 20th April.

Difficult tasks, no doubt — but, with the steely determination that McMahon has transmitted to his team on show, Swindon will face all their remaining fixtures full of confidence and self-belief.

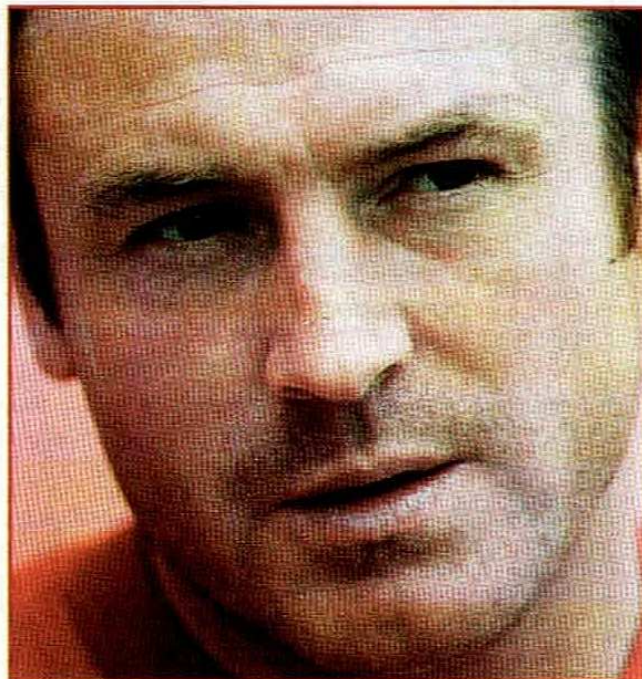

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he Moonrakers of Swindon were billed as the Champions of the West when, as our very first opponents, they came to St John's Lane on September 1st 1894, and such is their form this current campaign, it seems that they are once more deserving of such accolade. Swindon Town Football Club was formed in 1881 by the Reverend William Pitt in order to provide recreation for the young men of his parish, and they soon became the principal club in Wiltshire, winning the County trophy for the first six years from it's institution in 1886-87.

FOOTBALL LEAGUE

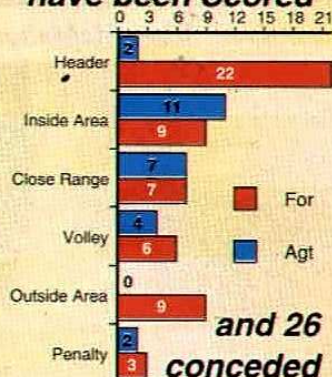
Numbered among the members of the First Division of the Southern League in 1919-20, Swindon gained admission to the Football League in 1920-21 when the Third Division was formed from the clubs in the rival organisation, such grouping being called the Third Division (South) in 1921-22 when the Northern Section came into being. The Robins did well in their early football career, settling down to be a regular top half of the table side until decline set in after finishing fourteenth in 1929-30. This led to a poor decade throughout the thirties, a period that saw them having to make a re-election application after finishing bottom in 1932-33. When League football was stopped after three games due to the start of World War Two in September 1939, Swindon's fortunes were still in decline with them being yet again at the bottom of affairs, but by the time normality returned for 1946-47 the Robins were good enough to claim fourth spot, just two points and one place behind ourselves. Such form didn't last however, and the 1955-56 campaign brought yet another bottom placing and a consequential re-election application. Fortunately the application was as successful as that previously, and that which followed in the very next season when they finished bottom-but-one. Finishing in the top half in 1957-58 Swindon avoided the cut off point for the formation of the Fourth Division and under the managership of Bert Head, an outstanding team that included the likes of Ernie Hunt, Don Rogers, Mike Summerbee and John Trollope, was developed. This side gained promotion to the Second Division in 1962-63 when they finished as runners-up to Northampton

Town, and as full members of the Football League for the first time they looked likely candidates for further promotion during the early part of the following season. Unfortunately 1964-65 brought about a return to Third Division status, the Robins finishing one off the bottom, and it was to take four years for such lost position to be regained.

