à lot of our supporters will have been asking what we've done differently in the last four pames to solveys such excellent results i can maker that in two wints not much Granted. we may have approached one or two things differently because of a change in personnel, but there certainly hasn't been one big aspect of our game plan that we've changed which has suddenly caused things to start going our way. we been saying all along that our performances this season have warranted for more of a reward than the results we've actually been getting. Fortune is a will thing in football, and if the rub of the green is consistently going against you, then it can start to affect your self-belief a wee bit. On the other hand, hough, when the tide turns and you begin to get the odd break here and there, confidence begins to snowball. That's what's happened to us, to some extent, in the last month or so.

this funny sometimes, the little things that can change a situation. People will point to the victory up at Sunderland or the seven goals against Huddersfield as the events which have got us motoring again – and although those results have definitely played their part, for me we experienced a turning point of sorts after the home game against Ipswich in November.

In that game where we ended up being down to nine men, but in the last twenty minutes Ipswich were hanging on to a one-goal lead, despite having two more men on the park. The players gave their all that afternoon, and every one of them was applauded off the pitch at full time. In my opinion, that was the turning point. After the game I sat the boys down in the dressing room and said:

"Remember that. We might have lost today, but the supporters know you gave everything you had out there, and you got a standing ovation. These fans are desperate for you to do well, but all they are asking is for you to show them that sort of effort and commitment."

Since then we've enjoyed some excellent results and a real upturn in fortunes. The best way I can underline that is by looking at the victory at Portman Road last Saturday... I felt very confident going into

the game, because although lipswich are second in the table at the moment, we'd more than matched them four weeks earlier in a 'nine men' game at Oakwell. We'd done our homework – we knew that they're a very good counter-attacking side – and apart from one hairy moment early on when they cleared a corner and then broke away, I can't recall Tony Bullock having to make a save.

That's something else which has given us a platform to build on – the fact that we've not conceded many goals of late. Against Watford and Ipswich we kept clean sheets, as we also have done in the last two games at reserve level. Shutting the opposition out like that also fosters confidence right throughout the squad.

We were good value for the points at Ipswich, even though we had what you'd call an under-strength side. The lads that have come in during the last few games, though, have acquitted themselves exceptionally well. Young Karl Rose, Baggy, Deon Burton – and of course, Mike Turner – have all greatly impressed me. Mike's debut was an absolute dream come true for him, real 'Roy of the Rovers' stuff. I've been delighted with the boy since he came from Bilston Town two weeks ago, and once he gets used to full-time training and so on, he should mature into a valuable member of the squad. Believe me, Mike has the ability to achieve a lot in this game, and his destiny is in his own hands now.

Our results over the last four weeks have lifted confidence sky-high, and what's more we've thoroughly deserved everything we've got. Beating Huddersfield so comprehensively will obviously stand out, but bear in mind also that our last three away games have been against the top three teams in the table – and we've come away with seven points. And, without labouring the point, it could even have been nine, because I felt we were the better side at Vicarage Road.

What the boys are starting to realise now is that we are getting these results against the best sides in the division because we are one of the best sides. Naturally, the last thing I want is for anyone to become over-confident, but we've proved over the last few games that we can live with, and beat, our closest competitors. If we can ally that sort of self-belief with the kind of work-rate we've shown all season, then in the months to come we'll be able to have a really good crack at clawing back some of the points we've dropped in the first half of the season.

As I've said though, complacency is always a danger – and if we don't approach this afternoon's challenge in the right frame of mind, I'm sure Jimmy Quinn's lads would be happy to burst our little bubble. Let's try to make sure that doesn't happen.

I'd like to finish by wishing all our supporters a very Merry Christmas... enjoy the game today, get behind the lads, and we'll see you all on 28 December!



MATCH REPORT

One man stretchered off, another sent off, a missed penalty... if someone had told you that all this misfortune would befall the Reds in the opening 45 minutes of a daunting trip to table-toppers Sunderland, then you probably wouldn't have given their hopes much credence.

But this event-packed power struggle will live long in the memory of those who witnessed it – more akin to a Hitchcock thriller than a football match, with its unpredictable twists and turns, red herrings, nerve-jangling suspense, and some fabulous performances.

After a relatively quiet first half-hour (in view of the drama that was to unfold later) which the hosts just about shaded, the contest suddenly exploded into life on 33 minutes, when Sunderland centre-back Darren Williams contrived to get in a calamitous mix-up with his goalkeeper... and Ashley Ward arrive on the scene to sidefoot the unclaimed ball into a vawning goal.


Four minutes later, the Reds' top scorer had the chance to extend his team's advantage but blazed over the bar from the penalty spot – and worse was to follow for the former Crewe centre-forward when he was red-carded less than sixty seconds later following a flare-up after he confronted Williams.

With that dismissal, the game took on an entirely different form – Barnsley's incisive counter-attacking being replaced by dogged determination as Peter Reid's juggernaut began to build up a head of steam. Sunderland poured forward remorselessly until relieved Tyke ears pricked up at the half-time whistle. A minute after the break, Bruce Dyer really gave the beleaguered defence something to hang onto with his first goal for his new club, capitalising on another error by Williams – who's backpass was woefully underhit, allowing Dyer to race through and fire past Thomas Sorensen.

