



# today's visitors The R's

This evening we extend a warm County Ground welcome to the players, supporters and staff of Queens Park Rangers Football Club for this Nationwide League Division One fixture.

We hope you all enjoy your trip to Wiltshire and wish you a safe journey home after the match.

Rangers have begun the 1997/98 campaign in much the same way as they kicked-off last season - among the favourites for promotion as one of the 'big fish' in the Nationwide pond.

But if last season proved a bit of a shock for the West London culture club with the competitiveness of First Division football, then the current term is sure to provide at least as big a challenge, as the battle is joined by the likes of Middlesbrough, Sunderland and Nottingham Forest.

A slow start to 1996/97 saw the Hoops dispense with Ray Wilkins  now in charge down the road at Fulham of course - and appoint former Arsenal assistant Stewart Houston in September.

Houston quickly set about reinvigorating the club and big money signings such as John Spencer and Gavin Peacock soon had the desired effect and saw Rangers moving back up the table again.

The goals of Spencer and the midfield promptings of Peacock played their part, of course, but it was the form of ex-Carlisle midfielder Paul Murray that was arguably the most telling factor. As his confidence grew at the higher level, young Murray revealed himself to be a quality playmaker very much in the OPR mould.

With the goalscoring difficulties seemingly solved - particularly so following the summer signing of former Stoke hot-shot Mike Sheron - the main problem at Loftus Road was a leaky defence.

But Houston acted to bring in Steve Morrow, from his former club Arsenal, and during the summer returned to Highbury once more to snap up highly-rated young goalkeeper Lee Harper, who has been everpresent this season.

The changes in personnel seemed to have had the desired effect - in defence if not going forward - when the Hoops kicked-off the current season with a 0-0 draw at home to last season's Play-Off Semi-Finalists lpswich Town.

But since then Houston's side have twice conceded four - at Nottingham Forest and home to Charlton - and have kept just three clean-sheets at the time of writing. One reason could be the departure of Northern Ireland international Alan McDonald, now plying his trade here at the County Ground, of course.

But a run of four successive victories in September have put the side in good stead, and on the brink of the Play-Off places.

This evening's meeting is sure to be a good test for Town's own promotion hopes.



# Stewart Houston the manager

Despite being born and bred in Dunoon in Scotland, much of Rangers' boss Stewart Houston's footballing life has revolved around west London.

He began his professional career as a player with Chelsea under Tommy Docherty and also enjoyed two years with Brentford before moving up to Manchester United, following former boss Docherty to Old Trafford.

His fee of £55,000 was quickly repaid as he showed his quality as a superbly consistent left-back, having made his United debut in what turned out to be George Best's final match for the Red Devils.

Houston won a Second Division Championship medal in 1975 and appeared in the FA Cup Final against Southampton the following year, when the Saints upset the odds by winning 1-0.

Destined to miss out on Wembley glory, Houston tore his ankle ligaments a fortnight before the 1977 FA Cup Final, losing his place to Arthur Albiston, who subsequently - and very sportingly - offered his winners' medal to Houston.

The son of a former St.Mirren player, Houston represented his country at U23 and Full level and had further spells with Sheffield United and Colchester United before retiring in 1985.

He joined the Arsenal backroom staff in 1990 and, as assistant to George Graham, played a big role in the club's recent domestic and

European successes. After two successful spells as caretaker boss at Highbury,

however, Houston became disillusioned with the Gunners and jumped at the chance to replace Ray Wilkins in the QPR hot-seat early last season.

Despite bringing in quality players of the likes of John Spencer and Gavin Peacock, Houston was unable to lift Rangers into Play-Off contention last term - but he is determined to be up there and challenging this time around.










# Looking back Mother Porks, back

# 5 YEARS AGO

"We did not start playing until we were two down" was Glenn Hoddle's comment as Brentford became only the second First Division side to stop Glenn Hoddle's side scoring in the evening fixture at the County Ground. Shaun Taylor, who claimed to have heard a whistle, hesitated and Gary Blissett was able to score with a low shot in the 19th minute. Lee Luscombe made it two with a narrow angled shot 12 minutes later. Despite a much better second half performance, which saw Craig Maskell miss a penalty and Dave Mitchell have a goal disallowed for offside, that was the way the score stayed. Goals

by Ray Wilkins and Bradley Allen helped Queens Park Rangers to a 2-0 win over Aston Villa in their Premiership clash at Loftus Road. Rangers' striker Les Ferdinand was called into the England squad for the match against Turkey. Stoke City and former Town Manager, Lou Macari was cleared of running an illegal bookmakers.

