The all so often vital Easter period certainly proved to be a fruitful one for us, picking up four points to move us away from the direct relegation zone.

Not too many people expected us to gain any reward at Play-off chasing Sheffield United, but the players surprised a few people and in the first twenty minutes we could have been 2-0 ahead We then proceeded to shoot ourselves in the foot to go in at half-time two goals behind! We then had to defend properly early in the second period, which gave us the base for our comeback. Craig Bellamy took his goal well to put us back in contention and following Chris Llewellyn's equaliser, I felt we looked the more likely winners. Unfortunately that wasn't to be, but it was a very spirited performance - I would just prefer it if we didn't have to fall two goals behind in the first place!

It was imperative for us to beat Huddersfield and for once we actually scored first, through a rare Craig Fleming goal - only the second of his career I believe. Once Neil Adams had made it 2-0 from the spot we were able to relax and play as we know we can.

All in all it was an excellent response from the players, who were under great pressure before the game. I would have settled for a 1-0 win, but five goals, a clean sheet, the style of some of our football and the results from elsewhere going our way – it was a real ray of sunshine for all of us.

The only dampener on the afternoon was the injuries to Craig Fleming and Darren Eadie. Hopefully Craig will be back in action very soon, but for Darren, the elbow to his cheekbone effectively ended his season. Once agin his injury came at a time when England had selected him, but that just about summed up his own, and the Club's, season.

Despite the euphoria following that win, I always felt that Stoke would prove to be a very tough game for us.

Everything seemed right up until kick-off, but in the final outcome. Stoke outplayed us in all aspects of the game and well deserved their victory. We had chances late on, but in all honesty it would have been unjust if we had snatched a late point.

It was bitterly disappointing as a win would have secured our Division One status and allowed us to relax for the final two games, now it is vital that we win again today against Swindon. They started the season in tremendous style, but then gradually faded away from the top of the table. They have the luxury of being 'relaxed' for this afternoon's game, but I'm sure Steve McMahon will be disappointed with his season following such a positive start.

As this is our last home game, it is appropriate for me to thank all my staff, who have worked exceptionally hard in what has been a disastrous campaign for the Club (I hope I'm not being prophetic here). Criticism and brickbats come with this job, but it is still not nice when they come, and all of the staff here have done well to work on through it all.

Our injury problems have been reasonably well documented, although not everyone seems to have understood them, but I have never seen the like before in all my years in the game. To have seven fractures in one season and have key players out for very long periods has obviously affected the continuity of team selection and not once have I fielded what I consider to be our strongest team. However it is not the time for feeling sorry for yourselves, but you can learn so much, about yourself. your staff and the players in times of adversity and if we can come through this season, then we should all be much stronger, and wiser, for the experience.

I would like to welcome the guests and representatives of the Castle Mall to Carrow Road. They are our match sponsors this afternoon and I hope they enjoy the occasion.

It just remains for me to say thank-you all for your support and see you again in August.

Hopefully that will have given him a lift and maybe he will score his third senior goal for the Canaries before the end of the season.

Ambassadors' 250 Club World Cup - France 98

For many clubs it's the last home game today of a fantastic domestic football season. But don't despair, in just a month's time, the World Cup kicks off.

Most of us will be watching the games on TV. A lucky few will be travelling to France. The vast majority of travelling fans will be genuine supporters. But we have to accept a hardcore holligan minority are making plans to travel as well.

So we have been working flat-out with our French counterparts to ensure the World Cup is remembered for all the right reasons. This co-operation will continue right through the tournament.

We want to ensure genuine English supporters get the warm and friendly welcome in France they deserve. That has not always happened abroad in the past

So French police have attended games here to understand better the special atmosphere at our matches. They have promised to treat all supporters, wherever they come from firmly but fairly.

But we must also stop the tiny minority of mindless hooligans again damaging the reputation of England abroad.

That is all the more important with our bid to host the 2006 finals, which has the full and enthusiastic support of Tony Blair and the Covernment, winning new friends every week.

We have made real progress in rooting out the cancer of hooliganism from our domestic game. I watch as many matches of my side Blackburn as I can. All match-goers know, despite a handful of appalling recent incidents, how much better the atmosphere is at games today compared with a decade ago.

We have also tackled the hooligans who masquerade as England fans. Euro'96 was memorable for many, many reasons. But the football authorities, police and decent fans can take great pride in the fact that the tournament was mainly trouble free

We have encouraged the courts to make full use of the powers to stop convicted hooligans travelling to matches.

