






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A fter a one season break we renew one of the oldest local derby fixtures in football which now stretches back just over 102 years to our days as founder members of the Southern League.

And there's plenty at stake in this afternoon's game, like there has been in most of our meetings since 1894, with the Royals boasting a four-game unbeaten run and Swindon Town looking for a fourth successive League victory.

Of course commiserations to the Robins on the ending of their Coca Cola Cup run at Old Trafford in midweek when, despite Peter Thorne's equaliser, they weren't able to take advantage of Manchester United's shadow squad and were edged out 2-1.

And it looked like that was going to be the winning scoreline for the Royals' youth team at Ashton Gate on the same night when they came from behind, with goals by Luke Dowling and Neville Roach, to lead Bristol City in round two of the Southern Junior Floodlit Cup. But an injury time penalty spot equaliser means a replay back here at Elm Park.

ELM PARK BAN

One of our supporters who ran onto the pitch during the Crystal Palace game last month has received an official caution from Thames Valley Police and is now banned from Elm Park for the rest of the season.

The incident happened when the referee awarded a penalty to the visitors but Reading Football Club wishes to stress that it will never condone or tolerate such conduct in any circumstances.

The potential consequences of such behaviour are extremely serious for the club and we will not hesitate to use the full force of the law if there is any repeat. We have all worked hard to build Elm Park's excellent reputation and anyone who attempts to harm that will be severely dealt with.

HOW TO GET THERE Burnden Park, BOLTON

Use the M62, following signs for the M61 at junction 14. Leave the motorway two miles further on, taking the B6536 which is the first exit off the roundabout. After two miles turn right into Croft Lane for Bolton Wanderers and look out for the Rosehill car park, which is a short walk from the ground.

There are 2,900 terrace places available at £11 for adults and £8 for youngsters and pensioners, plus 200 seats at £15 with £9 concessions. All are available on the night.

There are also facilities for disabled supporters but you should apply to us here at Elm Park for your tickets. Admission for wheelchair users is free with an adult helper paying £11 and a child or OAP paying £8.

Roots Hall, Victoria Avenue, SOUTHEND-ON-SEA

If using the M25, exit at junction 29. Either way take the A127
into Southend and when you-reach the main roundabout take the
third exit into Victoria Avenue.

The car park at the ground is for season ticket holders and guests only but there are parking facilities in the town centre and there is some street parking. Nearest station: Prittlewell (see facing page) We have tickets for the Roots Hall Family Stand on sale at the office in Norfolk Road at £4 for children and £8 for an accompanying adult. Otherwise it's pay on the day for 2,000 visitors' seats at £12 with no concessions.





A SHOT FROM THE ARCHIVES

ALAN SEDUNARY introduces the best of enemies

Pretenders like
Aldershot and Oxford
United may have tried
to lay claim to the title but,
as far as Reading fans are
concerned, the derby game is
the one against Swindon
Town.

It is certainly the fixture with the longest history because the very first game the two clubs played in any league was back in 1894 - against each other.

At the time we were both members of the newly-formed Southern League, a competition which Reading, along with Millwall, had been instrumental in getting off the ground.

When the Southern League kicked off Reading were still amateurs, unlike Millwall and Swindon, after a recent vote taken by our players and officials almost unanimously rejected professionalism on the grounds that "the sport would be purer and more honest" without it.

We'd already played a couple of pre-season friendlies, coming from behind in the first of them to beat the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders at the YMCA ground – a game which was delayed while the Reading players got their "togs" out of a locked cupboard.

The second game went much smoother when we beat the Vampires 4-0 - although presumably our opponents' keeper was frightened of crosses! (Yes, on this page even the jokes are ancient.)

On September 22, 1894
Reading made the short
journey to The Croft, Swindon's
ground, and were led out for
this historic fixture by skipper
Frank Deane, the man who'd
seconded the proposal to
retain the club's amateur
status.

A crowd of around 3,000 saw Swindon's Andrews almost score early on by "banging the ball at the goal with his head", but it was Reading who were in front at halftime when inside right Moore finished off a long passing movement for our first goal in the new competition.

Swindon's pressure brought them an equaliser through Reynolds soon after the break but Fletcher quickly restored our lead and fellow Worcester Regiment soldier Kelsey made it 3-1 when he headed in a Jimmy Stewart cross.

Andrews reduced the lead with what contemporary reports described as "a pretty goal" before Reynolds equalised again but, with the minutes ticking away in a a heavy downpour, Stewart pounced in an almighty goalmouth scramble to hit the Reading winner.

