especially coming up to Christmas when teams have suspensions and injuries, but we'll keep trying.



today's Visitors

After a stuttering, injury-ravaged start to the season which left them bottom of Division One with only one win in their first seven games, the Canaries are now bang on form.

Bruce Rioch's side is unbeaten in six games and are gunning for the play-off spot that eluded them last season. Bolton, Stockport and Nottingham Forest have all succumbed in recent weeks to a newly confident side, hoping to build on last season when they finished in the top half for the first time since their relegation four season ago. In fact before Christmas, City looked good bets for a top six spot but fell away to finish ninth and out of the promotion picture, having leaked far too many goals to sustain their challenge.

Now though. Rioch — in his second season at Carrow Road — has brought a new solidity to the side and a defensive record which shows only two goals conceded in their last six matches bears testimony to this fact. They may not be ripping opposition defences to shreds but they are awfully hard to break down these days. This improvement is all the more impressive considering the loss of two influential players before the end of August, Craig Bellamy, scorer of 19 goals for the Canaries last season and who, with Roberts, formed one of the best striking partnerships in the country, suffered a cruciate ligament injury in a pre-season friendly and is out until the New Year. Phil Mulryne, bought from Manchester United last transfer deadline day, then broke his leg in City's second home game and will be lucky to play again before

next August. Two hammer
blows to a club with little or no
resources to replace them,
following the recent announcement
of further financial losses, compounding
the problems that nearly saw the club fold a few seasons back.

Their last season in the Premiership — 1994/95 — was typical of the problems that beset the Norfolk club under the tenure of then Chairman Robert Chase - problems from which they are only now recovering. Ninth on New Years Day, they dropped like a stone to Division One amidst howls of protest and disgust. A loyal fanbase had watched an excellent side persistently pruned and sold off and relegation followed only 18 months after City's famous UEFA Cup triumph in Munich. Only when Chase finally left was the extent of the financial mismanagement at Carrow Road fully revealed. In the past four seasons major signings have been thin on the ground, as have City's spells in the top half of the table. It is widely accepted amongst the fans now that success will only be achieved through a fruitful Academy programme and prudent Bosman purchasing.

Nevertheless, Rioch has been blessed by the return of Darren Eadie from persistent injury and the form of youngsters such as Darel Russell and Adrian Forbes, whose youthful promise bodes very well for the future of a team and a City desperate to return to the top flight. The signs are there now that they're getting it right and, having just about recovered from a season's opening that saw six of City's better players sidelined, the play-offs are a realistic target for this young and confident side.

When fit, Darren's chief assets are his lightning pace and dribbling skills which are a nightmare for any defender.


Coupled with this he is tremendously brave, works tirelessly and has a powerful shot along with the ability to deliver the ball with great pace from corners and freekicks. Another product of the Canaries youth policy, Darren was a regular in the England Under-21 side and was also called up by Glenn Hoddle to the full England squad. Frequently the subject of transfer speculation, he signed a new four year contract in 1998 pointing out that, by the end of it he would be awarded a testimonial at Carrow Road. Every Canary fan will hope that Darren makes a speedy return to the first team and gets rightback to his brilliant best.



Now firmly established as the Canaries' first-choice goalkeeper, Andy already has a wealth of experience despite his relative youth for the position in which he plays.

He made a stunning full debut for Norwich against Newcastle in 1994, aged just 19, and now aged 24 he has well over 100 League games behind him. Still regarded as one of the best young 'keepers in the country he was a regular in the England Under-21 squad although he has now appears to have fallen a little behind Ipswich Town's Richard Wright in the international pecking order. Andy is a superb shot-stopper with excellent reflexes and agility who excels at 'making himself big' in one-on-one situations.

This will be the season when Darren looks to truly fulfil his outstanding potential. He started the 1998-99 campaign in blistering style with a 'Man of the Match' award and his first League goal on the first day of the season and his performances in the first half of the season won him rave reviews



1998-99 was an excellent season for Craig who showed just why the Canaries had paid out £600,000 to bring him to the Club from Oldham in June 1997. Craig is strong and determined in the tackle and, although not the tallest of centre halves, he is also very good in the air.



Darel broke through into the Norwich first team last season and did more than enough to suggest he could soon become a permanent fixture. Highly rated by everyone in the Carrow Road managerial team, he signed a four and a half year professional contract when he was only 17 and he extended that by a year in May 1999 to tie him to the Canaries until 2002.




