

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We welcome our special guest today, the Secretary of the Football League and Regional Representative of the Football Trust, David Dent, who will join our own Sir Stanley Matthews on the pitch to highlight the Trust's magnificent contribution of £3.25m, towards the new stadium. The presentation will take place just before kick-off of the first league match against Swindon Town in the new Britannia Stadium.

The construction of the new Stadium would not have been possible without the support of the Trust who contributed a grant and loans package of £3.25m. The Club are indebted to the Trust for all their help in ensuring that their dedicated fans get the very best facilities on offer.

The new stadium at Trentham North is just one example of major relocation projects made possible by Football Trust grants. It is Trust policy to provide the maximum support to clubs taking on the challenge of relocation and thanks to the Trust's support the United Kingdom boasts some of the finest stadia in Europe, if not the world. So far a total of ten new grounds have been built, a further five are under construction and thirteen clubs have plans to relocate.

The former colliery site will be transformed by this new development. The new stadium will provide 100 press seats, 160 seats for supporters with disabilities, a banqueting suite and car parking for 650 cars. This will ensure that the Potters' fans have access to some of the best facilities in the Football League.

David Dent commented: "It is a tremendous pleasure to be invited here today to see the first league game ever to be played at the magnificent new Britannia Stadium. The new stadium is a credit to the Club and I congratulate Stoke City on providing their supporters with some of the best facilities in the Football League. The Football Trust has made an important contribution towards the new stadium and has a vital role to play in helping clubs implement the recommendations of the Taylor Report and providing a grant aid to football at all levels of the

HOME SUPPORTERS

The North Stand will be the traditional 'singing' end of the stadium priced at £11 adult, £7 U17/OAP's. The Sentinel Stand (East) will provide excellent seats at the side of the pitch priced at £14 Adult, £8 U17/OAP's. The McEwan's Stand (West) is a two-tiered stand offering top quality seats. Lower tier seats are priced at £15 Adults, £8 U17/OAP's, while seats in the upper tier are available on a membership basis (see Members Facilities). The north-east corner of the stadium is a designated Family Area with seasonal membership priced at £15 adults, £10 juniors and matchday ticket prices at £11 Adults, £6 U17/OAP's and £3 U13. Conditions of entry to the Family Area are the purchase of one adult and up to 5 junior tickets or a maximum of 2 adults with at least

MEMBERS FACILITIES Seating on the upper tier of the McEwan's Stand is available to Premier Club Members only, although the Club reserve the right to sell seats to supporters paying a 'one-day membership' premium on the matchday ticket price (£16 Adult, £9 Û17/OAP's). Supporters sitting in the upper tier have exclusive use of the Premier Concourse. Legends Club members have the exclusive use of the Legends Sports Bar on matchdays, situated on the north-east corner of the stadium (capacity, 1,000) and the Club reserve the right to sell seats to supporters paying a 'one-day membership' premium on the

matchday ticket price. CORPORATE FACILITIES

The McEwans Stand (West) houses a range of corporate facilities including The Waddington Suite (a restaurant for up to 350 matchday diners), 50 private boxes on two levels, a members-only facility for 250 Vice Presidents Club members and The Gordon Banks Suite for up to 40 guests of the Match Sponsor. Entry to all corporate facilities is through the main entrance on the front of the McEwans Stand.

AWAY SUPPORTERS: Signal Radio Stand (South); Capacity 5,000

This is the maximum that will be allocated to visiting teams. The Signal Radio Stand is situated behind the goal and can be sub-divided into three parts which means that this figure may be reduced as required. Prices for away supporters are £14 Adult and £8.

U17/OAP's (concessions on a reciprocal basis and apply to advance sales only).

DISABLED SUPPORTERS

There will be 164 wheelchair places at the Britannia Stadium, situated in all parts of the stadium, including the away end. Prices; wheelchair season tickets, £95 (including car park space); match ticket, £5 (Escorts pay prevailing prices and places should be pre-booked to guarantee a parking space). Match commentary will be available for blind/partially sighted supporters in certain areas of the ground (contact ticket office for

more information). AWAY TRAVEL

All bookings for away coach travel will be taken at the ticket office which will be open up until coach departure times for both Saturday and evening away games. Postal, phone and fax bookings for coach travel will be accepted.