Curiously, for a team which had just won 4-3 away, Reading made six changes for our next game a week later and promptly lost 3-2 at home

Equally curious is the fact that the excellent Centenary History of the Southern League records that on the day we were playing Swindon, we were also losing 9-0 at Millwall. Something wrong there somewhere, but one thing that's right is our first league lineup which read: Findlay; White, McQuade, Deane, Turner, Knight, George, Moore, Stewart, Kelsey, Fletcher.

Elsewhere that month author J.B. Priestley and actress Fay Compton were born, while in London cabbie George Smith was fined £1 when he became the first person to be prosecuted for drunken driving, and two gentlemen named Simon

Marks and Thomas Spencer opened their first shop!

Since that first game with Swindon we've met up on a fairly regular basis and our 84 Football League clashes date back to when we joined the original Third Division in 1920.

One of those games, in January 1933, produced our biggest ever win when Jack Palethorpe contributed four goals to a 7-1 scoreline. On the other hand March 29, 1958 was a black day for the Elm Park faithful when Swindon hit four without reply – a game I painfully remember as the only time I've ever left the ground before the final whistle!

The last Royals-Robins meeting was on April 1 last year, and although the programme was littered with highly dubious items (when will work start on the Mark McGhee statue?) the real joke was on the visitors.

Archie Lovell had the last laugh when our 3-0 win came courtesy of his only League hatrick to date and an even rarer pre-planned goal celebration when he cheekily mimicked the airplane routine of Swindon's just departed star Jan-Aage Fjortoft.

AND FINALLY....the last Swindon Town player to score a competitive goal at Elm Park was none other than Jimmy Quinn.

In my view that can be the only reason for the treatment he's been subjected to by some idiots recently, but he can shut all his critics up this afternoon by getting a goal for us. That would make him only the second man - Pat Terry was the other - to have scored for both sides in postwar derby games.

ROYAL IN THE FRAME

TOMMY'S RIGHT ON

TARGET FOR A

RETURN TO THE

GOOD TIMES

ne of football's most well-worn cliches is the one about taking each game as it comes but when you hear it from keeper Tommy Wright you know he doesn't use the phrase lightly.

Because not only has the Northern Ireland international fought back from a career-threatening knee injury, but he and wife Anne have also had to deal with the personal tragedy of the death of five year old son Andrew.

Andrew, the Wrights' only child, suffered from cerebral palsy and he died just after Tommy underwent the first of three operations on his right knee - within a year of what should have been a dream £450,000 move from Newcastle United to Nottingham Forest.

And Tommy admits: "You don't really ever get over it because he left such a big gap in our lives. It certainly puts into context all the other things, including my injury, which people like to describe as tragedies."

Born in Belfast 33 years ago, Tommy began his career with Linfield and was already in his early twenties by the time he joined the Magpies during the 1987-88 season

His League debut came in the old First Division at Aston Villa in the January of the following campaign when he lined up in a Newcastle side which contained such diverse characters as Brazilian striker Mirandinha, Danish international Frank Pingel and future Reading players Ray Ranson and Lee Payne.

In all he made 73 League appearances for the St James' Park side, with another six on loan at Hull City added to his CV, before moving to Forest in September 1993. He'd already played three times for United in that season's Premiership but saw the writing on the wall when Mike Hooper arrived from Anfield.

Says Tommy: "Kevin Keegan said it was up to me but they'd had a good offer from Forest and I decided it would be a good move for me."

He took over from Mark Crossley in a Forest side adjusting to the shock of relegation, but his part in their return to the Premiership at the first attempt was limited to just 10 games before he injured his knee in training.

Tommy says: "It put me out for two seasons. The first operation was a cartilage and the second was to remove a piece of bone. I then tried to get back too quickly, I broke down again and had the third operation last Christmas when I was told just to aim for the start of this season.

"I'd had three reserve games before I got the call to say Reading wanted me to come here on loan. I appreciate that by bringing me down Jim and Micky were taking a bit of a chance on me, but I hope that we've done each other a good turn.

"I only knew about the move the morning before and that didn't leave my any time to worry about Wolves. But I think the fact that I've been through so much meant that I knew I just had to get out there and enjoy it, and playing in front of 23,000 at Molineux is what it's all about.

"I was very surprised by the position Reading were in when I arrived because there are a lot of good players here - as we showed against Manchester City and I'm sure they can do well this season.

