


Steve's serious business

It's a serious Steve Bull this year - claims Wolves' number one marksman. Well, you can't get much more serious than four goals from four games.

The tag of war-horse and veteran has been banned in his presence, and Bully is out to show that at 33 he's still a match for the best the division - and Wolves - has to offer.

Having reported back for the new campaign in the knowledge that he was no longer an automatic choice for the number nine shirt, the man who now has 18 Wolves hat-tricks to his credit didn't turn his back on the challenge.

A move to another club was an option that was quickly dismissed, and instead Bully blasted away any doubts about his abilities the best way he could - by scoring goals.

He says: "I've seen strikers come and go at Wolves, and I'll probably see some more. But they are going to have to take my shirt off me.

"I'm only 33 and I am still learning. In my mind and in my body I feel as young and fit as Robbie Keane. I've got two years left on my contract and want to push for another one. I know that I've got to look after myself and that's what I've been doing this season - I'm a serious Steve Bull!'

Steve is not only taking delight in his own performances, but also that of the whole team. He is especially pleased that goals are coming from his team mates.

"It's less pressure on me if other people can chip in," he says. "The whole team has started well, we're getting chances, and the lads at the back are keeping the opposition out.

"Fernando is hopefully going to be one of the players who stands out this season. He's settling down and with a few more games under his belt he will adapt to the way we play."

And of his striking partner, Bully adds: "Robbie's made a great start and we are working well together. As long as he keeps his feet on the ground, works hard, and listens to the old 'uns in the team, then he'll do really well."

Being a mere 33, does that mean listening to you Bully?

It's taken some time, and not a small amount of effort, but finally David Connolly is a Wolves player.

The 13-times capped Irish international arrived ready to sign for Wolves just before the transfer deadline last March, but contractual difficulties with his club Feyenoord meant that they would not grant the player international clearance.

The 21 year old striker was forced to return to Rotterdam and sit out the summer hoping that his move back to England would finally be sorted.

"It was very disappointing when I had to go back to Holland," he says. "I really wanted to play for Wolves and didn't imagine that the situation would become so complicated.

"This loan deal now seems to suit all parties. I'll be here for a season and hopefully the move will result in a permanent transfer after that.

"I was aware during the summer that Wolves were still interested in signing me. I had another good offer from a British club, but I was keen to come to Molineux.

"There were lots of attractions, such as the stadium and playing for Mark McGhee. I'm really pleased we've been able to sort it all out."

David's aim now is to get fully match fit and win a place in the team.

He adds: "I had the option of joining another club and going straight into the side. I chose Wolves, but I don't want to be on the sidelines. I don't know if I'll go straight into the team, but I'll start

fighting for my place right away.

"I've played in some of Feyenoord's preseason games, but the last proper competitive game I played was for Ireland against Mexico in May. Robbie Keane was in the team and I'm looking forward to playing with him at Wolves.

"Wolves have had a great start to the season and this is a great time to be signing."



In a season which contains 46 League games, and perhaps ten or more cup matches, we are going to need strength and depth within the squad.

Regardless of how well any individual is playing at this time, somewhere along the line he may be injured, suspended, or just not be playing as well as he is now.

When that time comes, whether it be in a week or six months, it is essential that we have players of equal quality as replacements.

The addition of David Connolly to the squad helps achieve this. David is still only 21, and is a lad who has tremendous ambition. He will keep Bully and Keaney on their toes by being a realistic threat to their place in the team.

We must try - if we don't have this situation already - to establish this pressure in every position.

GOODTY

David has not played competitive club matches since February, although he has managed to maintain a high level of fitness. We hope to have him involved as quickly as possible, at least from the bench.

Meanwhile, we have to be satisfied with the start that we've made. I am on record as saying that, until now, one of my disappointments has been that a distinctive playing style had not emerged. I am greatly encouraged by the first few games. That we are finally witnessing the style of performance through which Colin, Mike and myself have earned

our reputations is a great relief to me.

I realise that we have only just started the season, and that the opposition that Barnet offered was not top level, but our performance against them last Tuesday must be the blue-print for every match this season.

The basis of our Worthington Cup success was hard work - nothing more complicated.

We do have players with ability, and when those players combine that with such commitment that has been shown in our opening fixtures, then not many teams in our division will be able to live with us.