How 56 Goals have been Scored



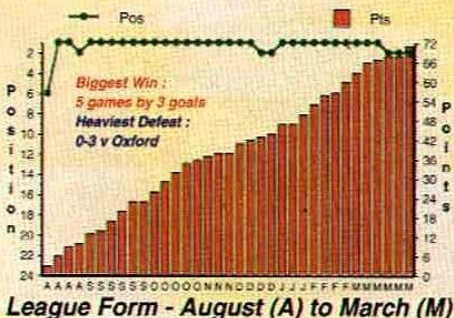
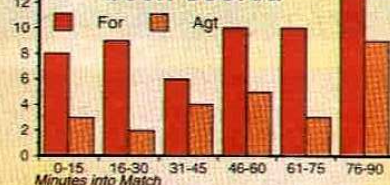
LEAGUE CUP WINNERS

The 1968-69 campaign was an outstanding one for the Town as not only did they secure a return to Division Two by finishing as runners-up to Watford (losing out on the Championship on goal average), but they also won the League Cup by beating First Division Arsenal 3-1 at Wembley Stadium. This time Swindon held onto Second

Division status for five seasons, relegation not rearing it's head until 1973-74 when they were bottom. A long spell in the lower divisions then ensued, this included demotion to the Fourth Division for the first time in 1981-82 when a defeat in their final game at Newport put them down. They escaped the basement in 1985-86 with a side that not only collected the Championship, but also created a new Football League points record with 102 and this team proved to be good enough the following campaign to regain Second Division status after a break of twelve years by winning the Play-Offs. 1990-91 brought further success in the Play Offs and a place in the top flight of English football for the first time, but to the dismay of the Swindon fans and all true football supporters everywhere the team was denied their hard won right to perform at this level in consequence of breaches of FA and Football League regulations. It was to be another two seasons before the Town achieved their goal, this by winning the play-offs in 1992-93. Unfortunately their team wasn't good enough to hold it's own with the elite and immediate relegation brought about similar decline last season, hence our meeting this afternoon.

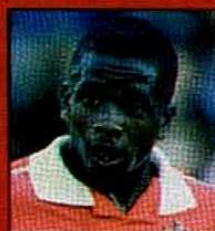

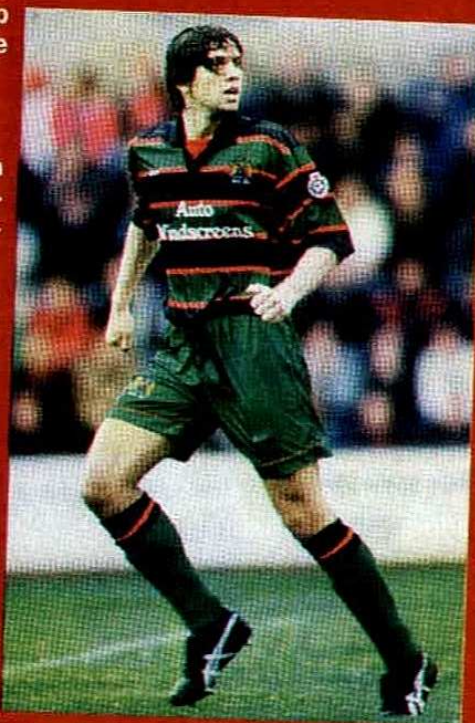

Howard Pritchard



Howard Pritchard was sorely missed by City following his transfer to Gillingham in the close season of 1986. An 'old

fashioned' type winger with the ability to run at defences and either get to the by-line and pull the ball back into the path of an incoming striker, or else take it into the penalty area and try a shot himself, Pritchard won a good number of penalties during his time with City as his forays into the box produced much fear in opposing defenders, though the validity of some of the awards were questionable.

He was born in Cardiff on the 18th October 1958 and joined City as an apprentice in August 1976. He made his League debut against Aston Villa two years later, although he had to wait only twelve months for his first senior outing, an Anglo-Scottish Cup match against Partick Thistle. Following City's relegation in 1981 he was transferred to Swindon Town, and in two seasons at the County Ground his career flourished, scoring eleven goals in 65 appearances (including six as substitute).