French police are making full use of the sophisticated intelligence networks and policing procedures we have developed in this country.

British football intelligence officers will be travelling to France to spot potential troublemakers and liaison officers will also be on hand to enable instant throughput of intelligence.

You, too, can play your part. We have re-launched our Hooligan Hotline which provided such a success at Euro 96. By calling 0800-515495, decent fans can blow the whistle on the thugs. It is already providing a stream of useful intelligence. It's completely confidential.

There's one other way you can help prevent flashpoints. That's by not travelling to France unless you have a ticket.

I know tickets are in short supply despite the best efforts of the FA. But I fear there is still a widespread view that if you want to catch a match, all you have to do is go over to France and buy a black market ticket even if you have to pay over the odds. But you would

Your chances of getting into the ground are very slim indeed. A black market ticket is no quarantee you will get into the match.

France has very tough touting laws which will be strictly enforced. That will cut down the chances of tickets being available.

But, more importantly, every ticket sold in France has the original purchaser's name printed on it. There is no point in pretending you are Eric Cantona when you are really Vinny Jones.

It will be a simple matter for the police or turnstile staff to check. At best, you will just be turned away and lose your money. At worst, you could face a fine or imprisonment.

So the advice is No Ticket. Don't Travel. Otherwise you could be wasting your time and your money.

We want this summer's World Cup to be remembered for all the right reasons. A festival of football for all to enjoy. And let's hope for success for England.





STEVE KING TESTIMONIAL


On Tuesday April 28th, the Canaries will be sending a strong squad to take on a Gorleston XI, in aid of long serving Steve King's testimonial match.






Hopefully you will all be pleased going home today as you were on Easter Monday, although I apologise to those of you who were persuaded to journey to Stoke after the strength of our performance.

Man of the Match


The Canaries' 5-0 thrashing of Huddersfield Town certainly provided plenty of contenders for the penultimate lonica 'Man of the Match' award of the season, but in the end the bottle of champagne went to striker Iwan Roberts, who scored two of his side's five goals and created another.

The genial Welshman has not enjoyed the best of fortune in front of goal for much of this campaign, but against his former club he looked likely to score every time the ball was played into the penalty area.

His two goals were relatively straightforward conversions of quality crosses. The first from Chris Llewellyn's positive right-wing run and cross, the second from Darren Eadie's driven cross ten minutes later. That is the kind of service Iwan cries out for - give it to him and he will surely duplicate the goalscoring form everyone knows he is capable of.

However, it wasn't just the goals which earned lwan the Ionica award. His contribution to City's build-up play was excellent too. He is a difficult man to dispossess with his back to goal and on several occasions he acted as the focal point for sweeping City moves. That was best highlighted with the Canaries' final goal when the big Welshman was three times involved in a superb passing movement which culminated in Erik Fuglestad's rasping right-foot shot. It was a deserved accolade for Iwan on an afternoon wher





he and his team-mates proved to many people how well they can play when they're firing on all cylinders.

Elsewhere in the side Andy Marshall made several key saves to safeguard his clean-sheet; one early one from Marcus Stewart was a spectacular one-handed effort and then he also made two good blocks in the second-half.

Defensively the Canaries were sound. Fullbacks Sutch and Fuglestad spent much of the afternoon on the attack whilst centre-backs Jackson, Fleming and Scott were as solid as rocks - Craig Fleming even taking time out to score only his second career goal in his 285th appearance!

Neil Adams and Craig Bellamy brought real composure to City's midfield, always trying to get the team moving forward in a constructive way, using their passing skills to best effect.

Neale Fenn would loved to have scored a goal, but he must take real satisfaction in his overall contribution to the team. His ability to come short and mix-up the way in which City build their attacks went a long way to creating the space for his colleagues to burst through in to. Darren Eadie had a relatively quiet game. All he did was earn the penalty and create goal number four - oh yes, and terrorise the entire Town defence with his pace and trickery!

Chris Llewellyn was probably Iwan Roberts' nearest competitor for the Ionica 'Man of the Match' award. The eighteen year old looked flushed with confidence following his excellent strike at Bramall lane two days before. He was unafraid to try things and his mazy runs often caused real panic in the Terriers' defence. One such effort, in the 17th minute, saw him beat two players and only just shoot too high with the outside of his left-foot. His fantastic run to set up Iwan Roberts' first goal, which started with him being totally off balance, was a real delight and the cross came from his so-called weaker rightfoot. All that was missing from Chris's performance was a goal and his best effort came in the 64th minute, but his shot on the run flashed inches over the bar.