It is nice to be able to look forward to the draw for the next round, which will take place live on TV next Wednesday at 10pm. It is my hope that we get another draw that would avoid any confrontation with a First Division rival. I would be nice if we could progress quietly in this manner to the Final and perhaps play Arsenal and gain revenge for last season's FA Cup semi-final defeat!

We are undoubtedly showing the benefits of our pre-season trip to Germany and Austria. The players fitness is first class and is reward for the very hard work that they put in during July.



difficulties with his club Feyenoord resulted in him having to return to Holland.


With Dougle Freedman and Steve Claridge leaving Wolves, we needed another talented forward of the calibre of this young Irishman.


David flew to England the next morning and immediately drove from Birmingham airport to join the team for training.


At the time of writing these notes we do not have international clearance, so I am unsure as to whether David will be available for selection today. Hopefully he is.

Our first two home games have ended in victory. Let's see if we can't achieve another hat-trick and make it three in a row today.









WHEN A PLAYER IS READY

The reduction of the first team squad over the last few weeks means that we are going to have to rely on the younger element of the playing staff at Molineux more and more in the coming reserve season.

But it isn't just about plucking one of the lads out of the youth team and putting him straight into the reserves. A lot more thought has to go into things than that.

I take a healthy interest in the youth players and as often as I can I watch their games as well as taking a look at them in training. And I am constantly having conversations with the youth team coach, Chris Turner, with regards to how players are progressing, and whether or not they are ready for a game in the reserves.

I am always guided by what Chris has to say. He realises, as I do, that if a player is thrown into a higher level of football too quickly, then his game could suffer. Younger players are prone to dips in form and a bad game could have a marked affect on a lad's confidence. Just having the natural ability is, of course, vital. But it isn't the only factor to be taken into consideration.

Physical presence is another important aspect, some of these boys are still just 16 and they still need to fill out. If you field them in the reserves, rather than the youth team where they are up against lads of their own age, and they come up against a big player who's been in the game for years - well you can imagine


what could happen.

why Chris and I have such

involved conversations.

Last season saw the likes of Nathan Lamey, Gary Haveron, Matthew Murray and Paul Loughlin, to name but a few, rising from the youth ranks to reserve level. And there's Mark Jones who made his first team debut on Tuesday which is what it's all about.

Already this season we have given Shane Tudor a run out - and he did very well as these youngsters generally do for me. They have marvellous talent and they all want to better themselves. But in this learning process, they must not be pushed to quickly.



Last Saturday we started our league season with a 1-1 draw at Notts County, Adam Proudlock scoring late on to earn us a share of the points.

The game itself was not a classic, we had a few chances early on in the game which we should have taken. Our overall play was always good enough to keep the pressure on County and as the opportunities went by I was always concerned about being caught on the break.

Unfortunately I was proved right when Notts County scored against the run of play. After the goal they did put us under pressure but we managed to hold out until half-

time only one goal behind.

After the break, with the wind slightly behind us, we took total control of the game and if we had showed that little bit more composure in and around the box, we would have wrapped the game up and not have had to wait for Adam's strike to rescue us.

The result is a good start for us as Notts County are always difficult opponents on there own pitch. Talking about the pitch, we could not believe how small the playing area was. It was really more suited to schoolboys than professional players. This first game in the Midland Youth League, for the majority of the side, opened a few of the players' eyes because they have been used to training and playing on a super training ground pitch at Compton, then they have had a play on a surface that was uneven and small.

It can only add to their footballing education, and hopefully they will learn from this experience as most of the away fixtures will be played on inferior pitches compared to Compton.

This season I have the biggest squad of players since I arrived two years ago. We have around 22 YTS players I say around because Ryan Green is still of the age of a youth player but we see no benefit to Ryan in including him in the youth side this year. Competition for places is going to be fierce and I have already informed the players that reputations and last year's success count for nothing when it comes to selecting teams. I want everyone working hard to make it difficult for me to select a team. If we have this, and I am sure we will. then we should have another good season in front of us.

Our ambitions this year will obviously be to retain the Midland League title. Every team we come up against this year will try that little bit harder as we are favourites to land the Championship according to the League Secretary, so we will have to get used to that sort of pressure.

The major cup competitions are something that I would like to see us do better in. We have disappointed ourselves in the last few years, so this year hopefully we can go further in the FA Youth Cup and the Southern Junior Cup. Both competitions will include some strong opposition.

But, most importantly, we hope to continue to provide young players for the first team squad. We have every confidence in doing this as we believe that we have a tremendous crop of young players that, in the coming months ahead, will push on up through the ranks.


