



ECTGUSOII ...

I am looking at the big picture tonight and taking into account all our commitments and the demands on our players.

In other words you will see a few different faces in our team as we welcome Swindon Town and Steve McMahon to Old Trafford for the third round of the Coca-Cola Cup.

I intend no disrespect to either Swindon or the competition itself but we are at the tail end of one heck of a spell...a round of World Cup qualifiers involving many of our senior players, playing Liverpool, always a demanding match, and then the long trip to Turkey to face Fenerbahce in the UEFA Champions League before our match at Newcastle United at the weekend.

By any standard that is a pretty testing run and it is why I have built up a squad this season which has quality and strength in some considerable depth. This is an occasion to use it and bring in a few fresh legs.

I feel I am also duty bound in fairness to the players who have sat on the bench and have been desperate to play at first-team level, but have had to be patient. I have explained to those who have been left out that with a bit of luck we will be involved in anything up to sixty games this season and that sooner or later they will be needed.

Intensity

This is one of those occasions and at this stage everything points this evening to players like Paul Scholes, Raimond van der Gouw, Simon Davies, Terry Cooke, Michael Appleton, Ben Thornley and the always supportive Brian McClair getting a taste of the top action.

People I speak to in Europe are always amazed at the intensity of the game in this country. Managers and coaches ask me how do we plan and motivate out teams when so much is asked of them.

We tend to take it all for granted, at least until one of our clubs come a cropper in European competition and wonder why. I assure you, in any comparison with Continental countries, we expect such a lot from our professional footballers. It's part of the bulldog breed of the British syndrome.

I doubt if I can change the system but at least I can devise a strategy better able to deal with it, and as I say, we have a pool of players at Old Trafford these days which I believe is capable of taking the strain.

Inspiration

We are now in a much better position to ride with a few injuries and also ring the changes to cope with the demands of a wave of big games.

So no insult to Swindon if this evening's team represents a few changes compared with the line-up at St James' Park on Sunday. I must be careful not to make too many changes of course, something I possibly did last season when we perhaps had too many young ones in the side and came unstuck against York City.

Whatever our team though I have every confidence they will perform to expectations and we will certainly not be underestimating Steve McMahon's side. Teams from a lower division always seem to draw inspiration when they come to play Manchester United.

I have seen them three times this season, partly because of going to watch my son, Darren, play against them for Wolves, and so I am well aware of their qualities.

They will test us I know. Steve was a fighter as a player and his team bring the same approach.

At the same time we are going well at the moment. We were all thrilled by our two-goal win in Turkey, a result which has us on course to qualify from the UEFA Champions League for the quarter-finals.

Questions have been asked about our record in Europe playing away, but on this occasion we supplied the right answer.

We will need to concentrate of course, especially after the shock of our defeat at Newcastle.

It was a chastening experience. Perhaps the recent matches caught up with us. The one thing certain, though, is that we will quickly recover.





Casino Swindon

This evening's visitors, Swindon Town, have announced a new partnership with Grosvenor Casinos which will allow the gaming giants to develop a unique casino complex on the club's County Ground site.

It will establish the Robins as the first football club in Europe to have a casino in their stadium.

The deal, which is still subject to legislative change by central government, approval by local magistrates, landlord consent and planning permission, would bring an estimated 100 permanent new jobs in the Swindon area.

Development of this casino venture will commence as soon as all necessary approvals have been received which is likely to be in the first half of 1997. Grosvenor believe the County Ground is an ideal venue for this new initiative as the football club is already a major area for leisure and brings with it easy accessibility and plenty of parking areas.

Swindon Town director, Rikki Hunt, said: "The initiative is all part of the club's aim to be at the forefront of commercial thinking in football and the fact that we didn't hear about this but went out and got it demonstrates the level of ambition that exists.

"The Board want to put Swindon Town on a solid

financial footing and this deal goes some way to helping us achieve that goal," he added. "We want to be more self reliant and the cash injection we will receive will help us develop the club."

Pedal Power


It was a case of deja vu at Swindon Town's County Ground recently when Robins' midfield player Mark Walters was told to get on his bike!

Swindon Town's



It was on that day that they vanquished the mighty Arsenal to win the Football League Cup at Wembley and record the finest moment in their history.

It was a victory that grabbed all the national headlines and thrust the homely Wiltshire club into the sporting limelight.

