Enjoy this afternoon's game.







Paul Bracewell was not tempted to make wholesale team changes, but Barry Hayles made his first start of the season in place of the injured Paul Peschisolido. In the first minute Horsfield shot wide, and only three minutes after that the Canaries should have brought themselves back into the tie. Lee Marshall found Russell sprinting through the centre of the Fulham defence but his shoe was wide. Shortly after Fulham were on the

Shortly before the end he was replaced by Sean Davis who put the seal on the evening with seven minutes remaining, A quality pass from Clark to Uhlenbeek saw Gus speed towards the goal line and his low place was perfectly placed for Sean to finish with clam assurance.





Purely Academic by Alan Smith Academy Director

We were all disappointed to lose our first Under 19 game to a very strong Arsenal side last Saturday. However they were complimentary enough to say that we were the best team they had played all season.

As a coach you can tell where most goals will come from in a game, and we have only conceded three goals this season - two from set pieces and one individual mistake of concentration. It is an old saving, but you learn more from defeats, and our young players showed plenty of character in the second half - we had much more of the play but could not convert the chances we made.

Since Paul Bracewell took over as manager we have had a nice balance of young players being regularly used in the reserve team. This can only be good for their experience and future development and gives the senior coaches a chance to view their progress. Last weekend we had a free period as there was an In

Service Training day for Academy Directors. One of the biggest areas of discussion amongst the 38 Academies was the divide between the senior squad and the Academies, and where the different roles ended and started. The majority of Academy Directors follow the European method where they are appointed by the main board so that consistency can be maintained should there be a change in a club's senior staff, therefore protecting the development philosophy of that particular club. Officially the Academy is responsible for all players under the age of 21. However if a young player is in the first team he would come under the first team Manager's training methods

during the week, although he may still do some work with players of his own age and utilise the Education and Welfare Officer. I think that it is important that young players in this position still spend time with the younger Academy boys as they can act as role models.

Personally, I don not believe in too rigid a system and I think common sense must prevail when dealing with the young players in the Academy. I think it would be foolish of any Academy Director not to discuss certain situations with the manager or the other coaching staff, although the Academy Director must have ultimate responsibility for the players' development, as this is the criterion on which he will be judged.

Coaching in England has taken enormous strides in the last two years but there are still lessons to be learned from our European counterparts. At Fulham we do not have many of the problems that other clubs have as our staffing structure is relatively small. It is important that the Academy uses other departments such as Sales & Marketing, the Community Department (which has supplied us with many players) and not least the Communications team who can expose the young players that we have. Finally, many congratulations to Ralph Frempong for being selected for the England Under 15 squad for vesterday's match against Northern Ireland.





34 year-old Paul Steele has chosen a best ever Fulham team that will delight supporters from the last twenty years. It combines the best players from Malcolm Macdonald's side of the early eighties with some of the key players from today's team



BEST EVER SIDE

Jim Stannard is in goal - a great shot stopper according to Paul Steele. The back four is Simon Morgan, Chris Coleman, Tony Gale and Paul Parker. Recently Paul Steele and his dad won a competition and had dinner with Simon Morgan. Paul says, "Simon is a Fulham legend and a thoroughly nice bloke." Chris Coleman is Paul's favourite current player, "for his commitment and all round ability". The midfield is John Marshall, Steve Hayward and Ray Houghton. "John Marshall was Fulham through and through, always 100%." Paul believes that Steve Hayward has proved how good he is by playing regularly now and is a competitive midfielder prepared to get stuck in. The front three of Paul

Steele's best Fulharn side would be Gordon Davies, John Mitchell and Geoff Horsfield. Both Gordon Davies and John Mitchell were prolific scorers in their Fulham days. In fact, Mitchell is the only player in the side dating from the Cup Final side of 1975. Paul describes Horsfield as a good all-round forward, who for a tall man stands up well, can run with the ball and heads well. The three subs would be an impressive trio of Paul Peschisolido, Peter Beardsley and Micky Conroy, Micky Adams would manage the team. Paul rates him as our best manager, just edging out Malcolm Macdonald. Paul credits Adams with, "Starting the revival of this great Club of ours and doing it with just enthusiasm and no money".