Returning to Ashton Gate in August 1983 Howard's form was so impressive that he won a full international Welsh cap when he came on as substitute against Norway in 1985, so adding to Youth International honours gained previously. He scored in his last game for City when he netted our second goal at Wembley Stadium in the Freight Rover Final victory over Bolton Wanderers on May 24th 1986, and Gillingham paid £22,500 for his transfer a few months later. At Priestfield Stadium Howard was ever present in 1986-87 and only missed a few games in 1987-88 before Walsall paid £20,000 for his services in July 1988. He made 41 League appearances for the Fellows

Park club, scoring six times, before moving to League newcomers Maidstone United the following summer where Howard brought his



League career to its conclusion, his 33 League appearances and six goals for the Kent club serving to give him a career record in the competition of 388 games and 68 goals. He then played for non-league Yeovil Town, Yate Town and finally Nailsea Town to bring the curtain down on a fine career.

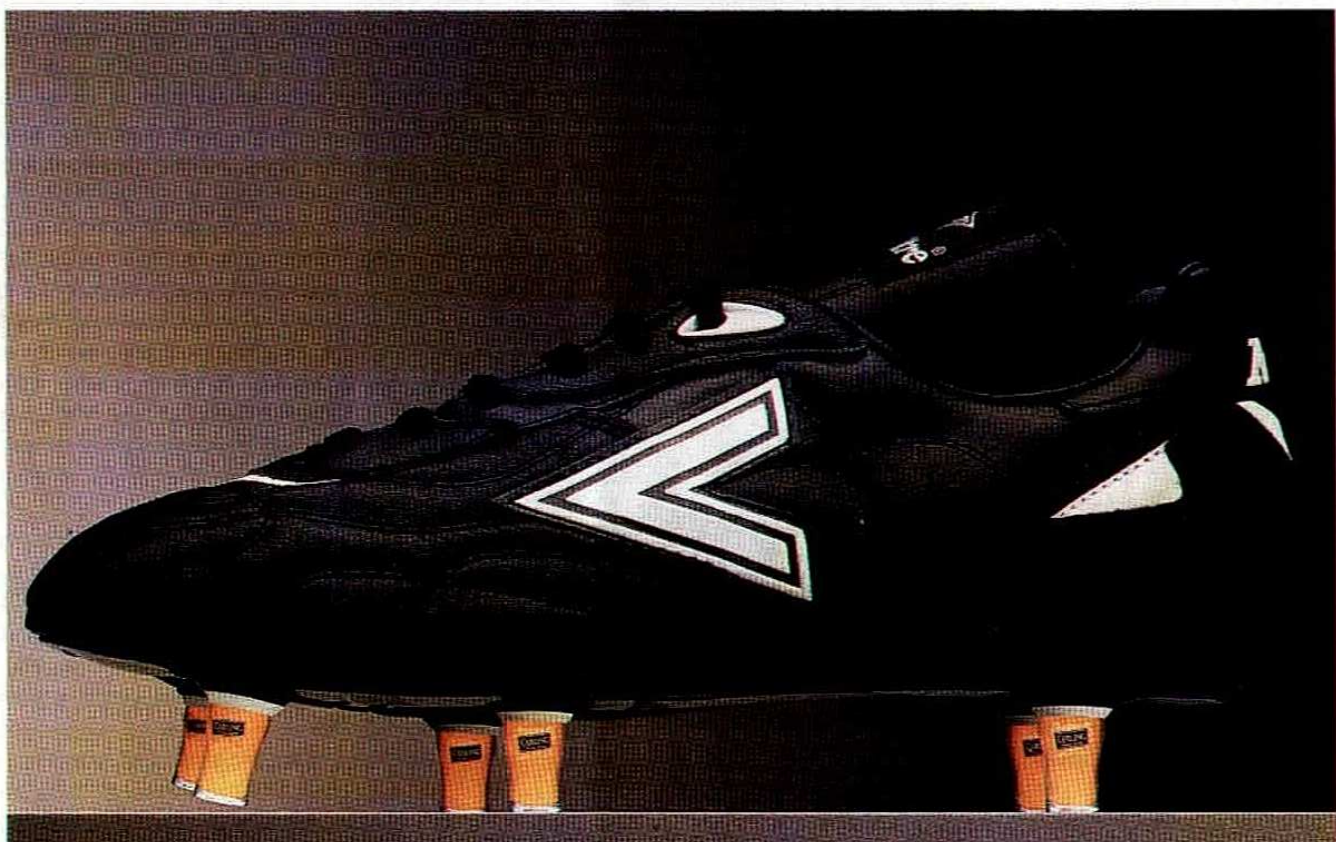

Realising Our Potential

A message from new City Chairman Scott Davidson



As a lifelong City supporter, I count it an honour and a privilege to have been appointed chairman of our football club.