# 10 YEARS AGO

Jimmy Quinn's 34th minute headed goal, a remarkable eighth goal in Town's Littlewoods Cup campaign in only the third round, cancelled out a Mark Morris goal to leave the scores level at the interval of a replay match at Vicarage Road. Sloppy defending in the second half saw the Town lose the chance of a trip to Maine Road and possible revenge on the team that had defeated them 4-3 at the County Ground just days


earlier. Hammond failed to hold a fierce drive by Gary Porter in the first minute of the second half and when Hodges' free kick curled into the Town net after 66 minutes, the tie looked over. Swindon fought back, reducing the deficit through Steve Foley in the 74th minute and might well have equalised had referee Gerald Ashby had a clearer view of Kenny Jackett's tackle on Dave Bamber. Sadly, three minutes from time Dave Hockaday was dispossessed

trying to start an attack and Malcolm Allan scored to make the scoreline more flattering than the Hornets really deserved. Despite the presence of David Seamen in goal and Alan McDonald at centre back, Rangers could only draw at home to Watford, a result that saw them drop to third position in the First Division. Terry Butcher became the fourth player to be charged by the police following incidents in the Rangers vs Celtic match.

# 15 YEARS AGO

Tranmere Rovers, managed by Bryan Hamilton, equalised twice but eventually went down 4-2 at the County Ground, a result that lifted Town up to fourth in Division Four. Town's goals included two penalties by Paul Rideout but the pick was Andy Rowland's magnificent lob over former Robin Scott Enderby in

the Tranmere goal. Terry
Venables' team earnt a point
from Rotherham. It was one of
85 points they gained in a
season which saw them finish as
Second Division Champions, ten
points clear of second placed
Wolverhampton. Tony Sealy with
16 goals was their
leading scorer.



# FLASH-BACK

It was 24th November 1993 when Swindon managed to register their first ever Premiership victory. It came at the 16th attempt. With Les Ferdinand already looking dangerous, Queens Park Rangers must have thought it was their night when Town were reduced

to ten men. Whether referee Gerald Ashby understood Dutch or Luc Nijholt slipped into Anglo Saxon the Town midfielder found himself sent off for foul and abusive language after questioning the award of a free kick. Having only ten men seemed to lift the pressure from Town. The only goal came after 37 minutes when Andy Mutch

headed down a Paul Bodin cross to Keith Scott who made it two goals in two games since joining Town from Wycombe Wanderers. After this Swindon played sensible possession football.

Adrian Whitbread and Shaun Taylor were outstanding in defence and Town clung on for an historic win.

On a more positive note trialists Justice Muze and Alex Masson both gave good performances.




out of nothing.....so far it's only us chasing Nottingham Forest.

All the games were entertaining to watch with goals flying in all over the place.





# from the OICSS OOX by Chris Scott

I suppose if there is one subject likely to unite all football fans, it's referee's decisions and the way their favourite team has suffered because of them. It's always been that way, at least it used to be until referees decisions started to be overturned by officials watching videos.

Football is not always known for keeping up to date but the coming of Sky TV in particular has highlighted too many dodgy decisions, given in good faith by referees at the time, only to find later that the ball did or didn't cross the line, the scorer was or was not offside, the foul by the defender was or wasn't inside the box and so on. How many players are sent off only for the referee to change his mind a few days later because the replay found him out. A recorded caution rather than a sending off doesn't help the team who lost a player for the rest of the game because of the officials genuine mistake. With a third official controversial incidents can be replayed a split second after they happen and the facts are then available for a correct decision to be made. The official in charge can still use his judgment to decide, but at least he can have the facts for really important incidents which vitally affect the course of the game. The argument that "it's bound to be right because the ref gave it" doesn't stand up now because decisions are changed after the game.!! And any hope that the unwritten law 18 "use common sense" can help has been submerged under explicit instruction from above.

We do expect a lot from our referees. David Ellery said

recently "They are after all only human beings". I am asking the question Do we really expect too much? Surely we ought to give every possible help now that refs are expected to clones of the FIFA manual. I am very sorry to see that personality in a referee seems to be discouraged, a smile a joke, the right word which calms a potentially nasty situation seems to be exchanged for a yellow or red card. Gone forever, it seems, are the styles of such as Jack Taylor, Clive Thomas and for anyone as old as me, Mervyn Griffiths. Wouldn't it be better to give the referee some help at the time with a third official (or should it be assistant these days) up in the stand equipped with video replay equipment to adjudicate quickly and accurately on difficult decisions? This works well in cricket, it could work just as well in our sport.