GREAT GAMES

Paul rates three games as his most memorable. The best game was a classic from the Macdonald era. It was a sunny Saturday afternoon in September 1982 and we won 3-2 at home to Leeds in an attacking game. "We had

just been promoted from Division 3 and they had just been relegated from Division 1". Davies scored twice and Dean Coney once. The second was a game on New Year's Day 1985 at Portsmouth and one of the great Fulham comebacks. Four nil down at half time, we came back to draw 4-4. Third is a game from the Micky Adams era. It was a Sunday away game at Orient in the 1996-97 season. Fulham won 2-0 with goals from Blake and Carpenter against an Orient side that included Ray Wilkins. Most of the large and noisy Fulham contingent at Brisbanc Road would agree with Paul's memories of that day, "It was a great atmosphere and after that game I knew we were going up"?

GORDON'S GOAL

There have been many great goals scored at the Cottage. But one of the most unusual goals rates as the best that Paul has seen. It was a Gordon Davies goal at home to Chesterfield in the 1981-82 season. It was a top of the table clash that we won 1-0. As Paul explains, "Gordon raced 40 yards onto a pass

from Roger Brown". The ball was heading for the corner of the ground near the Cottage. "Gordon reached the ball a split second before the Chesterfield keeper who had rushed out beyond the edge of the penalty area and Gordon's shot from a tight angle went straight between the posts. Gordon was standing by the corner flag when the goal went in".


IN HIS BLOOD

Paul's father has been a fan since the early 50s and made sure he became a Fulham supporter. Paul was 7 when he saw his first game, a 1-0 home victory against Millwall on Boxing Day 1972. Jimmy Conway scored in front of 16,903. For a long time Paul used to stand at the Hammersmith End but now has a season ticket in Block E of the Stevenage Road Stand. Paul says there have been many great moments over the year but he rates the celebrations after the 0-0 game at Mansfield that got us out of Division 3. Even though the game was not that good, it was a great feeling to be going up after years of decline. As Paul says, "After so many years in the doldrums, its great to be in the position we are in now. Gone are the days you were ridiculed for supporting Fulham. We are now taken seriously and beating QPR and Charlton in a matter of weeks is great, especially where I work"

WELCOME

Swindon have not enjoyed the best of starts to the season and went into last weekend's home game with Stockport in 21st place. Last season Swindon finished 17th in Division One. The Robins started the campaign with a goalless draw at newly promoted Walsall but their first home game turned into a TV horror show as Ipswich won 4-1 at the County Ground. The first victory of the season came at Selhurst where Crystal Palace were beaten 2-1 but this was followed by a run of five games which yielded just a single point at home to Nottingham Forest. Swindon gained their first home win of the season against Blackburn but any hope that the tide may have turned was completely washed up just four days later when Bolton scored four without response at the County Ground. Manager Jimmy Quinn has a tough time ahead and he will be looking for goals from summer signing Giuilano Grazioli who opened his Robins account with a goals against Ipswich and Palace. Swindon though are struggling financially and striker George Ndah looked set to join QPR but turned down a reported [1.25 million

PAST ENCOUNTERS

Fulham and Swindon have

not met in a League game since the 1986/87 season when the Robins also visited Craven Cottage for an FA Cup 3rd round tie. Fulham failed to score in any of the three games played that season losing both of the League games 2-0 and the cup tie by a single goal. Our last League victories over the Robins occurred when the sides met in our promotion scason of 1981/82. Roger Brown scored both goals as Fulham recorded a 2-0 win at Craven Cottage, Four months earlier we had won decisively (4-1) at the County Ground with goals from Gordon Davies (2), Kevin Lock and Sean O'Driscoll. High scoring encounters are a feature of Fulham v Swindon games as Fulham have scored four times against the Robins on three occasions since 1974 whilst the Robins managed five without reply in an FA Cup 3rd round replay in 1977. Current Swindon boss Jimmy Quinn will have good cause to recall the last time the two teams met in League action back in March 1987. Fulham fans were still reeling from the outrageous attempt by then Chairman David Bulstrode

OPR and the team travelled to Swindon without a win in six games. Swindon for their part were chasing their second successive promotion. Unsurprisingly Swindon

won 2-0 but the game was not a pretty one. The County Ground pitch was in a poor state. The one bright spot for the Cottagers was the debut of defender Glen Thomas who would go on to play some 282 games for the club but the day belonged to Jimmy Quinn who bagged both Swindon goals. The Robins went on to clinch promotion via the play offs whilst for our part fortunes improved both on and off the pitch in the closing weeks of the season as we climbed to finish 18th

Fulham and Swindon have met on 10 previous occasions in League action at Craven Cottage. Fulham have won on six occasions with the Robins winning twice.