TRAVELLING TO THE BRITANNIA STADIUM

BY CAR

North/South/West: M6 to J15. Take the A500 to Stoke-on-Trent then the A50 to Derby/Uttoxeter (the Britannia Stadium will be signposted at this point and visible on the skyline to the right). Once on the ASO you have to drive past the stadium on the right to the first exit and come back down the westbound carriageway of the A50 to get to

East; A50 all the way to Stoke-on-Trent. Stadium on the left. Please note: on a

matchday access to the stadium from the A50 will be strictly limited to coaches, permit holders and disabled supporters who have been allocated a parking space directly outside the stadium (see ACCESS and PARKING for more details).

BY BUS

Matchday buses will leave Hanley Bus Station (stand 11), Newcastle Bus Station (stand D) and Longton Bus Station (stand 10) and Stoke (Glebe Street) ONE HOUR before kickoff, with connecting bus services from all over the area. A shuttle bus service will then continue between Stoke (Glebe Street) and the Britannia Stadium up until 15 minutes before kick-off. Return buses will depart immediately after the match from bus terminals behind the Sentinel Stand (East). Normal bus fares will apply. For general enquiries Contact PMT on (01782) 747000.

IMPORTANT NOTICE: Additional signage will be in place on a matchday directing traffic to the car parks available. This signage will initially direct cars to the SOUTH car park until it is full, at which stage the signage will be adjusted by police to direct the flow of traffic to the MICHELIN car park

Please note: the access road which runs through the Trentham Lakes site which has been named Stanley Matthews Way, will not provide a through road for motorists from the A50 to Trentham Road (or visa-versa) as it will be gated and only used on matchdays. BY FOOT/CYCLE

Pedestrians can walk to the Britannia Stadium on a matchday from Stoke and Michelin car park, using existing footpaths along the bridge over the A500, which lead to the incinerator access road, to link up with the new footway/cycleway (and the new bridge over the canal and railway line) to the stadium. Pedestrians will also be able to link up with the new footway from the tow path which runs along the Trent & Mersey canal. Supporters can walk from Heron Cross (Grove Road) and Hollybush (Highfield Drive) to the stadium, along a newly constructed footway/cycleway, but pedestrians coming from Heron Cross should be aware that they must cross the ASO at Heron Cross using the new footbridge as a 1.8m high fence will prevent them from crossing the road any further down. There will also be no pedestrian access along the busy ASO0 or ASO roads. Finally, pedestrians will be able to walk to the stadium along Stanley Matthews Way running up from Trentham Road (A5035).

NEAREST RAILWAY STATION: Stoke-on-Trent (01782 411411)

Transportation for away supporters arriving by train can be arranged by the local bus company via Sgt Aston at Hanley Police Station on (01782) 202555. If required, this must be organised in advance by the visiting club. Supporters arriving by train can take a 2minute walk to Glebe Street in Stoke where buses will run to the stadium at regular intervals (see TRAVEL for more details).

ACCESS ON A MATCHDAY

Access to the Britannia Stadium from the ASO will be strictly limited to vehicles with parking permits, for car parks NORTH, WEST 1 and WEST 2 (Directors Box guests, private box holders, Vice Presidents Club members, sponsors, Waddington Suite guests, players, officials etc.), visiting coaches and supporters who have been allocated a disabled parking space outside the ground (wheelchair season/matchday ticket holders).

Supporters who are allowed access from the A50 should follow directional signage on a matchday which indicates coach and disabled parking.

Access to (and egress from) the SOUTH car park (1600 spaces for car park season ticket holders and match day parking) is from the new traffic signalised junction on Trentham Road (A5035). On non-matchdays, access to the Britannia Stadium is from the A50 entrance for all visitors.