It was a great team performance, laced with excellent individual displays - more of the same today please!





Chris Hay's late winner for Swindon, against Norwich at the County Ground last October. brought about the Robins' 22nd league win against the Canaries in the 71 match series of previous meetings between the two clubs. That figure is still some way short of Norwich's total of 28 victories, including the home and away successes of last season. Norwich also have the advantage in terms of goals scored; leading by 118 to 112

Norwich and Swindon are age-old rivals having entered the Football League together, when the Third Division was formed in 1920. They remained regular Third Division (South) opponents and it was not until season 1963-64 that they met at a higher grade, in Division

Following City's promotion to Division One in 1972 there was a 21 year gap before they

crossed swords again and that gap means that it is now over 41 years since Swindon have recorded a league victory here at Carrow Road, when they won 4-2 in November 1956. That 1956-57 season saw City finish bottom of Division Three (South). being forced to seek re-election and Swindon finish one place and five points better off.

Swindon haven't even scored a goal on their five previous league visits to Carrow Road a record they will be hoping to improve upon this afternoon.

PLAYED FOR BOTH

Twenty five players have worn both the red of Swindon and the yellow and green of Norwich. Of that list, not one single player has made over 100 league appearances for each club, although Ian Culverhouse, who played 296 league games for City between 1985 and 1994 is only a couple short of the 100 mark for Swindon, but he is not currently in Steve McMahon's side. 'Civvy', as he was known, was a tremendous servant for the Canaries, being a polished right-back who fitted in so well with City's passing style. Arquably his best moments came in his penultimate season at Carrow Road, when he was often utilised as a sweeper, especially in those memorable matches in the UEFA Cup.

Another player to serve both clubs particularly well was winger Don Heath, who played alongside the likes of Ron Davies, Gordon Bolland and Dave Stringer for City in the 1960's. A good team player, Don was a

good crosser of the ball and whilst at Carrow Road, weighed in with his fair share of goals. including one in that 1967 FA Cup win at Old Trafford His move to the County Ground



brought about his greatest career achievement though, when he played in Swindon's shock 3-1 win against Arsenal at Wembley in the 1969 League Cup Final.

In the 1990's, apart from Culverhouse, Keith Scott (pictured above). Jon Sheffield and Nick Tanner have all served both clubs for relatively brief spells.

Swindon Town began this season in great style and in mid-November found themselves with only Nottingham Forest above them. Everything was looking rosy, with former Celtic striker Chris Hay leading the way with ten league goals in the Robins' first fourteen matches, including a stunning matchwinner against the Canaries at the County Ground.

However, Swindon peaked too soon and in their last twenty six matches they have collected just seventeen points - a disastrous run which has seen them plummet into mid-table obscurity. Manager Steve McMahon, the players and fans have been at a loss to explain the team's incredible change in fortunes and the knowledge that they could compete against the best in Division One, has just made that slump all the more frustrating.

As with most teams who have struggled this season, injuries have played a key part in Swindon's fall from grace, with vital members of the side such as Fraser Digby, Mark Seagraves, Mark-Walters all missing vital games and even recent signing Iffy Onuora fell foul to a freak injury, fracturing his cheekbone in an accidental clash with a referee.

Thankfully for all Robins fans, their alarming drop down the table started from such a

high position that they have only flirted with the relegation issue and will now be re-grouping for the 1998-99 campaign. Steve McMahon is a forceful character who has long been associated with success and his own personal ambitions, of a return to the Premiership, will match those of the Club, but, not unlike the Canaries, the financial resources which might make that dream a reality are not readily available.

In recent weeks Swindon announced a massive financial loss and just before the transfer deadline McMahon was publically told that there were little or no funds available for team strengthening. He, like Mike Walker here at Carrow Road, will be looking to wheel and deal during the months ahead in preparation for the post-France '98 Football league campaion.

McMahon has already proved himself with some shrewd moves in the transfer

market including the capture of Chris Hay from Celtic for £330,000. The highly experienced figure of Alan McDonald arrived from Queens Park Rangers at the beginning of this season and Frenchman Philippe Čuervo has looked a very good prospect on occasions, especially during those successful opening weeks of the season.

Away from home, Swindon have collected nineteen points from twenty two outings. conceding forty three goals in the process, with only Stockport and Reading having leaked more goals on their travels.