This, of course, was like a red rag to a bull – Sunderland had not been beaten at their Stadium of Light fortress since September 1997, some 14 months ago, and they were determined not to surrender their mighty record. Two minutes after the hour, Chris Morgan was adjudged to have unfairly halted Dichio, Martin Scott stepped up to score from the spot, and the Roter roar increased a few decibels.

Wave after wave of red-and-white striped attackers beseiged the Barnsley goal, and when Niall Quinn met Scott's cross at the far post and the beanploe striker's header looped over Bullock, it just seemed a question of whether the ten men could cling on for an honourable draw.

They did much more than that, however... just as Sunderland were really turning the screw, a swift breakway ended with Sean McClare being upended by Kevin Ball in the area – and Darren Barnard stepped up to nervelessly rifle a low shot beyond Sorenson's right hand. Ten minutes later the whistle went again, and the majority of a 40,000 crowd left the Stadium of Light under a dark cloud.

DICKIE BIRD

Cricket legend Dickie Bird would have every right to grow tired of interviews as he approaches his 66th birthday, but when the topic of conversation is Barnsley FC, he is in his element....

It is a remarkable testament to Dickie's popularity that his autobiography is set to sell its one-millionth copy over the Christmas period. With the hardback and paperback editions both having topped the best sellers list since their release, it has been a story of success for the figure who was instantly recognisable behind the stumps in his decades of service to the world of cricket. In fact, it could be argued that Dickie Bird is as famous around the world as any cricketing figure this country has ever produced.

Opportunities for Dickie to see his beloved Tykes in action have been restricted with his book signings and his highly successful concert tours filling the diary in the last year, but he remains a committed Barnsley fan. "I don't get to Oakwell as much as I would like," he confirms. "But wherever I am in the country, I always look out for the results and the people at the Club deserve every success.

"Last season's Premiership experience was wonderful for everyone at Barnsley. I was delighted that the people who make this Club special had their chance in the spotlight.

From the directors to the ladies who wash the kit and of course the players and the management, it was a wonderful season. And the team did us proud.

"For the people like me who remembered Barnsley at the bottom of the Fourth Division with a couple of thousand people in the stands at Oakwell, seeing them beat Manchester United and Liverpool last season was incredible. Obviously we were disappointed in the end, but we proved that we can compete with the best and the bottom that the liverpool is the season was incredible. Kelly," he states. "He was magical to
watch. He played outside-left and

"Then there were the players who I saw at Oakwell and will never forget. A lot of the younger fans here today won't know anything about the likes of Frank Swift and Tom Finney, but I can tell you they were something else.

"You could argue that these players would not have lived with the modern stars, but I disagree. The lads are a lot fitter today, that is not in doubt. Yet I still feel that someone like Wilf Mannion could have adapted to the modern game. If they trained as hard as the players in the modern game, they could have been a match for them. When it came down to skill, they had it all. Tommy

Lawton and Joe Mercer were another couple of names I remember seeing at Oakwell.

"And then Matthews and Mortensen at Blackpool. They played against us the 1953 F.A. Cup and they were lucky to get through. Matthews did a bit of magic on the wing and whipped it across to Mortensen who shin-padded it in and they beat us 1-0. They went on to win the Cup that season in what remains one of the most famous Finals of all time, but

Dickie's tone takes a dip when the subject of England's flagging cricketers is raised, but he is heading out to watch the final two matches in the Ashes series over Christmas and still has a great passion for the game. "There is no better place to be than Australia at this time of the

year. I'm doing a bit of commentary for Australian TV and I'm sure I'll meet up with a few of our lads along the way.

"Darren Gough is a great lad who I have a lot of time for. He is a part-time Barnsely fan, even though he claims to be more than that, but you couldn't wish to meet a nicer fella. A great lad."

Dickie Bird doesn't have a bad word to say about anyone. It may be the reason that the British public have adopted him as one of their favourite sons.

FRANK TALIA

Born: 20.07.72

Melbourne-born Frank first came to England under Kenny Dalglish's management at Blackburn, but after failing to make a first team appearance at Rovers, he made his league bow on loan at Hartlepool. A switch to Swindon has seen him add to his league appearance tally.

DEFENDERS

MARK ROBINSON

Born: 21.11.68

Mark's form in the red of Barnsley was such that Newcastle United payed £450,000 to secure his services in March 1993. But first team chances were always limited at St. James' Park as the Kevin Keegan



revolution kicked in and he came to Swindon in a £600,000 deal in July 1994. Started his career at West Brom.

CRAIG TAYLOR

Born: 24.01.74

Brother of former Swindon favourite Shaun, Steve McMahon paid nonleague Dorchester Town £25,000 for his services and he has developed into a steady first teamer.

BRIAN BORROWS

Born: 20.12.60

Brian had the heartbreak of missing the 1987 F.A. Cup final through injury, forced to watch on as his team-mates lifted the famous silver trophy on what was the greatest day in the Sky Blues' history. Joined Swindon on a free from Coventry last month.