Club captain Matt Jackson enjoyed another excellent campaign in 1998-99 as he once again led the team with distinction. Matt is a cool and calm central defender who always looks comfortable on the ball and frequently sets the team going forward with his perceptive passing from the back.

Norwich City's first-ever French player, Cedric joined the Canaries from Bordeaux in a FF2,000,000 deal in May 1999. He initially joined the Canaries on a three month loan spell the day before transfer deadline day, but he impressed Bruce Rioch sufficiently for the City boss to make the deal permanent.


At the end of 1998-99 he was the Club's top scorer, the first to notch over 20 goals in a season since Chris Sutton, a hero to the Carrow Road fans and a runaway winner of the supporters 'Player of the Season' award!



A former England youth international Adrian possesses blinding speed and real ability on the ball and, although short in stature, he is immensely strong and leaps superbly to win balls in the air which he might not be expected to. Totally committed, his all action style makes him popular with the fans.



Paul signed for the Canaries from Newcastle in May on the same day that Cedric Anselin joined from Bordeaux. It was a case of finally getting his man for boss Bruce Rioch who had been interested in signing Paul, the son of football legend Kenny Dalglish, for quite a while.



Bruce Rioch was appointed the Canaries' eighteenth postwar manager on June 12th 1998 and has successfully guided the team through his first year of management, with assistance from Director of Football Bryan Hamilton.

A highly experienced and well respected figure within the game, Bruce has established a reputation as a strict disciplinarian who has strong beliefs on exactly how the game should be played. Much of his tough reputation has been exaggerated over the years, but he does insist on great self-discipline amongst his players, citing the example of Dennis Bergkamp, whom he brought to English football, as the model of professionalism that all English players would do well to try and emulate.

As a player, Bruce was a tough-tackling midfielder, renowned for his powerful left foot shooting. He started out at Luton Town before enjoying later spells at Aston Villa, Derby (twice), Everton and Torquay, as well as loan spells at Birmingham City and Sheffield United. At Burnden Park, between 1992 and 1995, he led his Bolton side through two promotions from Division Two to the Premiership. At the same time he also established Bolton as the team all the top sides feared in cup competitions, achieving notable wins against Liverpool, Everton, Arsenal and many more besides.

Bolton in fact reached the Coca-Cola Cup Final in 1994-95, losing at Wembley to a Steve McManaman-inspired Liverpool. His fine record at Bolton inspired Arsenal to name him as boss in 1995 and, in just one full season in charge at Highbury, the Gunners finished fifth in the Premiership before a disagreement with the Board led to him leaving the Club. Bruce's next port of call was at Queens Park Rangers, where he spent around twelve months as coach to his own former number two. Stewart Houston.

He is now firmly installed as manager of Norwich City Football Club, working alongside his former Everton teammate Bryan Hamilton and together they will be hoping to restore the Club to its former glories.





Overall, we have played better but the lads deserve a lot of credit for sticking at it and getting themselves back into the match.




bounds since he joined us. He's learning his trade and taking it all on board and thoroughly deserved his place on the bench for the reserves and did very well when he came on.

In the South West Counties League we have picked up three very good wins. The B-side is now third in that league and the boys have improved their performances since losing 7-0 to Bournemouth. We have given a few of the more experienced players a run in the side and, consequently, some of the lads that haven't been doing themselves justice, as at all levels of football, have found themselves out of the A side.

It's worked in terms of giving players a kick up the backside because the ones who were not performing for the A team have dropped down to the B side. But, they have shown a good attitude and are pushing for a place in the A side again.

We try not to put too much onus on results, we want to produce footballers that are comfortable on the ball so that they can go on and do a job for the reserves and then the first team. We all like winning, but that's not the be all and end all because we need them to do the right things and be able to play at a higher level.







It's been quite a busy last couple of weeks in terms of games played. Firstly we held a mini-tournament up at Supermarine involving Wycombe Wanderers, Northampton Town, Bristol Rovers and ourselves.

All the represented clubs brought two teams in each age group apart from Under 9's, which only had one group, and what a success it was. To see nearly 200 players of a good standard playing small-sided games against each other, watched by nearly 1000, parents made it all worthwhile.

On the playing side the standard was very high with all clubs trying to do the right things. The Under 9's pitch was surrounded by parents for each game, which were played in great spirit and produced some fantastic goals. The introduction of mini-soccer in the area has produced players of better quality because they get more touches of the ball during matches, improving their technique and this was certainly evident during the tournament.

