


New boss Denis Smith is a proven performer in his own right, but so far he has struggled to get to grips with his side, who at the time of writing have only won once under his stewardship.





Denis Smith the manager

Former Oxford manager Denis Smith was appointed to The Hawthorns' hotseat in succession to Ray Harford recently and celebrated a long-awaited first triumph with his new club last Saturday.

An accomplished manager with a good track record, Smith is sure to give the Baggies faithful plenty more to cheer about in the future. Born in Stoke in 1947, Smith was a tough, nononsense central defender who was the linchpin of his hometown side for many years. He played more the 450 games for the Potters and helped them to the League Cup in 1972 and also to promotion to the top flight in 1978/79. He had a brief loan spell at York City in 1982 and was subsequently

He had a brief loan spell at York City in 1982 and was subsequently appointed player/manager there for 1982/83. In his first season in the York hot-seat the Club finished seventh, but by the end of the following campaign they had won the old Fourth Division Championship with a then record

101 points (superseded, of course, by Swindon's 102 points two years later). Sunderland paid York £20,000 in compensation when Smith moved to Roker Park in June 1987 and he was the man who led the Wearsiders back from the dead with two promotions, from the old Third Division to the First, before being replaced by Malcolm Crosby in December 1991 following a poor run of results, culminating, ironically enough, in a 3-0 defeat at Oxford. After a brief spell at Bristol City he moved to the Manor Ground in September 1993, following the departure of Brian Horton. Relegation followed in his first season with

Oxford, but 1995/96 saw the Club regain their First Division status after clinching the second automatic promotion spot.

Last season, despite operating on a shoestring budget, Smith kept his side in Play-Off contention for much of the campaign, before they eventually finished in 17th spot.

Not surprisingly, though, when the Albion job became available Smith was willing to move away from a club plagued by crippling financial problems.



5 YEARS AGO

Despite conceding two first half penalties Swindon defeated Sunderland at Roker Park. The first taken by Gordon Armstrong was saved by Fraser Digby in the 12th minute, while the second, for which time in the first half was extended, was missed by Kevin Ball. Swindon tied up the

points 10 minutes into the second half when Paul Bodin fired home a left foot shot for his third goal in three games. A first half goal by Bob Taylor is not enough to stop the Baggies slipping to a 2-1 defeat at Blackpool. Although Bob Taylor scores 30 goals in the season no other West Brom player reaches

double figures and they miss out on an automatic promotion spot. There is joy at Wembley however when a 3-0 win over Port Vale lifts them into Division One. Manchester City's Steve McMahon sustains a groin injury against Queens Park Rangers an injury which keeps him out for the rest of the season.

210 YEARS AGO

Despite a flying start when Dave Bamber swept home a cross by Dave Hockaday, Swindon failed to complete a double over Middlesbrough in their Division One match at the County Ground. Tony Mowbray headed an equaliser for Boro in the 27th minute and that was the way the score stayed. This was largely due to the goalkeepers. Stephen Pears pulled out a fine save in the 76th minute for the visitors while Fraser Digby, returning after a three month absence with a broken thumb, foiled Gary Hamilton with an acrobatic leap five minutes from time. A Colin Anderson goal is the only one in Albion's home victory over Shrewsbury Town. The Baggies finish 20th just avoiding having to take part in the play offs to avoid relegation to Division Three.

15 YEARS AGO

Crewe, aided by a strong wind, were quick to set about the demolition of Swindon at Gresty Road. Just when it looked like Swindon had a lucky escape in the 12th minute when the ball rebounded off the cross bar,


Russell Lewis dived full length to head into his own net. Steve Edwards who had only signed from Oldham the previous week made it 2-0 after twenty minutes and when Tony Cliss scored a third for the Alex. Two minutes later Swindon, who failed to manage a shot in the first half hour, were well and truly sunk. Nicky Cross scored the goal that secures West Brom a home draw with Stoke City in Division One. Former Town striker Peter Eastoe is also in the Baggies line up.