5 PLAYED A MAJOR PART IN

Gary Haveron is entering his second year with us. He is a current under 18 Northern Ireland international and only this week he was joining up with Gordon Simms to go and play in a tournament, in Wales, for his country.

Since Gary arrived from Belfast 12 months ago he played a major part in last season's youth success. He can either play left centre back or as a natural left back. He is comfortable at both pos tions. Gary has also featured quite often in the reserves and he did himself proud when he represented the first team at Northampton during pre-season.

He has always done well whenever he has had to step up a level and his international experience has obviously helped him. He now has to push on and keep working hard at his game and hopefully gain a professional contract at the club.

Born in Glasgow, with an accent drawn from Leeds, Liverpool and London, Iffy Onuora finally landed in Swindon from Gillingham last March. He was soon taking off again - to score with a diving header in his first game for the club, a winning goal at Queens Park Rangers - before making his home debut against Wolves.

Onuora's brave performances in the front line helped Swindon stave off relegation last season and he was off the mark for this campaign with the opening goal in last Saturday's 1-1 draw with Sunderland. His attitude was epitomised after a bizarre injury sustained against Charlton last season when an accidental collision with the referee left him nursing a depressed fracture of the cheekbone. But the £120,000 signing returned for the final two games, determined to do all he could to keep the team in the First Division.

Determination is now the key note to Swindon's ambitions as they prepare to do battle with several clubs of greater resources and tradition. "When I got there last March, confidence was pretty low," admitted the 31-year-old. "We finished off with a some heavy defeats at Birmingham and Norwich. But the positive thing to come out of that was everyone is so determined now.

"We had a big talk about what had gone wrong and a few home truths were exchanged. We haven't set ourself targets as such, because there are some big clubs in this division and you can't go around saying you're going to do this or that to them. But what we all agreed is we could improve and this season we are determined to do ourselves justice."

To that end the Swindon players have been rolling their sleeves up and putting a grimace on their faces ever since the fixtures were drawn out of the hat. "When you see your first two away games are at Sheffield United and Wolves, both of whom you could realistically expect to be up there in promotion contention, and your first home game is with Sunderland, who could so easily have been in the Premiership by now, then you know you've got your work cut out.

"In a way, even though we lost at Bramall Lane, we were quite happy, because at least we knew we had done ourselves justice. Of course we'd be happy with a result at Wolves - God, a win would be brilliant - but we don't set targets."

As a forward, who has scored 63 League goals for four clubs since breaking into the professional game late with Huddersfield Town, Onuora appreciates Wolves' strike force of Steve Bull and Robbie Keane. "Everyone in the country seems to be talking about the young lad," he said. "Then of course they've got the old scoring machine himself so we'll have to be wary. I've also played against Dean Richards a few times when he was at Bradford and I was at Huddersfield and he's gone on done very well for himself, with the best yet to come.

"It's not my job to talk about how other clubs should do but with the facilities and stature Wolves have, the players and manager are under pressure to finish in the top six."


Onuora, who also had a spell with Mansfield Town before joining Gillingham two years ago and enjoying his best season with 23 goals in 1996/97, is a level-headed individual. "I


don't set myself targets. I know when I've played well and when I haven't. Even if I've scored but not had a good game all round, I'm conscious of it: I don't take too much notice of the newspapers. I suppose I am my own biggest critic.

"Playing alongside George Ndah


means my last two strike partners have been pretty pacey, as Ade Akinbiyi was quick at Gillingham. I'm just happy if I can keep up with them."

Supplying the ammunition for Swindon's strikers is former Wolves favourite Mark Walters who has been in sparkling early-season form and crossed for Onuora to head home against Sunderland. "Mark's a great footballer and from a striker's point of view. To see him on the wing supplying you with the ball is ideal."

Swindon's most expensive import of recent years after joining from Crystal Palace for £500,000 last November, Ndah got off to a sensational start when he scored after 12 minutes of his debut against Middlesbrough. But a serious knee injury curtailed his impact last season. Now he'll be looking to add to the goalscoring start he has made in the Worthington Cup in a pacey attacking parternship with Iffy Onuora.

Steve McMahon breaks out into a chuckle when asked about the budget he has at his disposal for strengthening his Swindon squad.

"A budget? Isn't that when you've got some money to spend?" inquires the Swindon manager, who has reshaped a squad who led the First Division last November by bringing in four free-transfer signings this summer. "I'm not happy with it but I've got to be realistic. This is how we operate here and that dictates your ambitions."