A big 'thank you' to all the people involved in making the day successful including the ladies up at Supermarine for the food and drinks. To all the coaches of each group and lastly, to our very own apprentices who gave up their day-off to set out equipment and referee all the matches. This was the first of what

I hope will be an annual event ,with other clubs also putting on these tournaments during half terms and summer holidays. On a pleasing note it was nice to see Danny Taylor, one of our Under 15's, who is recovering from a broken leg. He has had the plaster removed and is starting on the long road to recovery.



the editor talks with Iffy Onuora...

What do you think about our recent performances?

Well, the results are telling the story really, we're not picking up enough points. We got a good result against Port Vale, and then nearly got a point at Bolton and last Saturday we didn't really make it hard enough for Huddersfield. In the last two games we have rarely threatened the opposition goal. It is frustrating because we have shown that we're capable of playing well, but we're not putting it together for 90 minutes.

Do you think that, as a team, you have to be meaner?

Yes, especially in both penalty areas. We have conceded some cheap goals at our end recently and we haven't been as ruthless as we should in the opposition penalty area. Once we can improve in those areas I'm sure we'll pull through.

The games against Crystal Palace, Blackburn and Port Vale were the ones when everyone played well and the goals came - as well as all three points.

If we don't set a good pace to the game and force the issue the chances don't come and the strikers, not just myself, do not get the service. It's a question of getting things right bit-by-bit that means tightening up defensively and giving us more options, then I'm sure the chances will come.

OK, Saturday morning you wake up, hopefully with three more points in the bag, but the big question is: who will you be supporting at Hampden come Saturday afternoon?

I'll probably be supporting the winning side! No seriously, I'll be rooting for the Scots - as always. I was born in Scotland but I like to see England do well in big tournaments - but I hope the Scots win.

Will you be getting any stick from the lads?



I know you and George Ndah were good friends, how is he at the moment?


A I was





news from the treatment









I'm sorry to say that Graz has gone in for surgery, he's got a stress fracture of his fifth metatarsal. It's not up by his toes, the metatarsals start further back near the heel on the outside of the foot.

Unfortunately, it has to be pinned because there is poor blood supply to that area so it's safer to get it

pinned straight away rather than to chance it in plaster. It will probably - mean it will be 4 to 5 weeks non-weight bearing and then we can get it moving. The only good thing really is that we got him into hospital for the surgery very quickly.



Philippe Cuervo continues to make excellent progress and has been doing a lot of running up at Lawns, he's also had one or two games of football. They are small-sided, controlled games - nothing too serious but it gets him moving. We'll be working on some acceleration work with him shortly, so it's quite a lot of varied training for him and hopefully we'll have him in full training some time in December.

Gareth Davies played half a game in the reserve match against Bristol City and felt his knee problem again. I think it is the lateral knee ligaments that appear to be the problem and we will get it checked out by the club doctor shortly to make sure it's nothing more serious. He's been running on it today (Mon 8th) and has not felt any reaction, so it looks hopeful.





He's working hard in the gym doing strengthening work and then we'll pick up speed to work on the explosive movements as the week goes by.

Of course we've got Scott Leitch fit again and he's played in a couple of matches, so he could be ready to start on Friday.



Looking at the squad, Trevor Sinclair and Steve Froggart are in there as uncapped players, does that surprise you?



It will be the first game I've been involved with against Scotland so it will be very special for me. I only have four caps so I'm fairly new to international football. It will be a fantastic occasion and I am sure all the players in the squad will be really up for this one because we have to come out on top in the two games if we want to play in the European Championships.

How will you approach the game on Saturday?

The squad will meet up on the Sunday prior to the first match after we've all had hard games on the weekend. Hopefully everybody will come through fit for Saturday. We will work very hard because pride is now at stake and we've been let off

the hook slightly and we have another chance to qualify for next year's championships hopefully we'll take it.

How difficult is it to be red-hot favourites going into the play-off matches?

I don't think that really has any bearing on the game itself. At the end of the day, it's the team that wants to win the most that has the greater chance of qualifying. I'm certain there will be a few hard challenges going in and the atmosphere will be electric. We won't pay any attention to whether we are favourites or not, we just want to win the matches.

Because you have been given a second chance, does that make you doubly determined this time to qualify?

