





This afternoon we extend a very warm welcome to the players, supporters and staff of Stevenage Borough Football Club to the County Ground.

We hope you all enjoy your trip to Wiltshire and that you have a safe journey home after the match.

Borough come to town today as one of the leading lights in the GM Vauxhall Conference although they should perhaps by rights be a Football League club

Two seasons ago - in 1995/96 the Hertfordshire outfit were Champions of the Conference, which is generally seen as the 'Fourth Division' of the League. As Champions, they were automatically promoted. Right? that a non-League club's ground had to be up to certain standards way before the time they actually applied for election.

Stevenage failed to meet these exacting criteria, and were thus denied the elevation their efforts had earned. The only small consolation that the club can gain is that the subsequent court case did result in a slight relaxation of the Laws - some might say to make them fairer for the club seeking promotion.

But for all that, Stevenage have enjoyed a meteoric rise through to the pinnacle of the non-League pyramid. Formed as recently as 1976 - as simply Stevenage FC - the club are currently enjoying their fourth season in the semi-pro game's top flight.


The 'Borough' tag followed in 1980, when Stevenage moved to

After a promising start to life in the lower Leagues, things really started to happen in 1990/91, when the current manager Paul Fairclough was appointed - and from there the fairytale really began.

Having tasted the glory of winning the GMVC Championship in 1995/96, Borough faced the unenviable and ultimately unachievable task of trying to retain their title last season.

They come to the County Ground today having disposed of Carshalton (5-0 after a replay) and Cambridge United (2-1 after a replay) in the competition proper so far.

We can rest assured that Paul Fairclough's bright young side will be looking to add a further League scalp to their collection this afternoon.



## player profile The Boro Stevenson Borough



#### Des Gallagher

"Mr Stevenage', former England Semi-Professional international Des is fast approaching 300 senior appearances for Borough. Having begun with the Broadhall Way club, he returned in 1992/93, following a brief period on loan from Beazer Homes side Dunstable. A very popular player who has helped the club to much of its recent glory.

#### Richard Wilmot

A former Borough 'Player of the Year', Richard rejoined the Stevenage club in 1995/96 after a spell with near neighbours Hitchin Town. Having first played for the club in 1992, this highly-rated 'keeper left to join Scunthorpe United along with team-mate Neil Trebble during the 1992/93 campaign. He has also played for Halifax Town.



#### **Scott Cretton**

One of the longest serving players on the Borough staff, Scott has been with the club since first joining as a youth player more than seven years ago. The 1995/96 season was a particularly satisfying one for him, as he picked up no fewer than four winners' medals. In addition to his GMVC Championship-winning gong, Scott was also part of the Reserve side which won the Essex and Herts Border Combination as well as two cup

competitions. A bout of illness shortly before last season cost him his place in the side, and he has struggled for a regular berth ever since.

#### Steve Holden

Another England Semi-Pro international, Steve has tasted League football with Carlisle United and also played with Kettering and Rushden & Diamonds before moving to Stevenage.

#### Ryan Kirby

A former Arsenal apprentice, who also had experience with Doncaster Rovers, Ryan has proved to be a very popular addition to the Borough backline since signing from Northampton Town in December 1996.

#### Jamie March

Previously with Premiership Leicester City, Jamie is a young man with a bright future and has impressed the Stevenage staff since his move from Kettering Town during the summer of 1997.

#### Robert Marshall

Joined Stevenage in a swap deal during the summer of 1997, after an impressive season with Kettering Town. He began with Watford before beginning his non-League career at Harrow Borough.

#### Darren Rogers

A skilful left-sided defender Darren missed almost the whole of 1996/97 with Second Division Walsall thanks to a cruciate injury. Recovered in time to play in the final game of last season and after a handful of League and Coca-Cola Cup appearances this term, he moved to Broadhall Way in October. Hoping for a clean bill of health this year, he was also previously on the books at Birmingham City and West Brom.