PARKING ON MATCHDAYS

AT THE STADIUM

Matchday parking is available for supporters on the SOUTH car park, access from Trentham Road only (see directions below). Matchday parking on the SOUTH car park will be on a first-come first-served basis (cost £3 matchday or £62.50 for full season The SOUTH car park will be open from I lam for an afternoon match and 4.00pm for a night match. Tip: tune in to one of the local radio stations, Radio Stoke (94.6Fm) or Signal Radio (102.6Fm) for updates on parking availability at the ground to avoid any unnecessary travelling. Directions: North/South/West: M6 Junction 15. Take the A500 to Stoke-on-Trent then at the first exit, take the A34 to Stone and follow signs for Trentham. At the next roundabout, turn left onto Trentham Road (A5035) and carry on until you reach the traffic signalised junction which sits on the southern entrance to Stanley Matthews Way. East: A50 to Stoke-on-Trent. Leave the A50 at the Longton exit into Trentham Road (A5035). Stay on Trentham Road (A5035). Stay on Trentham Road until you reach the traffic signalised junction which sits on the southern entrance to

Stanley Matthews Way. DISABLED PARKING

Supporters purchasing a wheelchair season ticket will be allocated a parking space directly outside the ground, with access from the A50. Wheelchair users purchasing a matchday ticket may purchase a parking space outside the ground at a cost of £3, subject to availability. Disabled supporters (with a valid orange badge) may park on the SOUTH car park, subject to availability (cost £3 matchday or £62.50 for full season), where spaces closest to the Stadium will be reserved for disabled parking. (Access from Trentham Road).

AT MICHELIN

FREE Parking for supporters will be available, as in previous seasons on the Michelin factory car park, which lies on the edge of Stoke Town Centre (approximately a 10 minute walk from the stadium). Directions: North/South/West: M6 Junction 15. Take the ASOO to Stoke-on-Trent. After a couple of miles the road splits into five lanes. Take the far left lane, following signs for Campbell Road/Michelin. Turn left at the top and then left at the mini-roundabout into the Michelin car park. East: ASO to Stoke-on-Trent. Once past the stadium on the left, move over into the far left lane and stay in this lane through the roundabout and round a sharp curved road which takes you up and over the A500 (following signs for Campbell Road/Michelin). At the mini-roundabout turn left into Michelin Car Park.

For supporters wishing to visit the club shop or ticket office on the day of a match, parking will be available on the coach park behind the Signal Radio Stand up until 2hrs before kick-off, with access from the A50 permitted. *Please note*: cars left in this area after the allowed time are liable to be clamped or removed by the authorities. ON NON-MATCHDAYS

Parking will be available at the stadium on non-matchdays directly outside the shop, ticket office and executive offices on car park **WEST 2**, with access from the A50. On nonmatchdays there will be no access to the stadium from Trentham Road (A5035).

We had ignored all the peripheral fuss to get out minds on the job against Rochdale, even though we had a cushion of a 3-1 lead from the first leg, and that's even more crucial today as we search for league points. We must be focussed.

The situation with the new ground which necessity saw us switching our first scheduled home league fixture against Bradford to Valley Parade eight days ago, and thus playing our first three league games away, made it an especially difficult start to the season for us and means we need to beat Swindon.

One thing is for sure, having now experienced the superb backroom facilities at the Britannia, the wellequipped and spacious dressing rooms being among the best of them,

our players cannot help but be inspired to give their all.

The playing surface is absolutely superb, it has to be one of the best in the country - and now we have had a 90 minute

game to get used to it the players should feel settled right from the start this afternoon. Looking back over our first couple of game, I thought we were perhaps a little unlucky not to get a draw at Birmingham and deserved our point at Bradford.

Valley Parade is never an easy place to go and they had us on the rack in the first half, when we were indebted to a couple of superb saves from Carl Muggleton.

Carl had to make two more equally good saves in the second half, but by then we were competing on level terms and could have had a goal or two ourselves.

We made chances as we made at Birmingham, and I feel confident that we will start to take them and when that happens we will surprise a few teams in this league. Enjoy the game and let's see how much noise a big crowd can make in the Britannia Stadium!

