It's certainly nice to be back at Edgeley Park having completed two of our longest trips in the last four days. Both of our performances at Ipswich and Reading were very good but obviously the result at Reading wasn't and indeed was scant reward for the way we played. The Ipswich trip is not one that any player looked forward to. It's an awkward place to get to, but despite the journey we started brightly and got better - so much so I felt we controlled the game from near enough the start to the finish, we were well worthy of our 2-0 win and we could possibly have extended the scoreline.

I thought we produced a similar performance at Reading but a combination of slack finishing, the quality of our final ball and the performance of the officials meant we came away with nothing to show for our

efforts.

We need to start contributing with goals from other sources other than our two centre forwards in order to turn the pressure we are creating into goals. At the moment we're relying too heavily on Brett and Alun to be our goal scorers and there needs to be more willingness from others to get into goalscoring positions and have the moral courage

to chance their arm in front of goal. On the injury front Colin Woodthorpe has a back strain but he is suspended so that isn't too much of a problem at present.

Once again, I would like to personally thank any of our supporters who made either of the two long journeys. If anyone made both then your dedication and commitment to the club is greatly admired and much appreciated. Our home form to date has been good and this is in no small way due to the supporters who have played their part. This was something that we knew would be vital to us this season, hence my appeal to you before a ball had been kicked at home and I reiterate those sentiments that we need your continued participation in all our games to come.

Today we face the Division leaders Swindon in what will undoubtedly be another tough match. We will approach it as we have done all the others and hopefully achieve the desired result.



The World Cup 2006

The Football Association launched its bid to host the 2006 World Cup last week with an impressive promotional brochure outlining the reasons why it just has to be England. The highly colourful and extremely professional brochure opens with a personal message from the Prime Minister Tony Blair who gives his wholehearted support saying "I believe that our country has the vision, the enthusiasm and the commitment to host an excellent World Cup in 2006. The carnival atmosphere of Euro 96, I feel sure, has amply demonstrated our passion for football and our capacity for friendship and organisation. Our commitment to sport is unrivalled. Since 1990 we have invested, as a nation, over £1.8 billion in facilities with a host of bold initiatives still to come. The Government therefore supports England's World Cup bid wholeheartedly." Mr Blair is not the only big name to appear in the promotional literature with the likes of Tony Banks, Lennart Johansson and Arsene Wenger also offering favourable comments alongside the expected faces of Bobby Charlton, Gary Lineker and Geoff Hurst

Excellence

We do of course have a great case for hosting the World Cup, having already revealed our excellence at staging such events during Euro 96. Some of the statistics from the European championships a little over a year ago are staggering. Did you know for example that 1,279,371 spectators


attended Euro 96 - a record for the tournament.

 6.68 billion viewers in 192 countries watched on TV (+6.5% increase over '92)

* Euro 96 yielded a record profit of £69 million

* 250,000 foreign fans arrived in England for the tournament

However one of the most important features of Euro 96 was the fact that, despite media fears, there was not one serious outbreak of crowd violence. The tournament staged so superbly by the English promoted the following comment from UEFA President Lennart Johansson "From every point of view this was the best European Championship ever. England proved that football can do it."





Even that hard to please footballing maestro Eric Cantona had nothing but praise for English football - in his own inimitable style he said "Everything is beautiful about English football. The stadiums are beautiful, the atmosphere is beautiful - even the cops on horseback are beautiful."

It is this interest and admiration for the sport in this country, coupled with the recent investment in English football that has seen the English football league go from strength to strength to such an extent that

- *Aggregate attendances at league games have risen in ten of the last eleven seasons since
- *Nearly 23 million people attended last season the highest since 1979-80.
- *18 English clubs are now listed on the London stock markets.
- *133 foreign players representing 37 countries play in the Premier League alone.

 The appeal of football in this country is worldwide and it remains every players dream to play at Wembley a stadium described by Pele, as the church of football, the capital of football and the heart of football. It is of course well known that the old lady of football stadia has seen better days, but £200 million plus has been committed to the lavish remodelling of the stadium to turn in into an 80,000 seat venue of legends whilst retaining its historical and indeed beautiful character.

SWINDON ARE FLYING MIGH



High flying Swindon Town arrive at Edgeley Park this afternoon in the middle of an excellent run of form which has propelled them to the top of Division One. The Robins have been a real surprise package this term and Manager Steve McMahon must be absolutely delighted with the way his team have coped with only their second season back in Division One.

