

"I hope all the clubs in the third round today treat the FA Cup with the respect it deserves"

Today we welcome Jimmy Quinn and his Swindon side to The Valley for this FA Cup third round tie.

It gives both sets of players a break from the rigours of the League, but it also gives both the chance to progress if successful this afternoon.

We met Swindon only a few weeks ago and they demonstrated then in no uncertain terms why our division is so tough.

They may be at the wrong end of the table but they still gave us a tough game and I can assure you it will be no different this afternoon.

In fact, I think I'm right in saying they've only lost once in their last five matches.

If they can keep that run going today, I'm sure they will see it as a help in their League fortunes.

Both teams come into this game on the back of draws. We have got to improve our home record in terms of results, but not, I think, in terms of performances. As I have been widely quoted as saying, our last three home matches have been quite painful in terms of points gained.

Our performances definitely warranted a better return and anyone witnessing the games would



back me on that.

I've gone over the Manchester City and Port Vale games in previous notes, but it was déjà vu for the Blackburn game.

Rovers were another team that had few attempts on our goal but scored from two of them – even though one was at least eight yards offside.

Once again we came against a keeper in fine form – or was it bad finishing?

Either way, after dominating the game we ended up with no points.

We then took ourselves off to Barnsley, which is always a tough place to go and gain any points, especially when you let in a goal after two minutes.

It is great credit to the players that they took the game by the scruff of the neck and really dominated for the remainder of the first half. On top of that we got back into it with Keith Jones' fine strike.

The second half was hard fought and I felt if anyone was going to sneak a winner it would be us, but we ended up with a draw.

If we had picked up the results we should have done in previous home games, I would have been delighted with a point.

Barnsley were fifth in the table before the match on Saturday and they showed why they are up there, but it was another point towards our total and it keeps us in contention.

I do hope today's teams in the third round of the FA Cup treat the competition with the respect it deserves, in terms of their team selection.

With the changes sweeping through football over recent years – and the fact that Manchester United can pull out of the competition – I sometimes wonder where the game is going.

For whatever reasons of their own, the big clubs have already done their best to weaken the League Cup competition. I hope it is not repeated with the FA Cup.

The third round is normally a special day for any football fan, so let's hope we can remember today as a winning one, which puts us in the next round and in fine spirits for the two forthcoming local derby games in the League.

The fans who travelled to Barnsley on a bitterly cold day last Saturday gave us as much support as they could. It was well appreciated and you need to do that today, so please get behind the players right from the start. The inside story of events at The Valley

Council votes to allow new stand

The Addicks recorded a significant result on Tuesday night without so much as kicking a ball, when Greenwich Council's planning board granted permission for a new north stand at The Valley.

Despite strong opposition from some local residents, the committee voted 3-0, with one abstention, in favour of allowing the club's application, which would increase capacity of the ground to approximately 25,600.

As is usual in these cases the permission is subject to a range of legal commitments, but the club is delighted to have secured the council's formal approval for the expansion. We remain committed to working with the local residents to address their concerns, with or without legal agreements.

Although there are currently no plans to proceed with the work, this permission significantly increases the range of options for the future growth of the club. Certainly it would be difficult to sustain Premiership football with a capacity of 20,000, given the financial muscle available to the biggest clubs.

The proposed stand, which would replace the existing Covered End – built in 1934 and refurbished in 1992, but now the oldest part of the stadium by some margin – would join the west and east stands, and have 8,400 seats.

It would also provide much needed office accommodation for club staff and changing rooms for Greenwich Leisure, as well as a range of hospitality facilities. Nevertheless, the club's interest in the Millennium Dome site on the Greenwich Peninsula will continue and further news of our bid to be involved in its future is expected in the New Year. Chief executive Peter Varney comments on page eight.

Under the weather



Good response

More than 500 half-season tickets had been sold by Thursday, just over a week after they went on sale.

The total number of seasonticket holders is now well over the 15,000 mark and this will obviously reduce the number of one-off match tickets available.

We anticipate that seats for our Boxing Day home match with Crystal Palace will sell out within 24 hours of going on sale on Monday, so anyone wishing to see that game as part of a half-season would be advised to visit the ticket office today.

There were just over a thousand upper-tier tickets for the game at QPR left on Thursday night.