The triumph was the finest moment in their history and the only time Swindon Town had lifted one of the game's top prizes. They have enjoyed a brief flirtation with top grade football since – one season, 1993–94, in the Premiership – but that afternoon in north London remains the pinnacle of their achievements. Swindon Town were founded in 1881, but it wasn't until 1920 that they gained election to the Football League. Their record shows that the vast majority of the time has been spent in the Second and Third Divisions.

As a Southern League club they reached the FA Cup semi-final on two separate occasions, 1910 & 1912, but that was as near as they were going to get to major cup success until the memorable day of 27 years ago.

They began their triumphant route to the final with a 2-1 first round win over Torquay United at the County Ground. Roger Smart and Peter Noble scored the goals. Then it was off to Valley Parade for their second round match against Bradford City. Smart was again on target, but Swindon had to settle for a 1-1 draw.

Back at the County Ground they managed to overcome the Yorkshire club, but only following a remarkable fightback after Bradford had taken a 2-0 lead inside the opening eighteen minutes. The Robins eventually won the game 4-3 with John Smith, Don Rogers, Peter Noble and Sherell (own-goal) scoring the goals.

A Don Rogers goal gave them a 1-0 home win over Blackburn Rovers and a passage through to the last sixteen where they were drawn to meet First Division Coventry City at Highfield Road.

Many fans could be excused for thinking that the Robins' gallant cup run was about to be terminated, but it was the Sky Blues who had to battle for the survival. Goals from Rogers and Smart put Swindon in a commanding position but a late rally by Coventry saw the game end 2-2. A reply was required and the spotlight shifted to the County Ground

This time there was to be no let off for the First Division side as Swindon swept to an impressive 3-0 win with goals from Rogers, Smart and Willie Penman.

The twin towers of Wembley began to loom large for the Wiltshire club as they entered the quarter-final

and a tricky tie against Derby County at the Baseball Ground.

On the face of it the promised to be a harder hurdle to clear than Coventry, but the intimidating atmosphere of the Baseball Ground held no fears for Swindon and they proceeded to hold the Second Division promotion candidates to a goalless draw.

The Robins were becoming replay specialists by this time and sure enough they did the trick again by beating The Rams 1-0 at the County Ground. Not surprisingly, it was a goal from Don Rogers which booked their ticket for the semi-final.

Swindon had already played eight games in the competition which in normal circumstances would have been sufficient for a place in the final to be assured, but they weren't about to complete the job the easy way. In the last-four they were paired with First Division Burnley. Staged over two legs, with the first at


Turf Moor, it gave Swindon an excellent opportunity to reach their first ever major final. And their hopes were boosted even more after they won the first game 2-1 with goals from Stan Harland, the team captain, and Peter Noble, who would play for Burnley later in his career. Ralph Coates scored the Clarets' goal.

It was a great result and all that now remained between Swindon and a place in the final was the second leg on their own patch. A draw would be enough to see them through, but with six minutes of the second half completed events had taken a turn for the worse. Burnley scored twice, through Frank Casper (father of our own Chris Casper), and Steve Kindon, to take a 3-2 aggregate lead. It was an anxious time for the Robins, but help was at hand and within six minutes John Smith had scored to level the overall scores. The remainder of the game brought no further addition to the scoresheet and extra-time also passed goalless.

So a third game was required to decide the winner, but that didn't present Swindon with any problems they hadn't encountered before. After all they had already negotiated three replays to reach the semi-final.

The game which would decide their destiny was played on a neutral venue at The Hawthorns, home of West Bromwich Albion. The question was could they summon the reserves of physical and mental stamina to scale this one last obstacle to clinch their place

in the final?



Nobody could deny that Swindon had deserved their success. They had appeared in a remarkable eleven

matches to reach the final, but their greatest test lay ahead in the shape of the mighty Arsenal. And despite their courageous performances on the route to Wembley very few people outside Wiltshire gave them much chance of providing an upset.

That didn't bother Swindon Town or their legions of fans. Come what may they were going to enjoy themselves on their big day out in the Capital and that is just what they did!

Wembley's normally immaculate pitch was suffering after staging. The Horse of the Year Show' and several of Arsenal's players were still recovering from a bout of flu, but these were never offered as excuses for the Gunners' failure to beat their Third Division opponents.