Last season proved to be a time for consolidation after

following the departure of Wayne Allison to his home town club of Huddersfield, he will be looking to become a permanent fixture in the first team.


winning the Second Division championship in 1996. Steve McMahon has kept faith with many of the



players who brought the Wiltshire club their success, and they've rewarded him this season with some excellent performances. However, the player who's grabbed most of the headlines this season is one of their most recent acquisitions, Chris Hay. Hay is a pacy young striker who was drafted in from Scottish giants Celtic a week before the new campaign started. He signed a three year contract and has already gone a long way to paying back the bargain looking £330,000 fee/ The 23 year old has scored 13

goals already this term and will be looking to add more to that tally this afternoon. He made a total of 20 first team appearances for Celtic but has only started to blossom since moving south and testing himself in the English First Division. He is likely to be partnered by former Aston Villa front man Steve Cowe who was originally introduced to Swindon on loan but has since put pen to paper to secure a permanent deal. He struck seven times in thirty two starts last term, but is looking to become more prolific. What he lacks in height, he more than makes up for with pace and skill, and

number one, Fraser Digby, suffered a training ground injury which has kept him ruled out for a couple of weeks, and usual reserve

as McMahon has managed to sign Liverpool's **Tony Warner** as a temporary replacement.

EXPERIENCE

At the back Swindon can count on a highly experienced line up. Brian Borrows, Ian Culverhouse and Alan McDonald have all played in the Premier

League for Coventry, Norwich and Q.P.R.

respectively. Culverhouse was the first to arrive for a tribunal set fee of £250,000 in December 1994 following nine extremely successful seasons with Norwich City. The cultured defender began his career at Spurs and can play in either full-back position, or as a sweeper. Borrows prefers to play in the right back slot and is another player who likes to put his foot on the ball. He has spent most of his career at Coventry but





agreed to join Swindon in the summer after successfully helping the Sky Blues to stay in the Premier League last season. Another one club man is Alan McDonald who made his first ever move during the summer and signed a two year deal for Swindon. He is a highly committed defender who has a wealth of experience and also over

MARAUDING

Ty Gooden was signed by former manager John Gorman in

1993 and quickly became a huge hit with the fans who appreciate his marauding runs down the left hand side. He made over 30 appearances in Swindon's championship season after being released by Wycombe Wanderers. Gooden is provided with service by Swindon's highly talented ex Newcastle and Watford man Jason Drysdale. A number of injuries have limited his appearances in a Swindon shirt although he appears to be over the worst, and is now looking forward to a settled place in the first team.

Midfield player **Kevin Watson** came through Tottenham's junior ranks and made 12 first team appearances under Terry Venables before being loaned out to Bristol City and Barnet. He arrived at the County Ground on a free last summer and made 18 starts in Division One.

THE TREE

50 international caps to his name.

Filling the other defensive position will probably be **Craig Taylor** who is the younger brother of former Town favourite
Shaun. Craig signed a three year contract last April after
impressing during a trial period. The Robins paid non-league
Dorchester Town £25,000 for his services and Manager Steve
McMahon believes Craig has the potential to be even better
than his older brother.

LINKED

Stockport County, of course were linked very strongly with Swindon's midfield battler **Darren Bullock**. The tough tackling former Huddersfield man signed a three and a half year contract in February but has found it difficult to settle and was rumoured to be coming to Edgeley Park in July. Bullock is currently sidelined through injury and his anchorman role in midfield has gone to **Scott Leitch** who signed for a bargain fee of £15,000 last summer. Leitch is a former Hearts, Dunfermerline and Motherwell player who enjoyed a successful loan spell as Swindon coasted to the Second Division title and was delighted to make a permanent move down south.

ADMIRED

Swindon are to be admired for holding on to their league form despite being plagued by a number of injuries. A notable example of this is Mark Walters who on his day is one of the most talented wingers around. He has enjoyed successful spells at Aston Villa, Rangers, Liverpool and Southampton before joining Swindon on a free transfer last summer. Also struggling with injury is the gifted Frenchman Philippe Cuervo who impressed manager Steve McMahon during a trial period at the County Ground and signed a three year

contract just prior to the new season starting. Both club captain Mark Seagraves who, of course, used to play at Manchester City and Bolton Wanderers, and former record signing Mark Robinson are also sidelined through injury. Also in contention for a place in the starting line up today are Gary Elkins, Michael Pattimore and Peter Holcroft.