FLASH-BACK

When Swindon travelled to the Hawthorns on 3rd February 1973 they had already accounted for the hopes of one team from the second city with their 2-0 win at the County Ground in the previous round. It had taken Albion six hours to secure their place in Round Four in a marathon battle with Nottingham Forest, Swindon opened brightly pressing the Midland side into mistakes and Ray Treacy forced a fine save from Peter Latchford. It was Albion who struck first, when a centre by Willie Johnston was

headed home by Tony Brown. Asa Hartford, who looked the most skilful player on the pitch, laid on a second goal just minutes from half time when he found Len Cantello who hit a shot from 25 yards. The diving Jimmy Allan got a hand to the ball but was unable to stop it finding the net. The second half saw Swindon playing with great heart and pressing to reduce the arrears. In Tommy Jenkins and Dave Moss they had two dangerous wingers and the latter came close when a long range header shaved the bar. This was to be the closest Town

came to a goal for although they fought with a great deal of pride and no little skill they could never quite match the skill of Don Howe's First Division team.

We trained in the morning, then Pasta and Chicken at midday then it was off to Huddersfield to prepare for the game the following day.




31st January


The only disappointment during a solid performance was a back injury to Darren Bullock that could keep him out of the squad for a week.


and say "yes they are as good as the top clubs".







The cowardly assault of a linesman at Portsmouth's Fratton Park no doubt had some publicity seeking politicians itching to get on their soap-boxes to recommend their own brand of outdated, draconian anti-hooligan measures.

Thankfully, most of the media guite rightly reported the incident as it was - a vicious attack perpetrated by one extremely sad and violent individual. But undoubtedly the behaviour of fans up and down the land will be under close scrutiny, particularly with the world cup finals just months away.

Portsmouth could well be fined if the FA decide the club did not take adequate security measures. But what really could Pompey have done to prevent the lunacy of one misguided individual?

More police? Okay, there was only one officer on duty inside the ground but suppose there had been 100. Even that number could not guarantee the playing area being free of spectators for a whole afternoon. More stewards? There were plenty at Portsmouth but they have no legal powers and their role is primarily to ensure crowd safety. Bring back fences? Simply not an option, as a sunny Sheffield day in April, 1989 horrifically showed. It's also worth noting that football grounds are now far more pleasant places to visit since the fences came down. Ban visiting fans? Clubs like Swindon rely heavily on gate receipts and banning the 3,000 fans that the likes of Manchester City and Nottingham Forest bring would seriously affect income. The unique

atmosphere of English football would also

be lost, as the failed Luton experiment proved.

The real answer is for fans to take responsibility for their own actions. In England we are lucky enough to be able to go to most grounds and enjoy a match without having to peer through wire fences. And, with the exception of some fixtures, the police presence at grounds is fairly minimal. Facilities are better than ever and fans have been trusted, to a certain degree, to police themselves. Sure, ground improvements have been partly financed by supporters through increased admission prices, but the close proximity of English fans to the pitch is a privilege that is the envy of supporters abroad.

Top ref David Ellerey is demanding that police and stewards take tougher action with fans who come onto the pitch, but there is a very fine line between over-exuberance and aggressive, threatening behaviour. Mini pitch invasions with excited supporters celebrating on the touchline close to the players is a common sight. Very different from the Fratton Park incident, but a trend that must stop if fans want to continue to enjoy an unrestricted view of the match. The message is simple. Get behind your team - South standers won't need telling this - enjoy your football but don't abuse the freedom that makes going to football now so much better than the dark ages of the 1980's.

Frank Talia is now in his second week of

recovery after the "key-hole" surgery on his knee and is making good progress.

Glenn Hoddle's selection for next Wednesday's friendly international against Chile, at Wembley, provided just one or two surprises though in the main the squad is as expected.

With David Seaman out of the running because of a damaged finger the return of Tim Flowers was almost inevitable and with Nigel Martyn also available England will be as strong as they could be in this department whichever goalkeeper Glenn eventually selects.

The England coach said some time ago that he would give everyone a chance to prove their worth in the national side and that he would also be looking at one or two surprise players. Surely one of these is Dion Dublin, the Coventry City striker, who though having a good time with the Sky Blues I must confess does not strike me as an international candidate, Dion, who will be 29 in April, is big strong and awkward but does he have the touch and pace to compete at this level? I suppose these are the questions Glenn hopes to find the answers to and there is only one way of achieving this and that is by playing him.