When John Laycock, myself and others finally sealed the purchase of the available shares, we were fully aware of the big job that lies ahead in trying to revive the fortunes of Bristol City.

We are making only one promise — that we shall work as hard as is humanly possible to ensure that the job is carried out successfully.

Notification of the delayed AGM, together with an extraordinary general meeting to be held at the end of April or beginning of May, will shortly be sent out to all shareholders.

In the meantime I would like to take this opportunity to broadly outline some of our plans for revitalising Bristol City — plans which can only be achieved with the full backing of our supporters.

Although John will not be serving on the board, ours is a partnership. We have put an equal amount of money in to buy the necessary shares and we shall continue to work closely together for the good of the club.

One of our aims is to forge closer links with the fans. I intend to publish a regular news-letter keeping supporters informed of what is happening at Ashton Gate and will be looking for feedback so we are in touch with the fans viewpoint.

We want to raise Bristol City's profile by improving public relations at the club. There is already something to shout about because we have an improving young team and the financial problems which have been so crippling are about to be addressed.

Our commercial operation has to be developed, but I am delighted to say that we are on the point of announcing two major sponsorship deals which I was able to negotiate during my term as commercial director.

Another important aim is to look at finding ways of offering special admission

prices and arrangements for families and, in particular, children under 12. These are the fans of tomorrow and we want to attract as many as possible.

Details of the new share issue, which, it is hoped, will raise more than £1m for the club, will be proposed at the EGM. This will be of crucial importance in order to clear the substantial debt, repay the loans and help fund the club's future. These liabilities in addition to the recent purchase of shares means much of our original capital is already accounted for.

We already have pledges of substantial financial backing from current director John Clapp, Bristol stockbroker Stephen Lansdown of Hargreaves Lansdown, and Keith Dawe of Sanderson Computer Recruitment, whose support is greatly appreciated.

Supporters will be able to subscribe and I hope that as many of you as possible will see enough signs of progress on and off the field in the coming weeks to feel your club is worthy of investment.

The extent of the response to the share issue will determine what surplus cash can be made available for investment in the team.

While there is much to do on the commercial and administrative sides, we are aware that only by producing results on the field can Bristol City hope to prosper.

To that end we shall be continuing the investment in a youth policy which is starting to pay such rich dividends and giving our manager all possible backing in his efforts to recruit new players.

I have heard enough about Bristol City's 'potential'. I believe that success is not something you deserve but something you earn. The hard work starts here.

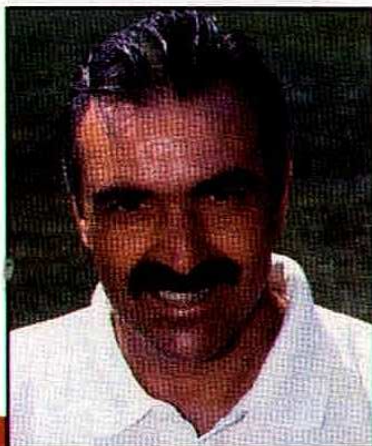
Climbing out of the Second Division has to be the priority and both John and I believe we are not far away from having a team capable of achieving that aim.

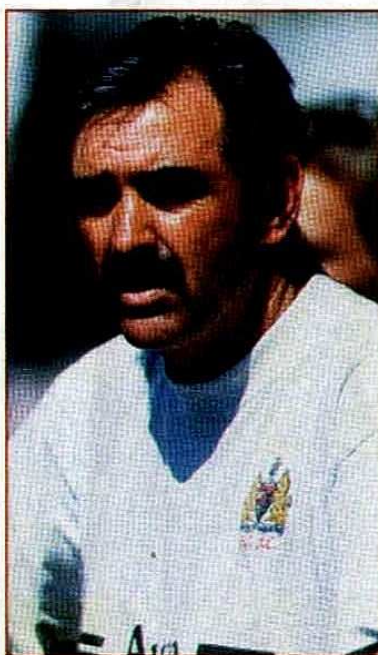

● I read an amazing story in *Goal* magazine about life under Alan Dicks when he was in charge here. Dicks set up a 'School for Captains' in order to 'counteract shyness, improve expression and develop the personality of players'. This was particularly important for dealing with the media.