McMAHON'S MISSION

Steve has eyes on promotion prize

Steve McMahon brings his team to Edgeley Park this afternoon hoping to add to his advantage at the top of the table. After arriving at the County ground in November 1994 and suffering the humiliation of relegation in his first season, McMahon is anxious to be as successful as possible with his Swindon team.

As a player, he collected almost every honour

As a player, he collected almost every honour available in the game for both Club and Country. He began his career at Everton scoring 11 goals in 100 games for the Goodison Park outfit before a £175,000 move took him to Aston Villa. He enjoyed his spell at Villa until newly installed Liverpool player-manager Kenny Dalglish took him to Anfield for £375,000 in 1986. It was during this spell in his career that McMahon emerged as a midfield general of the highest quality, bagging League and FA Cup winners medals galore during the glory years at Anfield. He also gained international

recognition collecting 17 full England caps and was a member of the England squad which won its way through to the semifinals of the 1990 World Cup Finals in Italy.

At Christmas time in 1991, Steve completed a shock £900,000 move to Manchester City where he continued to perform at the highest level until being allowed to leave and become player-manager at Swindon Town in November 1994.

Swindon were in a state of decline when he arrived and he was unable to arrest the slide sufficiently for them to avoid relegation to Division Two. However, in his first full season in charge he led Swindon to the Second Division Championship in fine style, making 21 appearances along the way despite a series of injuries.

Last season he had his work cut out as cynical observers suggested that the Robins were amongst the favourites for the drop. His side held firm though and consolidated which has given the launching pad for this seasons promotion push.

THE ROBINS - HISTORICALLY

Swindon Town FC was founded in 1881 by Reverend William Pitt as a result of a merger between two teams from the old and new areas of the town. There were signs of success even in the early years, as the club won the Wiltshire Senior Cup from it's inception in 1887 and retained it for the next six years.

Swindon suffered a disappointing spell at the turn of the century but improved between 1908 and 1914 whilst under the watchful guidance of manager Sam Allen. They were inspired by such players as Harold Fleming and Jock Walker and failed to finish lower than Fourth in the Southern League. The Robins were crowned as Champions twice and runners-up three times. The 1909/10 season saw Crystal Palace, Tottenham and Manchester City beaten at Town went marching on to the FA Cup semi-finals where they lost to eventual cup winners Newcastle United 2-0. The following season saw Swindon win their first Championship but when they played Manchester United for the Charity Shield, they lost 8-4!

1926 saw the arrival of David Hyman Morris at Swindon for £110 and it proved to be a bargain as over the next seven years, "Harry" as he was known, set many goalscoring records which still stand today. The Second World War had a major effect on football in this country, although Swindon managed to prosper by paying players on an appearance basis only, and therefore dramatically reduced the wage bill. Things took a turn for the worse after the war and didn't improve until Swindon's golden era in 1969. Town just missed out on promotion as Champions by goal difference but, of course, the highlights for the Swindon faithful was the visit to the twin towers of Wembley to see their side beat Arsenal 3-1 after extra time.

The 1969/70 season brought more silverware as the club won both the Anglo-Italian Cup and the Anglo-

Italian Cup winners cup, beating Roma and Napoli respectively. Swindon also reached the sixth round of the FA Cup and finished fifth in the Second Division - the best position the club had achieved to that point. However, the clubs fortunes declined again, and by the early 1980's, Swindon were languishing in the Fourth Division. Lou Macari became the club's new manager and after a shaky start in 1984/85 which saw him sacked for nine days, before he was reinstated, his belief in fitness and a direct game plan paid off as Swindon were crowned champions with a record 102 points. The following season saw promotion achieved again as Gillingham were defeated in the play-offs. In 1990 the team, now being managed by Ossie Ardiles, beat Sunderland at Wembley in the play-offs to gain promotion to the First Division but players and fans

beat Sunderland at Wembley in the play-offs to gain promotion to the First Division but players and fans alike were dismayed when the Football League decided to demote the Robins two Divisions for financial irregularities. On appeal, the decision was changed to a drop of one Division and Sunderland took Town's place in the top flight.

However, in 1993 with Glenn Hoddle in charge, Swindon grabbed a place in the Premiership by beating Leicester City 4-3 in a nail biting play-off final at Wembley. This was followed by two disappointing campaigns which saw the team suffer successive relegations from the Premiership to Division Two. The yo-yo effect was now clearly a feature of virtually every campaign and was evident again in 1995/96 as the club climbed back to the First Division as runaway champions of Division Two, under the guidance of Steve McMahon.