Likewise the same applies to Liverpool's wonder kid Michael Owen. If he plays he will become the second youngest player to represent England this century and the third youngest of all time.

Owen will be 18 years and 59 days old on Wednesday - 24

days younger than the great Duncan Edwards was when he made his England debut against Scotland in April 1955. England won that one 1-2. The Busby Babe was one of the greatest talents of all time and scored twice from wing-half, and hit the post, against Denmark in 1956. Alas, as many of you will have seen last Sunday's TV a match for England when he popped in two against Ireland in 1882.

Sheffield United centre-forward
Arthur Samuel Brown, known as
"Boy" Brown, played in the 2-2
draw with Wales at Wrexham in
February 1904 when still only
18. He scored in his second and
final England outing two years
later in Belfast when England
beat Ireland ?-0

There have been other teenage internationals of course including Jimmy Greaves and Alan Ball but Greaves was 19 years 36 days old when he was introduced in 1959 against Peru and World Cup winner Ball was just three days short of 20 when making his bow against Yugoslavia.

tribute. 'The Busby Babes: End of a Dream," Duncan was killed in the Munich air disaster along with eight team mates and 15 other passenger, including the great Frank Swift when returning from a European Cup tie in Yugoslavia. Edwards was 21 and had 18 caps (5 goals).

The youngest ever England debutante was a half-back who played for *Clapham Rovers*. James Frederick McLeod Prinsep, born in India, was just 17 years 252 days old when he helped England beat Scotland 5-4 in April 1879. It was his only cap though he was selected to play against Scotland in 1882 but had to withdraw through injury.

Another 17-year-old was Darwen star Thurston "Tot" Rostron, a five-foot forward who collected the first of his two caps in a 1-0 defeat by Wales in February 1881.

Blackburn Rovers centreforward James Brown was 18 when he won the first of his five caps in that same international against Wales. He scored three times for England and was, before Edwards, the only teenager to score twice in







I see our old mate Joey Beauchamp instigated the shock of the day last weekend when he scored twice to put the skids under Nottingham Forest on their own patch.

Oxford United's 3-1 victory was only the second home League defeat suffered this season by Forest.

Now the 26-year-old former England Under-21 winger says he wants to play in the Premiership, but with whom? He got home-sick just 10-miles down the motorway when he joined West Ham United before coming to the County Ground...There's no question about his ability it is his application that will make managers think twice.

Still, he got Malcolm Shotton's managerial career off to a flying start with *Oxford* and today they face another serious challenge at *Sheffield United*. I suspect that prior to these two games the new *Oxford* boss would have settled for two points so anything more is a bonus.


The Blades, involved in an FA Cup replay with Ipswich in midweek, have slipped to fifth place following last weeks 1-1 draw with bottom of the table *Portsmouth* who are hoping to shock Forest this afternoon - but expect an away win. They played defender Shaun Derry, a £700,000 signing from *Notts County*, but it seems they are paying for selling top strikers Brian Deane and Jan Aage Fjortoft.

Middlesbrough, my tip for the championship, made ground on Forest with a 2-1 win at Stoke on Sunday to lift them within two points of the leaders with a game in hand and they could be in poll position now themselves if they won Wednesday night's home game with Tranmere.

Whatever the position they are involved in the match of the day

at Birmingham City.

The Blues boast the best defensive record in Division One with only 22 goals conceded in 29 games, and only eight let in at home. But 'Boro, with eight wins and four draws, have the best away record and the second best away scoring tally. This game looks such a draw banker it is almost certain to end in a winner - but for whom?



The most prolific scorers away from home are third placed Charlton with 24 goals. Bradford City, beaten at Ipswich last week, are their hosts this afternoon and though they might not keep a clean sheet they should be due a home win.

Sunderland bounced back from their shock defeat at Norwich to beat Port Vale 4-2 with striker Daniele Dichio, signed from Sampdoria for £750,000, still on the bench. The arrival of the former OPR star has brought the best out of Niall Quinn who demonstrated his determination to keep his place with the goal of the game. Little Kevin Phillips slotted in his 19th goal of the season and it must be said that with strike power of this quality they have to be serious contenders for promotion.