In common with all other club departments, the ticket office will close at 2pm on Christmas Eve.

Matchdays aside, the only normal working days over the holiday period will be December 29th and 30th. Normal trading will resume on January 4th.

In addition, the club will close at midday this coming Tuesday for operational reasons.



We would like to thank Steve for his efforts on Charlton's behalf over the years and everyone at the club wishes him good luck in his future career.


He will be continuing in his role as pitchside announcer on matchdays.

The Addicks chief executive writes ...

United should be in the Cup

The first Saturday in January is traditionally FA Cup third round day, so it does seem a little strange to be kicking off in the competition in December.

All the talk about the FA Cup so far has centred on Manchester United. I did say at the time of their withdrawal that it was a sad day for football in this country. Many smaller clubs dream of playing them in the Cup and often such games are vital to their very existence. In my opinion, United should not have been allowed to withdraw.

I would like to welcome the directors and officials of Swindon to The Valley. They were very hospitable on our recent visit to the County Ground when we won a tightly fought game 2-1.

The FA Cup does give the opportunity to earn much needed additional revenue and I have given a couple of interviews this week to the local Swindon media, who have drawn parallels between our situation in the 1980s and that currently faced by our visitors. They made me aware of how important the competition is to Swindon, who face an extremely difficult financial situation.

I sincerely hope they manage to overcome their problems and go on to thrive in the same way we have.


I was also approached this week by Stoke City, who have recently been taken over by an Icelandicbased consortium, so we must be doing something right to attract all this attention! On Monday evening I met with the local residents group and, as you can imagine, there was considerable opposition to our planning application to redevelop the north end of the ground to provide an additional 5,600 seats.

The application was considered by a special meeting of the planning board of Greenwich Council on Tuesday evening and all of us at the club are delighted that the application was successful following a very tense two-and-a-half hour meeting at the town hall.

I would like to acknowledge the key contribution of Drivers Jonas, our project managers, and Albuquerque Nogueira, the architects of the new stand. The application was lodged in January and a considerable amount of time and effort has been put in by so many people to achieve the successful conclusion. I would also like to thank the planners at Greenwich for the professional manner in which they dealt with the application.

We now await the decision of English Partnerships on our submission in relation to the Millennium Dome site. If we make the final short list of three and if the financial case for the proposed new



stadium stacks up, then we will continue the consultation process we have promised on both options.

I must say I was extremely disappointed to see that English Partnerships had decided to allow a late bid to be added to the short list of nine. Essentially we are involved in a competition and surely it cannot be right that a short list is selected, proposals are displayed for consultation purposes and then a group comes in at such a late stage. I don't think we have heard the end of a very controversial decision.

I would like to apologise for the situation regarding the reserve game with Southampton on Wednesday.

Once it became clear that the weather would lead to us postponing the game at Welling I took the

decision to move it to The Valley.

In the limited time available it was not possible to comply with the safety and police requirements and we had to play behind closed doors.

I apologise for any disappointment caused, but there really was no other decision I could take in the circumstances.

Personally, I don't believe that it is a bad thing that we are having a day off from League action today.

I have sensed a lot of tension around League games and it will be nice to enjoy the thrills and spills of an FA Cup tie.

Get behind the team from the start and hopefully we can take our place in round four.

Shaun Newton now stand up!

Charlton's right winger has had some stick from the Valley fans this season, but he tells TERRY CORDWELL that he has no complaints about that

Charlton may have suffered their worst month of the campaign thus far, but amid the gloom few Addicks fans could have failed to notice the rays of light that made it a trifle easier to bare.

The sight of Clive Mendonca recapturing his goalscoring touch against Port Vale was one for sore eyes, while the form of Richard Rufus – at both ends of the park – has been tremendous.

But perhaps the one thing that has eclipsed these two saving graces has been the resurgence of Shaun Newton. The 24-year-old rightflanker had a tough time in the Premiership last season because of a serious knee injury. After returning to the fold prematurely, he struggled to find his form and could only amass 13 starts in all.

The scorer of two goals in the last four games aimed to make a flying start to the current campaign and, although he's the first to admit he hasn't done so, he insists he wasn't playing that badly.

"I don't think things were falling for me during the first half of the season," he said.