FRASER DIGBY (Goalkeeper)

Town's longest serving player celebrated his Testimonial Season in 1996/97 and to cap another marvellous campaign was voted Player of the Year. Served his apprenticeship at Manchester United and after a successful loan spell at the County Ground, signed for the Club in a £32,500 deal. This former England Under 21 international returned to United on loan in 1992/93 but his only senior appearance at Old Trafford was for Town during their season in the Premiership. BORN: Sheffield, 23.4.67.

FRANK TALIA

Was spotted playing for Australia's Under 21 team and after being invited over for trials with several English clubs, eventually signed for Blackburn Rovers in August 1992. Failed to make a first team appearance and was brought in on loan at Swindon before signing in November 1995. Recently put pen to paper in a new three year deal. BORN: Melborne, Australia,

20.7.72

MARK SEAGRAVES (Defender)

Mark was installed as Club Captain last season and played a leading role at the heart of the defence before injury brought a premature end to his season. A former Liverpool apprentice and England Youth international, Mark made his league debut while on loan at Norwich City before signing for Manchester City. He then signed for Bolton Wanderers and made 180 appearances for the Trotters before coming to Swindon in a £100,000 deal in June 1995. BORN: Bootle, 22.10.66.

MARK ROBINSON (Defender)

Started his career at West Bromwich Albion, moved on to Barnsley and such was his form that Newcastle swooped in for his services at a cost of £450,000 in March 1993. After losing his place in the first team through injury Mark came to Swindon for a then Club record fee of £600,000 in July 1994 and has been a regular at full-back although he can also play in the centre of defence. BORN: Rochdale, 21.11.68.

JASON DRYSDALE (Defender)

Another former Newcastle player who joined Swindon in a £340,000 deal

in March 1995. A series of injuries have limited his appearances in a Swindon shirt. Most at home at left back, Jason began his career at Watford where he won an FA Youth Cup winners medal. BORN: Bristol,

FREDERIC DARRAS (Defender)

This free transfer from French Club Bastia is a former Under 18 and Under 21 international for France. Spent 11 years with double winners Auxerre during which time he made no fewer than 19 appearances in the European Cup. Came over on a three year deal in August 1996 and is comfortable playing anywhere across the back line. BORN: Calals, 19.8.66.

ALAN McDONALD (Defender)

After spending his entire career at Queens Park Rangers, Alan made his first ever move - to the County Ground during the summer on a two year deal. A highly committed defender, his wealth of experience attracted Steve McMahon when he realised the Northern Ireland International's contract was up at Loftus Road. This former Northern Ireland skipper has 53 international caps to his name. BORN: Belfast, 12.10.63.

DARREN BULLOCK (Midfielder)

This tough tackling central midfielder signed a three and a half year contract in February 1997 after a £400,000 move from Huddersfield Town. Scored 20 goals in 156 appearances for the Terriers and could be described as a late developer as he was only drafted into the full time professional game in November 1993 following a £55,000 step up from Nuneaton Borough. BORN: Worcester, 12.2.69.

TY GOODEN (Midfielder)

Signed by John Gorman in 1993 after being released by Wycombe Wanderers following a successful trial period. Made over 30 appearances during Swindon's Championship season but was hindered by injuries last term and played on a handful of games. BORN: Canvey Island 23.10.72.

SCOTT LEITCH (Midfielder)

This former Motherwell, Dunfermline and Hearts midfielder signed for Swindon last Summer for a bargain price of just £15,000. Enjoyed a successful loan spell at the County Ground when the Club coasted to the Second Division title and was delighted to make a permanent move down south. BORN: 6.10.69.

MARK WALTERS (Midfielder)

On his day one of the most talented wingers around, Mark showed the skills which made him a hit at Aston Villa, Glasgow Rangers and Liverpool before a serious knee injury left him sidelined for the last few months of

the season. Joined Swindon on a free transfer last Summer and once fully fit, this former England international could hold the key to a successful season for his side. BORN: Birmingham 2.6.64.

LEE COLLINS

Missed the majority of last season through injury but signed an extention to his contract and is keen to get a regular place in mid-field. Signed in November 1995 after impressing during a period on trial. BORN: Bellshill 3.2.74

PHILIPPE CUERVO (Midfielder)

This gifted Frenchman impressed manager Steve McMahon during a trial period at the County Ground and signed a three year contract on a free transfer from Sochaux just before the new season started. A talented midfield player who likes to run at opponents, Philippe's previous clubs include Saint Etienne. BORN: Ris-Orangis 13.8.69.