How referees are selected is too big a question to go into here, perhaps another time but should there not be some "Fast track" promotion for those who are likely to make it to the top? Experience is also a big factor but just as important is the ability to handle people. Like a player, class and ability in a referee can be spotted very early. Can the game get some weight behind training players in top football to become referees well before they finish playing and then promote the good ones quickly? Why not publish referees markings, better still why not get the customers involved in some way in marking them? With an assessor sat in the stand you get just one man's opinion. It's all very well for top refs and players to deplore the abuse heaped on officials but how much has been

done to remove the reasons. I'm on the refs and players side, as well as the fans side - surely they all want the same thing- correct decisions. Referees are daily subjected to verbal abuse from many sections of the game, wouldn't it be better to get rid of some of the reasons why mistakes are made. Football does itself no favours by refusing to face up to this problem and its responsibilities in this area. The cash is there to at least try to improve the standards. How about trying the sin bin for a season to see if it would work? There is no compassion shown to the player who loses form and I can see no reason why referees should not be dropped if they fall below an acceptable standard. After all refereeing is only a lucrative hobby to our officials. Should we have full time officials? That's altogether a different debate for another time. Just a final thought. What would managers talk about and journalists write about after the game if we didn't have so many questionable decisions? More on the game maybe? More about the players? Oh! Of course we could go back to the old fashioned way of accepting decisions come what may and forgetting about videos and reversing decisions.








Football has been seeing red again following two controversial refereeing decisions last week which resulted in players being dismissed from the field.

The fact that the most prominence has been given to the least significant of the two incidents merely reflects the media's total obsession with Premiership football at the expense of the Nationwide Football League. For while a few photographs described the background to the sending-off of **Nottingham Forest** goalkeeper Dave Beasant, full pages were devoted to the hands on incident which resulted in Paul Durkin red carding Arsenal's French midfield player

Let's take the Arsenal man first. He was dismissed for putting both hands on the referee's chest when disputing a decision. I watched the game live on TV and have no argument with the referee's action. Durkin believes he was manhandled and so he was.

Emmanuel Petit.

Sky TV pundit Andy Gray has led the protest claiming that referees today have lost their common sense. He tried to suggest on air that Petit only put his hands on the match official to stop the referee running into him and added to his argument by showing an earlier incident in the same game when another Arsenal player grabbed Mr Durkin's shoulder from behind.

The fact that you can cite another example of a blatant

disregard for the rules clearly does not make the subsequent indiscretion legal. The player physically assaulted the referee and to my mind got his just desert.

Mr Durkin made the point that he stood by his decision. He claimed: "It goes beyond what he did to me. The other 30,000 referees in this country look up to referees in the Premier League for guidance. If we allow people to get away with the man handling of officials then it sets a president for the rest of football".

The Petit sending-off was in the 83rd minute of Arsenal's goalless draw with Aston Villa and had no bearing on the final outcome at all. But Beasant's early bath cost Nottingham Forest two points which at the end of the season could be the difference between Premiership and Nationwide Football League football.

Forest were comfortably leading 2-0 and looking hungry for more goals when Reading's Martin Williams found himself in a one on one with Beasant. The keeper rushed out to challenge and Williams lost

control of the ball, the goalkeeper turned away to try and avoid contact with the attacker. But Williams ran into him and actually stood on his foot

goalke away avoid the a Willia him an stood on h as they met.

A good point and one that will be supported by all those brave fellows who take up the whistle on a Sunday morning on the fields around Wiltshire, and way beyond. If the FA was seen to be week in this instance it would take all the authority away from local association when dealing with similar disciplinary cases.

A very important point then in regard to the game as a whole, but back to the issue concerning Forest custodian David Beasant. Why I suggest that his demise is more significant is twofold. Firstly he was clearly not guilty of committing a foul, a matter which has now been accepted by the referee John Brandwood. Secondly the referee's action totally changed the course of the game and virtually handed Reading a point, they never looked capable of winning.

Mr Brandwood saw it as a professional foul, sent Beasant off, and handed Reading a lifeline from the penalty spot. Centre-half Steve Chettle took over the gloves and conceded the penalty and two other goals in a 3-3 draw.

It was compelling viewing I must admit but hardly justice on the day. The referee's reversal on reviewing the incident on video means the slate is wiped clean for the former England goalkeeper who had never been sent-off before. He will not be suspended which is good and just but it still does not bring Forest back the two points that they lost.

They could be so significant next May when the final reckoning comes. If Forest miss out by two points or less you can bet they will not be sending John Brandwood a Christmas Card. But we just might!

Our meeting with *QPR* is probably the more enticing as it features two clubs with Premiership ambitions and thus the result will be significant to the top of the table positions. The *Middlesbrough Portsmouth* game on the other hand combines the elements of promotion and relegation.

Let us look at this game. Middlesbrough, relegated from the Premiership last season after investing millions in foreign players, against Portsmouth, managed by our former defender Terry Fenwick and fast establishing itself as a nursery for Australian youngsters.

Boro of course have now parted company with Italian striker Ravanelli, who really took them for a ride, and perhaps the most outstanding individual in the Premiership last season, the Brazilian Juninho. But with coffers seemingly bulging to the hilt they invested heavily on replacing them with Arsenal's Paul Merson and Aston Villa's midfield general Andy Townsend the principle replacements.