"Usually, if a player in an important position like mine is playing really badly, the team loses. And apart from the last month or so,

we haven't lost very many at all."

The Camberwell-based player went on: "I probably needed to score a goal or two early in the season to get me going, but that didn't happen. However, the most important thing was that the team were winning and sitting in a good position in the table."

The Addicks faithful didn't view the situation quite so philosophically and were quick to voice their frustrations.

In reply, Newton has done the professional thing and stepped up his level of performance to something near to the top of his game.

"You can't let the crowd bother you," he said.

"I can understand the way they feel, because they know what I'm capable of and they have a right to be disappointed.

"They pay good money and expect to see the real Shaun Newton, so why should they keep quiet?

"It was a difficult season for me last year. When I did get back into the side at the start of this season I felt so relieved to be playing again that maybe my mind wasn't on performing to the best of my ability.

"Now, though, I know I am completely over my injury, not just physically but mentally as well, and hopefully I can get back to where I was two years ago – playing well and scoring goals."

Newton's duck was broken at


Swindon in late November, and solid displays followed at home to Port Vale and Blackburn.

His first-half injury-time strike in the latter game should end up a goal-of-theseason contender.

But while it would be difficult to argue against his finish at Swindon being responsible for his new confidence, the emergence of the old Newton hasn't only been only about his net-buster against Rovers.

His passing and

crossing has acquired a fresh crispness, his touch has tightened up and his willingness to run at defenders has resurfaced.

In his new frame of mind, Newton explains how his season's best tally of seven may soon be broken.

"I set myself a target of ten goals," he said. "The first has always proved the hardest for me and I usually score more in the second part of the campaign.

"The way I see it, I get some kind of chance, be it good or bad, about twice every game.

"I just have to learn to stick them away when they come."

A lack of goals has been a criticism

levelled at Newton, but the player still views finding the onion bag a bonus rather than a necessity.

"I'm the kind of player who, because I'm quite fast, am seen more as an attacking midfielder than a defensive one. But I think my defensive work is just as important as my attacking play.


"I could be really pleased with a performance that may not have included goals or even balls into the box. The most important thing is to do your job for the team and if I happen to score as well that's all the better."

It's ironic that Newton's best spell coincided with his team's worst, but he believes the sight of automatic promotion is far from fading.

"I don't think there is anyone in this division capable of living with us at our best," he said.

"There isn't a team out there that we are trying to keep pace with.

"We are just playing our own game and I think what we are going through now will be our only bad patch.

"We are probably the only team in the division who don't cater for the opposition.

"Teams as high up as Manchester City have come to The Valley and completely shut up shop, which can only be a credit to us."

He went on: "Some people will say we haven't beaten any of the top teams, but anyone watching these games will know we've played well and not scored, and let in sloppy goals.

"Most of our points are coming against mid-table sides and teams down the bottom, which is where a lot of the other top clubs have been dropping them."

If Charlton do go back up, Newton believes they will stay there this time and doesn't share the view that the gulf between the two divisions is increasing.

"Obviously it depends on which clubs you are talking about. You only have to look at what Sunderland are doing at the moment to confirm that if you have a good squad and are organised, you can do it.

"Last season we were only

actually outplayed about three times and that was against the likes of Manchester United and Leeds.

"We didn't do ourselves justice because we kept losing by the odd goal in games that could have gone either way.

"But on the other hand, you cannot say teams who go up are not going to lose by three or four goals week-in week-out.


"Watford and Bradford are both having a hard time of it at the moment."

Approaching 25, Newton has reached the peak of his physical fitness, but concedes there is still room for improvement.

"I don't think a professional footballer can ever stop improving," he said.

"You learn new things about the game day in day out and you just want to better yourself in some area with every match you play."

With his injury out of his mind and his confidence well and truly back, there is no reason why Shaun Newton cannot start doing just that. pensions | life assurance | investments

Robins reliant on mighty Quinn

The battle of the basement boys saw Swindon Town draw one-apiece with Walsall last weekend, a result that kept Jimmy Quinn's County Ground side glued to the foot of the First Division table.

Town will be hoping that a win today will give everyone associated with the club some light relief from the rigours of a relegation battle.