"Personally I'm just happy to take each game as it comes and, whatever happens at the end of my loan period then I'll certainly be grateful to Reading for giving me the chance to show what I can do."

There's no doubt that the gratitude is mutual because the Royals are unbeaten in the four games since his arrival - a run which started with that magnificent win at Molineux.

And another thing Tommy's sure he can do is win back his place in the Northern Ireland side - alongside Royals skipper Barry Hunter - even though the current number one keeper is Forest club mate Alan Fettis.

Since making his international debut against Malta in 1989 Tommy's won 22 full caps for his country but the last of those was more than two years ago and he says: "It's another target you set yourself when you're recovering from injury.

"Alan's in the side at the moment but he's only playing in Forest's reserves and there isn't much cover, so it would be another small achievement to get into the squad for the game against Germany next month."





ou may remember that earlier in the season I accused some clubs of inciting away supporters by playing a fanfare of some description over the tannoy when the home team scores.

Oldham Athletic were one of the examples I gave, and I'm sad to say that they are still guilty of this tacky American trend (Wolves do it as as well although not for a while).

But at Oldham last week not only did we have to endure this rubbish, we also ran into our oldest of enemies - the brass band!

Before the game and at half time we had to sit and listen to these five old codgers - wearing ill-fitting Oldham replica shirts which had obviously been supplied by the club because they'd all been badly washed so that the dye had run into the white numbers - while they pumped out 'traditional football fan tunes' like "here we go".

It was awful. I've said it before and I'll say it again, I sincerely hope that this is not the sort of thing we have to look forward

to at the new ground.

The British clubs were back in Europe last week and the English ones seem to have done well. Newcastle will still be pleased with their two away goals, having returned to St James' Park with a 2-3 defeat at the hands of Ferencyaros in Hungary, although the game was really there for them to win.

Once again sloppy defending at vital times cost them dear, not to mention the fact that Kevin Keegan should pick his other goalkeeper.

In the Cup Winners' Cup Liverpool will be more than happy with their 2-1 win against Sion in Switzerland as, barring a complete

disaster, it effectively means they are through to the next round with the Anfield leg still to come.

The Champions' League saw Manchester United grab a good 2-0 win in Istanbul (not Constantinople) against Fenerbache. From my vantage point (armchair, front room) the highlight was the way the Turkish p.a. announcer went that step further even than Oldham, by shouting and playing music full blast while play was in progress to get the crowd going. Actually I was a bit disappointed when the UEFA official made him turn it off.

The week's main controversy came from the other British club in the Champions League, Rangers. Losing 2-0 in Amsterdam against 1995 champions Ajax (no controversy there) Paul Gascoigne kicks out at a Dutchman and receives another European red card and, along with the alleged domestic dispute with his wife, that's brought all the knives out again from the English press.

"This man should not play for England again", they cry, just as they did before Euro 96, after the Far

East tour. It was amazing how a couple of blinding performances and a stunning goal against Scotland made them all change their tune and remember how vital Gazza is to England's success.

I agree that his on-the-field disciplinary

problems could be a worry, but he takes great pride in pulling on an England shirt (as well he should) and has never been sent off while representing his country. I don't think off-the-field allegations should come into

If incidents taking place away from the game are allowed to influence events on the pitch then the game as a whole will suffer even more. For example Tony Adams wouldn't have been allowed to be such a key figure in Euro 96 because he'd have been banned for being jailed in the past for drink driving.

Whether Gascoigne plays for England again or not should be decided by his form on the pitch and by Glenn Hoddle - and by nothing and

nobody else!



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

Several members of the City side had each cost past or



present clubs more than the whole Royals side put together, but famous names like Clough and Kinkladze were rendered virtually anonymous.

In the current refereeing climate Darren Wassall was possibly fortunate to escape with a yellow card for the lunge which stopped Lee in his tracks on the edge of the box after 20 minutes but the Welsh international certainly made him pay for that indiscretion.

Lomas livened up the closing stages by collecting a red card from referee Mick Pierce for an ugly jump at Parky, and City boss Steve Coppell had to admit that his new team were second best in every department.

t was a case of after the Lord Mayor's Show when the Royals switched from Elm Park's best gate of the season to a half full Boundary Park where basement club Oldham Athletic didn't exactly prove an inspiration.

Still keeper Tommy Wright got the chance to prove to watching Northern Ireland boss Bryan Hamilton that, if he's needed for the visit to face Germany next month, then he's right at the top of his form.

