Ade put the ball past Greece's keeper, but he was adjudged to be offside. It was not a decision the Wolves striker was entirely in agreement with.

"I looked at the TV replay afterwards and I thought my goal looked OK," says Ade. "But unfortunately the referee said it was off-side.

"We didn't enjoy the best preparations for the game. We didn't get to train until the morning of the match, which is hardly the best way to do things.

"But overall I enjoyed the experience. I was pleased to be given a shirt, and to start and finish the game.

"The manager said that I'd given one hundred percent and that he was pleased with my attitude.

"As for the actual match, we played quite well going forward, but need to get better organised defensively.

"We are hoping to sign a new coach from Holland. He came out to watch us and if we can get him signed up I think he will be able to get us better organised.

"The next game is against South Africa and that will be a very big match for us."

Ade returns to League action today hoping to deliver the fans another top performance like the one against Grimsby, but he has warned them not to expect as many goals.

He says: "I think Swindon will come here and make the game very difficult for us. I think they will defend and we will win it by a goal."

Ade is also looking forward to welcoming his old Norwich striking partner Iffy Onuora to Molineux, but has already told him not to expect any favours.

"Iffy's told me that he's going to come looking for me on Saturday, " laughs Ade.

"I told him that I was going to let my feet do my talking!"






WELSH MEETING

"Howard called us all together and told us the game was off. But he said that we were to keep our heads up and that there would be other opportunities in the future.

I felt we showed Birmingham - who


Fielded an experienced side - too much respect on the night. But otherwise it was a good performance from our players.

international level is - while sometimes inconvenient - a tribute to the club, its management and players. It is also something we, as supporters, should be very proud of.


We return to League action today and mark the occasion by opening our disabled room for business.

Many of the kids who came along were enjoying their first ever live football match, and they clearly enjoyed themselves.



Our opening 30 minutes saw some nicely controlled play with plenty of useful possession.


We took the lead through Easter but, credit to Northampton, they fought back to equalise just before the break.


The second half was quite an evenly matched affair, but we continued to plug away and Larkin and Easter scored to make the final score 3-1.

Iffy Onuora thought Wolves pulled off a bargain signing when they splashed out £3.5million on Ade Akinbiyi, and that was even before the Nigerian international started banging in the goals for his new club.

Onuora can claim to be a better judge than most of the strike-force that Molineux fans hope will one day lead them into the Premiership, having become good friends with Akinbiyi during their time together at Gillingham and then playing alongside George Ndah before he left Swindon last month.

And the Robins striker, himself a shrewd £120,000 signing from Gillingham two seasons ago, thinks if Wolves fans can be patient and wait for Ndah to recover from his broken leg, then they will soon enjoy watching potentially the most devastating attack outside the top flight.

"I think George and Ade playing together will be a handful for anyone," said Onuora, 32. "I think the fee Wolves paid for Ade was about right. He is a proven goalscorer in this league and has matured in the last couple of years since I played with him.

"When he was at Gillingham he was quite raw but it seems there is definitely a lot to come from him yet. You're talking about one of the best strikers in the division.

"George probably had to leave because of the financial situation (at Swindon) but it was a good move for him as well. I was sorry to see him go because he is a very good friend of mine. We were room-mates but it was inevitable he was going to go sooner rather than later. I don't think he will have any problems impressing the fans once he gets fit again.

"Of course he was a bit downhearted after picking up the injury but hopefully he should come back from it.

"Ade and I spent a couple of years playing together at Gillingham, and became good mates, and George came on loan for a while too. So Saturday will be a bit of a reunion for us all although we speak regularly anyway on the phone. I meant to ring Ade before he went off to play for Nigeria last weekend, and wish him luck, but I'll have a chat with him and see how he got on. "

Glasgow-born Onuora, no slouch himself, points to the pace of Wolves' new strikers as the key to possible future success.