The five away-day successes came at Reading (1-0), Stoke (2-1), Portsmouth (1-0), Port Vale (1-0) and Queens Park Rangers (2-1); whilst the draws came at West Brom (0-0), Sunderland (0-0), Bradford City (1-1) and Huddersfield (1-1). The Robins travelled home pointless from Ipswich (1-2), Manchester City (0-6), Wolves (1-3), Stockport (2-4), Charlton (0-3), Sheffield United (1-2), Nottingham Forest (0-3), Crewe (0-2), Tranmere (0-3), Bury (0-1), Middlesbrough (0-6), Oxford (1-2) and Birmingham (0-3)

Swindon's last visit to Carrow Road was for the opening match of the 1996-97 season, so it is nearly two complete seasons since the

Canaries met the Robins here in Norfolk. That afternoon produced some excellent football (and some wonderfully hot weather) which will hopefully be repeated on this climax to another league season here at Carrow Road.

THE MANAGER

Steve McMahon won 17 caps for England as a combative midfielder who could also pass the ball well and score his fair share of goals - in short he was the complete midfielder. He also won 3 Championships and 2 FA Cups in a career which took in spells at Everton, Aston Villa, Liverpool, Manchester City and finally Swindon.

He has made just one substitute appearance this season and is now concentrating fully on his managerial duties. He holds forthright opinions on how the game should be played and when on song, his Swindon side are a joy to watch, he will be hoping there are many more such occasions next season as the Robins seek promotion back to the top-flight, following their relegation in 1994.

THE PLAYERS

FRASER DIGBY - Fraser is Town's longest serving player. having completed eleven years at the Club last September. He served his apprenticeship at Manchester United, but since his £32,500 move he has played well over 500 games for the Robins. A spectacular custodian he was Swindon's 'Player of the Year' last season.

SOL DAVIS - Sol made his full debut at Oxford earlier this month, only his second taste of First team action. A speedy leftsided player, he can operate as an orthodox left-back or in a more advanced wing-back role. He enjoys getting forward and will be hoping to add to his limited experience as the seasons draws to a close. **DAVID KERSLAKE** - David

is an experienced right wing-



MARK ROBINSON - Mark is a very versatile and much underrated performer for Swindon and his absence through injury for a large chunk of this season was a massive blow to the Robins. Originally a fine, attacking right-back, he adapted his game, with great success, to play in midfield and also as a sweeper. A good passer of the ball, especially over longer distances, he is a most determined competitor. ALAN McDONALD - Alan spent seventeen seasons with

Queens Park Rangers before his

summer switch to Swindon in 1997. A really committed central defender, he is particularly effective in that air, both in defence and when he moves forward at set-pieces. Robust in the challenge, his experience ensures that he is seldom caught out of position and he remains a most effective player. CRAIG TAYLOR - Craig is the younger brother of former Town favourite Shaun and like his brother he is a powerful central defender who is a match for almost anyone in the air. Snapped up from non-league Dorchester Town towards the end of last season, he scored a cracking goal on his league debut against Port Vale in October 1997

IAN CULVERHOUSE - lan was a tremendous servant to the Canaries between 1985 and 1994, winning the Club's 'Player of the Year' award for 1990-91. An assured all round defender. he is now more often utilised as a central defender rather than his original right-back role. He reads the game well and his distribution has always been of the highest calibre.

STEPHEN HOWE - Stephen or Bobby as he prefers to be known, is the former Forest attacking midfielder who having found his senior opportunities limited at the City Ground, spent a month on loan at Ipswich prior to his move to Swindon in January Slightly built, he is a creative player with quick feet and has, on occasions, played as an outand out striker.

LEE COLLINS - Lee arrived at Swindon from Albion Rovers in November 1995 and has only just won himself a regular place in the Robins' line-up. An aggressive ball-winning midfielder, he has had more than his fair share of run-ins with officialdom this season, but he will not allow that to curb his natural tackling instincts.

KEVIN WATSON - Kevin is a

stylish former Tottenham midfielder, very much in the Hoddle, Crook, Hazard mould. He likes to get his foot on the ball and direct his team's attacking moves, using his vision and astute passing skills. despite his obvious skill on the ball, he is not a great goalscorer.