Last season proved to be one of consolidation for the Robins although they did show some promising signs, and have built on those to provide them with a platform on which to build this seasons promotion challenge.

This afternoon we welcome high flying Swindon Town to Edgeley Park for what promises to be a highly competitive encounter.

It would be fair to say that the Robins' start to the season was not wholly anticipated, following their nineteenth position finish last season. Whilst clearly Steve McMahon has moulded a fine squad of players, man of the moment is certainly Chris Hay whose tally of twelve goals this season (nine in the last eight games) represents over half of Town's total tally of 23 league strikes.

The County ground has certainly been home sweet home for Swindon this season. Like County they have not yet tasted home league defeat recording seven wins against:- Crewe (2-0), Tranmere (2-1), Port Vale (4-2), Bury (3-1), Norwich (1-0), Q.P.R. (3-1) and last Saturday against Bradford when Steve Cowe in the side in place of the injured Wayne Allison scored the only goal of the game with a curling left foot shot past Gary Walsh. Their other two home fixtures saw draws against Huddersfield (1-1) and Nottingham Forest (0-0).

Two of their three away wins came in their first two away fixtures with maximum three point hauls gained at Reading (1-0) and

Stoke (2-1) - this was the first league game played at the Potters Brittania Stadium. They had to wait until the last day of October to record their other away win gaining a hard fought 1-0 success at Portsmouth, man on target needless to say being the ubiquitous Chris Hay.

The period between these wins saw five away fixtures with just two points picked up with a brace of goalless draws at West Bromwich Albion and Sunderland. Their three defeats have come at Ipswich (1-2), Wolves (1-3) and at Maine Road where struggling City had an all too rare success hitting six goals without reply.

The Coca Cola Cup saw Swindon able to concentrate on the league at an early stage with a first round exit at the hands of Watford. A 2-0 first leg home defeat was always going to be difficult to overcome and so it proved, the second leg ending up 1-1 at Vicarage Road.

WINTER SUN SAFETY

Are you planning to escape part, or even all of the approaching British winter? If the answer is yes, then you need to think about skin care during your holiday.

Going skiing?

The combination of high altitudes, bright sun and crisp mountain air can catch even the most seasoned skiers and snowboarders unawares.

Too much exposure to ultraviolet rays can cause sunburn and may lead to skin cancer.

Don't forget that snow reflects sunlight back onto the body, increasing the amount of UVB rays reaching exposed skin. While sand only reflects about 17% of UVB back on to the body, freshly fallen snow can increase the amount of UVB reaching the skin by 85% Up to 80% of the sun's rays can penetrate through light cloud, fog and mist, so don't be fooled by an overcast day.

Protecting yourself from the sun whilst on the slopes is easy and doesn't have to be expensive. Make sure to protect the vulnerable parts of your body which are the face and neck, especially the tips of the ears, nose and lips. The best way to protect yourself is to:

*Wear goggles or sunglasses with UVA and UVB filters to protect your eyes. Look out for those labelled with the British Standard BS2724:1987 as these will give good protection.

*Wear a ski hat with ear muffs, a scarf or high collar to help protect the head and neck. *Apply a high factor sunscreen or sunblock to all exposed skin, including the face, neck,

ears and lips. Look for a sunscreen with a protection factor (SPF) of at least 15.


If you find that you do suffer from sunburn apply after-sun cream. It will help counteract the drying effect, especially from wind burn, although it won't repair any skin that is seriously damaged from the sun.

Going for warmth and relaxation? Then you need to remember to follow the basic sun safety guidelines that apply during our summertime. They are:

- *Take care not to burn.
- *Seek the shade during the hottest part of the day, usually 11am 3pm.
- *Cover up with a T shirt and a wide brimmed hat.
- *Use a suncream with a SPF of 15 or more.

Finally, if like most of us you'll be staying at home for the duration then wrap up warmly and look forward to an early

Spring!



PLAY FOR US ...?

In the years prior to Brendan Elwood's chairmanship, Edgeley Park was occasionally graced by former "big name" players seeing out their playing careers in the lower divisions. One such County signing was former England international Mike Summerbee...Phil Brennan takes a look at his career.