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

The past thirteen seasons have certainly not been short of incident at the County Ground. When Lou Macari arrived as Manager in 1984 the club were in the old Fourth Division but the ex Manchester United and Scotland star fashioned a side which won promotion twice in successive years

Macari departed for West Ham in 1989 to be succeeded by Ossic Ardiles and in 1990. Swindon fans thought their dreams of top flight football at the County Ground had finally come true when Sunderland were defeated in a play off final at Wembley. But their joy was short lived as the club were found guilty of financial irregularities and demoted back into the former Division Two. Three years later, by now under the guidance of Glenn Hoddle who operated in the role of player boss, Swindon again won promotion to the top flight via the play offs following a dramatic 4-3

Wembley victory over Leicester. Sadly Hoddle departed immediately for Chelsea and Swindon lasted just one season in the top flight.

Worse followed as Swindon were relegated for a second successive season but the club bounced back immediately winning the Division Two title in 1996 under Steve McMahon. The first half of the 1997/98 season saw the club lead the table at one point but just four wins in the final twenty nine games saw the club finish 18th. Last season McMahon departed after a poor start and Jimmy Quinn returned to the County Ground as

Manager. Swindon spent much of the season in the lower mid table region and finished in 17th place, three points clear of relegation.

HE PLAYED FOR BOTH CLUBS - CHRIS GUTHRIE

The late 1970s saw mixed fortunes for Fulham and one player whose two seasons at Craven Cottage saw stark contrasts was centre forward Chris Guthrie. Guthrie was signed by Fulham Manager Bobby Campbell from Swindon in September 1978 and immediately made his presence felt on his debut against Millwall when he outbattled the Lions tough central defender Barry Kitchener, Guthrie did not score himself in the home win over Millwall but had to wait just seven more days before finding the target in a 2-0 win at Oldham. Guthrie was an old fashioned centre forward who dominated in the air, he ended the 1978/79 campaign as leading marksman with 13 goals

from 34 games. Fulham had challenged for promotion before Christmas but a poor winter caused a backlog of away fixtures and the club's form suffered as a result. The following season was to prove a poor one for the club and for Guthrie as injury restricted him to just seventeen appearances - his final game coming at Burnley in February 1980 two months after he netted his last Fulham goal in the 2-1 home win over Shrewsbury, Guthrie moved on to Millwall scoring just once in seven games before injury brought an unhappy and premature end to his League career which had started with Newcastle. Spells at Southend and Sheffield United followed before he joined Swindon in the summer of 1977. He scored 12 goals in 45 games whilst at the County Ground but his most successful spell came at Southend between 1972 and 1975 with 35 goals in 108 games.



Yesterday's Heroes by Dennis Turner

Perhaps this article should have been called 'The Day Before Yesterday's Heroes' because it was 36 years ago that Eddie Lowe played his last game for Fulham. This was an emotional 3-3 draw against Birmingham at the Cottage in the old First Division when the visitors, reluctant to spoil the occasion, were considerate enough to score five of the goals. Many in the 20,000 crowd on that May afternoon in 1963 had come to say goodbye to Eddie, one of the most loyal and consistent players in our history. His total of 511 appearances was a new club record at the time and has since been exceeded only by Johnny Haynes.

EDDIE LOWE



Now aged 74 and living in retirement in Nottingham, Eddie was happy to reflect on his time at the Cottage. "I signed in 1950 when Fulham were in the top flight," he recalled. "I had been with Villa since the end of the war and had played for England but I got injured and because the team was playing well, I had trouble getting back. I thought a change would do me good and it would also help my brother Reg. We both went to Fulham in the same deal. That summer the club signed quite a few new players, like Archie Macaulay, Ian Black and Bobby Brennan, all internationals. They were exciting times." Over the next 13 years, Eddie was to become a fixture in our sides, at left back or left half and finally switching to centre half at the end of his career. Much of the time was spent in the Second Division (First today) but there was never any question of Eddie leaving after we were relegated in 1952. "I was

very happy at the Cottage," he explained. "My family were settled in Worcester Park and I don't like moving around a lot. Besides, we were a good team with some excellent players, like Johnny Haynes, Bobby Robson, Beddy Jezzard and Charlie Mitten. I also used to run a sports outfitters at Tolworth with Ian Black. I was involved on a part-time basis but I enjoyed it a lot. I used to get out and meet people from other clubs through this business. All the stories about Fulham being a family club were true. We went on close season tours together, to Canada at the end of my first year and twice to Italy later on when our wives came. Not many clubs had tours like this in the 1950s." The football was pretty