SOL DAVIS

Born: 04.09.79

A youngster who has made just six appearances for the side last season and has gone on to build a platform for himself this term. His slender build means he can look like a soft touch at the back, but he is anything but that.

ADAM WILLIS

Born: 21.09.76

Like Davis, Willis has made his first team breakthrough this season. Started his career in the Premiership with Coventry, but failed to make a single appearance for the Sky Blues before joining Swindon last season. At 22, he will be looking to progress his career rapidly in the next few months.

MIDFIELDERS

DARREN BULLOCK

Born: 12.02.69

A £400,000 signing from Huddersfield Town midway through the 1996/97 season, Darren has provided a cutting edge to the midfield with his aggressive and powerful displays. Started at non-league Nuneaton Borough.

KEVIN WATSON

Born: 03.01.74

Flame-haired Kevin started his career amongst the superstars at Spurs and only managed a handful of first team appearances for the North Londoners, not to mention loan spells at Brentford, Bristol City and Barnet. A move to Swindon has given him the chance of more regular action.


MARK WALTERS

Born: 02.06.64

A winger of whom so much was expected as he made his breakthrough in the professional game at Aston Villa. 
GEORGE NDAH

OCTOBER

- 3 Jimmy Quinn's first game in charge ends in defeat as Stockport win 3-2 at the County Ground. Swindon slip into the bottom three.
- 9 Quinn secures his first three points with an impressive 3-0 win over in-form Huddersfield. Iffy Onuora scores against his former club.
- 17 A narrow defeat at Ipswich sucks Swindon back into the relegation quagmire.
- 20 Ty Gooden's late goal secures a valuable point at Birmingham's St. Andrews.
- 24 "We need to start winning more games," is the message from Quinn after another draw, this time against West Brom. Town twice held the lead in a thriller at the County Ground.
- 31 Swindon might think that life is tough for them, but QPR arrive in Wiltshire in the midst of a real crisis. After losing 3-1, Rangers are rooted to the bottom of the table. Town's Leitch and Ndah pick up injuries in the game.

NOVEMBER

- 3 Winger Mark Walters signs a new contract that will keep him at the club into the next century.
- 7 Two Iffy Onuora goals seal a win away at Crewe who drop to the lowest depths of the First Division. It pushes the Robins through the 20 point barrier.

- 14 Swindon have not won at Bradford for over 40 years. It will be another year at least before they break that duck after a 3-0 thumping. "That was as bad as we have played since I came here," moans Quinn. Neale Fenn plays his first game on loan from Spurs.
 - 21 George Ndah comes back from injury to score against his former employers as Swindon beat Terry Venables' Crystal Palace 2-0.
 - 28 "We should have got something out of this one," was the verdict from Quinn after a disappointing 1-0 defeat at Grimsby.

DECEMBER

- 4 Ty Gooden damages a hamstring and could be out for up to a month.
- 5 Norwich climb into fourth place after a 1-1 draw against Swindon. Mark Walters scores the equaliser for Town.
- 8 Philippe Cuervo breaks his leg in a reserve game.
- 12 Onuora scores first against Bradford at the County Ground. But the visitors go on to record a crushing 4-1 win.

Taking on a football management job with the promise of no money and very little likelihood of any materialising would hardly receive the full backing of your doctor.

But that is exactly what Jimmy Quinn took on as he succeeded Steve McMahon as Swindon manager earlier this season. With his experiences as joint-manager alongside Mick Gooding at Reading to fall back on, Quinn appreciates that his task at the County Ground will be anything but easy.

Yet it seems he is at the club where he feels most at home. "A lot of my friends and family are Swindon fans and I have lived in this area for a long time," says Quinn. "It is a great job for me and I am enjoying every moment of it however tough things are from a financial point of view. I know there is no cash to spend on new players, but that was the situation when I came to the club so nothing has changed."

Quinn was the surprise choice to succeed Mark McGhee when he walked out on Reading in 1994 and his partnership with Mick Gooding threatened to end the theory that joint-management cannot work. They took the club to a second place finish in the league that season and would have earned automatic promotion if it were not for the Premiership's reduction in size.

They played out a dramatic Wembley play-off that was ultimately won by Bolton 4-3, but few who were present will ever forget the occasion. A Wembley classic in every sense of the word. So he was thrown into the deep end of coaching when he couldn't have expected it, but this is his first solo effort at lifting a flagging club and he couldn't have taken on a bigger task.

The slump of the team led by McMahon in the second half of last season meant that spirits were low when the season

started and the poor early form did little to alter that depressing mood. So the results achieved since Quinn's first match in charge against Stockport in October have been commendable.

"I just have to work with the resources I have available," continues Quinn. "I am hoping to bring in players on loan or free transfers and we have been looking at the non-league circles for some new talent. That means that results may not be turned around straight away. A good win could easily be followed by a defeat, but we have to try and find consistency.

"Our form at the County Ground has been pretty good since I came here, but the we have struggled away from home. That has been disappointing."