Mike Summerbee was born in Preston in December 1942, his father George had been a player in Preston North End's prewar side. The family moved to Cheltenham when Mike was six years old, when his father became manager of the town's non-league team. On leaving school Mike had a trial at Bristol City but soon became homesick and returned home where he started as an office junior at an aircraft factory, continuing to play football locally he was soon spotted by Swindon Town's chief scout Cecil Green. Soon after signing professional terms Mike made his first team debut still aged only sixteen during the 1959/60 season, in-

which he made fifteen appearances scoring his first ever league goal. Mike became a regular in the Robins line up over the next couple of seasons, whilst earning himself some extra money during the closed season working a grave digger with his flat mate Ernie Hunt. Mike was an integral part of the Swindon Town team to get promoted as the Robins finished runners up in the Third Division in 1962/63. The clubs stay in the Second Division was to be short lived, as they were relegated at the end of the 1964/65 season, although this was to be Mike's best season for the club as he scored thirteen goals in forty one appearances, including a brilliant individual performance at Maine Road capped with one of the goals in the Robins 2-1 victory.

Outstanding

Mike's outstanding performances had been noticed by several leading clubs and Swindon were aware that the twenty two year old forward was destined for bigger things and indeed had already turned down a £12,000 bid for Tottenham Hotspur before accepting a bid of £35,000 during the summer of 1965 from Manchester City.

Mike quickly became a favourite with the Maine Road fans with his obvious talent and his ability to create chances for his fellow forwards. He was also never afraid to "get stuck in" which as a forward endeared him to the City faithful. The club lost just five games that season (1965/66). with Mike an everpresent, on their way to clinching the Second Division championship. The following season required a period of settling in as the new boys acclimatised to the First Division with their new signings Colin Bell, Tony Book and Francis Lee, whilst their neighbours from across the

city were chalking up their second championship in three seasons. The following season (1967/68) City suddenly appeared to find their feet as their self belief instilled by Joe Mercer and Malcolm Allison became more evident, the season built to a fitting climax as the Blues had to win away at Newcastle United to be sure of pipping Manchester United to the title, with the game only ten minutes old Mike (who had been a prematch injury doubt) settled any early nerves with a clever goal, and although the Geordies made City fight all the way, the championship went to Maine Road courtesy of a 4-3 victory. The season spent defending their title was a disappointment for all concerned, and although Mike earned personal recognition with his first England appearances for the games at Wembley against Spain (1-1) and West Germany in Hanover (0-1), the citizens struggled in the league. However, the obvious talent of the squad was evident as the Blues reached the FA. Cup Final against Leicester City and Mike made his mark on the game by creating the only goal for Neil Young as the Cup went to Maine Road.

The 1969/70 season saw City advancing on two Cup fronts, in the League Cup, and the European Cup Winners Cup. City returned to Wembley in the League Cup for the final against West Bromwich Albion, a game played on a pitch ruined by heavy snow and the recent Horse of the Year Show, and even though City won the Cup in extra time (2-1), the heavy pitch was a telling factor as the ball stock in the mud and Mike came out of a tackle with Ray Wilson with a hairline fracture of his leg. During his comeback Mike took a knock on the same leg in a league game against Sheffield United a couple of days before the European Cup Winners Cup Final forced him to miss the victory against Gornik, although his ever-

him a winners medal. Mike was one of the players put on standby for England's World Cup squad for the Mexico World Cup in 1970 and although he didn't get the chance to play in the tournament, he made his third England appearance against Switzerland the following year at Wembley and scored his

only international goal in a 1-1 draw. In total Mike made eight full appearances for his country, three more came in 1972 against West Germany, Wales and Northern Ireland.

This was also the season that City were top of the First Division but only won three of their last eight games to hand the title to Derby County. His final cap came in 1973 when he came on as a substitute in Moscow against Russia as England won 2-1.

Mike's days at Maine Road appeared to be numbered with the appointment of Ron Saunders and although the club reached another League Cup Final in 1974, where they were beaten by Wolverhampton Wanderers, Mike was destined to leave the club which he duly did in the summer of 1975, having made over four hundred appearances scoring sixty seven goals for City Mike joined Burnley for a fee of £25,000.

Unfortunately for Mike the Clarets were relegated at the end of his first season, and although he enjoyed his spell at Turf Moor, making fifty one appearances without scoring, he was transferred to Blackpool in December 1976. Mike only made three appearances for the Seasiders in his time at Bloomfield Road and during the closed season he signed for Stockport County (August 1977).