WAYNE ALLISON (Forward) Top scorer for the

past two seasons, The Chief has proved to be a valuable asset since his £475,000 move from local rivals Bristol City. A big. strong target man, Wayne served his

STEVE FINNEY (Forward)

A series of injuries restricted Steve to just nine starts last season, this after suffering a broken ankle at the tail end of the previous campaign. Prior to this had netted 16 times after signing on a free transfer from Manchester City. BORN: Hexham 31.10.73.

CHRIS HAY (Forward)

This pacy young striker was drafted in from Scottish giants Celtic a week before the new campaign for £330,000. A three year contract was agreed and Swindon believe they have got a bargain for a player who made more than 20 first team appearances for Celtic. BORN: Glasgow,

THE MEN IN CHARGE Manager STEVE McMAHON

In his first full season as player-manager he led Swindon to the Second Division Championship in fine style making 21 appearances despite a series of injuries. As a player collected almost all the honours available for both Club and country. Began his career at Everton scoring 11 goals in 100 league games before a £175,000 transfer to Aston Villa. Kenny Dalglish then took him to Liverpool for £375,000 where he emerged as a midfield general of the highest quality bagging League and FA Cup winners medals galore during the



glory years at Anfield. He also gained international recognition collecting 17 full England caps and being part of the 1990 World Cup squad. Christmas of 1991 saw Manchester City pay £900,000 for his services and he continued to perform at the highest level until taking over as Swindon manager in November 1994. BORN: Liverpool, 20.8.61.

First Team Coach MIKE WALSH

This former Bolton Wanderers, Everton, Manchester City and Blackpool defender became Steve McMahon's number two in October 1996. He came to the County Ground with a wealth of experience having managed Bury for five years, leading them to three play-offs. Mike also has four Republic of Ireland caps to his name. It was during his time at Everton that Mike met Steve McMahon and was delighted to be given the opportunity to renew acquaintances last year after being enticed away from Unibond Premier League side Barrow where he was manager. BORN: Manchester, 20.6.56.

A Brief History of Swindon Town Football Club

The Club was founded in 1881 by Reverend William Pitt as a result of a merger between two teams from the old and new areas of the Town. There were signs of success even in those early years as the Club won the Wiltshire Senior Cup from its inception in 1887 and for the next six years. Giant killers

After a disappointing spell at the turn of the century Swindon Town improved drastically from 1908 to 1914, guided by Secretary/Manager Sam Allen.

Inspired by such players as Harold Fleming and Jock Walker the team never finished lower than fourth in the Southern League. They were Champions twice and Runners-Up three times.

In the 1909-10 season Crystal Palace, Tottenham and Manchester City were among the victims in Swindon's FA Cup run which eventually came to an end when they were beaten 2-0 in the semi-finals by Newcastle United - who went on to lift the Cup.

The next season the Club won its first Championship but when they played Manchester United for the FA Charity Shield, they lost by an amazing 8-4 scoreline.

In the 1911-12 campaign Swindon progressed to the semi-finals of the Cup again, seeing off the likes of Manchester United, Everton and West Ham before going down to the eventual winners Barnsley.

Hot shot Harry

David Hyman Morris moved from Swansea to Swindon for £110 in 1926 and what a bargain price that proved to be.

Better known as Harry, he stole the show during the next seven years with a feast of goalscoring records which still stand to this day. Most goals in a League match, most goals in a season, most goals in a career - all these records still belong to Harry.

Mixed fortunes

Although the Second World War had a major affect on football, Swindon prospered financially as players were paid only appearance money, thus reducing the wage bill.

After the war, things took a turn for the worse both on and off the field with inconsistent displays and money problems.

Golden years

The period surrounding the famous League Cup victory of 1969 was a golden time for the Club.