It will also provide the opportunity to make up for an even more embarrassing exit from the Worthington Cup than our own defeat against Bournemouth. Swindon lost over two legs to Third Division whipping boys Orient in the first round.

Until three weeks ago, Town had an FA Cup winner in their side in the shape of winger Mark Walters, who gained Wembley silverware with the Liverpool side that beat Sunderland in 1992. Walters left for Bristol Rovers in November, but another forward with FA Cup pedigree of a different kind is Giuliano Grazioli, 24.

London-born of Italian parents, he shot to national fame as the striking sensation who scored the goal that took Stevenage to a badtempered fourth-round replay against Kenny Dalglish's Newcastle United two seasons ago.

By coincidence, the nippy marksman got the winner against Swindon in the third round that season, which set up the tie against the Geordies.

Grazioli joined Peterborough soon afterwards, playing up front with Jimmy Quinn during his spell with the Posh.

When Quinn joined Swindon as boss, one of the first things he did was pop back and pick up his old teammate on a free.

In a desperate attempt to find the goals that could save Swindon's bacon this season, Quinn has given himself a squad number – 40, his age – but Robins fans tend to look to Iffy Onuora, 32, for net-rippling salvation.

Charlton fans might remember Iffy fracturing his cheekbone in a bizarre incident a couple of years ago when he collided with the referee during a game against us.

The strapping Glasgow-born striker, formerly of Huddersfield and Mansfield, joined Swindon from Gillingham for £120,000 in 1998, scoring on his debut with a flying header, and he continued to have Town fans eating out of his hands with a 20-goal tally last season.

Former Celtic man Chris Hay, 25, also pitches in with the goals. Signed from Parkhead for £330,000 in 1997, Hay set a blazing pace with 13 goals in 18 games. Despite a series of niggling injuries, he managed another six in 18 games the following season and has put a few away this term, too.

Young goal-grabber Charlie
Griffin is widely expected to be the next big thing at the County
Ground, but a highly-rated youngster who is ultimately using time at Swindon to further his career at West Ham is Michael Carrick.
Signed on loan from the Hammers, Carrick was a team-mate of Joe Cole in West Ham's victorious FA Youth Cup side of last season.

Calm and composed, the England youth star augmented his growing reputation with the equaliser for Swindon against Walsall last weekend.

Captain Scott Leitch, 30, would no doubt love to see Carrick join him full-time at the County Ground. Another of the Robins' Scots brigade, Leitch joined the club for a mere £15,000 from Hearts three years ago but has repaid that fee many times over with his heart-on-sleeve approach to the game.

The Motherwell-born left-sided

midfielder started out in football at Dunfermline, joining Hearts in 1993. Three years later, ex-Robins boss Steve McMahon took him on loan and saw enough to want to sign him up for good.

When Brian Borrows retifed, McMahon gave Leitch the honour of captaining the Wiltshire side.

Currently Town's longest-serving player, wing-back **Ty Gooden**, 27, has been with the Robins since 1993, when then boss John Gorman signed him from Wycombe Wanderers. A pacy wing-back and excellent crosser of the ball, Ty is a big hero with the Robins faithful.

Andy Williams, 22, is a skilful winger who joined Town from Southampton for £65,000 just two

months ago, after an impressive loan spell with the club.

The Welshman has played a handful of games for his country, making his international bow at none other than Brazil's Maracana Stadium.

Two other players included in Town's midfield mix are Bobby Howe, 26, and Robin Hulbert, 18.

Howe is an attacking midfielder signed from Nottingham Forest in January 1998.

The five-foot-seven player made just 17 appearances in seven years at Forest, but seems to have made rather more of a positive impression at Swindon.

At the back, three older heads – Gareth Hall, 29, Alan Reeves, 32, and Mark Robinson, 31 – provide a reassuring presence for Sol Davis, 20. A left-sided defender, Davis has come on leaps and bounds since making his League debut against Queens Park Rangers days after his 18th birthday.

Former Chelsea and Sunderland man Hall can play anywhere along the back line, just as he has done on numerous occasions for Wales. Forced out of the first-team picture at Wimbledon, Reeves provides grit, guile and experience at centre-back.

A fine header of the ball, he complements the assured ground play of former WBA, Barnsley and Newcastle man Robinson, who can play centre-back, full-back or even sweeper.