The prize of qualifying is so immense that when you do get another chance like this you have to take it with both hands. To play in the European championships would be a great honour and it's something that I haven't done before, a few players in the squad are lucky enough to have done so and they say it's an unbelievable occasion. I know the country will be right behind us and hopefully we can do the business for the fans.

What is it like to play for Kevin Keegan because he and Arsene Wenger are obviously very different characters?

He's a great motivator and is very relaxed which helps the players relax also. The training sessions prior to a match are great and we train so well we are disappointed when we don't take it into matches. Hopefully we can do this in this match because he deserves it after all the hard work he's done in preparing for the games. He's helped the atmosphere within the camp because he's a great man- manager and we all feel better about what we are here to do.

If selected, how will you feel immediately prior to the match?

I will be nervous of course but, like all the lads, I will have to be confident that we'll play to the best of our abilities and hopefully that will be enough. Anything can happen in these games because they don't come a lot bigger than England v Scotland - National pride will be at stake as well as a place in next year's finals.



He began by detailing his formative footballing years; the school matches, the trial matches, his early games for Bury followed by his stories connected with his big money move to East Anglia. He was then seen quietly sipping a pint of Guinness and, sharp as ever, Mick McCarthy attempted to obtain his signature. Finally he was caught tucking zealously into a plate of Haggis with Neaps and Tatties, this man must play for us exclaimed Craig Brown!

He remembered his few days with the Welsh squad before injury curtailed his stay. He then recalled his days in tartan, how he was lined up to be the first player without a Scottish bloodline to play for the Auld Enemy before it actually emerged that the only countries he could actually play for: England, by virtue of his mother being born in Birmingham, and Jamaica. He had been primed to play in one of the biggest matches of the 1990's, the famous England v Scotland Euro 2000 play off match of 1999, but his hopes had been dashed by small print.

As his mind drifted the grandchildren that had, until now, been sitting patiently around his chair, began getting restless and chatting amongst themselves. BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE







As we approach the Millennium, Daniel Fylan-Smith looks back at the ups and downs of Swindon Town F.C.

Swindon Town Football Club was formed in 1881 by Reverent William Pitt to provide recreation for the young men of his parish.

It was a game of football played on 12th November 1881 that led to the foundation of the football club. The game was played between Spartans of Old Swindon (a cricket club) and St Mark's Young Mens' Friendly Society, and was played on JEG Bradford's field in Old Town. The match ended as a 2-2 draw and afterwards a decision was made for the two teams to join forces under the name of the Swindon Town Football Club. The decision was a remarkable event considering the deep-rooted conflict that existed between the farming communities of Old Town and the railway community of New Town.

Between the years of 1881-86 there were a series of changes of venue but it was at Croft that the club began to enjoy its first triumphs. In the 1886-7 season the Wilts senior cup was introduced and Swindon managed to carry off the trophy in the first six years of its existence. The club's early success saw the first Swindon player called up for international honours - Dick Jones, who played for Wales. The title of first true professional went to Jimmy Munro - born in Dundee, Scotland. He played for Bolton Wanderers for three seasons before moving to Swindon Town, where he became the club captain and earned representative honours for the Southern League. He died at the early age of 28, leaving a wife and young daughter. The medical certificate gave the cause of death as spinal meningitis.


In 1894 Swindon became founder members of the Southern League, along with Millwall, Southampton, Chatham and Luton, plus four other amateur clubs. The first season of the Southern League saw Swindon finish bottom and the wage bill totalled just £10. Once money was involved for the payment of players, it

was a logical step for the club to become a Limited Company, which it did in 1897. Some of the original directors were EC Skurray, W Reynolds, HW Thomas and S Allen and all of the committee members signed a document approaching Arkells for a much-needed loan.

The club was not particularly successful on the field, and it was the turn of the century before they finished higher than sixth in the table. It was off the field that things started to progress. Facilities were not the best at Croft and that prompted a move to the County Ground and, after one season playing on the cricket field behind the north stand, they moved to the present pitch. In 1897, Thomas Arkell loaned the club £300 in order to build a stand. The 90's not only saw a change in ground, but also in colours - the original colours being white shirts and black tops. Attempts were made to change the shirts to green bodies with white arms but this proved too difficult to achieve with the contemporary dying process, so red shirts were chosen instead, thus bringing about the nickname 'The Robins'.