DARREN BULLOCK

Darren made his league debut for Huddersfield after being signed for £55,000 from Nuneaton Borough. A combative midfielder who relishes the battle, he was allowed to leave Huddersfield following an 'away from football' incident and has now settled in well at Swindon. An influential character, he seldom has a bad game.

TY GOODEN - Ty is a leftsided attacking midfielder although he can play at fullback if called upon. Signed on a free transfer from Wycombe Wanderers, he has this season cemented his place in the team and is producing some consistently good performances as an attacking midfielder.

PHILIPPE CUERVO -

Philippe was signed on a free transfer from French club, Sochaux prior to the start of this season. A neat and constructive midfielder, he enjoyed a sparkling start to this campaign as Swindon took the Division by storm. His progress was then halted by a hip injury and it is only recently that he has returned to the squad.

SCOTT LEITCH - Scott made his Swindon debut at Carrow Road on the opening day of last season. A naturally defensive midfielder, he can operate as a central defender, alongside a stopper style centre-back if required. A hardrunning player, his play often goes unnoticed as he mops up around the fringes of play, winning the ball and using it quickly and effectively.

CHRIS HAY - Chris made an immediate impact on English football following his summer arrival from Celtic, scoring goals for fun in the campaign's early weeks. Although his goals have dried up to a degree in the latter stages of the season, he remains a danger because of his unpredictability. He likes to try the unexpected and has the ability to pull it off, making him a very awkward opponent indeed.

MARK WALTERS - Mark has always had the ability to win matches off his own back, being gifted with tremendous skills, pace and composure in front of goal. Unfortunately he has not always harnessed that ability on a consistent basis, but he remains a potential matchwinner in any company. Can play out wide, where he can drift past defenders at ease, or more centrally, where his ability to turn defenders can create goalscoring opportunities. GEORGE NDAH - George

cost Swindon £500,000 when he arrived from Crystal Palace in November 1997. A tall, rangy striker with good pace, he was often utilised as a winger in his early days at Palace, but he is now more often seen as a central striker, where his powerful, direct running can be used to the best effect.

Celebrity Status

JULIAN WILSON can claim enormous credit for the most successful chapter in Swindon Town's history.

Without the former BBC racing presenter's contacts it is doubtful whether Swindon would have ever appointed Lou Macari as manager.

Julian, a Swindon supporter since 1953, introduced sponsors Lowndes Lambert to the Club when they were languishing in the Fourth Division at a low ebb in their history.

He takes up the story: "Rooky Shaw, the owner of Grand National winner Hello Dandy, was connected with Lowndes Lambert

"The company put up the money for Lou's wages and that appointment completely changed the fortunes of the Club."

Under Macari's guidance, Swindon climbed to the fringe of the Second Division play-offs (today's First Division) before he left to manage West Ham.

Ossie Ardiles, the former Argentinian World Cup winner, continued the good work and appeared to have guided Swindon to the top flight for the first time, again through the play-offs.

The joy was short-lived as Swindon never took their place among the elite as they were dramatically relegated two divisions – reduced to one on appeal – after being found guilty of financial irregularities.

Julian describes the emotions of that traumatic time as the glory was tainted by scandal.

He said: "To win promotion to the First Division, as it was known, was the fulfilment of a life's dream for me.

"We were wrongly relegated because of financial improprieties which have later been proved to be on a smaller scale than suggested, and not as serious as others in the game."

Julian didn't have long to wait as Glenn Hoddle, who succeeded Ardiles in 1991, finally guided them to the Fremiership two years later.

Hoddle's departure for Chelsea was a blow which ultimately led to Julian distancing his love affair with the Club.

He said: "I went to the opening home


game in the Premiership against Oldham, and I knew then what our fate would be.

"Oldham, who were not one of the top teams, won 1-0 but it could easily have been four.

"I had looked forward for 40 years for Swindon to climb to the top of the mountain and yet within weeks I could see the work being undone as we rolled down the hill. "And though I don't watch them so often I still follow their results and look to see how they are faring."

Julian's close involvement in the Club's affairs until recent times is a far cry to his childhood when, as a 13 year old, he used to cycle from his home at Farringdon 10 miles to the County Ground.

That was along the A420 Oxford to Swindon road, something he says would be a non-starter these days with increased volumes of traffic.

The 1969 League Cup Final when Swindon, still a Third Division side, beat the mighty Arsenal at Wembley will always be remembered as Don Rogers' finest hour for the Robins.

Fate dealt Julian a kind hand that afternoon as he was supposed to be on racing duty that day.