#### Mark Smith

An England Semi-Pro international and Stevenage legend, Mark signed from Hitchin Town five seasons ago and is one of the most consistent and highly-rated players at the club and a previous 'Player of the Year'.

Mainly a defender, but versatile enough to fill in almost anywhere on the pitch including in goal.

#### Robin Trott

A young defender who gained League experience with Gillingham and was voted 'Player of the Year' at Welling United in 1996/97 before moving to Borough during the close season.

#### **Midfielders**

#### Stuart Beevor

At the time of writing, Stuart had found the net only once all season - but his solitary strike proved to be the 74th minute winner against Cambridge United in Round Two. Came of age in the GMVC Championship-winning side of 1995/96, and was awarded the 'Most Improved Player of the Year' title as a reward for his efforts. Having made his debut back in April 1993, he is fast



approaching 100 appearances for the club.

#### Neil Catlin

An attacking midfielder who is not afraid to have a go at goal, but has not been as prolific as he would like during Borough's disappointing League season so far. Reliable and consistent, he scored many important goals for the club last season, none more so than the winner in the FA Cup Second Round against Leyton Orient that set-up a glamour Third Round meeting with Birmingham City.

#### Darren Fenton

A hard-working player with a powerful shot, Darren was snapped up from Baldock Town after a brief pre-season trial at Broadhall Way.

#### Thomas Johansen

Like any self-respecting League club these days, Stevenage have an overseas star on their books. Thomas is a Norwegian midfielder who is studying at the University of Hertfordshire and who signed on at Broadhall Way in September 1997.

#### Steve Perkins

Signed for Borough after a successful trial period in October 1997 and has gone on to establish himself in the side as a goalscoring midfielder. Steve was previously with Plymouth Argyle, and scored one of Stevenage's goals in their 5-0 victory over Carshalton in the First Round Proper of this year's FA Cup.

#### Jason Soloman

Versatile midfielder who can play on either side of the park, Jason loves to push forward and help his strikers. A former England Youth international, he joined the club from Fulham in February 1996 and has also played for Watford, Peterborough and Wycombe Wanderers. He scored on his Borough debut, v Stalybridge Celtic last season.

#### **Forwards**

#### Gary Crawshaw

Among Borough's leading scorers this season - he had netted six at the time of writing - Gary joined the Stripes from Hendon in January 1994 and proceeded to score the goals which took the club to the Diadora League title that season. Previously with Staines Town, Gary left Borough for a whistle-stop world tour, but resigned with the Hertfordshire club when he returned to the country before the start of the 1996/97 campaign. He is Borough's penalty taker.

#### Tim Stevens

Current New Zealand international who played in several of his country's World Cup Qualifying games. Tim won the 1996/97 New Zealand League 'Player of the Year', 'Players' Player of the Year' and 'Golden Boot' awards before moving to Stevenage during the summer of 1997.

#### Paul Thompson

Highly-rated young striker who became Borough's record signing when he joined from Gateshead in the recent close season. Top scorer at Gateshead last term with 15 goals, he has - at the time of writing - yet to find the net for Stevenage. Previously with Hartlepool United.

#### Neil Trebble

A prolific scorer at non-League level. Neil is - at the time of writing - Borough's equal top hit-man in the League this season with five strikes to his credit. He announced his arrival on the scene at Stevenage by scoring on his competitive debut for the club - and then went two better by notching a hattrick in his first League game. Such exploits quickly got him noticed and, along with 'keeper Richard Wilmot - he signed for Football League club Scunthorpe in 1992/93. He also had pro experience with Preston and Scarborough before returning to Broadhall Way in March 1996.

#### Dean Wordsworth

A former Bromley and Crystal Palace striker who creates a lot of problems for opposing defences. Made a dream start to life in the Conference, scoring twice on his Borough debut, against Farnborough Town in November last year.



## Paul Fairdough

the manager

The architect who constructed the bandwagon on which Stevenage's fortunes have ridden since 1990/91, Paul Fairclough is a legend at Broadhall Way.