Backing them up against Walsall last week was local lad **Steve Mildenhall**, 21, a former YTS trainee who vies with **Jimmy Glass**, 26, and Aussie **Frank Talia**, 27, for goalkeeping duties.



Meet the manager

Jimmy Quinn entered professional football with Swindon, who plucked him from obscurity with Oswestry Town for £10,000 in

The tall but mobile target man looked a great prospect for Robins, before his journeyman instincts saw him move on to a host of other clubs. But amid his travels he did return for another stint at Swindon when Lou Macari was boss, scoring 30 goals in 64 appearances.

Quinn recently returned to Town again, this time as manager after Steve McMahon's departure. But just months later, the club is bottom of the First Division.

In the face of grumblings from an impatient section of the County Ground crowd, Quinn has not just rolled up his sleeves.

He has rolled on his socks and pulled on his shirt and shorts, too, remarkably returning to action at the ripe old age of 40 in a plucky attempt to get Town motoring.

A good FA Cup run could be just what the doctor ordered, although it was in classic



promotion battles that Quinn earned glory as a player.

The Belfast-born Northern Irishman, capped 48 times, notched many vital strikes in

successful promotion campaigns at West Ham in 1990/91 and Reading in 1993/94.

He also bagged a sackful of goals for Blackburn Rovers, Leicester City, Bradford City, Bournemouth and Peterborough United.

He entered management at Reading as co-boss with Mick Gooding in 1994.

During a three-year reign in the Royals' hot seat, Quinn, Gooding and ambitious chairman John Madjeski experienced some giddy times, transforming the club's image from quaint Berkshire no-hopers into a real First Division force.

Quinn was replaced by Terry Bullivant for the 1997/98 season, but he was an obvious candidate for the top job at Swindon when McMahon's reign came to an end.

A threadbare squad and dwindling crowds are hardly the ideal ingredients for a recipe for success, but if Quinn's up and at em approach out on the pitch can inspire his side to dig deep, there is every chance the player-boss could drag Town to safety.

FACTS AND FIGURES

First cup meeting: Charlton and Swindon have only met once before in the FA Cup - in a fourth-round tie at The Valley on January 28th, 1956. Although our great exploits of the immediate post-war years seemed a long time ago, we MARLION were the favourites to lift the trophy in 1955/56. Having whipped non-Leaguers Burton Albion 7-1 at The Valley three weeks earlier, our next hurdle was Swindon, who were struggling at the foot of the Third Division (South) and eventually finished bottom, four points below Crystal Palace and six behind Millwall. After taking a 35th-minute lead through Bobby Avre, an injury to Derek Ufton disrupted the shape of the team and when Bob Edwards hit a 70thminute equalise, a major shock looked a possibility. We had to rely on an unlikely scorer to get us out of trouble, namely Cyril "Squib" Hammond, who netted his only goal of the campaign to give us a lucky 2-1 win. A disappointing 28,042 watched the game, a thousand less than for Burton Albion, but interest increased dramatically for the home fifth-round tie against Arsenal, when 71,767 saw us

*Last cup meeting. When Swindon visited us for a second round, second leg, League Cup match on September 27th, 1994, we carried over a 3-1 lead from the first game and the final ourcome looked a mere formality for the Addicks.

But Norwegian international Jan-Aage Fjortoft hit a first-half hat-tick to give Swindon

a 4-3 lead. We managed to take the match to extra-time, thanks to a late David Whyte goal, but a freak own goal from Andy Petterson gave Swindon a shock 5-4 aggregate win.

Has the FA Cup lost some of its lustre?

A recent internet poll showed that more than 80 per cent of supporters consider the league to be more important than the FA Cup for their clubs.

This season, holders Manchester United are not even involved. They've decided it is more important for England's World Cup 2006 bid that they compete in a contrived FIFA tournament in South America than in the oldest - and best - club competition in the world.

Shame on Manchester United. And shame on the FA for turning the other cheek and rubber stamping their absence. Aren't situations like this one of the reasons United carry such a large squad?

But enough about them. Out of sight, out of mind. It's their loss.

A good number of clubs will be

out of the FA Cup after this weekend. We will hear from their managers, players and supporters that "now we can concentrate on the league".