He said: "I had only been working for the BBC for three or four years so daren't ask for the day off.

"Amazingly the racing at Chepstow was abandoned so I was able to be at Wembley for the Final."

Julian has also been to Wembley on two further occasions with Swindon for the play-off Finals.

Swindon have been victorious on each of those three Wembley visits with Julian describing them as three of the best days of his life.

The Robins were also triumphant in the Division Three play-offs before the finals were staged at Wembley.

Julian describes the eventful eighties as the most memorable period and it meant even more as he helped shape the successes.

He recalls favourites from this era such as David Kerslake, Steve 'Chalky' White, Jimmy Quinn, Paul Bodin, Colin Calderwood and the long-serving Fraser Digby who remains with the Club.

Julian was also involved in a racing syndicate with players Kenny Stroud, Chris Kamara, Brian Williams and Chic Bates. They had a share in Sea Aura which won its maiden race at Lingfield in 1981 ridden by Lester Piggott. Julian, who is a member of Kent County Cricket Club and Western Province in South Africa where he spends much of the winter, has played football for Denis Waterman's XI and a Racing Press XI.

He also remembers the anti-climax of setting foot on the County Ground pitch in August 1993 at the Oldham game.


Julian had been invited to take penalties on behalf of the Lord Taverners and recalled the night with embarrassment

He said: "I am left-footed but because of trouble with my hip couldn't swing my leg so had to take them right-footed.

"The first hit the bar, second struck the stanchion while the third and fourth were saved. Luckly the fifth went in – much to my relief."

Maybe Julian should take lessons from our own 'spot-kick-king', Neil Adams.

Otherwise, only the return to action of Neil Adams, following his three month stint on the sidelines, gives cause for optimism.


Monday March 23rd ... Iwan Roberts is forced to pull out of the Welsh 'B' squad to face Scotland tomorrow evening because of a sore knee.

With transfer deadline fast approaching, there is some speculation linking the Canaries with a possible loan swoop for Leicester City's striker Steve Claridge, although it is believed that Leicester would prefer to sell the player rather than loan him out.

Tuesday March 24th The next name into the 'possible loan signings' hat is that of Portsmouth's Swedish international striker Mathias Svensson, although he has stated a preference for a move to a Premiership club.

Chris Llewellyn is the 'star' of the Wales 'B' side which loses 4-0 to their Scottish counterparts.

Wednesday March 25th ... Southend make a gentle enquiry as to the availability of John Polston on loan, but the player, and Mike Walker, are not too enthusiastic about the possibility.



Craig Bellamy makes his full international debut for Wales, against Jamaica at Ninian Park. He comes on as a second-half substitute and in so doing becomes his country's fourth youngest international player of all time. The game ends in a 0-0 draw.

Thursday March 26th It's a busy day on the transfer front, beginning with the surprise exit of Robert Fleck to Reading for a £60,000 fee, bringing to an end 'Flecky's' eight year association with the Canaries which, in his two spells, saw him play 299 games scoring 84 goals.

The former Canary goalkeeper. Mark Walton, arrived on loan from Fulham, as experienced cover for Andy Marshall for the rest of the season. Also on the loan front, Rob Newman joined Second Division Wigan on loan for the rest of the season.


Then with around seven minutes to go until the five o'clock deadline, Mike Walker's frantic efforts to bolster his striking resources are proved successful with the loan signing of Tottenham's 21 year old front man, Neale Fenn, who looks set to make an immediate debut against Oxford on Saturday.

Amongst the enquiries Mike Walker made on the final day include Aberdeen's Dean Windass, Ian Rush and Mike Macari (together with many others).

To complete a very busy day, Steve Foley's Reserve side fight back from 2-0 behind to earn a 2-2 draw with local rivals lpswich Town. The goals were scored by Martin Eldridge and Bradley Andrews.

Saturday March 28th ... Following a largely uneventful opening first period, two suicidal goals conceded ensure that City return home without any reward from their trip to Oxford. Not until the introduction of substitute Neale Fenn, did City at last begin to pose some degree of threat, but the late pressure was to no avail.

Tuesday March 31st Mike Walker travels across the channel to take a behind the scenes look at French First Division club Auxerre. They are a club of similar size and potential to Norwich City who, in recent seasons, have learned to first compete with, and then succeed against, the more traditionally powerful clubs in French football.