Swindon took the lead in the in the 35th minute when Arsenal's towering defender Ian Ure (he later spent three seasons at Old

Trafford). made complete mess of a backpass to 'keeper Bob Wilson and Roger Smart nipped in to tap the ball into an unquarded net. Arsenal forced the pace for a most of time after Smart's goal and, but for heroics from Peter Downsborough in the Swindon goal, the Gunners may have put the game beyond recall. As it was, they didn't make breakthrough until

four minutes from the end

when Downsborough, of all people, made a rare mistake which allowed Bobby Gould, the Arsenal striker, to head the equaliser. So, for the third time in consecutive ties Swindon were faced with a session of extra time. It was a half-hour which was to belong to the Robins' flying winger, Don Rogers.

He scored twice, the second in the very last minute, to provide a fairy-tale ending to the greatest day Swindon Town have ever enjoyed.

And, as if that wasn't enough for one season, they went on to make it a double celebration by clinching promotion to the Second Division after finishing as runners-up to Watford.

Footnote: As a Third Division club, Swindon were ineligible to compete in the European Fairs Cup the following season. However, they did take part in the Anglo-Italian League Cup Winners' Tournament where they met AS Roma. The Italians won the first leg 2-1 in Rome, but were then overwhelmed 4-0 by Swindon at the County Ground.



Greatest Day





There's nothing the Old Trafford crowd likes more than an old fashioned, mud and guts tackle, especially when it is beautifully timed and wins the ball.

Manchester United fans have always had a warm appreciation for the whole-hearted player prepared to commit himself and play with a little bit of devil. It's why Nobby Stiles was such a popular player and why the Reds' faithful loved Denis Law.

It wasn't just because they were great players, it was because they played with a fire and a passion that made it obvious how much they cared.

And the tradition is still very much alive as Nicky Butt gives the present day midfield the kind of ball-winning bite needed to make the most of talents like Eric Cantona.

Roy Keane can put himself about a bit as well of course and together he and the 21year-old Butt make one of the best midfield partnerships in

the League, arguably as good as anything United have had over the years.


Manager Alex Ferguson clearly thinks so, which is why he was prepared to sell Paul Ince and give the Keane and Butt duo their head. They have not let him down and their combination at the heart of the team had much to do with last season's League and FA Cup 'double'.

Intelligence

This season has seen the partnership handicapped by injury to Keane, but the Gorton-born Butt is more than capable of standing on his own feet because in addition to his tackling he reads the game well and passes the ball with a crisp accuracy and intelligence that Cantona appreciates and clearly enjoys.

Butt may not have the eye-catching silky touches of David Beckham, the eye for goal like Paul Scholes, or the qualities of the Neville brothers, but it is worth remembering that Butt led the charge of the 'Fab Five' into the first team. He had a maturity which made him the leader playing comfortably in Premiership company.

He may still find it hard to come up with the kind of goal scored from the halfway line by Beckham on the opening day of the season, and there is no doubt the London boy is ahead as a pin-up for the girls, but Butt is a players' player appreciated by those around him for commitment and unselfish work.



It's true he has had the occasional headline away from the sports pages, notably figuring in a court case, and is an experience he desperately wants to put behind him.

"I have been involved in one bad incident and because I also come from a fairly rough area some people have got the impression I am a trouble-maker but it is simply not true. It takes a lot to wind me up. I'm not a bad lad and that spot of bother was not me. It's behind me now anyway and I just want to get on with my football," he explained.

There is no doubt that the emergence of Butt and the other youngsters from the highly charged FA Youth Cup winning

team of 1992 has given Ferguson a cracking base - inspired, solid and committed, as well as gifted. As Butt says: "I think it has helped to come through as one of a group. It shares the pressure. One month like the opening of the season it was David Beckham in the headlines for his goal and getting into the England team. Before that Gary and Phil Neville were in the limelight and at one point it was all 'Scholesy' and his goals. It also helps I think that the five of us are all good friends.


Proud

"The manager has put a lot of faith in us and I think we all want to repay that loyalty and do him proud. He treats us like a father really, almost like we were his own kids.

"He pulls us in when there is something he hears about that he doesn't like but the big thing is that he is there for us.

"Last season was unbelievable. The team was very confident and at times we were leaving the opposition for dead. This season has had its disappointments. Playing Juventus in Italy was a shaker but Roy Keane will be back soon and he is one of the best players in Europe."