Just how serious we will know after today's visit to *Molineux*. You never want to tangle with a wounded wolf and Mark McGhee's men are as sore as they will ever be after losing at home to their local rivals West Brom. Incidentally, it was McGhee's 100th League game in charge of *Wolves*, but it was Andy Hunt's 13th goal of the season that proved unlucky and

to rub salt into the wounds it was only *Albion's* second win in 11 games. *Wolves v Sunderland?* Possibly another draw.

As mentioned earlier, bottom club *Pompey* play hosts to Forest while second from the bottom *Bury* are home to *Port Vale. Bury's* outstanding home record has been blown away by five defeats and seven draws. They have now gone 15 games without a win but picked up a valuable point in a 0-0 draw at *Charlton.* Paul Dalglish, son of Kenny, on loan for the remainder of the season is set to make his home debut.

Manchester City are still trying to claw their way out of the nightmare that has them dangling in 20th position.

A trip to Carrow Road looks a difficult one particularly as **Norwich City** have taken the scalps of **Forest** and **Sunderland** in their last two home games, but then lost at **Crewe**.

The Canaries seem to trip themselves up against the less fancied sides and this, together with rumours of Darren Eadie's pending departure to a Premiership club, suggests City might squeeze a point. Huddersfield Town fans are hoping Wayne Allison will regain his scoring touch in time to beat play-off chasing Stockport this afternoon. The Terriers are due a win.

The big question at *Reading*, where *Tranmere* are the visitors, is will there by any goals? You see Rovers maintained a clean sheet for the seventh successive match against *Man City* and registered an all-time League record of five consecutive goalless draws.

Crewe have had a marvellous January with four wins; QPR are still failing to get the best from their team. Two new additions to the Rangers team are lan Dowie and Keith Rowland from West Ham but can they spark a home win? Finally, Ipswich at Stoke - look for a draw.



























Anyway, turning the corner, turning the tide, whatever you want to call it, it's great to get some points under our belt.



OSC-UD Daven Bullock

Darren Bullock is a much feared aggressive midfielder who has enjoyed success with Huddersfield and now hopes to repeat this at Swindon, but the Town star has an unlikely background for a footballer.

Up to the age of 24 Bullock was playing Non-League football and cleaning windows with his Dad until he got the big break.

He moved From Nuneaton
Borough in the Vauxhall
Conference to Huddersfield in
November 1993 for £55,000.
Here he spent five successful
years as a regular first team
choice. "I have great memories
of Huddersfield" says Darren " I
went from Non-league to pro
and it was here that I learnt my
trade as a footballer. You had to
grow up very fast and realise
you have to give 100 per cent
with work rate and effort".

His only major regret is that he didn't go into football earlier.
"I should have listened to what people were saying to me" says Bullock "I sometimes wonder what a different player I might have been, but that's life, you learn from your mistakes".

Bullock refers to this period of his career as the highlight: two play-offs, two trips to Wembley and scoring on a regular basis. He scored 20 goals in 156 games for the Terriers. He also had a great rapport with the fans affectionately known as "Psycho". Bullock smiles, "I can't imagine why".

But that's all history, Bullock is now focussed on his job at Swindon. The tough midfielder signed a three and a half year deal in February 1997 after a £400,000 move from Huddersfield and netted on his debut for Swindon against Birmingham City on February 26th.


But after a great start he is aware that as a player he still has a lot to prove in front of the County Ground faithful.

He said "It's still early stages for me at Swindon and I know I've got to prove my worth. I'm improving my fitness all the time and want to get a run of first team appearances. My best times at Swindon are yet to come".

When asked why Swindon have suffered this recent losing streak Bullock puts it down to the player confidence. "Because we were at the top of the league earlier in the season there is an expectation that you will win every game.

"I think that got to us a bit, you only have to lose a couple of games and then you begin to feel the pressure, especially when the fans want to win so much. When you get in that situation it is difficult to turn it round, but I think we've done that now."

There can be no denying Darren Bullock has a lot to offer Swindon with his strength and