If money is the root of success in this business then *Middlesbrough* must reap the reward of promotion; and quite honestly they would seem to be the best equipped club to acheive this end. But as we know big money has not always brought big rewards in football, though it does obviously help.

Despite their pedigree it has been far from a smooth start for Middlesbrough and inevitably, as it seems is now common practice, when results are not favourable, the media began to spread rumours of discontent in the Cellnet Riverside camp. Merson was reported to be disillusioned and anxious to return south. Emerson too, it was suggested, was about to get on his bike again.

The Brazilian midfielder has been the subject of a £4 million bid from *Benfica*, and that is something manager Bryan Robson obviously has to mull remember chatting with Lennie Lawrence who was then the manager at Ayresome Park. His Boro side were a little off the pace for promotion from the old Second Division, and he was bemoaning the fact that no one else in the Division could compete with Blackburn Rovers. He accused them of buying promotion on the back of Jack Walker's millions.



As for *Pompey*, they are seemingly at the other end of the financial scale in keeping with the majority of clubs in the Nationwide Football League.

Trying to follow in the footsteps of your big brother can often prove to be a daunting task - but Craig Taylor is most certainly taking it in his stride!

Craig, the younger brother of former Town defender Shaun, has already made quite an impact at the County Ground and few will forget his dream debut against Port Vale when he marked his first senior game for Swindon with a stunning long range goal.

"It is always nice to score but to hit the net from 35 yards on my debut was tremendous. I should have scored with a header in the next game so two goals in two games would have been nice but I was pleased to get off the mark."

he commented.

But Craig wasn't brought in from non league Dorchester for £25,000 to score goals, he was signed to help shore up the defence and if his performances so far are anything to go by then the Plymouth born defender has done exactly that.

"I'm a centre half and my main priority is to help keep the goals out but I like to go up for corners and set pieces and if I can score five or six goals this season then that will be a big help to the team."

It's early days in Craig's
Swindon Town career but he's
delighted with the way things
are going for him. However it
hasn't all been plain sailing and
he suffered a major blow just
before the start of the season.

"Everything was looking good during the pre-season friendlies. I was playing well and thought I stood a chance of starting the campaign in the team but when we were playing against my former club Dorchester, I felt a bit of a twinge in my groin.

"I went to see the specialist and I was told I had a hernia which meant I was out for the first four weeks of the season.

"It took me a few weeks to regain my fitness and I played a couple of Reserve games, then suddenly I was called up into the first team to face Port Vale."

With the likes of Mark
Seagraves, Mark Robinson and
lan Culverhouse all out injured
and loan signing Chris Casper
missing with a chest infection,
Craig was told he would be
starting against Port Vale which
came as something of a surprise.

"To be honest I probably came back a couple of games earlier than I should have done. Obviously I wanted to play but I think the Gaffer wanted me to get a few more Reserve team games under my belt but in the end he had no choice but to put me in and since then everything seems to have slotted into place for me."

"Obviously we have had a lot of injuries of late, particularly in defence but I feel that the way I have been playing, I've been doing enough to stay in the team and hopefully, even when everyone else is fit, I will keep my place."

Craig has already shown that he has got all the attributes which make up a good

defender and Steve McMahon believes he has the potential to be an even better player than his older brother.

Like his brother, Craig is dominant in the air but he is also pretty useful with the ball at his feet and isn't afraid to get stuck in where it hurts.

It all sounds pretty familiar to Town fans who worshiped Shaun during his time at the County Ground but Craig doesn't really like to compare himself to his brother.

"People always ask me if I'm similar to Shaun and I don't really like to make a comparison. But I suppose it is inevitable because we both play in the same position.

"We're both pretty good in the air although I would say that Shaun is probably a bit better in that department than me.

"Yes we are similar in some aspects but in others we are very different." he added.

But Craig is the first to admit that Shaun has had a big influence on his career.

"I talk to him after every game I play and he tells me how he is doing as well. I see him nearly every day and it is good to be able to speak to someone who has got so much experience in the game."

Craig has played against his brother once while Shaun was at Swindon and Craig was playing for Exeter but they have never been in the same team.

"It's quite strange really because when I joined Exeter as a YTS player he left and then when I came to Swindon he had moved on so we've never had the chance to play in the Nationwide (

same team or even train together."

So while Shaun is reaching the twilight of his marvellous career, Craig is just beginning to catch the eye after spells at Exeter, Crewe (on loan), Bath City and Dorchester Town.

He admits it has been tough adjusting to playing in Division One and there were a few who thought he would be out of his depth - but Craig is proving those doubters wrong. And he feels he can play at an even higher level.

"You have to believe that you can play at a higher level and I think I can, hopefully with Swindon Town." he said.