"I think George's pace is frightening. You think he is quick, and then when you play with him and see him at close hand, he's even quicker. Ade has known him even longer than I have but when we spoke after he had made his debut for Wolves a few weeks ago, Ade said I didn't realise he was that quick. And of course Ade is pretty fast himself. Between the two of them, it would be one hell of a good race!"

The former Huddersfield and Mansfield Town striker added modestly: "Perhaps I'm not in their league when it comes to pace, maybe a few years ago, but I'm a little bit older now."

Swindon's striking problems saw manager Jimmy Quinn, a few days before his 40th birthday, come off the bench and nearly score the winner in a much-improved display by the struggling Wiltshire side against Norwich eight days ago. The game finished goalless but Quinn, on as a late substitute for Onuora, hit the bar to nearly nick the points for the Robins.


"The boss came on about five minutes from the end. It wasn't that much of a shock because we knew he was on the bench and the crowd were chanting his name. I don't know what his plans are but it's another option for us.

"When you look at it, George has gone and another striker, Guiliano

Grazioli, has had to have an operation on an injury so that's two strikers out of the equation already. And in terms of having strikers on the bench, we didn't really have much of a choice.


"The boss has been scoring goals in the reserves and although I know that's not quite the same, good luck to him because his record over the years speaks for itself. If he's going to keep being substitute, then maybe that's just the thing we need. I can't see myself playing at 40 but that's another issue.

"Maybe we are never going to pull up any trees, we know we are



some way behind some of the richer clubs in the division, but certainly we should be better off than where we are now in the League. If we finish midtable this season, then people will say we have done okay after the start we have had. Maybe that's the best we can hope for.

"I know Wolves are going quite well, it won't be easy at Molineux, but if we can keep Ade quiet, although that's easier said than done, then maybe that's half the job done."

BORN: Rochdale 21.11.68 PREVIOUS CLUBS: West Bromwich Albion, Barnsley, Newcastle United A survivor of Swindon's Second Division Championship side of three years ago, Robinson is a top-class performer, whether in the heart of the defence or as an attacking wing-back. Despite starting at West Brom, he went on to make himself a reputation at Barnsley which encouraged Kevin Keegan to spend £450,000 for his services as Newcastle started taking all before them.

Limited opportunities at St James', however, led to another move and he joined the Robins for £600,000 after their season in the Premiership. Has now played over 200 games for the Wiltshire side and if he can steer clear of injuries, Jimmy Quinn knows he has at least one Premiership-class defender to rely upon.

MICHAEL CARRICK

MIDFIELDER

BORN: Wallsend 28.7.81 PREVIOUS CLUB: West Ham United One of the most talented young midfielders in the country, Carrick is currently on loan from West Ham where last May he won the FA Youth Cup alongside the likes of Joe Cole and Adam Newton in a 9-0 aggregate demolition of Coventry City. Made his Premiership debut when coming on as a substitute against Bradford in August and has been a fixture on the Hammers bench since, though Harry Redknapp knows first-team action will accelerate his progress. Jimmy Quinn isn't complaining as Carrick's ability to dictate play from the heart of midfield, and with either foot, mark him out as a class act.

CHRIS HAY

FORWARD

BORN: Glasgow 28.8.74 HT: 6.0 WT: 12.5

PREVIOUS CLUBS: Giffnock North AFC.

Celtic

An able and potentially prolific striker who has suffered from not being able to get up a good head of steam from playing for a long stretch unimpeded. Scored some crucial goals towards the end of last season, including a brace in a 3-3 draw against Portsmouth and a winner at Huddersfield that ultimately helped Swindon avoid relegation. Has good close skills, as honed in his four years with Celtic, and can also play in the 'hole' behind the main strikers to good effect.

The main man

Jimmy Quinn, while resurrecting his playing career even as he celebrated his 40th birthday on Thursday, knows that his priorities lie in management. And as he endeavours to steer Swindon Town away from the relegation zone, he is grateful for the education he received from Wolves boss Colin Lee in their two years working together at Reading.