As a former Swindon player, the fans are certainly right behind Quinn in his mission and an appearance on Sky's Soccer AM by Swindon winger Mark Walters highlighted that everyone is mucking into the task ahead. "It is very different to what I was used to at Liverpool," confirmed Walters who has just committed his long term future to Swindon with a new contract.

"We all have to help out in any way we can and that means washing our own kit which is something different. It is good to see the other side of the game because life at Liverpool was everything you would expect it to be."

Quinn doubts whether Walters is being totally honest when he suggests that washing his own kit is fun. "I wouldn't have thought he enjoys it, but Mark is an excellent professional and gets on with the job."

MARKING HOOLIGANS OUT OF THE GAME

As a long-term football supporter herself, Home Office Minister Kate Hoey explains the thinking behind the Government's recently published consultation document on combating football hooliganism...

FOOTBALL's thriving. Our game's graced by some of the finest players in the world. Television viewers from China to Norway tune in to watch our matches because they know they are guaranteed excitement and entertainment.

Grounds are safe and comfortable – to a standard unimaginable just 15 years ago. Hooliganism inside stadiums is now a rarity, not routine. Families are flocking back to football and there are far more women at matches than when I first started watching Arsenal 30 years ago.

There's still a buzz from England's brave performance at the World Cup. But events off the field in France also showed we can't afford to be complacent about the thugs who masquerade as football supporters.





The conduct of this tiny minority shamed the vast majority of England fans who went to France solely to support their side and enjoy the football and the occasion.

It prompted the Government to review all existing football legislation to determine what else could be done to counter their threat to both our image abroad and our game at home.

But it is not just a matter of the Government legislating. It is, after all, your game and your enjoyment they are ruining as well. You also have a major part in rooting out hooliganism from soccer.

That's why we want your views on new proposals to tackle football hooliganism and to prevent it starting in the first place. I know you have views. I welcome the many constructive suggestions from genuine fans following the trouble in France.

We are putting forward a draft of new recommendations to tighten up the law and make sure punishments fit the crime. Some of these are closing existing loopholes. Some will be controversial.

Evidence from France this summer, for instance, suggests a ban on the sale and consumption of alcohol can reduce trouble. So to improve our bid for the World Cup in 2006, there is a proposal to give our police a similar power to be used in the most exceptional circumstances. This may not be universally popular but we want to listen to your views.

We believe the World Cup has also shown that there is a strong case for insisting convicted thugs are forced to hand in their passports before international matches or tournaments abroad – and report to their local police station – so they can't travel. And we also want your views on banning known hooligans from travelling to games even if they have not been convicted of football offences.

Among other recommendations are increasing to ten years the maximum ban from grounds for those convicted of football-linked hooliganism, extending ticket touting legislation to matches outside England, and creating a new offence of racist or indecent chanting.

We want to put new measures in place before Euro 2000. I promise you that the Government will play its part. But it is up to all of us – clubs, players, supporters' groups and the fan – to play a role in speaking out against the thugs and making it clear that hooligans will not be tolerated. Together, we can mark them out of our game.

PASSING BACK


1969

BARNSLEY 1 SWINDON TOWN 1 Saturday 1st February 1969

Back in the days of two promotion slots and two points for a win, Swindon were in a fabulous position when they visited Oakwell on the first day of February 29 years ago. The Wiltshire club were placed third in Division Three but had three games in hand over second-placed Bournemouth with only a point deficit, while there was only another solitary point between them and leaders Watford.

Barnsley were having a season of consolidation after their promotion at the conclusion of the previous campaign. Having said that, however, the home form was very impressive – with 17 wins and six draws recorded in their 23 league games at Oakwell the previous season. The 1968/69 season had opened with home defeats to Barrow and Gillingham, but of the 11 games at Oakwell since then, seven had been won and the other four drawn.

The pitch was very heavy on the day Swindon came to visit, and the rain which had been unrelenting all morning continued throughout the match. It was the state of the pitch, in fact, which contributed to Swindon's goal in the seventh minute... John Trollope, who seemed to play for Town forever, put in a seemingly harmless cross from the left which skidded in the mud, and without leaving the ground, slid across a stranded Roy Ironside to nestle in the far corner.

Town now showed the form which had taken them so high up the table and they had Barnsley on the rack as they made light of the conditions. For a time it looked a case of how many, but the Reds' twin centre-halves Eric Winstanley and Pat Howard stood firm against the assault. Slowly the tide turned and with the ageless John Bettany beginning to see more of the ball in midfield, the hosts began to pose some threats to Peter Downsborough's goal.

With only a minute of the half remaining, the equaliser came. Again, there seemed to be little danger when the ball was played forward into the visitors' penalty area... it looked to be running out for a goal kick where the penalty area crosses with the byline, when suddenly Bettany caught it up and despatched a firm volley from an acute angle, the ball crashing past a startled Downsborough via the underside of the crossbar.

Although the quagmire conditions worsened, the second half was a magnificent affair with both teams going all-out for the win. Both held the ascendancy for spells of the second period but neither could find that all-important winning goal. A draw, in the end, was a fair result – although both managers would put forward a case of chances that had been created but not taken.