We hope the solution is found quickly.

● Some clever clogs has pointed out that the linguistic phenomenon of a palindrome – a word like 'level' that reads same from front to back, and vice versa – could apply to a phrase involving the name Tony Yeboah and an angry Leeds manager Howard Wilkinson. If Sgt Wilko was ever to let rip at the African super striker for a below par performance, he could say, in true Self Righteous Brothers style, HA!, OBEY YEBOAH! Don't see the gag myself!

● As if our own Junior

Surprisingly enough, the fans there supported the action, and their organisation; the Italian Federation of Supporters are threatening to boycott matches because of what they see as mismanagement by football authorities there. They want a say in the Italian football authorities decisions, especially on the televising of games and on the whole question of 'pay per view'. Two key demands were: reduced ticket prices for televised matches, and rescheduled games cancelled from last Sunday 'not to fall on a working day'. Sounds pretty reasonable to me.

Mind you I'd be tempted to add a plea for Italian (and other) TV directors not to run 'action replays', in all their variations, while the play is actually in progress. How many pieces of crucial 'live' action have been missed because they've put in a pointless 'flashback'?

● Anybody got any idea what all the hand waving and arm movements that managers make during matches actually means? Ron Atkinson in particular seems to use his own form of semaphore. Does it make any difference to what's going on? Is there a book published that can help the bemused fan (and maybe even players)?

● **ultra!** ahead of the pack again! Our coverage of various subjects this season has now been featured in several different publications! In *The Face* this month, Chris Dolby of Bradford City and the issue of "Asians who can't play football" was featured; Terry Venables is taking England to China pre 'Euro 96', mainly because of the massive interest in the game there; the veteran football writer Ken Jones commented in *The Independent* about managers who create teams diametrically opposed to their own playing styles; and the 'cosmopolitan' nature of English football has been examined in all the national paper's sports pages and footie magazines.

The Easter period is always a busy time for football and this year is no exception. 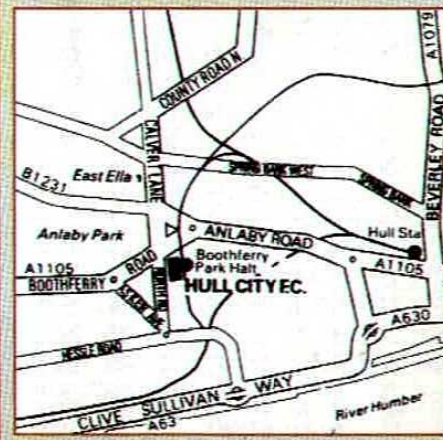

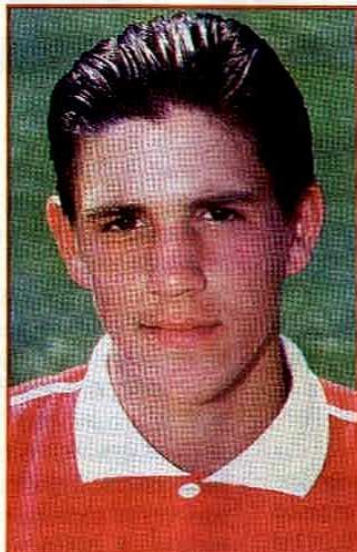

Football Historian Leigh Edwards continues his comprehensive catalogue of 50 City post-war years with 'S' & 'T' for Stone, Sweeney and Taylor.

FRED STONE

Full-back Fred Stone provided reliable cover for Ivor Guy and Jack Bailey in Bristol City's defence during the early post-war era. Born locally, he developed with Oldland Common and Warmley before Bob Hewison signed him in February 1947. Given his League debut in the 2-2 draw at home to Swindon Town in April 1948, he featured in the 1952/53 promotion challenge and netted three goals in 64 third division (south) outings prior to joining Chippenham Town in July 1953. Together with other one-time City players like Ron Tovey and Jimmy Terris, he helped them to finish as Western League runners-up in 1954/55, then continued in the Western League with Salisbury and settled in Kingswood.