The decimation of his young squad led to the former Northern Ireland international naming himself as a substitute for last Friday's goalless draw with Norwich City - and he thoroughly enjoyed the seven-minute run-out he received in his third 'debut' for the Wiltshire club.

Quinn first joined Swindon - from Oswestry Town, for £10,000 - 18 years ago and returned there from Blackburn Rovers for a second spell five years later. After a long and illustrious playing career, winning 48 caps for his country, he moved into management when succeeding Lee and Mark McGhee at Reading in 1994.

Initially named in the caretakermanagement team was our own Adie Williams before ex-Molineux favourite Mick Gooding and Quinn, while still playing, steered a team built around Scott Taylor and Simon Osborn to Wembley and the First Division play-off final. Both Williams and Quinn scored in a dramatic 4-3 defeat by Bolton.

Quinn actually returned to full-time playing with Peterborough United for one and a bit seasons before the lure of returning to Swindon proved too strong. The well-travelled striker vowed to stop playing senior football but the recent personnel crisis at the County Ground has forced an about-turn.

"Too old? You're not wrong," he laughed. "Actually, though, I was fantastic - for seven minutes. I've been playing for the reserves and scored six goals in the previous three games. When Guiliano Grazioli went in for an operation last week, it confirmed we're a bit thin on the ground for strikers. I've been trying to bring in a loan signing.

"I don't feel too bad though and while I can't get around the pitch like I used to, and I don't think I could make 90 minutes, I might be able to help out for 20 minutes here and there.

"We haven't got any money here and the team does lack a bit of experience but I wouldn't involve myself if I thought I was letting anyone down. The fans have been asking for me to get involved, and the board suggested it, so in a way I'm just bowing to public opinion.

"I did say I wasn't going to play for the first team again when I became manager here. I'd done that before at Reading and it is a very difficult job to do both. But circumstances have dicatated this.

"You get all the shouts of You old 'so and so' but I've had that since I was 30! So it's water off a duck's back now. I scored 25 goals for Peterborough by the end of January, before I struggled to

recover from an injury. When I went there I was leading scorer with five goals before I came to Swindon early last season. I don't think you ever lose that knack and I'm still quite fit."

Having lost George Ndah to Wolves, Grazioli to injury and this week Mark Walters to Bristol Rovers on loan, Quinn is eager to strengthen his squad because he knows league results have to pick up if Swindon are to avoid relegation. But he sees plenty of positives to work around. "The team spirit's good and while a little bit of confidence is lacking because we're near the foot of the table, our football hasn't been that bad. I'd be more worried if we were bottom and playing rubbish but our performances haven't been reflected in our points tally. It's my job to keep spirits up but it's not for want of trying we're where we are: these lads have been giving it a right good go."

Reading achieved much back in Quinn and Lee's time at Elm Park as good coaching and team unity helped the side finish as Second Division champions and then second in the First Division five years ago, Quinn rates Taylor - "an athlete as well, who can get about the park" - and Osborn - "one of the best



midfield players in the division" - and remains conscious of the job Lee did in McGhee's shadow at Reading.

"Colin's a top coach," opined Quinn, "one of the best I've ever played under. He's doing very well at Wolves and if he has the time, he can take them where they want to be. I know expectations are very high at Molineux but they certainly have one of the best coaching teams in the business.

"I've had 12 managers at my various clubs and a lot of coaches with them. When you get a good one, they tend to have a bit of extra time for you and then you can learn things from them. Colin is very good in the way he wants to play the game and certainly his training methods are second to none."

Quinn will have so many reunions today he might have his work cut out to warm up and still hold the team talk. But he does have a special word for Ndah who broke his leg so soon after leaving Swindon for Wolves. "George is a lovely lad," said Quinn. "I've been in management for five years and not been associated with as nice a lad as George, It was a horrendous tackle that put him out and I just wish him all the best for a speedy recovery."