Tom produced fine saves from Shaun Garnett, Toddy Orlygsson and Nicky Banger - the latter having promised all sorts of goalscoring mayhem in the morning papers - and the only time he was beaten was from the penalty spot.

That came on 65 minutes when 18 year old Andy Hughes plunged theatrically to the ground in the box - Paul Bodin would have needed a small guided missile to have hit him that hard - and Orlygsson scored his first goal for the Latics. But 10 minutes later sub Jimmy

Quinn didn't need to be theatrical when young Hughes' horribly mistimed tackle whipped his legs away, and the Royals joint boss climbed to his feet to send Alan Kelly the wrong way.







soft tissue injury and we've been able to treat it with ice cream, sorry, I mean ice, and he should be





ast month the Robins announced plans which would make the County Ground the first football stadium in Europe to have its own casino.

But when their ill-fated Premiership adventure was followed by an undignified slide out through the bottom

of Division One, few punters would

have risked a bet on them bouncing back sooner rather than later.

They seemed to be preparing for a long spell in exile when players of the ilk of Jan-Aage Fjortoft - the Norwegian with mannerisms guaranteed to get up the nose of every rival supporter - were shipped out and seemingly not replaced.

Millionaires' Row could have come close to being fatal but instead they proved no worse than a deeper than usual flesh wound.

In fact Steve McMahon's side, even though injury to the player-manager himself meant he played no part on the field from Christmas onwards, found life in Division Two something of a breeze.

Apart from a three day spell in December and a two week interval in March - when Crewe and Blackpool had the temerity to muscle in - Swindon never relinquished top spot and they finished a nine point distance ahead of our mutual Thames Valley neighbours Oxford United.

Wayne Allison arrived from Bristol City to score 17 times in the League, Steve Finney emerged from Manchester City's reserves to hit 12 goals, despite injury Peter Thorne found the target 10 time to underline the previous season's promise and Kevin Horlock also grabbed a dozen from midfield.

And although hopes of boosting their bank balance in the Coca Cola Cup ended with second round defeat against Blackburn Rovers, they went all the way to the round five of the FA Cup before losing to Southampton at the second attempt.

That blend of steel, power and guile which has been a hallmark of McMahon's own game during some 500 League appearances for Everton, Aston Villa, Liverpool, Manchester City and the Robins is now a distinctive feature of his team's approach.

Bryan Robson's presence in the England set up was probably to blame for the fact that McMahon won no more than 17 full caps for his country, but that abrasive edge to his nature has never diminished albeit these days it's more verbal than physical.

Injury has ruled him out so far this season but he must surely be fairly content with the way his side is handling things in his absence.

Three straight wins this month have taken Swindon into seventh spot - a low key local derby triumph over Oxford, the pulverisation of a Huddersfield Town outfit for whom former Reading keeper Steve Francis exceeded even his own worse nightmares and then last Saturday they became the first side to win at the Palace this season.

Regardless of the outcome of their midweek visit to a Manchester United side still smarting from the previous Sunday's indignities, Swindon have made hard work of this season's Coca Cola Cup run.

In the first round goals from Allison and Scott Leitch put them in the driving seat against Wolves, but when ex-Royal Simon Osborn pulled one back within five

> minutes of the second leg kicking off at Molineux they had to hang on in

nailbiting fashion.

Two late goals meant Mark Walters' strike wasn't enough for a home win in round two against Queens Park Rangers. But once again Swindon showed their durability with Wayne O'Sullivan and Allison forcing extra time at Loftus Road and Thorne sealing a 3-1 victory.

The axe was poised when the Robins last visited Elm Park on April Fools Day 1995 and the vultures were watching every false step.



FACING THE ROYALS

INTRODUCING swindon town

The riches of Blackburn Rovers lured Melbourne-born Australian Under 21 keeper Frank Talia away from the sunshine but his League baptism in this country didn't arrive until he got 15 games on loan in the slightly less glamorous surroundings of Hartlepool United. He also had a loan spell with the Robins before, with Tim Flowers and Shay Given blocking his path to the number one spot at Ewood Park, he joined them on a permanent basis almost a year ago.

His current rival for the Swindon keeper's jersey is 29 year old Fraser Digby, who also knows what it's like to have his ambitions stifled because he served his apprenticeship at Old Trafford at a time when Gary Bailey, Chris Turner and Gary Walsh were all in residence.

Digby, an England international at schoolboy, youth and under 21 level, failed to make the Manchester United first team but his £32,500 move to the County Ground proved a bargain in every sense because he's since played more than 400 games and has just started his testimonial season.