At the season's climax, Barnsley finished in mid-table comfort, while Swindon were to be rewarded for an exceptional campaign with promotion to Division Two, losing out on the Championship to Watford only on goal average. However, Town's other – and more spectacular – conquest came in the League Cup. They sensationally carried off the trophy, beating Arsenal in an unforgettable final at Wembley, with winger Don Rogers, in particular, having a match to remember.

previously.

One would-be criminal who wasn't guite so lucky that day was the lad who attempted to rip off a pub jukebax at Stocksbridge, Sheffield. When the barman went down to the cellar to change one of the barrels, the thief managed to prise a panel off the side of the machine and successfully emptied it of cash and the records he wanted. Suddenly, he heard the barman coming back up - so quickly slammed the panel shut and prepared to act natural. Only one problem... his belt got caught in the door as he shut it, leaving him literally strapped to the machine - records in one hand, cash in the other.

This week Keith Lodge talks to...

Karl Rose

KARL ROSE was getting changed after a training session when Peter Shirtliff came up to him and said: "Nipper, the gaffer wants to see you."

His immediate reaction was, 'Oh no, what have I done wrong?' And it was with some trepidation that he went and knocked on the manager's door.

He need not have worried. Super John was all sweetness and light. "How's your injury coming along?" he asked, with obvious concern.

"Not bad, boss," replied Rosie. "I've managed to get through a week's training with no ill effects so far." That certainly made a refreshing change for the 20-year-old who had been sidelined for nine weeks with a troublesome knee injury which refused to clear up.

"Good," rejoined his gaffer. "So how do you fancy a game with the first team at Watford tomorrow?"

Karl's jaw dropped. It was the last thing he was expecting. All right, he was well aware that the Reds had been rocked by suspensions and injuries and they were down to the bare bones when it came to putting out a strike force, but he had not played for nine weeks and had only three days training behind him.

However, nothing ventured nothing gained. "Sure, boss," he said. "I'll go for it if you're happy to take the risk."

The team travelled down that afternoon and stayed overnight in a hotel. Karl was just settling down after the evening meal when the phone rang in his room. When he answered it, a voice at the other end of the line said: "Is that Karl Rose? I'm from the Daily Mirror and I'd like to do a special article about you."

Nipper, however, was not taken in. He had been tipped off in advance. The caller was, in fact, Sean McClare, who was in the adjoining room.

Recalled Rosie: "It was a good bit of fun and it helped relieve the tension, but I didn't get much sleep. The game was going round in my head. I was thinking, 'what if I miss an open goal, what if this or that happens?'"

However, he was quite happy with the way he performed, although disappointed not to take one of the two good chances that came his way.

"The goalkeeper made a good save from a first half header, but I might have done better with a shot in the second half. At least I got it on target, so it wasn't too bad. To score would have been the icing on the cake for me.

"I was satisfied with my game as a whole and it was a good result for the team. Watford were going well, with only one defeat at home. I thought we were the better side and could have won."

Karl knew he had performed satisfactorily when his dad, Barrie, told him afterwards that he had 'done all right'. "That's high praise from Dad. He keeps my feet firmly on the ground. He has been the biggest influence on my career. He has always encouraged me and been very supportive all the way."

The former Darfield Foulstone schoolboy also receives backing from Gemma, his girlfriend of two and a half years. A Wath girl, she was there in a family party of ten which travelled down for his league debut at Vicarage Road.

The only absentee was younger brother Lee – he also has a brother Jason, who is 21 – who was taking his theory examination as part of his driving test. The only consolation was that the 17-year-old passed with flying colours.

With three fellas in the house, Karl's Mum has also had to become a devotee of the game, although not quite as fanatical as her husband, who was the one who took Nipper to Oakwell as a young fan almost as soon as he could walk.

"It's a great thrill to play for the Reds because I've stood on the terracing behind the dug-out cheering them on as a supporter for as long as I can remember," says Karl. "When I signed associate schoolboy forms at the age of 15 there were several Premier League clubs interested, including Sheffield Wednesday. I almost signed for them, but the pull of my home-town team was too great, and I'm sure I made the right decision. All my family were chuffed to bits at Watford and it was a brilliant day."

On the Sunday he sat at home reading through the match reports in the papers and watching highlights on the telly, and he was still so excited that he hardly slept that night either, reliving every moment.







He was brought back down to earth the following day, however, when, after a training session on the astro turf his knee puffed up yet again.

"I couldn't believe it. I thought I had got over it. It's gone on so long. I've seen three specialists, had one operation, and they still haven't a clue what the problem is. I'm on a course of tablets now. If that doesn't work I will have to go see someone else. It's all very worrying."

He travelled down to Ipswich last Saturday, but was not fit enough to take his place on the bench. Latest recruit Mike Turner stepped in and went on as substitute to make one goal and score the other in a fairly-tale debut. It's an ill wind...