Both of last season's games between Wolves and Swindon finished with the home side taking the honours courtesy of a single goal victory. What was different was the weather, which was warm and bright when the Wiltshire team came to Molineux in August, 1998.

Going into the game, Wolves were unbeaten in their two League fixtures and they hadn't conceded a goal. And, just four days earlier they had soundly thrashed Barnet in the League Cup with Steve Bull notching his 18th, and final, hat trick for the club in the 5-0 win.

Swindon had just one point in the bank from their opening two games, and talk of another goal rout was in the air. But, as often is the case, the expected didn't happen. Yes, Wolves did win, but only thanks to a Keith Curle penalty. That arrived in the 29th minute when Ty Gooden was judged to have fouled Robbie Keane as he ran into the Swindon area after playing a one-two with Fernando Gomez. The skipper side-footed the spot kick home to beat Frank Talia.

But a poor game could be summed up by the fact that the penalty was the only on target shot that Wolves managed throughout the proceedings. And Mike Stowell was only brought into worthwhile action once.

The game did mark the debut of long term loan signing David Connolly who came off the bench to play out the final seven minutes. Despite the lacklustre performance, the win put Wolves up to fourth in the table behind three other teams with 100% records, Norwich, Birmingham and Watford.

It was a truly awful rain and a howling

day with torrential rain and a howling wind making life a misery for the Molineux faithful who were packed behind the goal in the uncovered end of the ground.

The supporters were issued with polythene coats to keep away the worst of the elements but it couldn't have been much fun. The game was the first for Colin Lee since he lost the caretaker tag of his job title.

And it was to end traumatically for the players, the manager and the fans as Town took the points with an injury time winner denying Wolves of a point which was the least they deserved from a game which, at times, they dominated.

Wanderers were without defenders Lee Naylor and Kevin Muscat, both victims of the flu bug that had hit the club. But the strike force of Keane and Connolly were a constant threat to Town and several good opportunities were wasted. They were to prove costly. A free-kick from the right, taken by a man not unfamiliar to Wolves supporters, Mark Walters, was powerfully headed home by Iffy Onuora.

It was so close to the end of the game that as soon as it restarted, the referee blew for time. It was a heart-breaking blow for those sodden supporters, one they knew their team didn't deserve.

What those fans didn't know, however, was that there was only going to be one more defeat in ten League and Cup away fixtures for their favourites between then and the end of the season.

3 What's the funniest ENCOUNTER YOU'VE HAD WITH A FAN?



Paul Scholes for his superb goalscoring display at Hampden Park last Saturday. With the atmosphere there the pressure must have been intense but he kept his cool.







LODKING BACK THAT WAS

THE DAYS LEADING UP TO WOLVES V EXETER CITY
20TH NOVEMBER 1973

Bleak Times

On the day that Wolves were due to face Tranmere Rovers in a third round League Cup replay in November, 1973, a state of emergency was declared, because of the ongoing mining and power dispute.

The announcement was made from Downing Street following a cabinet meeting and under the regulations of the act, ministers had the power to regulate ports, public services and facilities, the distribution of food, the supply of gas and electricity as well as the supply and distribution of liquid fuel and refinery products.

Slightly warmer weather had reduced the risk of power cuts though there was still the threat of power reductions. And to add to the gloom, Lord Stokes, the chairman of British Leyland, warned that petrol could cost £1 a gallon within a few years time, and the Bank of England raised its minimum lending rate from 11.25% to 13% after more bad trading figures had been released.

It was a defiant Tranmere side, one that made Wolves fight all the way for victory, that came to Molineux. Rovers had beaten Arsenal at Highbury in the previous round, and then Wolves were well pleased to have come away from Prenton Park with a replay secured.

Wanderers had to wait until six minutes after the break before they finally broke the deadlock, Derek Dougan converting after Steve Kindon had helped on Phil Parkes' long clearance.