Sweeper Ian Culverhouse, voted into the PFA Second Division side last season, was also rated a bargain when he played 370 times for Norwich City after they'd paid Spurs £50,000 for him in October 1985 - particularly as the Canaries made a £200,000 profit when he joined Swindon a little over nine years later. Left back Jason Drysdale helped Watford win the 1989 FA Youth Cup before a £450,000 switch to Newcastle United in August 1994, but his £350,000 move to Swindon seven months later was followed by a string of injury problems.

Republic of Ireland under 21 defender Wayne O'Sullivan and Redbridge-born Edwin Murray have both graduated through the club's youth scheme but 30 year old French youth and under 21 cap Frederic Darras was signed from Corsican club Bastia during the summer after spending 11 years of his career

with Auxerre.

Wallingford-born Gary Elkins had eight seasons at Fulham before joining Wimbledon, and he'd made more than 100 appearances for the Dons before last month's £100,000 move to Wiltshire, while former West Brom and Barnsley defender Mark

club transfer record when he left Newcastle in July 1994.

One-time West Ham United trainee Kevin Horlock, now a fully fledged Northern Irish international, is comfortable in defence but has scored a hatful of goals in a more advanced midfield role, and former Manchester City stopper Mark Seagraves was in Bolton Wanderers' First Division playoff squad in May 1995 but became a £100,000 Robin a month later.

Midfield man Paul Allen cost Spurs £400,000 from first club West Ham in 1985 and moved to Southampton for £550,000 eight years later but the 34 year old, who owns two FA Cup winners' medals, arrived at the County Ground a year ago on a free transfer. Ty Gooden was snapped up in 1993 when Wycombe Wanderers let him go, and made 30 appearances in last season's Second Division championship campaign, 22 year old Kevin Watson played 12 times for the Spurs senior side and 20 year old Alex Smith made the Everton side during their foray into last season's European Cup Winners' Cup. Scott Leitch, once of Dunfermline Athletic and Hearts, cost the Robins £15,000 while fellow Scotsman Lee Collins left Albion Rovers to move south almost a year ago. Winger Mark Walters, a former Villa Park and Anfield team mate of boss Steve McMahon, collected three championships with Rangers north of the border and an FA Cup winners' medal with Liverpool when he returned south, and he moved to the County Ground in the summer after a brief spell with Southampton.

Gloucester-born striker Steve Cowe made his League debut in March after graduating through Aston Villa's youth ranks and the 22 year old's already shown he's capable of building a partnership with experienced Wayne Allison, a consistent scorer with Halifax Town and then Bristol City before his £475,000 journey along the M4 in the summer of last year.

Former Preston North End YTS boy Steve Finney (no relation to the great Tom) played alongside McMahon at Manchester City and contributed 16 goals to the Swindon cause in last season's Second Division title charge before breaking an ankle in March, while former Blackburn Rovers striker Peter Thorne chipped in 10 from only 22 League games despite suffering injury problems of his own.



















MAURICE O'BRIEN looks at life in Division One

Something of a shaggy dog story was behind the conspicuous absence of Lee Richardson - Oldham Athletic's top scorer last season - when the Royals visited Boundary Park at the weekend.

The 27 year old former Aberdeen man became the fifth experienced player to join the Laties' lengthening injury list, when he collected a mass of stitches and a badly damaged hand complete with a broken finger - after taking his pet dogs for a walk in a local park.

Richardson and pets were attacked by two Staffordshire Bull Terriers, and by the time he'd managed to fight them off he'd collected a catalogue of wounds which will apparently sideline him until Christmas.

You'd have thought Mark
McGhee might be an expert on
famous last words by now even before his declaration at the
start of last month that he wanted to
turn Molineux into "a fortress" by not
losing there for the whole season.

However, having remained unbeaten at home for three games they've seen their last four visitors - Sheffield United, Bolton Wanderers, the Royals and Port Vale - depart with maximum spoils.

After Vale's victory last Saturday McGhee was complaining that half his £10 million 34-man squad are on the injury list - even though that still leaves him with a bigger and more expensive first team set-up than most.

But he declared: "If we lose 1-0 to Port Vale when I put out my strongest team, that's when I can expect the worst." There he goes again!

Port Vale are in something of a crisis themselves with chairman Bill Bell putting the club and its star players up for sale after an angry demonstration by supporters followed last week's home defeat by Crystal Palace.

Mr Bell, quite justifiably, points out that he wasn't playing against Palace and couldn't have personally influenced the result but added: "Not only did I have to suffer abuse at the match but also my wife and family.