Most will end up slogging through a nondescript season, finishing in mid-table and forgetting about all the fun that goes with a long Cup run.

FA Cup success can lift a team's stature, raise supporters' spirits and add a few pounds to the club's coffers. Don't underestimate the importance of any of this.

So, has the FA Cup lost any of its lustre? Not to me.

There are three elements that make the FA Cup great - tradition, competition and anticipation.

The tradition speaks for itself. Charlton's greatest playing achievement is the 1947 FA Cup triumph.

The competition is a series of one-offs between two teams. The

experience is either a thrill of victory or an agony of defeat.

In important one-off competitions, the result is immediate and the feelings can be very intense. Just check the scenes surrounding any giant killing.

And then there is the anticipation. That depends on who you are, and who you are playing.

If you are a team from the lower divisions, what could be better than a trip to Highbury, Anfield or Old Trafford?

Ooops, forget Old Trafford.

To go to one of those grand venues is one thing. To come away with a famous victory is something else. The lower-division clubs dream of what could be and the biggest clubs, whether they're willing to admit it or not, dread the same thing.

The FA Cup is, was, and always will be something special.

Charlton versus Swindon may not be setting a lot of football hearts aflutter. After all, they faced each other as recently as November 23rd.

But then how many supporters have travelled more than 3,300 miles to be at The Valley today?

I think it always adds something special to my annual midwinter trip to England when a FA Cup match is on the schedule. If The Valley is my football Mecca, then an FA Cup tie is a high mass.


> Nothing against our friends from Wiltshire, but I'd prefer the Addicks were playing someone else.

Swindon Town may be down around the bottom of the Division One table, but they are no pushovers.

They have a fighting spirit and are dangerous opponents in a one-off.

But I think even Swindon's supporters would prefer to be playing someone other than Charlton this afternoon.

I prefer when the Addicks are drawn against opposition from a division other the one that they are in. Higher? Lower? It doesn't really matter, as long at it is someone different from anyone they'll face in the League season.

I've also been to Swindon's County Ground, for a 1989 match against Sheffield United.

I recall that it rained, nearly half the ground was closed and that the small quartz alarm clock in a leather wallet stamped with the old Swindon logo that I bought in their club shop lasted for nearly 10 years on the same battery. I hope Swindon are not nearly as efficient today.


The growing number of Americans who follow soccer have a great fascination with the FA Cup.

"Having been based in both sides of South London, we are extending our fan base across the region and we now have junior sides across London.


"Next year we will look to hold a

Spotlight on the next generation

Edward the unexpected

Trialist centre-forward Edward Gyimah gave the U17s their first victory since September 18th with a fine hat-trick in a 3-1 win at Nottingham Forest a fortnight ago.

Stocky striker Gyimah, playing his first match for the young Addicks, gave his new team a twogoal advantage by half-time and fired in his third after Forest had pulled it back to 2-1.

"It was a fantastic debut for Edward," said delighted coach Andy Ritchie. "His goals were all

very different, which showed what a versatile forward he is.

"He took the ball around the keeper for his first, made space for himself to head home his second and his third was a comfortable tap-in.

"But it was a very good overall performance from all the boys against a wellorganised Forest side.

"Kris Taylor was outstanding at the back. When they got back into the game after about an hour, Kris really took charge and motivated the team superbly. It could have been a tricky period for us, but we didn't allow them back into it."

Charlton hadn't won a game since their 3-1 victory over Fulham, but Ritchie insists confidence in the camp has remained high.

"Our results haven't been the best," he admitted. "But I have always worked on the

players' minds as well as their technique, so confidence hasn't been a problem.

"The regulars understand that there will always be a lot of young players in the side, as well as trialists, and that their improvement is the most important thing."


The following week, though, the U17s failed to build on the victory and succumbed 3-0 to West Ham at Sparrows Lane.

Gyimah was again the most dangerous player for the home side and displayed an impressive array of skills to the New Eltham gathering, who had no doubt heard the story of the previous Saturday.

But the home side struggled to get Gyimah and strike partner Dean Gibbs on the ball in advanced positions and found it equally difficult to contain strikers Moses Jjunju and Lee Riddle, allowing the latter to leave the ground with the match ball.