Swindon's lack of strength in depth contributed to a disappointing second half of season last term and the Wiltshire club eventually finished 18th, four points clear of relegation to a division they won in style a couple of years ago.

McMahon, three times a Championship winner and twice an FA Cup holder in his six years playing for Liverpool, has been accustomed to triumph throughout his career. McMahon went to the 1990 World Cup Finals alongside Steve Bull in an international career that brought him 17 caps. But now he is having to cut his coat according to his cloth at the County Ground and has different aspirations for the midterm future.

"We want to go for mid-table and then finish the season better than we did last time," said the former England international, 37 two days ago. "Then we'll see where that takes us."

The fixture list has hardly been kind to Swindon and they lost 2-1 at Sheffield United and drew 1-1 at home to Sunderland before anticipating today's visit to Wolves. "People who have got us to go down this season probably picked the start of the fixture list," said McMahon. "But we've played two games, got a good point from a tricky start and we can take a lot of positive things.

"It is a tough start to the season but we've done fine," he elaborated. "We did well last Saturday and we

did okay at Sheffield United on the opening day. Wolves is obviously a big test for us as they've had two great results and their tails are up, aren't they? But two games don't mean a great deal in terms of promotion and relegation. Look at us: after 17 games last year, we were

"You've got to be consistent over a whole season. Everyone knows that if Wolves show that, they can be the best of teams in this division. They're a wellorganised side, they've got good players right through and even though Dougie Freedman has moved on, they've got players to come in.

"Without wishing to sound repetitive, Robbie Keane's the man, isn't he? His name is on everyone's lips, a bit like Michael Owen and he looks like he could go a long way in the game."

McMahon has also had to scour the market for exciting youngsters and free transfers. He has brought in the experience of Gareth Hall, who cost Sunderland £300,000 a couple of years ago, and Alan Reeves, similarly valued by Wimbledon in recent times, to boost his defence, Jimmy Glass, Bournemouth's colourful goalkeeper, has also cost nothing while Adam Willis, untried at Coventry, will also supplement McMahon's squad.

"We haven't spent a thing this summer," confirmed McMahon, who did spend £500,000 on George Ndah and £120,000 on Iffy Onuora last season. "But we make the best of what we have. You can only work within your limits."

After four years in charge at Swindon, McMahon is becoming adept at such a skill.

The two encounters with Swindon Town last season could hardly have had a different game content. At Molineux an autumnal encounter was laced with spectacular goals, inspired debuts and controversy as the game finished 3-1 in Wolves favour with only 19 players remaining on the field at the final whistle.

But for all the excitement on that sunny Saturday afternoon, the return fixture at the County Ground five months later was to finish in a tedious goal-less draw with little to cheer a small midweek crowd.

The first game saw Wolves introduce two new players to their ranks. Up front was Dougie Freedman, a midweek signing from Crystal Palace, and in midfield was Paul Simpson who, at that time, had been loaned out from Derby County.

And the two new boys combined to give Wolves a 12th minute lead. Simpson fed a short pass to Freedman who unleashed a 25 yard rocket shot into the top corner of the net. But, within five minutes, an unsavoury incident ended in a double sending off. A terrible two footed tackle by Lee Collins on Carl Robinson resulted in the young Welshman writhing in agony on the ground.

Collins was dismissed for his actions as was Steve Bull who was incensed by the tackle and was accused by the referee of grabbing Collins by the throat - a charge later dropped on viewing of video evidence, the red card punishment being replaced by that of a yellow one.

Swindon hauled themselves back into the game with a 25th minute penalty which was converted by Chris Hay after Dariusz Kubicki had fouled Wayne Allison. Shortly after the goal, Town's Chris Hay was booked for kicking the ball away. It.was an action he was to regret for after a 68th minute deliberate hand ball, resulting in a second bookable offence, he too was red carded.

The game looked to be petering out towards a draw when two goals in as many minutes sealed victory for Wolves. With just 12 minutes to go, Keith Curle glanced home a header following a right wing cross from the lively Simpson who capped a fine debut with a tremendous goal moments later.

Fraser Digby's clearance fell at the midfielder's feet and, with the goal-keeper struggling to make his ground, Simpson sent an exquisite forty plus yard chip into the back of the net.