Town were only denied promotion as Champions by goal difference but of course the highlight for the Swindon faithful was the visit to the Twin Towers of Wembley to see their side beat Arsenal 3-1 after extra time. The 1969/70 season brought more silverware as the Club won both the Anglo-Italian Cup Winners Cup and the Anglo-Italian Cup, beating AS Roma and Napoli respectively.

Swindon also reached the sixth round of the FA Cup and finished fifth in the second division - the best position the Club had achieved to that point.

The Macari Years

In the early 1980's Swindon were languishing in the Fourth Division. Something had to be done and Lou Macari became the Club's new Manager.

After a shaky start in the 1984/85 season (he was sacked for nine days before being reinstated), Macari's belief in fitness and the direct game paid off as Swindon were promoted as Champions with a record total of 102

Next season promotion was achieved again - by beating Gillingham in the play-offs.

Ups and Downs

In 1990 the team, now under the guidance of Ossie Ardiles, beat Sunderland at Wembley in the play-offs to gain promotion to the Premiership for the first time in the Club's history.

But players and fans alike were devastated when the Football League decided the punishment for financial irregularities was to demote the team two divisions.

This was later reduced to a drop of one league, back to Division One, while Sunderland took Town's place in the top flight.

However in 1993, with Glenn Hoddle in charge, Swindon grabbed a place in the Premiership by beating Leicester City 4-3 in a nail-biting Play-Off Final at Wembley.

This was followed by two disappointing seasons which resulted in relegation from the Premiership to Division Two.

The yo-yo effect, now clearly a feature of virtually every campaign returned in 1995/96 with the Club climbing back to the First Division as runaway Division Two Champions.

Did You Know?

In 1946 a little known 19-year-old Irishman from Glentoran named Richard Blanchflower guested for Swindon Town in a game at Reading. He later became known as Danny!

Town equalled their highest ever league place of fourth in the old Third Division South in 1957/58 - but would have finished as runners up had

they not conceded a last minute goal on the final day at Bournemouth. Fortunately the lapse was not costly as only champions were promoted in those days

In February of 1967 there was a higher gate at Town's home reserve game against Chelsea (9,786) than for the first team's fixture at Doncaster (7.935) - as FA Cup vouchers were being distributed at the

During defender Colin Prophett's four year stay at Swindon, between 1974 and 1978, he twice went in goal following injury to the keeper. Both occasions were against Sheffield Wednesday - his old club! Duncan Shearer notched 98 goals in four seasons at the County Ground but his first for the club came four months before he joined! In a 3-0 win at Huddersfield in February 1988 the third Swindon goal was accredited to Dave Bamber - but Duncan actually knocked the ball into his own net. Adrian Viveash became the first Swindon substitute to be substituted in a league game when manager Ossie Ardiles pulled him off after just 21 minutes against Middlesbrough in September 1990.

SWINDON TOWN FACT FILE

Full-back John Trollope appeared in a record 889 first-class games for the Robins between 1960 and 1981. Of these 770 were in the Football League and only five players, two of them ex-Stokies, Peter Shilton and Robbie James plus Terry Paine, Tommy Hutchison, Robbie and Alan Oakes, have appeared in more in this competition. Trollope also managed the Robins for three years: 1980-83.

More than 70 years ago Harry Morris was the star marksman of Swindon Town and between 1926 and 1933 he netted a club record 230 goals, 216 of which came in the Football League. He twice hit five in a game against Q.P.R. in 1927 and Norwich City three years later. In 1926-27 Morris weighed in with a record 48 goals, all but one coming in the Third Division South.

The first player to score four goals in a Third Division match was Swindon's Harold Fleming who did so against Luton Town in August 1920. Twenty five years ago the former Scottish international wing-half Dave Mackay handed over the managerial duties at the County Ground to Les Allen - both men had previously played together for Tottenham Hotspur

Ten years ago the Swindon Town manager was Lou Macari and five years ago the current England coach, Glenn Hoddle was in charge of the

Striker Paul Rideout became the youngest player ever to appear in a League or senior Cup game for Swindon Town when he made his debut for the club against Hull City in the Third Division in November 1960 at the age of 16 years, 107 days.