Charlton had more than their fair share of possession, but West Ham took the lead on 13 minutes. After Jjunju was upended by Charlton goalkeeper Glen Morris, Riddle stepped up to bury the spotkick inside the right-hand post.

Five minutes on, Morris denied the Hammers a second with a fine reaction save. But the visitors managed to double their lead five

minutes before half-time, thanks to a good finish from Riddle.

Charlton rallied after the break and St Luce powered a 35-yard shot inches over, but they remained unable to make their possession count. West Ham's game-killing third came after 75 minutes.

A fine cross from the right sailed over the Charlton defenders for Riddle to notch up his hat-trick with a far-post header.

"It was a disappointing result, considering the amount of possession we had," said Ritchie.

"I felt we had 70 per cent of the ball and have explained to the players that we have to start producing an end product, especially if we continue to give away soft goals."

He went on: "I was pleased with the way we passed and the spirit was excellent. Alex Martin played his best march of the season and St Luce was steady at right-back. We just have to stop allowing these little lapses to creep into our game."

The U19s' fine run of results came to end on Saturday, when they were convincingly beaten 5-0 by the Hammers at Chadwell Heath.

"We were well beaten by a very strong side," said academy director Mick Browne. "They had players in the team who have been involved in the first-team squad. They wanted to beat us and they did exactly that. We struggled to match the overall pace of their play, but having said that we were not completely devoid of ideas ourselves.

"We got into four or five very good positions, but couldn't finish any of them off. Although they were very quick at the back, they weren't particularly impressive. They gave the ball straight to us quite a few times, but again we failed to take advantage. Kemi Izzet battled hard in midfield and Pierre Bolangi came out of the game with a lot of credit.

"Being 3-0 down at halftime, we changed it around to their 3-5-2 because their five in midfield were

outnumbering our four. After the break it was more of a contest, but you cannot expect to concede five goals and get anything out of the game.

"We've got Spurs this weekend and would all like to break up for Christmas on a high note."

"He capped his performance with a fine diving header and had a couple of other strikes that went just wide or over the top.

"In the second half we reverted to 4-4-2, which is obviously how the first team play, to have a look at him as part of a front two. He tired slightly towards the end, but that is understandable because he isn't used to the pace of the English game. He was also very surprised how quickly the ball came off the surface compared to Jamaican pitches," he added.

Apart from the last 15 minutes, Charlton's domination of the game was total and Southampton were surely not worth the share of the spoils that they found themselves chasing in a tense final quarter.

"In the first half, especially, we played some excellent football," said Stevens. "We created chances and could have gone in with a healthier advantage. No team can dominate for the full 90 minutes and Southampton came back into it late on, but I felt we dug in really well when it mattered. Sam Turner produced two stunning saves in the last ten minutes, which epitomises the spirit of the players," he added.

The Addicks could have gone 3-0 ahead on 25 minutes when Charlie MacDonald's clever reverse pass set up Mark McCammon. He looked a certainty to score after a perfect first touch, but Bevan managed to smother his rather delayed effort. A minute on Barbé tried his luck again from distance after a neat one-two with Fuller, but the ball just rose above the crossbar.

However, the first team's habit of conceding a goal after the break is obviously contagious because, with the second period barely a minute old, Danni Rodrigues stole in front of Anthony Allman and headed home.

"It's ironic because we did the same against Palace," said Stevens. "We did a little bit of reshuffling for the second half and they struck very quickly. But we showed a lot of character to stabilise the situation.


"Everyone from front to back worked very hard to make sure we didn't concede the second goal."


However, Charlton continued to pile on the pressure. Kemi Izzet intelligently avoided the offside trap to latch on to MacDonald's pass, but couldn't get to the ball sufficiently ahead of Bevan to get a clear sight of goal. With the dreaded five-minute period after the interval not yet over, Charlton almost let in a second. Ryan Ashford's swinging left-wing cross was met solidly at the near post by Rodrigues, but sub keeper Turner produced a one-handed point-blank save that induced gasps of disbelief from the 40-odd present.

Charlton then had a string of chances but failed to regain the twogoal cushion. MacDonald stung a shot narrowly wide from 20 yards, Fuller robbed a defender but his chipped effort was saved and McCammon saw his ten-yard attempt saved by Bevan's feet.