good as well, as Eddie explained. "We got to the semi finals of the FA Cup in 1958 and 1962 and won promotion in 1959. I didn't play in the 1958 Cup matches against Manchester United but we were really unlucky at Villa Park. We also should have won against Burnley at Villa Park four years later. In the first half, when the sun was shining, we went 1-0 up and were all over them. After the break, it snowed, they got an equaliser but we should have had a penalty when Adam Blacklaw brought down Maurice Cook. I've got no complaints about the replay,

though. The year we went up we were at the top from the start of the season. These were all good Fulham teams and it was a pleasure to play in them." Yet it was a game much earlier that stuck in Eddie's mind. "It was a Boxing Day visit from Manchester United in 1951. They were second in the League and the crowd was well over 30,000. I got injured after about ten minutes and because there were no substitutes in those days, I came back after treatment and played on the left wing. At one stage we trailed United 3-1 but ended up drawing and I scored twice. The first was direct from a corner and I'm told this was the first time that had happened at the Cottage and the second was in the very last minute. Earlier that season I got injured against Preston and again had to play on the left wing. I scored the only goal of the game that day." In his final season, 1962-63, Eddie switched to centre half and, despite being at the veteran stage, he played well enough to come fourth in the annual 'Footballer of

the Year' poll. Next stop

was Notts County, as player manager, but he only stayed two years. "I didn't really take to it," he confessed. "If I was going to stay in management, there would have been a lot of moving around the country, and I didn't really want that. Too many marriages have suffered as a result. But I liked Nottingham and I've been here ever since. I went to work for a Swiss firm in Newark and studied aceountancy. I ended up in Purchasing and staved with the firm for 25 years until I retired."

Unlike many older players, Eddie enjoys modern football. "I know it's faster and more physical, but it is also very skilful. The whole game has changed so much, the training routines, the tactics, even the ball, but I do believe that the players from my generation would still have made it if they were around today and had been brought up with the modern methods. I always look out for Fulham's results because they're still my team. I'm very pleased at what has happened the last few years and with Mr Faved's commitment and money they should go all the way to the Premiership." As a player, Eddie was very skilful and very fair and, as a person, he was and is a real gentleman. He has also left an indelible mark on our history which seems to suggest that nice guys do sometimes come out on top.





Gus Uhlenbeek


There can be few players as fleet of foot - even in the First Division - than Fulham's own flying Dutchman, Gus Uhlenbeek. He's now retained the status he willingly sacrificed when choosing to join Fulham from Ipswich on a 'Bosman' at the start of 1998-99. And while a combination of injury, the excellent form of Steve Finnan and the temporary obstacle of loanee Jamie Smith restricted him to just 18 starts in League and Cups in his first season at the Cottage, he made 14 more appearances as substitute.

That's the role he's been seen in this term, introduced to the game in the second half to terrorise tiring defences. His personal details on the Fulham club website cites games with his former club as his most memorable, and he admits he'd like the opportunity to make a greater mark. "It's always trustrating when you're not playing but in our team we've got so many great players every position is " doubled. You just need to make the best of it but I'd love to play more games, definitely."

Yet when he does appear on the pitch his cheerful demeanour, eagerness to entertain and, of course, his ability to deliver telling balls with a cross or long throw have made him a crowd

favourite. When I spoke to George Best recently, he lamented the lack of smiles to be seen on the pitch these days in comparison with the hevday of Best and Marsh, "I wish I had his ability," sighs Gus, once he's stopped laughing heartily at the comparison, before stating his agreement. "I enjoy football a lot and I'm happy to make it my work. I enjoy every day I can do it. I'd like to see more smiles but these days there's so much money involved people get carried away. Much has been made recently by certain visiting clubs of Fulham's 'old fashioned' ground with standing on three sides but Gus believes the intimacy and closeness of the fans adds a dimension to his game. Playing towards the Hammersmith End in the second half, as Fulham invariably choose to do, puts him within evecontact range of the Enclosure. And both sides of the relationship clearly dote on each other. "I love the crowd reaction when I get the ball. I just want to prove myself to the fans because they make football

the game all right, but you hear them yelling 'Run 'em, Gus!', or shouting when the ball goes out for a throw. It's always a boost when the crowd goes mad." His former club have been among the pace-setters this term and, as well as having a nostalgic feeling for them, Gus genuinely believes the men from Portman Road will do well. "They're always a good side and I think they'll be up there, but last couple of weeks they've gone a bit sloppy. It's hard to tell right now, but after Christmas we'll have a better idea of who's going to be up there come May. I think Charlton and Birmingham may be there and Man City are flying at the moment - but there are loads of clubs pushing. That's what makes this such


football stops from before Christmas until mid lanuary. I've been here for five years now, so I'm used to it - in fact, I can't imagine

With such domestic contentment, forcing his way into the first-team reckoning at Fulham would be the final piece of the jigsaw. But Gus accepts his future is uncertain. "My contract finishes at the end of the season so we'll have to wait and see, but I'd love to stay in this country. If it's not with Fulham..." Thoughts of a post-playing career don't include management -"I'm not that type" - but at 29 he's got time for further consideration.