There have been times when Karl thought he was never going to get his first team chance. Just when it looked as though there might be an opening for him, new players were brought in. First Georgi Hristov. Then Ashley Ward. Now there is competition from Turner.

"I have no complaints about the way have been treated, though. I have had a lot of help from Malcolm Shotton, Colin Walker, Peter Shirtliff, Danny Wilson and now John Hendrie. All have played a part in my development and I am grateful to them for that."

Youth team coach Walker did, however, give him a bit of stick after his rare appearance against Watford. "Humph,"muttered Colin. "I see you're fit enough to play when you want. It's alright if the first team picks you."

Karl reflects: "It was a surprise to be called up. No doubt about that. But a nice one, although I was rather thrown in at the deep end with so little preparation. I don't think I let anyone down."

He was delighted, too, that Paul Bagshaw also made his league debut as substitute in that game. "Baggy and I have come through the ranks together. It was great to make our league debuts in the same game. We're big mates. Baggy slept at our house after this week's players' party. Gemma came and collected us. It was a case of three steps forward, six back, but we got there in the end. It was a good do."

Karl's immediate ambition is to make the breakthrough as a regular in the first team and help the Reds regain their place in the Premiership. In the long-term he would like to play for England in the team that wins the World Cup!

Nobody's done that for 32 years, but you've got to aim for the top, haven't you?

It was nice to keep a clean sheet in the goalless draw with Sheffield Wednesday on Monday night.

Our latest recruit, 22-year-old Mike Turner, signed from Doc Martens League side Bilston, had a scoring debut for us in the 3-2 home victory over Wolves at Oakwell and was delighted to have done so well against a teamfrom his neck of the woods.

Another good performance away to Coventry, where he did not play the full game, was enough to earn him his first team chance as substitute at lpswich last Saturday, and he again notched a debut goal.

He did brilliantly in that game to not only score the second goal in stoppage time, but also set up the first goal for Sean McClare.

He has been signed to the end of the season and it is up to him to impress sufficiently for us to offer him an extended contract then. He has certainly made a terrific start.

It must seem like a dream for him at the moment and I am delighted for the lad, although he knows as well as anybody that there is a lot of hard work ahead of him as he adjusts to full-time training.



One of our Academy youngsters, Neil Austin, having been substitute for England Under-15 Schoolboys for their second match in the Adidas Victory Shield series against Northern Ireland, was given a place in the starting line-up for the second game against Scotland, and he responded with a splendid all-round performance.

Although it was not an entertaining game – Scotland set out to spoil and stole victory with a late breakaway goal after being outplayed for most of the time – Neil did everything asked of him. Required to play a covering role he acquitted himself admirably, although disappointed that he was unable to get forward as much as he would have liked.

A key member of the Barnsley Schools' team which shared the English Schools' Trophy with Bristol last season, he has been with us since the age of ten, and is obviously a great prospect. He is currently a pupil at Holgate School.

Meanwhile, a 3-0 away win over Newcastle United provided further evidence of the continuing development of our Under-19 Academy side.

It was a complete 14-man performance. The players now just have to believe more in themselves. They have shown that they can do it. There was just one blemish and that was the fact that, despite me having a moan in the previous few games about our slow start, we did it again. Fortunately on this occasion the home team failed to take advantage and we took

control from then on.

We went in front after 15 minutes and never looked back. An Andrew Smith corner was not cleared properly and Ryan O'Carroll fired home a great shot from the edge of the penalty box.

BIRMMINGHAM CITY

The Blues' seven goal feast at Oxford had manager Trevor Francis purring about the performance of his three strikers - though it was only the fourth time this season that Paul Furlong, Peter Ndlovu and Dele Adebola had played together for Birmingham. Francis thought the whole team did well but reserved special praise for the City fans who stood in the pouring rain on the exposed Manor Ground terraces. The huge win was ample revenge for the Blues who had lost at home to Oxford a few weeks before. By coincidence, Birmingham came to cash-strapped Oxford's assistance by buying United's Simon Marsh for £250,000.

PORTSMOUTH

Pompey fans may well be glad to see the back of 1998, but before the New Year is here they might have a few more traumas to go through. The latest upheaval coincided with a 0-1 home defeat to Grimsby - their fourth home league defeat of the season - and several hundred disgruntled fans took to the field at half-time and at the end of the match to demonstrate their anger at the club's financial affairs. Stories in the press have said that under chairman Martin Gregory the club is losing £40,000 a week and in the light of a £5m debt is preparing to sell leading scorer John Aloisi to Charlton at a 'knock down price', though there were doubts whether the deal would go through as Charlton's management was unhappy with the level of publicity surrounding any deal. Indeed, all the Portsmouth players are up for sale but boss Alan Ball has been excluded by his chairman from any negotiations. Now the club may well face a fine if the F.A. judges the pitch invasion as a breach of security.