Over the years, Manchester United have been well served by players from Gorton and Collyhurst....and Nicky Butt is adding splendidly to a proud tradition.



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Fifty-Years-Un

lain McCartney, Secretary of the United Review Collectors' Club, continues his look at the life and times of the match programme.

A season in which United contested a unique 'treble' of the League Championship, the FA Cup and the European Cup, but at the end of an exciting and eventful campaign it was only the Championship trophy that went on display at Old Trafford.

A total of twenty-seven 'Reviews' were produced, of which four were un-numbered European Cupties against Anderlecht, Borussia Dortmund, Bilbao (all played at Maine Road) and Old Trafford's first competitive European fixture against Real Madrid.

The FA Cup Final was reached, lost unluckily to Aston Villa, and the solitary home draw against Everton in the Fifth Round is covered by issue no.16.

Issue no.1 for the opening League fixture of the season against Birmingham City included for the first time a programme loken and token sheet, two items that in years to come would be for many the main reason for buying a programme. The token sheet was found on the inside back page, resulting in many collectors in later years finding copies of this issue a page short.

'Review' no.3 v. Portsmouth featured a model of the ground on the cover, which included the proposed floodlighting system due to be installed before the end of the season. The lack of such facilities was the reason why the first three European ties were played at Maine Road. Issue no. 19 v. Bolton Wanderers covered the first floodlit match at Old Trafford.

Another Old Trafford 'first' was marked by issue no.6 earlier in the season with the debut of a youngster by the name of Bobby Charlton against Charlton Athletic.

Issues 21 and 22, at Easter, were identical in content and the 4-0 and 2-0 victories over Sunderland and Burnley respectively saw the Championship trophy remain at Old Trafford.

Programmes covering the Cup Final and the FA Charity Shield helped add to the collectors' enjoyment, but one issue still frustrates the modern day collector and that is no.11 – a postponed issue from 22nd December against West Bromwich Albion.

The season which is forever etched in the minds of United supporters throughout the world. Once again the team competed on three fronts and it was only the events at Munich which prevented additions to the list of honours.

This dramatic season produced thirty-one 'Reviews', broken down as follows – twenty-one League, three FA Cup, one FA Charity Shield, four European Cup, one postponed (no.20 against Wolverhampton Wanderers) and a representative match between an FA XI and an Army XI on 30th October. It is worth pointing out that this particular programme is numbered 10, the same as the issue for the League match against Burnley.

Of the other issues, no.9 covered the FA Charity Shield against Aston Villa, and four issues were produced for the European Cup ties – Shamrock Rovers (no.6). Dukla (no.11), Red Star (no.17) and AC Milan (no.30). Three FA Cup programmes also feature in the collection – Ipswich Town (Third Round – no.19). Sheffield Wednesday (Fourth Round – no.21) and West Bromwich Albion (Fifth Round – no.23).


No.21 for the Sheffield Wednesday Cup tie is perhaps the most famous of all 'Reviews', with its blank spaces where the United team should have been, and is an issue kept by many who have no other programmes in their possession.

Programme contributors Alf Clarke and Tom Jackson lost their lives at Munich along with the lads they wrote about, and their places were taken by Keith Dewhurst and Eric Thornton, with David Meek contributing his first programme article in no.23. This issue also contained a tribute to Duncan Edwards, who had died some two weeks after the crash.

The programmes following the dramatic Cup tie with the Owls contain numerous references to the aftermath of the crash and together with the previous nineteen programmes produce a record of an unformetable season.

A couple of items of note. The Charity Shield and European issues along with the representative match did not have the supporter and player on the cover, just the match details. Secondly, a programme does exist for the postponed Wolves match, but copies are very rare and along with a copy from the match in Belgrade against Red Star would be outside the means of most collectors.



Old Twelcomes Under Transport

Last term Steve McMahon saw out his first season as player-manager with Swindon Town by guiding the club to the Division Two title and promotion.

Since then the Robins have continued to impress in their new elevated status in the First Division, on which form they arrive at Old Trafford tonight.

They defeated fellow League rivals Queens Park Rangers in the two-legged Second Round tie despite losing the first game 2-1 at home. This came on the back of an excellent First Round triumph against promotion favourites Wolverhampton Wanderers. So, with confidence and spirits at a high in the Swindon camp, they will endeavour to notch a so-called giant-killing this evening.