Chances for each side in the return fixture could probably be counted on one hand. A dire first half ended with Adrian Williams heading Simon Osborn's corner against the bar. In the second period substitute Steve Bull had a couple of half chances and had a justifiable penalty appeal turned down, whilst Don Goodman was just wide with a low drive.

But it was one of those games that seemed to have goal-less draw written all over it from the opening minutes and the crowd of 7,770 seemed relieved when referee Leake brought the proceedings to an end.


One of the most popular Wolves players of recent years is undoubtedly the man fondly Christened 'Psycho' by Molineux fans-midfielder Keith Downing. His commitment on the pitch was unquestionable and his industrious workrate the platform for many victories as Wolves stormed to the Forth and Third Division Championships in successive seasons.

VICTORIES

Keith was born in Oldbury in July, 1965, and he played his early soccer with his school team, Newton Albion of Smethwick. On leaving school he had a two year apprenticeship with Chelsea but wasn't taken on. So he joined up with non-League Mile Oak Rovers before Notts County took him into League soccer in the winter of 1984.

It was just over three years later, in July 1987, that Graham Turner acquired his services for Wolverhampton Wanderers on a free transfer. It was the start of an affair between player and club that was to last for six happy years during which he not only collected those two Championship medals, but also one from the Sherpa Van Trophy Final against Burnley at Wembley.

Whilst he was never a prolific goalscorer, his tireless enthusiasm for the game captured the hearts of the supporters. Hard in the tackle, but never unfair, he was just the player needed in the climb



from the two basement Leagues where finesse is a word rarely used to describe footballing styles.

In all, Keith played 228 times for Wolves and he scored 11 goals before there was an almost reluctant parting of the ways when he made the short move to St Andrews.

But with the change of venue came a change of luck and in a year with Blues he played just one first team game. Signed by Terry Cooper, he suffered a bad ankle injury in his early days at Birmingham and, by the time he'd recovered, Barry Fry had moved into the manager's chair and brought in a host of players.

Such was the size of the squad, it was clear that there was no room for a despondent Downing. So he moved to another Midlands club, this time Stoke City where he spent a season. He had a short spell on loan with Cardiff before making a final move - this time to Hereford United where a stress fracture in his back meant that his playing days were over at the age of just 31.

BUSY TIMES

Football is still very much a part of Keith Downing's life even though he has had to hang up his boots. In the close season of 1996 he was offered the job of Youth Team coach at Hereford. The Bulls, relegated from the Football League and struggling because of lack of funds, were so short staffed that he suddenly found himself taking care of the reserve team too.

At the helm was former Wanderers manager Graham Turner who was forced to move upstairs to help keep the club afloat. With only Turner and his former Molineux midfielder in attendance at Edgar Street as coaches, it meant that the role of first team coach was added to the other duties Keith had undertaken.


"I was a bit surprised that it all happened so quickly," said Keith. "I always had the ambition to stay in the game when I'd finished playing - more so on the youth side of things. Because of the difficulties at Hereford, I found that my rise through the ranks was pretty fast. I'm still only 33 but it's a good challenge for me.

"After I became first team coach we enjoyed a good run and ended last season by going 13 games unbeaten which lifted us up to sixth place in the final table. The team is a very young one and there are a couple of former Molineux boys in it - Gavin Mahon and Richard Leadbeater.

"Obviously, promotion back to the Football League has to be the aim though I know it isn't going to be easy. But the ladsare very enthusiastic and it can only do their confidence good playing in the Vauxhall Conference where the standard of football is higher than a lot of people think."

With three teams to coach soare time is very much a rarity though he does find as much as he can to spend with wife Claire and 19 month old son James at their Bromsgrove home. "I do get really busy," he says. "And obviously the family come first when I get some spare time. I hardly ever get the chance for a game of golf now.

"But I do enjoy doing a spot of radio commentary for Radio WM if there's a night game, and I've been on The Wulf too. I love coming back to Wolverhampton. I've still got lots of friends there and everyone was always very good to me - and they still are in fact. It's almost as if I've never been away from the town."




"We drew my old club Notts County in the Area Final and did well to hold them to a one all draw at Meadow Lane which set things up for us nicely at Molineux," he recalls.

"Although only two sides of the ground were open, there was a tremendous atmosphere and everyone was really fired up for the game. And we couldn't have had a better start thanks to Bully. With less than half an hour gone he'd scored twice and we were well on our way.

"The icing on the cake came midway through the second half though, when I scored against my old mates. Robbie Dennison took a corner which was only half cleared. The ball fell just nicely for me on the edge of the box and I hit it on the volley.