Now enjoying his eighth campaign at the Borough helm, Paul has taken the club from being an average non-League outfit to Champions of the Vauxhall Conference - the highest honour that semi-professional football in this country can offer.

Under his expert stewardship, Borough have catapulted up through the Diadora League, finishing as Champions of the Premier Division, and then launched an all-out assault on the Conference, culminating in that historic triumph but so cruelly denied League status.

Perhaps the most remarkable statistic is that during his first two years as boss at Stevenage, the club didn't lose a single home game - a run lasting a remarkable 44 matches, 42 of which were victories.

A Liverpudlian former schoolteacher, Paul was voted as 'Manager of the Year' in the GMVC in 1995/96.

Last season saw Fairclough lead the Broadhall Way outfit to the Semi-Final of the FA Trophy and the Third Round of the FA Cup (lost to Birmingham 2-0). They also finished third in the League table.




#### **15 YEARS AGO**

Bristol City's biggest crowd of the season turned up for the visit of Swindon in Division Four. Howard Pritchard's 64th minute header seemed to have

secured the points for Swindon but then all hell broke lose in the final minute. Alan Nicholls appeared to kick the ball out of Jimmy Allen's hands allowing Glyn Riley to tap the ball in. Incensed that the goal was allowed to stand, Town skipper Gary Emmanuel protested too

fiercely and was sent off. For Swindon, lying fourth after the match, it was to be the incident that started a spell which saw them slip down the table. Bishops Stortford drew 2-2 at Middlesbrough but lost the replay after going in front to two late goals by David Shearer. The other two non league teams in the third round, Weymouth and Worcester City, lost at Cambridge United and Coventry respectively. Arsenal threatened to ban TV cameras from

Highbury if football matches were televised live!



#### FLASH-BACK

Since joining the League in 1920 Swindon have been defeated in the FA Cup by non league opponents on five occasions.

Before the war they lost at Southall but the first time this happened in the post war era was in the 1953-4 season when Town were drawn to play Hastings United on their Pilots Field ground. A record crowd of 9,217, saw Hastings take the lead through an own goal after just two minutes. By half time they led 3-0 and although Ray Sampson scored his only Cup

goal for Swindon, a further goal made the final score 4-1 to the Southern League side. It was another Southern League side which accounted for Swindon in the First Round in 1961. After a 2-2 draw at the County Ground, Swindon travelled to Rockingham Road to face a Kettering side that featured former England and Portsmouth centre half Jack Froggatt. After a goalless first half, Sam Burton in the Town goal conceded a penalty which Curran converted. A further Curran goal and another by Ritchie took the

Poppies into Round Two. Swindon's only third Round defeat by non league opponents was at the hands of Tooting and Mitcham who beat them 2-1 in a replay in 1976. The only time that Swindon have lost to opponents from outside the League at the County Ground was in 1964 when Dagenham won a First Round replay. Alan Mayes gave Town the lead in the 20th minute but Alan Campbell equalised in the second half and Whitton scored an extra time winner for the Gola League side.






## JUNIOR ROBINS

#### Nothing compares with the stimulation the FA Cup gives our domestic game.

No matter who the protagonists, what stage of the competition, the tingle is still the same. It is the most thrilling knock-out sporting event in the world. It is common practice in this commercial world of ours for people in the game to suggest that the ultimate test of a team is to win the Championship. This they say is a show of consistency and staying power. So it is, but who is to say that the qualities of a long distance runner are better than those of the sprinter. Was, for instance, Steve Coe or Steve Cram a better athlete than Linford Christie because they ran much further?

Of course not. All were super in their own spheres and that is why the winners of the FA Cup should not be down graded in comparison with the Champions.

The Cup, the brainchild of that remarkable doyen of the game C. W. Alcock whose name is inseparable from the development of Association Football, did more to promote the game than any other act. Like a thread of gold, Alcock's career ran through the weaving of the story of "Soccer" and his tall and dignified form strode the river of the game from its source.