However, the elated tenor around the County Ground at present is in dramatic conflict to the pre-McMahon period. Indeed, the Robins' fans have been put through the ultimate of rollercoaster emotions in recent years as their club have endured highs and lows of an astonishingly swift nature.

Swindon brooded sullenly in the Fourth Division before they were awoken by the forceful impact of Scotsman

and former United favourite Lou Macari.

The tough talking Macari took the helm at the club in 1984 and it was almost a case of what could have been when he was sacked, only to be reinstated nine days later. Undeterred, he then led them to two promotion winning seasons. In 1985-86, the Robins went into the old Division Three with a record 102 points, and the following season Division Two status was gained through the play-offs when they overcame Gillingham. Osvaldo Ardiles then took over and continued Macari's success by leading the club to a Wembley play-off shoot-out against Sunderland to achieve Division One graduation.

Euphoria swept through the whole town over the defeat of the Rokerites as the realisation dawned that their team were with the big boys in the top flight. Sensationally, however, the bubble was burst with the punishment of automatic demotion of one league for financial irregularities.





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
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Whatever happened to...



Peter Fletcher experienced opposite ends of the emotional spectrum during an Old Trafford career in which delight with early progress was balanced by the double sadness of relegation and unlooked-for departure at the tender age of 20.

"I was at Wembley for the European Cup Final



It all began so promisingly for the tall, lean striker, a Mancunian who enlisted as a starry-eyed apprentice in August 1969 in the same intake as Sammy Mcllroy. 'Fletch the Stretch' had supported City as a boy but as he grew older his father took him to Maine Road and Old Trafford on alternate weeks.

Peter explains: "Dad told me to watch the best and learn, and gradually I picked up on

the excitement generated by Matt Busby's brilliant side. Denis Law became my hero and I became a United fan. I was at Wembley for the European Cup Final in 1968, which was absolutely inspirational, and I was thrilled to sign for such a great club."

There followed steady movement through the junior sides -

highlighted by a trophy for being top scorer in a youth tournament in Switzerland – before Peter was called up for first-team friendlies in 1972, towards the end of Frank O'Farrell's managerial reign. His

League introduction arrived when he rose from the bench to replace Trevor Anderson at Stoke City in April 1973 as the Reds, now guided by Tommy Docherty, struggled clear of demotion. Sadly, the following term brought more travail for a frankly poor side which lacked confidence or any semblance of much-needed continuity. It was into this nightmare scenario that Peter stepped for his only First Division starts, two desperately tense February encounters with Derby County and Wolverhampton Wanderers.

Three months later, United went down and Peter was in the stand to watch the infamous confrontation with City which underlined the Reds' fate. Soon after that traumatic afternoon, he was told he was surplus to requirements.

He recalls: "It was very upsetting. I had dreamed of joining United and thought, as a kid, that it would go on forever. I was so naive. Apart from anything else, I was losing my job. It seemed more like losing an arm. To that point I had done nothing since my schooldays but play for United. I still had a year on my contract to run but the manager told me I would never play in another senior game and I couldn't face that."

Happily, relief was at hand. Although Peter had made only seven League appearances, five of them as substitute, he had forged a reputation - mainly through his exploits partnering Brian Kidd in the reserves - as a footballing frontman and Second Division Hull City wanted him. Accordingly, in May 1974, the disappointed youngster moved to Boothferry Park, valued at some £36,000 in the deal that took Stuart Pearson to Old Trafford.

After two reasonably productive years on the Humber, Peter switched to Fourth Division Stockport County in 1976, a transfer which enabled the 22-year-old and his wife Margaret to return to their home area. Having re-established his roots he retained them even after joining Huddersfield Town in 1978, travelling over the Pennines every day with four teammates who were also based in Lancashire.

Peter looks back: "There was great camaraderie between us, a bond which helped us on the field." That much was evident as the former Red Devil enjoyed the most successful spell of his career, netting seventeen times in thirty starts as the Terriers lifted the Fourth Division title in 1980. His tally would have been better still but for a back injury which proved to be a chilling foretaste of trouble ahead. Although he recovered after a

lengthy lay-off to perform splendidly in 1981/82, he broke down again and was forced to retire at the season's end.


That offers from Malmo in Sweden, from Australia and from

Understandably he wasn't going to risk his long-term health and so, still only 28, Peter Fletcher bade a reluctant farewell to the game he loved. After eight months during which he regained the mobility to live a normal life outside football, he became a security supervisor with Stockport Metropolitan Borough Council and now manages a workforce engaged in the never-ending battle with crime.