Russell Allen, the son of former Wolves manager Ronnie, pulled the Merseyside team back on level terms in the 71st minute, just before a partial floodlight failure. Just five minutes from the end Barry Powell grabbed the goal that gave Wolves a home meeting with Exeter City in the next round of the competition.

Royal wedding

The following day's news was dominated by an event that gave the headlines a lighter touch - albeit temporarily, when Princess Anne married Captain Mark Phillips at Westminster Abbey.



Two thousand people packed into the Abbey and an estimated five hundred million watched the ceremony on television throughout the world. As the couple left for their honeymoon, the trial of nine IRA members ended at the Old Bailey.

They had been accused, and found guilty, of causing the blasts that rocked the Old Bailey and Scotland Yard that year. Five were given life sentences and the others got 20 years.

More than £1,000 million was wiped off share prices as a tense and nervous stock exchange awaited news of a tough mini-budget. There was, however, no confirmation from Whitehall that a budget was imminent.

On the soccer front, England slipped to a 1-0 defeat to the Italians at Wembley, and Wolves enigmatic midfield star, Danny Hegan, left the club to join Bob Stokoe's Sunderland.

The crisis in the Middle East meant that the likelihood of petrol rationing was getting ever closer. Esso warned 50,000 of their customers, throughout the country, that they faced reduced deliveries.



And, to compound matters even further, brewers warned that the price of beer was likely to go up by a penny a pint within a few weeks. These were, indeed, bad times for everyone.

Revie Ban

Martial law was declared in Athens and four people were killed and 120 injured in incidents triggered off by students who were demonstrating for more political freedom.

Italian giants Lazio were in deep trouble following ugly scenes at the end of their UEFA Cup tie with Ipswich Town in October, 1973. Though Lazio won the second leg by 4-2, they went out of the competition on a 6-4 aggregate, As the teams left the field Town players were kicked and hit. The Italians were fined £1,500 and banned from UEFA Cup games for a year.

Leeds manager, Don Revie, received a one match ban for having entered the field of play to speak to some of his players when United were playing at Hibernian in a European tie. The ban meant that Revie would not be able to enter the dressing room for his side's first leg game with Vitoria Setubal of Portugal.

The manager had to watch the game from the stands as a spectator. Leeds trainer, Les Cocker, was also censured for entering the field of play without permission.

At Molineux, an uneventful game with West Ham finished in a goalless draw. The result meant that Wolves had gone six League games without a win, the last four of which had also been without a goal for them either.

The only consolation for the team and supporters on the day was that the single point gleaned lifted the side up

one place to 19th in the table. League Cup Relief

Because of the power crisis, Wolves had to play their League Cup tie with Exeter on a Tuesday afternoon. Obviously, a large proportion of their fans were stuck at work and that showed in the gate of just 7,623.

But those who did attend saw Wolves get back their scoring appetite as they romped to a 5-1 victory over the Fourth Division side. The game kicked off at 2.15pm and back in the team was John Richards. The strikerhad missed the previous four games through an ankle injury.

And Richards missed an easy chance within just 30 seconds of his comeback. Geoff Palmer sent a high ball into the area and Richards headed it down for his strike partner, Dougan who hit a shot across the face of the goal back to Richards. But he completely miskicked as he tried to push the ball home.

It was the start of incessant Wolves pressure and they were rarely out of the Exeter half of the field, and Kenny Hibbitt blazed over from 15 yards with only the keeper to beat as Bill McGarry's team tried to break the deadlock.

When a goal finally did arrive, it was with the last kick of the first half when Hibbitt converted after he'd been set up by Barry Powell. It wasn't until 17 minutes into the second period that Exeter finally managed a worthwhile effort on goal, Dick Plumb hammering a fine shot from 20 yards just wide of

Four minutes later, Hibbitt found Dougan who tucked the ball past City keeper Allen Clarke for the second. But,

within a couple of minutes, the visitors reduced the deficit when Plumb headed a Brian Joy free-kick beyond Parkes.