The period between 1901 and 1907 was one of a singular lack of success for the club with Swindon managing to finish in the top 10 just once. Not surprisingly, the results on the pitch were reflected in the home gates, and the club found themselves in a position where they couldn't afford to pay the players' wages. This lead to the players and directors foregoing some of their wages and, if it hadn't been for the generosity of the club treasurer, the club might have come to an end. HW Thomas was owed £395 by the club but he decided to write off the debt. and this allowed the club to continue in existence.

With the knowledge that the club had been cleared of its debt, Arkell's brewery donated £25, and the townspeople and local factories raised more money for the club by organising six-a-side football competitions. The club also sold shares worth £1,500 at the suggestion of the chairman, M Skurray and these shares



were purchased in one's and two's for ten shillings each. Other money-making schemes were set up, such as selling photographs of the team on cards for two pence each, and admission to the ground was set at six pence.

It was time for the club to go in a different direction, and it needed as a leader someone who could get Swindon to be successful once more. The inspiring individual would be Harold Fleming, who played for Swindon between 1907-24 and was capped nine times for England. He is commemorated in the stretch of road between the county ground and the Wiltshire Hotel and with a statue that stands inside the main entrance to the ground. Such tributes are given to legends, and Harold was such a man. He was very keen to play for Swindon and, as a matter of course, during his first season he used to trek the 30 miles from Andover to play. He made his first team debut on 19th October in a Southern League match against Luton Town, and immediately established himself as a first team regular.


Fleming was to inspire one of the club's most sustained runs of success in it's history. In the Southern League, the club showed improvement by finishing second to Northampton Town by five points in the 1908-09 season. Swindon also had a reputation of being great goal scorers, falling just short of a 100 and finishing second to Brighton in the 1909-10 season. However, in this season Swindon also earned lasting fame with a magical cup run resulting in wins against Crystal Palace in the first round and Burnley in the second, bringing them a draw with Tottenham in the third.

Tottenham in 1901 had been the only non-league team to have won the cup and that success helped them win election to the Second Division. This seemed to inspire Fleming and his team into beating them by 3-2 in a heroic game.





Jimmy Ithell

Welcome to our A to Z of former Swindon Town players. This week we take a look back at Jimmy Ithell.

William James Ithell was born at Hawarden in North Wales. He began his professional football carer in pre-war days at Bolton. Like so many others, Jimmy, as he was known, lost a chunk of his career to the War as he was on active service. He was one of many of British soldiers who were successfully evacuated from Dunkirk but, after service in the Middle East, returned to Europe and served with the Allied Forces all the way through to Berlin. Louis Page persuaded him to come to Swindon after the War as he had more of a chance of first team football and housing was more readily available.

Jimmy was the regular centre half for two and a half seasons. He made 107 appearances scoring just one goal, which came during his first season with the dub in a 2-2 home draw with Reading. Perhaps his most memorable moments came in the Town's cup run in the 1947/48 season. He was at the heart of the defence which kept a clean sheet in the Third Round victory at Burnley to earn a Fourth Round tie against Notts County at the County Ground. This match saw Jimmy up against England centre forward Tommy Lawton, but again he helped Swindon keep a clean sheet in a 1-0 victory.

During the 1948/49 season Jimmy was injured and lost his place to Gareth Hudson. He

returned to the team in the following campaign but had only made 5 more appearances when an injury sustained during a 4-3 defeat at Reading kept him out of the team again. Indeed this injury was to bring a premature end to his career as, although he returned to play left-back in a disasterous 5-0 home defeat by Nottingham Forest, it effectively ended his career.

Looking back on his career, Jimmy felt that football had been more entertaining in his time as the primary aim had always been to score goals rather than just stop the other side scoring. He also felt that forwards in his day were more willing to shoot rather than just try to pass the ball. Asked to pick the best Swindon team of his era he selected the following line up: Boulton; Young, Emery; Kay, Ithell, Painter; Dryden, Lucas, Owen, Jones and Bain. "They were a great bunch of lads and we had a wonderful team spirit." Jimmy was not finished with



football when his playing career ended. He took on the manager's role at first Boston United and then Poole Town. He had further spells as a part-time manager with Chippenham Town and Trowbridge before turning to the licensing trade in the latter town where he was landlord of the Castle Inn.

leeds lethargy



If the goodbye is sensational enough there will, of course, be a press conference, these days called a press call'.


One of my friends who worked as a press agent recalled one such event where the media were gathered unaware they had been called to witness the departure of one of the games major figures. Meanwhile the

back-door exit, escorted by a policeman in a fluorescent yellow tabard and leather gloves. The