"I don't believe I deserve to be treated like this. If they want me out they've got it." He threatened that if he didn't find a buyer then he'd shut the whole place down by this weekend but the problems found central defender Gareth Griffiths, who cost Vale just a grand from nonleague Rhyl three years ago, prepared for the worst.

Griffiths, already a qualified draughtsman, is about to take exams to get a degree in sports science and he joked: "The way things are going with our chairman it might come in handy because I could be on the dole soon."

Portsmouth winger Jimmy Carter got 'crazy ganged' after he won the man-of-the-match award as his side went out of the Coca Cola Cup to Premiership surprise packages Wimbledon.

For the past couple of seasons Coca Cola have been giving away much sought after mountain bikes to the winner of each tie's star man award, but when Carter went to ride his home from Fratton Park he discovered that some of his Wimbledon 'mates' had let the tyres down.

eanwhile Swindon Town winger Mark Walters must have been tempted to have a real stinker during Wednesday's trip to Old Trafford - because his Coca Cola displays this season have already brought him no less than THREE mountain bikes.

Chairman Mike Spearman reckons Walters ought to open his own bike shop but perhaps he should have loaned one of the machines to team mate Peter Thorne when the Robins flew in to London at the end of last month.

Thorne scored in Swindon's 4-1 Football Combination win at Charlton Athletic in the afternoon and then nipped across to west London to link up with the first team....coming on as a sub to score a Coca Cola Cup extra time winner at Queens Park Rangers!

Sheffield United keeper Alan Kelly showed he's certainly got the secret of perfect timing after a goalless draw against Tranmere Rovers at Bramall Lane persuaded him to give up the captaincy.

The Republic of Ireland star said: "I felt it was better for the team if an outfield player did the job. It hurt to give it up but if we are promoted the sacrifice will have been worth it."

Result? The Blades' next two games saw them hand out 3-0 and 4-0 stuffings to Charlton Athletic and Stoke City respectively. Now that's what you call a captain's decision!

Poor old West Brom must once again be wondering about the wisdom of paying £600,000 for striker Paul Peschisolido with Canada's drive to qualify for the next World Cup going ahead at full steam.

A combination of suspension, from his spell at Birmingham City last season, and international duty ruled him out of the first four games of the new campaign.







FINDS IT HARD

TO HIDE A SMIRK

Who cannot resist the temptation of indulging in a bit of schadenfreude at the expense of our current divisional companions
Manchester City?

I would lay money that most of the 3,000 plus
Royals who made the trip to Moss Side in 1993 for that thrilling FA Cup game will now be smiling wryly.

The less gentlemanly amongst us will surely be sniggering unsympathetically at their present plight, much as they might have laughed at us if we'd made it to the Premiership and become cannon fodder for the so-called 'big clubs' and the hackneyed scribblers of Britain's sports pages, along with our 'crumbling and outdated' facilities.

Why is Maine Road such a poisoned chalice? Is it the end result of years of mismanagement and neglect? Or could it be what I suspect, the first real example of the downside of having such a monstrous entity at the pinnacle of our football system - the much vaunted but illusionary Premiership?

It's a wagon which has come loose from the rest of the train, pursued in a futile, desperate chase by those left stranded by the self-inflicted uncoupling. And now an important passenger has fallen off!

As the television-fuelled lolly pours into the sport at the top level to pay ridiculous salaries to mostly average personnel, delusions of grandeur run manifest, given credence by the new breed of 'sugar daddy' chairmen and a voracious, frenetic media.

Of course it's not the fault of the clubs that they have had to redevelop stadia which dated from Victorian times in some cases, but as the shining new edifices have risen along with the sport's profile (not to mention ticket prices!) the levels of humility and reality have plummeted.

The 'health' of a club is now measured in bank balances and share prices, irrespective of what's going on on the pitch.

For me, the true and only representative indicator of a club's health is its team. How it plays that simple old game, football.

Back in the winter of 1993 at Maine Road the signs were already there. Poor old City were ailing then, already succumbing to Premiership altitude sickness.

A glittering, executiveboxed stand towered incongruously over the rest of the ground as City struggled against a club which was fundamentally healthy where it mattered, on the pitch, even though the sides were separated by two divisions.

Health or wealth? Maybe that's something they can debate in the 'Media Theatre' at Blackburn Rovers should they return to reality come next May! And Carling can move over for Bisto, now that the Premiership's a runaway train!