They have done so on a modest budget with a thriving youth policy and Mike Walker sees their model as an ideal one for Norwich City to follow. Saturday April 4th The day begins with good news for Canary fans as Darren Eadie is included on the bench to face Bradford City at Carrow Road following his recent harnstring injury. However, events on the pitch either side of halftime throw a real dampener on proceedings, as City concede one goal just before the break and two immediately after it. The first and third goals come from some questionable decisions from the referee as Bradford players make the most of the slightest bodily contact, but facing a three goal deficit, the Canaries launch into their task with real relish. Chris Llewellyn and Craig Bellamy peg two goals back and there are plenty more near misses, but it is a desperately disappointing 3-2 home defeat.

Earlier in the day the Youth team draw 1-1 at Charlton with Darel Russell finding the net. **Wednesday April 8th** ... Adrian Coote is delighted with his call-up into Northern Ireland's first ever Under-21 squad, which will travel to Switzerland in a couple of weeks time.







In The Wings

Youth football within the professional football set-up is to undergo dramatic changes following the recent publication of Howard Wilkinson's 'Charter for Quality'. His document outlines many fundamental changes to the current system of bringing young players through at professional clubs.

Norwich City have, quite rightly, prided themselves on the success of their youth policy which has produced many many players of the highest quality in the last twenty years or more.

As from July 1998, Norwich City plan to introduce a Football Academy, depending on their being granted a licence to do so by the Football Association, and this Academy will provide three year scholarships for prospective young footballers, rather than the current two year traineeships.

The scholarships will allow for the individual educational needs of each of the young players to be closely monitored as well as their footballing education on the fields of Colney.



Seven boys are being taken on as 'scholars' during the summer, being guineapigs for the new set-up.

They will join the ten players who will be in their second year as trainees; Yerni Abiodun, Barrington Belgrave, Shaun Carr, Martin Eldridge, Anayo Etunmu, Paul Goreham, Matt Joynson, David Murray, Robert Smith and Darel Russell, who has already earned himself a professional contract.

Darren Way and Kevin Parker will remain at the Club on YTS terms, but will be too old for Youth football. Their extra time is due because they have missed long periods of their two year traineeships through injury. The pair will hope to win professional contracts in the near future.

Here are brief biographies of the seven new Canaries.

DANIEL GAY - Daniel. from Kings Lynn, is an agile goalkeeper who has acquitted himself very well during his unexpected callup into the Youth team during this season. He has also

played quite regularly for the 'A' team.

BLOIS -

Lewis, from Aylsham, is a regular



member of the England
Under-16 squad. A polished
midfielder or left sided
defender, he has already
made his Reserve team
debut, aged just 15, and looks
set for the brightest possible
future in the game.

NEIL BILHAM - Neil, from Sprowston, is a very quick winger or central striker. He really does have tremendous pace and an excellent goalscoring record. He has been a regular member of the 'A' team this season.

IAN THOMPSON - Ian, from Canvey Island, can play as a winger or as a wingback. He too is very quick and he combines that with tenacity and an excellent attitude towards the game.

Pitshou, from Wembley, is of French-African extraction and

is an athletic midfielder with an abundance of natural talent. He is a real flair player who used to play up-front, so he knows where the goal is.

Matthew, from Stevenage, was released by Arsenal's School of Excellence and following an assessment period was invited to join the Canaries. A good passer of the ball, he retains possession well from his midfield position and has the ability to play at wingback if required.

A Letter from Aunt Erica

"To every thing there is a reason, and a time to every purpose under the heaven." Ecclesiastes, of course, refer to 1998/9, but I suppose we've not quite done with this season yet. I hadn't expected us to end the season struggling anxiously against what everyone tell me would be a descent into Hell. An amazing assortment of injuries have, depending on your outlook, been either the reason or an excuse for the disappointment of it all. Certainly our splendid collection of youths have, in contrast to our kit, proved rather too green at times. At least one of the wizened pros, (I can get away with it but don't try calling Peter Grant a wizened pro to his face), may have tried too hard in an effort to compensate. Others, like Fuglestad, Segura and Fleming have still to get used to our funny little ways in this country. As for our coaches, well we don't even get a wireless that works any more.

As our destiny began spinning ever more dizzily on a thread Kevin Baldwin tied his very special lucky scarf knot and Dot Hart finally found the right combination of lucky ear-rings. If you should see a lady with one of her ears sporting a luminous red dragon bearing the legend "come to Wales - land of song, languid valleys, and the leek." and the other adorned with a badge proclaiming "I've seen Jack & the Beanstalk at the pier pavilion Llandudno," well, just don't laugh, this is a serious business. Anyway, it worked against Huddersfield with Bellamy, Llewellyn and Roberts cutting the mustard.