WOLVES

The failure of Wolves to put themselves among the front runners in the promotion stakes has led to a number of players at Molineux being told already that they won't be retained after this season. Manager Colin Lee decided there must be many changes at the club and reportedly Mark Atkins, Paul Simpson and Darren Ferguson (just back from a loan spell in Italy) are among those senior players who have been told they are free to leave in the summer. Dean Richards is holding out on a contract until he is sure of Wolves' status for next season. Meanwhile, Lee was cheered by a late fightback by Wolves after trailing 2-0 at home


to Norwich – Robbie Keane netting twice in the last six minutes but the Canaries were far angrier at the tackle by Kevin Muscat that put Craig Bellamy out of the game and out of action until the New Year. Muscat, who has been booked eight times this season so far, escaped a yellow card for the tackle that left Norwich boss Bruce Rioch seething.

BRADFORD CITY

Lee Mills helped himself to two goals in the Bantams' 4-1 win at Swindon but was then sent off for the first time in his career, the ref deciding that Mills kicking the ball away after an offside flag warranted a second yellow card. The 13-goal striker misses the Boxing Day clash with Bolton and was already awaiting the outcome of the F.A.'s decision over a charge of misconduct following an incident after the Huddersfield v Bradford game in November.

Jermaine Wright came up with the goal that ended Crewe's agonising run of 18 league games without a win, stretching back to August, by scoring the game's only goal at Loftus Road but it was Australian goalkeeper Jason Kearton who stopped the Rangers' revival.

WATFORD

The Hornets welcomed manager Graham Taylor back from a long illness, saw chairman Sir Elton John in the directors' box for the first time this season and scored four against Stockport to celebrate. Gifton Noel-Williams scored twice for the home team before County got two late consolation goals.

BOLTON WANDERERS

Speculation has been building that Wanderers' eagerness to sign Jon Newsome, who has been on loan from Sheffield Wednesday and playing alongside Paul Warhurst in the Bolton defence, might extend to Arnar Gunnlaugsson going to Hillsborough in part-exchange. Manager Colin Todd has been quick to deny any such deal and instead hopes the Icelandic striker, who has 15 goals to his name, will sign a contract extension.

SUNDERLAND

Sunderland's drive towards the Premiership came close to slipping up when the City of Light's undersoil heating failed to work properly for the visit of Stockport - and to add to manager Peter Reid's annoyance he missed the winning goal from Nicky Summerbee on the snow-covered pitch because he was stuck in the lift on his way from the stands to the bench! The Wearsiders were cheered by the return of Alex Rae as sub following his much-publicised alcohol problems and was back in the starting line up for the home win over Port Vale a week later.

TRANMERE ROVERS

Captain Kenny Irons hammered his 12th goal of the season to earn Rovers a 94th minute equaliser against Bolton at Prenton Park and their 12th draw of the campaign helped relieve some of the worries building up at the Merseyside club – not only over the league position but also in the light of enquiries by local police into allegations of fraud at the club.

NORWICH CITY

Traditional yellow and green or all yellow? While Carrow Road boss Bruce Rioch has gone on record to say he dislikes the new experimental yellow footballs, fans of the Canaries are voting in a display of appropriately coloured cards at half-time in the match against Bristol City to show which first choice strip they prefer their favourites to play in.




Who has been the biggest influence on your career?

What's the best game you have played in for Barnsley?

The 7-1 win against Huddersfield the other week was incredible. The best thing



Who is the best current player in your position?

Michael Owen has set the world alight in the last year, but I am more of a target man and Mark Hughes has always been the main man in that role. He is playing a bit deeper for Southampton this season, but at his best, no-one holds the ball up better.

Which one thing would you change in football?

There has been enough talk about it, but I am in favour of having television replays for key decisions. It is unfair for a team to be punished by what might be a genuine mistake on behalf of a referee, so when there is a doubt whether the ball is over the line or not, have a look on the TV. And if you are not sure whether a defender is the last man back of not, double check it. You don't want to stop the game all the time, but it would help.

Losing by a hatful at Old Trafford last season wasn't a pleasant experience. They had one of those days when everything they hit went in. I've spoken to United fans who say there were worse teams than us who went there last season and they got away with much better than a 7-0 thumping.

If you could swap places with anyone in the world, who would It be?

Nick Faldo. I love watching the golf when they go into the extra holes at the end of a major. It is one against one and you are on your own out there. No-one else can help you and the pressure is incredible. I really admire the way they pull it off.

What is your most treasured possession?

My two girls, Darby and Taylor.

What is your nick-name at the club?

I've got so many, but what one is printable! They called me saviour last year, but I didn't save us so that didn't work and Darren Sheridan has called me George of the Jungle this season. It has something to do with a film, as far as I know. I must look like George.

Do you have any footballing superstitions?

I used to wear the same socks for weeks on end if I was on a goalscoring run, but I tend to take a more balanced approach to the game now. Those superstitions don't work.

We're 1-0 down in the last minute of a vital match when an opposition player goes down injured and they kick the ball out deep in their half. Do you throw it back to them?

It depends on how the game has gone. If they had been kicking lumps out of us all day, I would think twice about it and if we are at Wembley next May, trying to get a goal in the play-offs, then it would be hard to throw it back

Who would you most like to be stuck on a desert Island with?

People answer this question by saying their family, but why would you want them stuck on the island. It is bad enough that you are there! I suppose a Baywatch babe would not look out of place on a desert island.