KENNY STROUD

Experienced midfielder Kenny Stroud made a significant contribution to Bristol City's 1983/84 promotion success. He signed professional from apprentice for Swindon Town in March 1971 and made over 300 League appearances for today's visitors, an influential figure as they reached the League Cup semi-finals in 1979/80. Released following relegation to join Newport County in August 1982, he starred in the 1982/83 promotion near-miss and Terry Cooper signed him on another free transfer in October 1983. He netted four goals in 69 League outings before retiring in June 1985 and has since run Kingsbridge House hotel in Swindon,

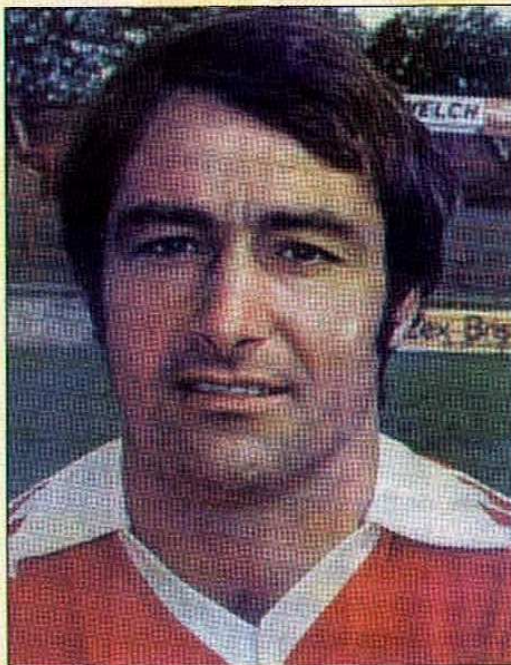
briefly reviving his playing career in the Southern League with Bath City and Newport AFC.

CON SULLIVAN

Young goalkeeper Con Sullivan was ever-present for Bristol City in 1951/52. Born locally, he played for Trowbridge Town and Horfield Old Boys before Bob Wright signed him in May 1949. Given his League debut at home to Bournemouth in December 1950, he contested the goalkeeping slot with Syd Morgan and Tony Cook whilst at Ashton Gate and made 73 third division (south) appearances prior to joining Arsenal in February 1954. He gained top-flight experience as Jack Kelsey's understudy before a dislocated shoulder ended his League career in 1960. Still living in Knowle West, he spent 20 years as a warehouseman for Robertson's in Brislington until the site closed in 1981, then worked for Courages in a similar capacity until retiring in June 1992.

GERRY SWEENEY

Versatile Scottish right-back Gerry Sweeney was an influential figure in Bristol City's 1975/76 promotion campaign. Initially with Celtic, he represented the Scottish League during five years at Morton before Alan Dicks paid £22,000 for him in August 1971 and displaced Trevor Jacobs in defence. Also helping City to reach the FA Cup sixth round in 1973/74 and win the Anglo-Scottish Cup in 1977/78, he was four times ever-present and netted 22 goals in 406 League games before the 'Ashton Gate Eight' crisis forced his release in February 1982. Subsequently with Trowbridge Town, York City, Forest Green Rovers, Gloucester City, Paulton Rovers, Clevedon Town (player manager), Backwell United (player coach) and Walsall (assistant manager), he is now a postman based at Portishead and part-time coach at Ashton Gate.

TREVOR TAINTON

Long-serving ex-England Schoolboy midfielder Trevor Tainton was three times ever-

present for Bristol City, including the 1975/76 promotion success. Born locally, he signed professional from apprentice in September 1965 and Fred Ford gave him his League debut at home to Carlisle United two years later. He featured prominently as City reached the League Cup semi-finals in 1970/71, the FA Cup sixth round in 1973/74 and won the Anglo-Scottish Cup in 1977/78. Awarded a testimonial in October 1976, he netted 24 goals in 486 League games before the 'Ashton Gate Eight' crisis also forced his release in February 1982. Subsequently with Torquay United, Trowbridge Town, Odd Down, Imperial, Olveston (Player Coach) and Almondsbury Picksons (Player Coach), he has been a security officer at Oldbury Power Station since December 1985.