Swindon Town won the Football League Cup at Wembley in 1969 when they beat the strong favourites Arsenal 3-1 after extra time on a strengthsapping surface. Star of the show for the Robins was winger Don Rogers who scored twice, one a classic effort when he raced half the length of the pitch before netting.

In successive seasons of 1909-10 and 1911-12 Swindon played in the FA Cup semi-final. They lost on both occasions - to Newcastle United and then Barnsley, the latter after a replay.

Former Welsh international full-back Rod Thomas appeared in a total of 30 full caps for his country during his playing days with Swindon, being the club's most capped player.

The first referee reported to be knocked-out whilst officiating in a Third Division game was Alf-Bond who was struck by the ball during Swindon Town's clash with Newport in September 1958.

Swindon Town received a club record fee of £1.3 million from Middlesbrough for striker Jan Aage-Fjortoft in March 1995. Two years earlier, in July 1993, Swindon had recruited Fjortoft from Rapid Vienna for a then record lay out of £500,000.

Swindon's only flirtation with the Premiership came in season 1993-94 when unfortunately they had a disastrous campaign, managing only five wins and five draws from their 42 matches, going down with a mere 30

Twenty-five years ago a record crowd of 31,668 packed into the County Ground to witness the Swindon-Arsenal FA Cup-tie. Today the same ground can house half that number of fans.

Bradford's Field, Globe Field and The Croft were Swindon Town's three previous grounds.

Hat-Trick Heroes

Bowyer's Fourtimer Rocks The Pool

Frank Bowyer scored Stoke City's first FA Cup hat-trick after the Second World War achieving the feat (a fourtimer in fact) against Hartlepool United in a third round tie at The Victoria Ground on 9 January 1954.

This encounter was a rather one-sided affair with the Third Division (North) side, although inferior in all departments to a stern-looking Potters line-up, giving a good account of themselves in front of almost 24,000 fans.

Bowyer's goals were all well taken, two of them being set up by the industrious Johnny King, who got on the scoresheet himself, while Joe Hutton claimed the other. Bowyer was born in Chesterton 75 years ago and joined Stoke as a junior at the start of the Second World War. He remained at the club for 21 years, right up until he signed for Macclesfield Town in the summer of 1960. In all he scored 149 competitive goals for the Potters (in 435 appearances) and during the hostilities he netted another 56 goals (in 162 outings). A very fine footballer indeed, who was perhaps unlucky not to gain international honours - simply because during a six year period in the late 1950s, the Potters played in the Second Division. If they had been in the top-flight, then Bowyer may well have represented England! All he had to show for his efforts was to go on tour with FA XI to Canada (1950).

Hat-Trick Blues For Birmingham

In contrast to Bowyer scoring Stoke's first post-War Cup treble, Freddie Steele had the honour of scoring the Potters' last in this competition before the 1939-45 hostilities. Sixty years ago, he grabbed three goals in Stoke's 4-1 home win over Birmingham in a third round encounter at The Victoria Ground in January 1937, witnessed by 31,480 fans.

At the time both teams were in the First Division - and both were to be involved in relegation battle later in the campaign. In the end the Potters finished 17th in the table with Blues one place below them, each on 38 points, two clear of danger! As for Steele's feat in that Cup-tie, he was in great form and although the scoreline perhaps flattered Stoke to a certain degree, there was no denying that hot-shot Steele was the star performer. Joe Johnson, who aided and abetted in one of Steele's goals, also got on the scoresheet, netting with a thumping drive from the edge of the area. NB - Freddie Steele - hat-trick hero-is featured again in our next programme against West Bromwich Albion.

Shrimpers Poached!

Simon Sturridge hit his first treble for Stoke in a fine 4-2 victory at Roots Hall in November 1995. The former Birmingham City striker found the net in the 33rd, 64th and 76th minutes. Nigel Gleghorn netted the Potters' other goal and almost 6,000 were there to see 'Studger' walk off with the ball. T.M.

- The announcement will be preceded by a loud warning signal to catch the attention of the crowd.
- · Listen carefully to the announcement and be ready to respond in a calm and controlled manner.

- It is imperative in an emergency situation that spectators conform to instructions of Stewards/Police.