"We have one more game before the Christmas break," said Stevens. "It would be nice to see the year out with five wins on the spin."

Both cite the main attraction of the job to be its variety, as Marissa explained: "Our daily duties change from day to day, depending on the clients that are in the building and how the lounges are being used.

"On a typical day we would meet and greet the clients, fans and members of the general public.

"It is basically making sure that

anybody who phones or visits the ground for whatever reason is given the best care."

"Matchdays are a different experience entirely though," continued Debbie. "Then it is a matter of looking after the directors and sponsors and ensuring that they have the appropriate passes."

Despite the friendly environment and the different and interesting challenges the duo face every day, there are a few downsides, particularly the long hours and being the first port of call for complaints.

"At times it can feel like that you are in the front line, with everybody directing their complaints and moans towards you. It can be hard to deal with at times, but that is the nature of the job and you accept it."


However, there are always lighter times around the corner and Debbie explained some of the more obscure requests she has had to deal with.

"A few weeks ago I answered a call from a gentleman who was trying to buy tickets for the Chelsea versus Feyenoord match.


"Despite me telling him quite a few times that he had in fact called Charlton Athletic and not Chelsea Football Club, he still insisted that I could sell him tickets.





Vital goal was 50th for Keith

Keith Jones, who had been on the 49-goal mark for ten months, finally made his halfcentury with what could turn out to be a precious pointwinner against Barnsley at Oakwell last Saturday.

The fact that Barnsley were the opponents couldn't have been more appropriate, because it was against the Tykes that Keith's magnificent first-class career started, when he made his first-team debut for Chelsea at Stamford Bridge on March 26th, 1983.

Keith notched his first goals for the Blues, a brace against Coventry City, at Stamford Bridge on November 3rd, 1984 in the old First Division. Chelsea won 6-2, with Kerry Dixon (3) and David Speedie the other scorers.

Our popular midfielder has in fact scored at every level of senior league football and in all the major cup competitions.

Last season, on February 13th, he hit the Premiership goal that gave

us a truly special 1-0 Valley win over a Liverpool side that included Robbie Fowler and Michael Owen.

Despite more than his share of injuries over the years, Keith has to date aggregated 562 league and cup appearances.

His 172 for Charlton, which started against today's opponents, Swindon, on September 17th, 1994, put him in 75th place in our alltime rankings.

His goal at Oakwell was his seventh in our colours, one more than a clutch of players who include Alan Curbishley and Richard Rufus.

Chettle - ten years on

Another veteran who made a big impact at Oakwell last Saturday was defender Steve Chettle, on loan to Barnsley from Nottingham Forest.

His early goal was only his 12th in a 12-year League career.

And the second of his dozen was scored for Forest against the Addicks when we suffered a 4-0 hammering at the City Ground on May 13th, 1989.

Danger abroad

Welcome as the point was at Barnsley, it was disturbing – and annoying – to come out of the match with five bookings.

Disturbing, because it is the highest number we've picked up in a match this season, bringing our total to 37, which means that, on average, only Sheffield United have a worse record.

And annoying, because if anything Charlton have been lacking a bit on the physical side at times this season.

On this evidence, one could have predicted that our match against the Blades at Bramall Lane back in September would have resulted in a



spate of yellow cards, but in fact it produced none.

On the other side of the coin, more opponents have been booked against Charlton – some 44 – than against any other club.

This is despite the fact we've played fewer matches than most in our division.

The Oakwell clash was the second time Tony Bates had refereed a Charlton match – both away.

His first time in charge was at Fratton Park on December 20th, 1997, when we beat Portsmouth 2-0 on goals, but lost 4-1 on yellow cards.

So in two matches with Bates in charge, 11 yellow cards have been produced, two dished out to home players and nine to the visitors, Charlton.

Dismissals

Nearly halfway through the season now and I'm pleased to revise downwards my early prediction of sendings-off in First Division football this season from 125 to 117.

This averages out at just under five per club, which even at this stage of the campaign has been exceeded by Tranmere (six red cards) and Bolton (five).

In fact, in Tranmere's 28 League and cup matches, no fewer than 13 players have been sent packing – comprising six from Tranmere and seven opponents.