Having only just failed to make the Premiership with play-off losers Ipswich in 1997 and '98, Gus would be delighted to make it third time lucky this time round. Let's hope he has the last laugh!



100 years of Fulham by Alex White

1906

Just after Fulham had won the Southern League Championship in season 1905/06, the club secretary Herbert Jackson was found dead in the cloakroom at Southfields Station with a bullet hole in his head. There were no suspicious circumstances as lackson had shot himself. He was suffering from a brain tumour and the pain had become unbearable. Surgery in those days would have meant almost certain death. The police found a note in his pocket explaining his actions. The letter was to his wife in which he said he could no longer stand the pain. He wished Fulham the best for the following season writing "Fulham for the League and Cup". The club obviously meant a great deal to him. He had joined as a player in 1893 and had later served on the club's committee. When Jack Aylott resigned as secretary, Jackson took over in 1904. A testimonial was arranged to help his widow with much needed funds. Fulham beat a Southern League select team 3-2 with goals from Jimmy Hogan, Alex Fraser and Bobby Hamilton.

1956

One of the greatest games ever at the Cottage took place in late January 1956 when Fulham met Newcastle United

in a FA Cup fourth round cuptie. At one point Fulham were 3-0 down but pulled back to lead 4-3 before letting in two late goals to lose 4-5. Fulham's unfortunate hero was Tosh Chamberlain who scored a hatrick but ended up on the losing side. The game had everything including a very controversial goal. Chamberlain had another goal



ruled out early in the second half. United's equaliser at 4-4 would not be allowed today. Vic Keeble, their centre forward, barged into keeper Ian Black and sent the player and the ball over the line. Keeble then rubbed salt in the wound by scoring the winning goal, heading home with eight minutes to go. Chamberlain's goals came in the 39th, 68th and 70th minutes. Jimmy Hill put Fulham into the lead three minutes later from close range, Fulham's third goal in five minutes. You may have seen the film of Hill jumping up and down after scoring this goal as it has been on the television many times.

1931

Fulham pulled of their best victory since joining the Football League in 1907 when they beat Torquay United 10-2 at Craven Cottage on a mild September evening. In a one-sided game Jim Hammond scored four goals, the last three being in succession. Torquay had let in 24 goals in



their first four games and had a number of first teamers out through injury. Fulham brought in two young wingers who excelled. Joe Proud and lack Finch, replacing regulars Frank Penn and Billy Richards, had a field day as they took United's defence apart. 'Bonzo' Newton scored for Fulham after five minutes but a muscle injury later slowed

him down. Finch scored the second after a goalmouth scramble. Proud drove in a rebound from a shot from Finch and Hammond hooked in number four. Newton and Price added further goals to give Fulham a 6-0 half time lead. Hammond scored a soft-seventh then Hutchinson pulled a goal back for Torquay, Hammond scored another after a brilliant dribble and unstoppable shot. Stabb scored United's second but Hammond was gifted the ninth and Johnny Price shot through after a scrimmage in front of the goal for Fulham's tenth goal.

1981

Fulham played the Japanese national side in a pre-season friendly at the Cottage and won 2-1. The Japanese were very skilful but lacked physical strength. Fulham took the lead after a well rehearsed free kick in the 43rd minute. Kevin Lock found Gordon Davies on the end of the Japanese wall. He turned quickly and shot past Taguchi in the Japanese goal. Masaaki Katoh scored an opportunist goal for the equaliser after 58 minutes. Fulham scored the winner seven minutes later. Peter O'Sullivan fooled Nishimura and his cross was steered home by the onrushing Ray Lewington. Fulham's new signing from Brighton, Peter O'Sullivan, gave the midfield more width. John Beck and Lewington were unlucky to see well-struck shots go just over the bar as Fulham pressed for more goals. The 1981/82 season proved to be a very successful one for Fulham as they gained promotion back to Division Two.




News and views from the inside