"It was one of those that either disappears into the crowd or gets blocked. But I caught it just right and the ball flew into the top corner. After the game I met up with my late father Gordon, along with some friends, and we had a great time in an Italian restaurant on the Tettenhall Road. It was the perfect end to a perfect day - one I'll never forget."


Of the early pacesetters in Division One, successive wins for Wolves, Birmingham and Bruce Rioch's Norwich will not have surprised too many people. But Watford, where Wolves travel next Friday night, were not ranked pre-season as promotion hopefuls and their six-point start deserves due credit.

But then their manager Graham Taylor, has proved time and time again that he knows what he is doing at club level. The former Wolves and England manager led his first footballing love to the Second Division title last spring, after a brilliant first half of season, and has made some interesting transfers this summer.

Making his Watford league debut as a substitute in last Saturday's 1-0 win over Bradford was one Tony Daley, released from Molineux in the close season after his horrendous injury problems. He hasn't started a league game since December, 1995, but, having made his name under Taylor at Aston Villa and winning his seven England caps under the same manager, the 30-year-old winger should at least get the opportunity to prove himself during his three-month contract at Vicarage Road.

Taylor has also dipped into the lower divisions, buying Allan Smart from Carlisle for an initial £75,000, and shopped abroad, bringing Michel Ngonge in on a free transfer from Turkish club Samsunspor. The Zaire international scored Watford's winning goal against Bradford, when Dean Yates, an excellent centre-half bedevilled by injuries during his time at Derby County, made his league debut for Watford.

With the Sky cameras illuminating the fixture, a return to Vicarage Road should provide a lively start to Wolves' Bank Holiday weekend which concludes with the visit to Molineux of Stockport County, 4-3 winners in the corresponding fixture at the end of last season, on Monday. Former Molineux star Paul Cook has just returned to their side, though Andy Mutch has moved to Conference side Barrow and Tom Bennett is still out with his broken-leg injury.





It's my job on matchdays to make sure that the players have everything they need to prepare for the game.

Helping me with my day's work are two YTS lads, Paddy Mitchell and Scott McQuade. The lucky pair have been assigned to assist me all season, and, with the help of four other youth trainees, will see to it that everything runs smoothly for the two teams.

The most important thing to arrange is that our lads all have the right kit to warm up and then play in.

Players have different preferences as to what they want, and you get to know all their individual ways. For instance, Simon Osborn has a lucky vest, and I've just learned that Fernando Gomez likes to wear a brand new pair of socks every game!

While I'm laying out the kit, the YTS lads on duty with me will be making sure that the players' boots are ready and the practice and match footballs are all blown up.

With help from the young lads, and Graham Hughes and Cliff Moss, we make sure that both dressing rooms and the referee's room are stocked with soap and drinks, sandwiches, and a couple of packets of chewing gum to aid concentration!


It's important to keep the place as tidy as possible - which isn't easy when you've got forty or more blokes confined to a small area! So once everything is ready, we give the place a good tidyup before the players come in for their meeting. Then the stadium's professional cleaners come in make sure it's spick and span.

In the meeting, the gaffer goes through the team and makes sure every player knows his job. When that's done, I go around making sure everyone has what they need and I do my bit to get them fired up for the game.

Next, the lads get changed, sort out anything they might need for their guests, and then go out to warm up. This is another opportunity for a quick run around with the broom and mop.

The two team sheets are submitted to the referee 45 minutes before the game by the managers and captains of the two teams. The club press officer is also there to make note of the line-ups to report back to the press room. If the visiting team arrive late, they are probably still getting changed at this stage, so I will do the knocking on their door for the press officer, in order to spare her blushes!


During the match I sit on the bench and offer any help I can. Sometimes the physio or a player might need something which I can easily pop back to the dress-



ing room to get.


After the game we have to make sure that all the kit is bagged up ready to go to the laundry and that both dressing rooms are tidy enough for the cleaners to come into. The YTS lads who so far haven't made any contribution then come in and take over from their colleagues who have been working hard, and I put a list of clean-up duties on the noticeboard.

After that, to round off my matchday, it's a quick glass of 'pop' in the Golden Room to hopefully celebrate a Wolves victory!



ADE ADEBULA: SETTING THE GOAL STANDARD

Norwich midfielder and full Welsh international Craig Bellamy has kicked off the season with a flirtation with Carrow Road history.