Exeter's joy was short-lived, however, and three goals in the final 17 minutes confirmed Wolves' superiority. Richards got the first, flicking home a Mike Bailey centre, then the home centre-forward found Hibbitt with a delightful pass and the midfielder converted with ease.

The last goal, and the best of the afternoon, was a powerful Richards, header following a Hibbitt corner.

Wolves met, and beat, Liverpool in another midweek afternoon game at Molineux, and then overcame Norwich on a 2-1 aggregate in the semi-final to earn a trip to Wembley to face the might of Manchester City. In a superb game beneath the twin towers, the Hibbitt/Richards scoring combination was at work again to help Wanderers lift the Cup in a 2-1 triumph.

Nottingham Forest have been at the centre of a flurry of transfer activity following new manager David Platt's apparent realisation that his present team aren't good enough to return to the Premiership.

After recently splashing out big money on Bristol City left-back Jim Brennan and missing out on the loan capture of Stan Collymore, they took Danish striker Mikkel Beck on a two-month loan from Derby and this week invested £1.5m in Stern John, the 22-year-old Trinidad and Tobago striking partner of Dwight Yorke.

John has come to England from US club Colombus Crew to try to address a goal-scoring problem that has been apparent at the City Ground since lan Wright's departure to Celtic.

Platt is facing the sternest test of his fledgling career in management after Forest surrendered their unbeaten home record in Division One to

impressive Huddersfield last Sunday.

He has also seen his side lose six times already on their travels going into today's game at improving Tranmere, and said of Huddersfield's continued emergence as a promotion force: "There are no complaints from me.

"We got exactly what we deserved. Right from the start, I felt we were not at the races and made too many bad decisions and too many mistakes."

Huddersfield boss

But the fallen giants have taken a major step forward in the search for the successor to sacked boss Brian Kidd.

They have drawn up a list of names and Ewood Park chief executive John Williams said: "We are clear in the direction we are going.

"We are working towards a strong set of requirements and it goes without saying just how important a decision this is for the club."

Rovers, struggling just above the First Division relegation zone, would not be drawn on a timescale in the build-up to today's home date with Fulham.




Blackburn's near-neighbours Bolton have been busy in the market, selling Neil Cox to Watford for £500,000, the full-back having previously played in relegated teams at Bolton and Middlesbrough. But new Reebok boss Sam Allardyce, who is reported to have suspended defender Andy Todd for an off-field incident, has had a quick pay-back from his loan signing Gareth Farrelly.

The Everton and former Villa player scored with his first touch for the club - a superb 25-yard drive - as Bolton added to Sheffield United's problems with a 2-1 Sunday win at Bramall Lane.

not a particularly good recipe."

Albion, who have cancelled the contract of full-back Paul Holmes, at long last recorded their first home win of the league season - 3-2 over a Portsmouth side who had Fitzroy Simpson sent off for his second booking.

On the same day, QPR's good form came crashing to an end with a 3-0 defeat at London rivals Crystal Palace - an afternoon made all the more gloomy for Rangers by the sendingsoff of Chris Kiwomya and Karl Ready.

More joy for Palace has come from the lifting of the bar on them making signings. They have given a trial to Swede Anders Torstenssen and sealed the capture of Venezuelan forward Fernando De Ornelas.

Three other low-key deals have seen Mark Walters move from Swindon to Bristol Rovers on a free transfer, Charlton step in to sign keeper Antti Niemi - once on trial at Wolves - from

Rangers on a three-month loan deal and Walsall increase their foreign legion by snapping up Argentinian utility man Gino Padula on a shortterm contract.

The cynics might be wondering how long it will be before Fulham splash out again. Last Saturday's First Division action saw them lose 3-1 at home to Barnsley, who are looking an increasing threat in the promotion stakes.