What was the last film you saw?

Lock, Stock and Two Smoking Barrels. It was pretty good and Vinnie Jones put in a good performance.

Who, apart from Barnsley, do you think will get promoted this season?

It is hard to look beyond Sunderland, even though we got a great win at their place a few weeks back. And I fancy Bolton will be right up there at the end of the season. I still think we have a chance to go up even if it is through the play-offs.

MATCH REPORT

What a game. It defied belief, let alone description. Seven goals for John Hendrie's side, several of them absolute corkers, a penaity miss, breathtaking attacking football, an incredible 6-0 half-time scoreline and a glorious two-goal debut for new signing Craig Hignett... all ingredients which made this Friday night feast one to savour for a euphoric Oakwell crowd, and for a nation watching on television.


Hignett, understandably, warranted special mention after his instant impact, and Darren Barnard was voted man-of-the-match for a performance which comprised one stunning goal, two assists and a stream of searching crosses into the box – but in truth, it was a day for the team rather than individuals. The Reds functioned smoothly as an offensive and defensive unit; ripping their highly-placed visitors apart with some slick, purposeful passing. Deep down, you have to feel sorry for Peter Jackson's Huddersfield side, for this annihilation could have been inflicted on any one of half-a-dozen opponents already this season – it was just the Terriers' misfortune that they happened to be stood in the firing line when Barnsley finally hit top gear.

The catalyst was Bruce Dyer's early goal, a volley hooked home from point-blank range in the 10th minute, which gave the home side the early boost they needed. Shortly afterwards Hignett opened his Oakwell account with a deft nod of the head to divert Nicky Eaden's cross into the bottom corner... and the new man doubled his tally when Town's Belgian 'keeper Nico Vaesen allowed Hignett's firm volley from 20 yards to squirm under his body and over the line.

Eric Tinkler then thundered in at the near post to flick another Barnard corner into the roof of the net, and Ashley Ward inevitably got in on the act when he fastened onto Eaden's through pass to evade Vaesen with ease and slide home his 15th goal of the campaign.

The Reds' faithful erupted in delirium once more when they were treated to a sixth goal in a cathartic half-hour spell five minutes before the interval. Eaden swung a high crossfield pass out to Barnard on the opposite flank, and the Welsh international produced the goal of the night... a perfectly executed first-time left-foot volley from the corner of the area which swerved and dipped on its scorching path into the top right hand corner. Definitely a 'goal of the season' contender in anyone's book.

After a first half which couldn't have been better if John Hendrie himself had written the script, the second period was destined to be something of an anti-climax. And so it proved – with Hignett sending a penalty and the chance of a dream hat-trick skywards after Ward had been fouled in the 54th minute. There was, however, a beauty of a seventh goal when Dyer's superb turn and blistering finish left spectators and defenders alike gasping, and although substitute Delroy Facey grabbed a late consolation, it was hardly any consolation at all for our West Yorkshire rivals. They had been comprehensively shredded by a five-star Barnsley performance which certainly bodes well for the second half of the season.




On a personal note, I was glad to be involved, albeit on the bench, at Portman Road last Saturday. I can't stress enough how frustrating it is and much you miss the thrill of the game when you can't be selected because of injury and suspension, so it was a real relief to be able to pull on a first team shirt again.

There's no doubt that, as a team, we're living up to expectations now, more than before – but if you ask anyone at the Club, they'll tell you that the potential has always been there for us to do that. For various reasons, the early weeks of the season didn't go quite as we'll as we'd hoped, and with some of our rivals getting out of the blocks like lightning, that was a bit of a setback. In the last month, though, we've been playing as well as anyone in the division.

It's a common phrase, but you can't overestimate the role that confidence plays in football. When you are on a high, you express yourself more on the park, and you have the belief to try something that maybe you wouldn't attempt when things aren't going your way. The Huddersfield game is a perfect example – it was as if something suddenly clicked into place, and you could visibly see the team growing in confidence during that match. A case in point is Darren Barnard's tremendous goal. Now, Darren has a powerful shot on him anyway, but because he had the confidence on the night to try something like that, we saw one one of the goals of the season.

It's so tight in the top half of the table that anyone who has a decent run over the holiday period is going to find themselves in a good position come the New Year. Everybody seems to be beating each other, with only Sunderland standing out, so only a few points separate the sides at the top from those in mid-table. About a month ago, we were 12 points off the Play-Off positions, and in the space of four good results we've cut that to just seven. You always play a two or three games in a short space of time at this time of year, and if we continue our good form through Christmas, we'll be right up there with the chasing pack by the time we take a break for the F.A. Cup.

In the third round, of course, we have a difficult trip down to Wiltshire to face today's visitors. In that respect, today's game assumes even more significance because not only are there three valuable league points at stake – but whoever comes out on top this afternoon will carry a little psychological advantage with them for when we meet Swindon again in a fortnight's time. First things first, though, and we'll be going all out today to make sure that our good form continues, and we can give all you Reds fans an early Christmas present of three points!