Bellamy's goal in last Saturday's 2-1 win at the Stockport side managed by former Canaries boss Gary Megson meant he had scored in five successive matches going back to the end of 1997/98. That left him only two goals, or games, short of the club record set by Errol Crossan in 1958/59 and Ross Jack in 1982.

But the run came to an end with the 1-0 midweek Worthington Cup win at home to Swansea, when the only goal came from former Wolves striker Iwan Roberts. Norwich have signed Manchester City midfielder Ged Brannan on a month's loan.

Albion's Lee Hughes and

Birmingham's Dele Adebola have also been on the goal standard with avengeance in the opening two weeks of the campaign, their contribution to a scorching start here in the West Midlands being underlined by three and four goals so

Adebola's feat for a Blues side who nudged back above Wolves in the table with their televised 3-1 home win over Crystal Palace on Sunday, could prove particularly lucrative. A £25,000 BMW is on offer to the first Blues player to hit 25 goals this term! He scored again in the Cup at Millwall on Wednesday.

Blues, like Wolves, went through the entire close season without buying, but swung into transfer-market action by tying up the £1m capture of Derby defender Gary Rowett and parading him before their third win in three games.

Albion may have started brightly, like their two neighbours, in the League, but they came a right cropper in their Worthington Cup return at

Brentford, hammered 3-0 on the night and 4-2 on aggregate during a week in which six First Division clubs perished to lower-grade opponents.

One of them was Graham Taylor's Watford, who had Tony Daley in their League line-up for the first time when he went on as a sub for the final minutes of their second successive First Division win - 1-0 at home to Bradford. But the Hornets. who stung many a big club in the 1970's and 1980's, found the boot on the other foot on Tuesday as Cambridge clung to a 1-1 draw at Vicarage Road that put them through over two legs.

A bright spot for Taylor has been 31-year-old Michel Ngonge, a Belgium-born striker of Zairean parents who has been playing in Turkey. He this summer became the manager's first-ever signing on the evidence of video-film alone and has quickly responded with a goal in both the League and the Worthington Cup.

No-one can accuse Bradford of having been dormant in the marketplace, but their dealings have not yet paid dividends.

They go into action today still seeking their first Division One points of the campaign despite breaking their highest outlay for the second time in a few days by splashing £1.3m on Arsenal reserve forward Isaiah Rankin. Paul Jewell had earlier recruited former Wolves striker Lee Mills from Port Vale for around £1m.

Rankin, 20, scorer of 68 goals in 114 appearances for the Gunners' youth and reserve teams, and five in 11 while on loan at Colchester, got off the mark for Bradford when he scored their winner in a tense two-leg cup struggle with Lincoln.

The Port Vale side Mills has left behind has made a miserable start. As well as going out to Chester in the Worthington Cup, and having Allen Tankard and new signing Peter Beadle injured in the process, they have lost their first two League matches - the latter of

them perhaps surprisingly.

Four years on the trot, they had won away to Huddersfield, most crucially and spectacularly on the last day of last term. But they lost 2-1 at the McAlpine Stadium seven days ago, although the Yorkshire club saw Steve Jenkins become their second player to be red-carded in First Division games this term.

Kevin Phillips, top scorer in Division One last season, celebrated the signing of a new four-year contract at Sunderland by driving in the Wearsiders' equaliser at Swindon last weekend and getting on the score-sheet again in the midweek second-leg Wothington win at home to York.


How newly-promoted Grimsby could do with some of Phillips' goals! They failed to trouble the scorers for the fourth time in four matches when they drew 0-0 at Preston in their cup second leg. Fortunately, they were more potent with penalties and went through in the shoot-out! Last Saturday, they lost 2-0 in the League away to a Bolton side, for whom Dean Holdsworth and Nathan Blake were again on target.

Bury appear to be enjoying life, under Neil Warnock. Well up the table after four points from the removed opening two games, they ran amok with a 4-1 cup win at Burnley despite falling behind just before half-time.

And another of last season's First Division new arrivals, Crewe, have clicked following two opening defeats. They saw off Barnsley with two rare goals by Chris Lightfoot and then overturned a first-leg deficit to put out Oldham at Gresty Road, thanks to new signing Ross Jack.

Goals, too, at last at Ipswich, who hit Exeter for five to complete a 6-2 aggregate win three days after their second successive goalless League deadlock. One of them came from Alex Mathie, who has been a transfer target for Preston.