A family man with three children - Lucie (19), Lindsey (17) and Peter junior (11, and the proud possessor of a United replica shirt) - Peter finds time to take in the local blues-rock music scene. Sadly, his back precludes any sport except snooker, for which he has won a few trophies. "I might not be able to get my chin on the cue," he smiles, "but I can take my time and I don't do too badly."



'Save The Bishops'

Bishop Auckland are without any doubt one of the most famous non-league clubs in this country.

They have a proud history which stretches back to the last century and, in their days as an amateur club, they were also one of the most successful with a string of appearances in the FA Amateur Cup final at Wembley and a total of ten victories which represented a record in the competition.

They remain to this day an illustrious name in English football history but their very existence has been in some jeopardy recently following an incident in a FA Cup match with Macclesfield Town last season.

The Bishops ran into financial trouble after settling out-of-court a legal battle with Town's George Shepherd, who was injured in the match.

The famous north east club appeared to be in dire-straits, but that only served to galvanise the local populace into action. The Northern Echo organised a 'Save The Bishops' campaign and the response from the community around Bishop Auckland was magnificent. All manner of fund-raising activities took place, sponsored walks, raffles, race nights, football matches,

Many organisations and individuals were approached to throw their weight behind the campaign and United responded rapidly to confirm that a team would be sent to play a friendly against Bishop at Kingsway.

Happily, the collective efforts of numerous people once again proved that, 'where's there's a will, there's a way', and in a remarkably short time the future of Bishop Auckland was assured. So it transpired that United's visit, whilst boosting the coffers even further, was billed as a celebration, rather than a survival match.

United, of course, had good reason to help the beleagued northeasterners, for it was they who came swiftly to our assistance in the dark days which followed the Munich air crash more than thirty-eight years ago.

They had no hesitation in offering the services of three players -Bob Hardisty, Warren Bradley and Derek Lewin - to bolster United's shattered playing staff. It was a marvellous gesture which has found its own special niche in our club's history, so it was highly appropriate that United were in a position to help the Bishops in their hour of need.

It's remarkable that a few short months ago they looked doomed and yet now there is a feeling of renewed confidence sweeping the little town in County Durham. That was the message that came over clearly on United's visit there two weeks ago.

The tiny Kingsway ground was packed to capacity with everyone enjoying a marvellous celebratory atmosphere. They roared with approval when Warren Bradley and Derek Lewin were introduced to them before the kick-off and there was rapturous applause for the teams when they took the field.

It was one of those nights when they would have cheered had they been told the entrance fee had been doubled. As for the match. Well, United scored through Ben Thornley inside the opening minute and from then on there was only going to be one winner. Even Bishop Auckland wanted United to

win the match, or so it appeared. Two of their players - Mickey

Driscoll and Mark Foster - helped the Reds along by putting through their own goal and substitute Philip Mulryne scored what was the goal of the night with an unstoppable shot from the edge of the area. Jonathon Milroy grabbed Bishops' only goal.

The people of Bishop Auckland are extremely proud of their football club and it's nice to know that the scare is now over and they can once again look forward with optimism.



Eight Goal Thriller

Three goals in the last eight minutes saved United 'A' from suffering their first defeat of the season. Wrexham looked all set to become the first team to claim full points from the Reds after they led 3-0 with twenty-three minutes of the game played.

However, a goal from David Brown ten minutes before half-time put United back in with an



Manchester Police have a very detailed evacuation procedure in place should the need arise. Regular supporters will no doubt. know that we frequently test our emergency tone. In the event that the tone should be sounded in a real

 Please remain in position and listen carefully to the announcement. Loud speakers are located not only in the stands but in all concourse areas, toilets and outside the stadium.

 Whole stands, part stands or the entire stadium may be evacuated.
 Depending on the nature of the incident this may take place onto the playing area and out of the stadium.

•Our PA system operates on a zone to zone basis. It may be, therefore, that certain zones are affected but not others. In such an event our main attention will be focused on the zone concerned.

 If you hear an announcement broadcest in an area other than your own you should ignore it and respond only to messages directed at your section. All spectators are asked to respond calmly but as quickly as possible.

 Part of our emergency evacuation policy is to make spectators aware of what is happening and to update this information as frequently as necessary.