Fast forward. We take the point we need against Swindon and are safe; mental arithmetic and rumours of latest scores play no part in our day. Justice is done. Neil Adams' penalty at Fratton Park scored in time added on for Portsmouth's shameless attempts to hold on to their slender lead, (their trainer instructed the ball boys not to give the ball back to our goalkeeper), costs them dearly. Season ticket applications flood in. Our Fans' Leader calls for beers all round. I slip quietly away with 'Young Player of the Year' Darel Russell to a little villa Delia knows in Cap Ferrat to try talking him into a longer contract . . .

The toast then is to Next Season. And if during the summer you should spot a rather distinctive lady displaying the charm of Audrey Hepburn, the determination of Elizabeth Taylor, the zeal of Oliver Read, a light but even tan, and a huge T-shirt emblazoned "I'm with Lusty Rusty," don't be too envious. Deep down she's just a frustrated inside-right.

Well write again next season. Toodle-pip!

Who are the Underdogs Now?

Can we pretend that next season's third round FA Cup draw produced the following ties: Gateshead v Gillingham, Barrow v Cambridge, Aldershot v Scarborough, Southport v Scunthorpe and New Brighton v Wigan. If so, they would probably be announced as 5 non-league teams at home to Football League teams. Yet, in 1949 this same draw would have meant just the reverse, with 5 league teams at home to non-league opponents. So you can see that all these 10 clubs have changed their status since 1949, plus a few besides.

The biggest change came in season 1950-51 when 4 extra teams were admitted to the English Football league, then consisting of Division 1, Division 2, Division 3 (South) and Division 3 (North). The new 4 were Colchester, Gillingham. Scunthorpe and Shrewsbury. Since the, 9 more teams have joined and have remained in the league while 9 of the original teams have gone out.

The post-war ins and outs have been as follows:-Colchester, Gillingham, Scunthorpe, Shrewsbury, Peterborough, Oxford, Cambridge, Wimbledon, Wigan, Scarborough, Barnet, Wycombe and Macclesfield.

Out New Brighton, Gateshead, Accrington, Bradford PA. Barrow, Southport, Newport, Aldershot and Halifax.

However, the changes have not been so straightforward as these lists might suggest. Workington, Hereford and Maidstone have come in and gone out again. Colchester have come in, gone out and then come back in again. Lincoln, Halifax (congratulations!) and Darlington, more simply, have gone out and then come back in again.

Lincoln, Darlington and Colchester were 3 of the first 4 clubs to be relegated to the Vauxhall Conference following the introduction in 1987 of automatic relegation for the club finishing bottom of the Fourth (now Third) Division of the Football League. All 3 quickly regained league status by finishing top of the

First impressions may suggest that a lot of teams have been involved in the changes, but, over such a long period, it could be said that changes have been relatively few. One of the reasons is that, prior to 1986, the Football League was something of an Old Boy's network. Before the automatic relegation procedure was introduced, the bottom 2 clubs had to seek re-election, while teams from outside the league could be nominated for inclusion. This nomination did not depend on any particular achievement in a non-league competition but, to have any chance of success, the club needed to have a good playing record plus a good ground and facilities. Existing members of the Football League then voted either to re-elect the 2 bottom clubs or to switch to 1 or 2 of the outside nominations. Much lobbying went on in support of the 2 teams applying for re-election and 1 team in particular, Bradford (Park Avenue), survived 3 successive seasons despite having to seek re-election each time. However, a fourth failure to improve the team's performance was too much even for the club's many loyal friends and, in 1970, Cambridge United were voted in to replace them.

This system was changed in 1986 when it was decided to introduce automatic relegation for the bottom club in the Football League The team would switch to the Vauxhall Conference and be replaced by the top team from that competition. This was, however, made subject to the suitability of the ground and facilities of this top team. If they were unsatisfactory, there was no question of the honour being transferred to the runner-up.

At the end of the 1995-96 season, Stevenage Borough, who had finished top of the Conference, failed to move up to the Football League because their ground had been rules as unsatisfactory. Torquay United, at the bottom of Division 3, were the lucky survivors. A year later, Hereford United were not so lucky. Macclesfield Town, top of the Conference, had a suitable ground and they replaced Hereford United in the Football League.