ALEX TAIT

Red-haired ex-England Youth centre-forward Alex Tait was a popular figure at Ashton Gate during the early 1960's. Signing as a part-time professional for Newcastle United in September 1952 while qualifying as a maths and PE teacher, he understudied Jackie Milburn and netted a memorable hat-trick at Sunderland on Boxing Day 1955. Fred Ford's first signing for City, he cost £5,000 in June 1960 and partnered the likes of John Atyeo, Bobby Williams and Brian Clark in attack. He scored 38 goals in 117 third division outings before joining Doncaster Rovers in June 1964, then Burton Albion a year later where he succeeded Peter Taylor as player-manager and plotted the 1965/66 promotion and Merit Cup success. Still living in Tutbury, he became deputy headmaster during 19 years at Allestree Woodlands Comprehensive until retiring in July 1991.

MICKY TANNER

Aggressive young midfielder Micky Tanner helped Bristol City to reach the Freight Rover Trophy final in 1986/87 and third division promotion play-offs in 1987/88. Born locally, he was a schoolboy with City but failed to secure an apprenticeship and impressed with Brian Drysdale's Shepton Mallet and Lawrence Weston Hallen before Terry Cooper signed him in July 1985. Given

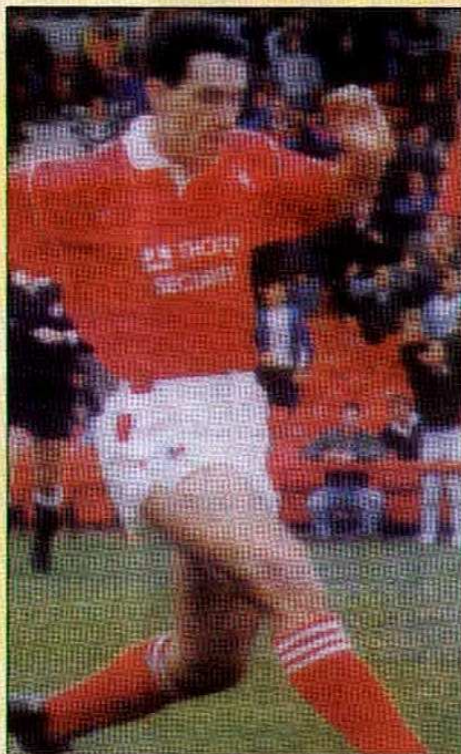
his League debut at Wigan Athletic seven months later, his only goal in 19 third division games clinched a 1-1 draw at York City in March 1987. He joined Bath City in July 1988 and has since played for Cheltenham Town, Weymouth (under Gerry Gow), Bath again, Bristol Manor Farm (twice), Mangotsfield United (twice), Clevedon Town and now Shirehampton. A qualified fitter, he works for Seeking Toyota at Portbury.

ARCHIE TAYLOR

Young winger Archie Taylor was one of several Doncaster Rovers players who followed manager Peter Doherty to Ashton Gate. An amateur with Doncaster, he joined Bristol City in May 1958 and scored on his Second Division debut at Charlton Athletic in September 1959. He understudied Jimmy Rogers and netted twice in 12 League games prior to joining Barnsley in July 1961, then had spells with Goole Town and Hull City. Moving to Halifax Town in July 1963, he was ever-present in 1964/65 and followed Willie Watson to Bradford City in December 1967, then joined York City in October 1968 and starred in the 1970/71 promotion campaign. Subsequently with Gainsborough Trinity, Frickley Athletic and Hatfield Main, he still lives in Doncaster and is now a sales agent for Revlon and Vidal Sassoon hair products.

BOB TAYLOR

Goal scoring favourite Bob Taylor was leading marksman and 'player of the year' in Bristol City's 1989/90 promotion campaign, when he topped the third division charts with 27 goals. He joined Leeds United from Horden Colliery in January 1986 and secured a regular first-team place in 1987/88 until displaced by Ian Baird. Joe Jordan signed him in a £225,000 exchange deal involving Carl Shutt in March 1989 and he netted 50 goals in 106 League outings before Ashton Gate fans were upset by his £30,000 sale to Bobby Gould's West Brom in January 1992, where he replaced Don Goodman in attack. Twice top scorer at The Hawthorns including 1992/93 when Albion won promotion via the Wembley play-offs, he is now rated in the £2,000,000 class.