Mike's first appearances for County came in the seasons opening fixture at Edgeley Park against Watford, he scored his first goal for the club and his first for over two years in a defeat at Aldershot, in total, Mike scored four goals that season all of which came in away fixtures, the teams fortunes had started to fade and following three defeats (two at home) player/manager Allan Thompson was relieved of his management duties.

The chance to become County's sixteenth manager since the war was offered to Mike in March 1978, a challenge he accepted, although there was to be no marked improvement with the team winning only three more games to the end of the season. The 1978/79 season started reasonably well in both the League and League Cup culminating in a return to Old Trafford for Mike as his new charges were drawn against Manchester United in the League Cup, a night that will be forever remembered for the poor refereeing that turned a likely County victory into an injury time defeat, with Mike taking his team on a well deserved lap of honour. Later that season Mike scored his first goal at Edgeley Park in a victory over Portsmouth. Unfortunately the Hatters won only six more games that season to finish a disappointing seventeenth in the table.

Resigned

The following season (1979/80) saw Mike play in twelve of the opening thirteen fixtures scoring what was to be his last ever league goal in the draw with Darlington at Edgeley Park (1-1) and six games later, following a heavy defeat at Bradford City (1-6), Mike Summerbee resigned as manager (his place to be taken by former County player Jimmy McGuigan), Mike didn't play for the club again and retired from football, having mide over

eight hundred appearances and scoring over a hundred goals to concentrate on his growing shirt manufacturing business. Following his retirement Mike appeared in the prisoner of war movie "Escape To Victory" with Brazilian superstar Pele, Mike also became friends with Hollywood film stars Michael Caine and Sylvester Stallone who were the stars of the film. His involvement in football had become more or less non existent, (apart from watching his son Nicky, who like his father had started his career at Swindon Town before moving to Manchester City). until his great friend and former team mate Francis Lee ousted Peter Swales as Chairman at Maine Road and called for Mikes involvement to help bring back the glory days to Manchester City, a task that at present is proving to be harder than they could have imagined.

We have heard of many things over the years that have delayed a football match but there was a new one last week when a hedgehog delayed the start of the Selby Town v Curzon Ashton game. It certainly didn't give poor old Curzon any luck, they went down 5-2.

There was an unusual situation last week in the replay of the North West Counties League Cup tie between Maghull and Nantwich. Crystal Ball Clouds Over




Bod' on the Move



Gregory managed to equalise with a mere three minutes to play.

There are even more problems when you are trying to run girls' teams. With the lads there is not quite the same requirement for dressing rooms, toilets, etc. The lads will just get changed in the cars and nip into the bushes if necessary. You cannot really ask the girls to do the same. Add to this the fact that in the girls' leagues the opponents have usually travelled a fair distance and the requirement for decent facilities becomes even greater. Still it is all part of the fun and that is what playing football definitely is. 



Club Historian Richard Harnwell looks back down the years

1967-68

The Go-Go-Go County era masterminded by Chairman, Victor Bernard, entered a new testing phase with County taking their place in Division Three as the previous seasons champions of Division Four.

County unveiled the club's new 'County Arrow', a new train to escort fans to away games in time for the new term, but its first journey in the club's eagerly awaited first game of the season, saw a disappointing start with a 0-3 reverse at Reading.

Six days later, over 9,000 turned up for the first home game of the season against Swindon Town.

Manager Jimmy Meadows replaced Jones and Stuart with Colin Parry and Johnny Price and the change worked as County scored twice through Keith East and Derek Kevan, without reply. The County team that day was:

Starting his first full season for County was striker, Bill-Atkins who was enjoying scoring for fun in the League Cup.

Atkins netted all four goals in the 1st round against Crewe which included a hat-trick in the replay at Edgeley Park. County were rewarded with a 2nd round tie at home to Sheffield Wednesday and despite scoring three times through Atkins, Kevan and East, County were eventually beaten 3-5.

Highly rated keeper Ken Mulhcarn had just one more league game to go - a 3-1 home win over Bournemouth - before a part exchange deal with Alan Ogley was agreed with Manchester City.

It was long before County paid Torquay United just £7,500 for the services of the exciting goal scoring talent of Jim Fryatt. Fryatt scored on his County debut, the first goal in a highly entertaining 4-3 win over Southport which earned an 'almost' unheard of -5 stars, from the match report from The Daily Express.