It was Alcock who conceived the Cup principle, it was Alcock who captained the Wanderers to a 1-0 victory over the Royal Engineers in the first Final, at the Oval on 16 March 1872. Fifteen clubs had entered but withdrawals and byes meant that only 15 ties were played. Now, some 50,000 cup ties later, the Cup campaign spreads over nine months and involves nearly 700 matches.

Take Emley for example, the smallest of the minnows still left in the competition - they are away to West Ham United today. They entered the competition last September and have already completed eight games which is more than the eventual winners will probably participate in. If not involved in replays, a top club can reach the Final at Wembley in five ties.

The Cup is unique. It is the real test; a triumph of nerve, steel and character

that stretches the emotions, both on and off the field, beyond all rational bounds. How often have we heard managers and players refer to a crunch League game as their "Cup Final"? It is the ultimate test, the moment of truth, when the gauntlet has been thrown down and your life is on the line. Yes, to win the Cup might be a short sprint in terms of a season; but it can stimulate a lifetime of passion, emotion and memories, so why should it be devalued in terms of the League? In the latter decades of the nineteenth century, when the Association game was in its infancy and a bit beyond, the Cup - known then as the English Cup - was held in high esteem as the Blue Riband event of the game.

The game was elitist in its formative years and for the first ten years only six (southern) clubs contested the finals. But in 1882 the establishment was rocked to its foundations when Blackburn Rovers

became the first provincial club to intrude on the Kennington Oval party. The lads from the north lost 1-0 to the Old Etonians but this was a last defiant gesture before custody of the cup fell into professional hands. A year later Blackburn Olympic pipped the Old Etonians 2-1 to end the class demarcation.

Since then the competition has thrived on the unexpected as favourite after favourite has been vanquished by the unfashionable. Ask Cambridge United, the second round victims of our opponents today Stevenage, or Lincoln City who were blasted out in a penalty shoot-out by little Emley of the Unibond League.

Back in 1900 when Bury won through to a final against. Southampton many in London were a little hazy as to the locality of Bury, never mind the football team. By the end of the final showdown at the Crystal Palace the capital knew all about the place, for the team had won the English Cup by 4-0.

The press went to town. Even the smallest detail was not overlooked and some of the information offered in the streets was mind bending. For instance, one ingenious chronicler set down the staple industry of Bury as "puddings." People asked, "What kind of puddings?" and those equally intelligent of the facts said, "Oh, you know, just puddings."

But perhaps industries matter little to the ordinary football fan; it is nothing to him maybe that puddings spelt prosperity in football. He is only interested in what tickles his own palate, the little bit of sauce, the relish of an exciting giant-killing act, as the underdogs take a bite out of the establishment.

The FA Cup is littered with such dramatic acts year after year.

To each and everyone of us there is a cherished memory which will remain with us forever. No doubt the Swindon fans who cheered Town to a 1-0 victory over Watford Rovers in our


very first FA Cup engagement, in October 1886, held that dear. They would certainly not wish to remember the second round for we crashed 7-0 to the Swifts. Our first real slaying of the


powerful was achieved 89 years ago when after a goalless home draw with Sheffield United we beat them 3-2, after extra-time in the replay. Goals from Warburton, Tout and Johnston sealing this step in history.

Johnston and Warburton were on target again in a 2-1 victory over QPR but in the third round we lost 2-0 at Wolverhampton Wanderers. But our best was yet to come.

In the 1909-10 season, five goal Harold Fleming led the charge to the semi-final. Palace were beaten 3-1 away and home wins over Burnley 2-0, Tottenham Hotspur 3-2 (Fleming hattrick) and Manchester City 2-0 earned us a semi-final meeting with Newcastle United. Ironically, it was staged at White Hart Lane and we lost 2-0.

In 1912 Swindon were again only a win away from a final. We lost 1-0 to Barnsley in a semi-final replay. Today the boot is on the other foot but we have a good record against non-league opponents counting amongst our victims some of the most famous cup giant-killers such as Yeovil Town, Hereford United and Tooting and Mitcham.