Had the clubs away form been better, County could well have made a serious late bid for promotion, but heavy defeats were the 'norm' during the season. In fact County conceded 17 goals in the final five games of the campaign

that saw the club defeated four times.

Swindon gained revenge over County in the return with a 2-0 win of their own just before Christmas.

The biggest embarrassment of the season came in the 1st Round of the F.A. Cup were they were drawn again local, non-league Macclesfield Town.

The 'Silkmen' earned a credible 1-1 draw at Edgeley Park with Bill Atkins scoring for County, but remained 2nd favourites for the replay. Derek Kevan scored, but was then sent off in the replay as Town progressed courtesy of a 2-1 victory.

In the end, County finished a disappointing 13th in the league after promising so much more. Despite this, County averaged over 8,000 crowds for the season and Jim Fryatt netted an incredible 22 times from just 32 league games. In the process, he became the first marksman to

break through the '20 barrier' since Jack Connor in 1955-56. Swindon failed little better and finished just two points higher than County, the season before their famous League Cup success at Wembley over Arsenal.



BILLY HAYDOCK

Defender Billy Haydock, pictured here as a part of Asa Hartford's backroom staff in the late 80s, played in every match of the 67-68 campaign.

It was the second successive season that Haydock had appeared in every game, having won a Fourth Division Championships medal the season before. His one goal this season came in a 4-2 home victory over Bury at Edgeley Park in late April.

Sandy McGregor reviews the latest 'County' book.

The popularity of books on football seems to have gone through the roof over the last few years. Probably five years ago the only books on football that you could get were player's ghosted biographies and the odd history of specific clubs. Nick Hornby was the first man to tap into the idea of football fans putting their opinions into print with the excellent 'Fever Pitch'. The idea that one man;'s obsession with Arsenal would make a best seller never seemed to occur to anyone before.

A number of fans have written about one season in their club's history. The finest of these to me is James Ferguson's The Black Diamonds and the Blue Brazil. For those of you who don't know the Blue Brazil are Cowdenbeath. Ferguson's book takes you through the worst season in the club's history. Following league reorganisation the Blue Brazil were way out of their

depth in the Scottish First Division and managed to go a whole season without a home league win. The tale of dismal performance after dismal performance is one that will strike a chord with County fans who have memories of the dark days of the seventies. Last season County fan Dave

Party, the excellent County fanzine. Dave planned to keep a diary of the season and write a book about the life of a lower division football fan. The book 'Saturday Night and Thursday Morning' has now been published. Little did Dave realise when he started out on his mission that he would end up going to sixty seven matches and seeing the most momentous (so far)

season in the club's history.

Ex-manager David Jones also had a book published about last season but Dave Espley's is a fans eye account of how it all looked. David Jones' book was ghost written by a journalist who rattled the book off in double quick time. I felt reading that book that it was quite likely that the guy who wrote the book had not been to a single game last season. It contained a number of factual errors which should never have made it through to the printers. It did strike me that Jonesy was cashing in.

As I said earlier Dave Espley's book is very much how the season looked if you were a supporter. As befits any serious football fans Dave has to base his work and social commitments around County. Unlike books written by players of managers this contains a lot of descriptions of the journeys to and from matches. If you go to every match in a season then you will almost inevitably more time travelling to matches than you will actually watching the matches themselves. There are enough tales of car, bus and train journeys to put Michael Palin to shame.

The description of the matches are pretty good as well. As someone who was at almost all the games that he describes I can vouch for the accuracy of them and also the way that he catches the mood of the moment. A couple of times I did spot factual errors but not as many to detract from the book. It is an entertaining read with a fair few laughs along the way.

What I did have problems with was how negative Dave was. He does have a lot of time for County fans and his descriptions of them lie somewhere between Desmond Morris and Johnny Morris. The Board of Edgeley Park also get a lot of criticism, given that they have been instrumental in getting the club from the foot of the Fourth Division to the First Division I would have thought that a bit of credit was due. Dave also finds time to have a go at the Police, the Stewards. the people who produce match programmes (close to the bone), the people who buy match programmes and the caterers. The only people that he has much good to say about are Alun Armstrong, Danny Bergara and Jarvis Cocker. It almost makes you think that Dave only comes along to County so that he can have a moan.







Cola heroics do have that


household appeal and they played with the same vigour, style and self belief that we all witnessed last term.


the net. Durkan then forced a save from Leigh Edwards with a shot from thirty yards after being put through by Kiko.






