By the way didn't the editor of a certain programme claim before the Crystal Palace game that in spite of the league positions there really wasn't much to choose between the two teams. And that's another thing, can we please arrange a humiliating defeat against Palace before every future derby match. The only bad news from the weekend was the awful injury to Jean Yves de Blasiis. We all wish you a speedy recovery Jean Yves. Finally there is one last point I would like to make. It has been claimed recently that the Portman Road crowd don't make much noise. It's not true! I haven't heard booing that loud since a certain rotund gentleman was in charge at Carrow Road. Enjoy the game. Rupert Sheldon. G



s Academy Physiotherapist it is my job to look after the health and well being of all young Norwich City players and trialists. Every Academy is required to employ a full time Chartered physiotherapist exclusively for this reason. I joined Norwich City when the Academy was launched in the autumn of 1998, having spent the previous

seven years working at the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital physiotherapy department. Prior to this I spent three years training at the Oswestry and N. Staffordshire School of Physiotherapy. After two years of general physiotherapy I specialised in outpatients and orthopedics, whilst developing a particular interest in the treatment of sports injuries. During this time I gained some practical sporting experience working with Norwich Rugby Club.

Being born and bred in Norfolk, Norwich City has always been particularly close to my heart. I have held a season ticket at Carrow Road for many years with the obvious highlight being the experience of travelling to Holland, Germany and Italy to watch Norwich in the UEFA cup in 1993. Looking in from

the outside Norwich City's youth policy always impressed me, and since joining the Academy I have found the quality and experience of staff has been first class. With the calibre of staff at Norwich City it is not surprising that so many young players have developed their talents so effectively over the years.

Looking after the medical welfare for the boys includes numerous different areas, many of which may not be immediately obvious. Sprains and strains are part of a physical game, but the treatment of injuries is only a relatively small part of the job when compared to the holistic care of the individual players. Prevention of injuries for example, involves monitoring of growth and development, controlling the type and . frequency of training, assessing fitness levels and improving sport technique. This makes it one of the largest and most important focus areas for the

Academy.

as they develop physically they may find that their coordination decreases. As well as affecting their football progress this can make them more susceptible to injury, which can lead to a great deal of frustration. At the same time they have all the pressures associated with growing up and also have to concentrate on maintaining the standard of their schoolwork. It is

therefore hardly surprising that some of the lads will find things difficult from time to time. Consequently offering the right level of treatment and support in a professional and non-threatening environment is essential.

As the boys get older this must all be balanced by an understanding of how physically and mentally demanding professional football can be. They must adjust to this as their bodies grow and develop, and they will learn to rely much less on the treatment room. At the same time a strong emphasis on enjoying football helps the players to cope with the demanding levels of fitness and training expected from them.

To achieve these aims teamwork and communication are essential. I work closely with Academy doctor Mark

Gaskin and Sports Scientist Dave Carolan. This is particularly important during rehabilitation after injury, when regaining fitness and preventing re-injury is a priority. Constant discussion continues with the player's parents and the coaching staff to keep them fully informed at all times. It is also important to remember that the local GP has overall responsibility for the boy's medical care, and there will be times when it's more appropriate for treatment to be coordinated from the doctors surgery.

In summary it is my job to provide all Norwich City Academy players with a safe and professional environment in which to fully rehabilitate from injury and to ensure that they have access to the highest quality advice from the relevant health care professionals. I am proud to be associated with the Norwich City Football Club Academy.



TONIGHT'S VISITORS

SWINDON TOWN

onight's visitors are Swindon Town, a club staring Division Two in the face after a season of struggle and disappointment. Relegated from the Premiership in 1994 with the worse-ever defensive record in top flight football, they finished last season with the worst one in Division One and look set to repeat that unenviable record this season.

Steve McMahon left during last season to be replaced by ex-Northern Ireland international Jimmy Quinn, who returned to the club where he began his career and guided them to the safety of 17th place. With a crippling debt reportedly in the region of £4m Robins' fans knew there would be no big money signings to strengthen their leaky defence, but Quinn swooped to sign former Peterborough United teammate and striker Giuliano Grazioli under the Bosman ruling.

The season got off to a truly rocky start when the Robins were dumped out of the Worthington Cup by lowly Leyton Orient and could only manage three wins in their first 16 games. Their lack of firepower was demonstrated by the fact that Chris Hay's goal which earned a point at Stockport in October was his first for six months, while later that month George Ndah was bought by Wolves for \$1m despite only netting once for the Robins all season.

The sale of Ndah was the final straw for supporters and chairman Rikki Hunt stepped down after bearing the brunt of their anger at poor performances and what they saw as the steady stripping of the club's best assets. His argument that the sale of players was essential to secure financial stability cut little ice.

In the match after Hunt stood down Swindon moved off the bottom by beating Port Vale, but they then embarked on a record-equalling run that left them firmly rooted to the bottom of the table and with

little prospect of escaping the drop. They went 19 league games without a win and equalled the club record, but Robins fans remarked that by including the FA Cup defeat at Charlton the current team could officially call themselves the worst ever Swindon side. And there was plenty more bad news during that run from November through to early March.

In January the club had to dismiss 15 members of staff in a cost-cutting exercise. Already four points adrift at the foot of the table, the Robins were losing an estimated £25,000 per week and anticipated losses of £1m by the end of the current financial year. Manager Quinn had to make an "an impossible choice" between his assistant manager Mike Walsh or reserve team boss Alan MacDonald, but let Walsh go as MacDonald had only recently moved into the area and he didn't want to let him down.

Strikers Iffy Onuora and Ty Gooden were both sold to Gillingham in a cut-price \$300,000 deal as new chairman Cliff Puffett tried to balance the books, but in February the Wiltshire side were forced into administration. On the field the team staggered their way to their record run without a win, but broke the run in emphatic fashion at home to Huddersfield. Against a side in the race for promotion they produced an excellent result to win 2-0, their first win since October, and followed up by ending the incredible winning run of runaway leaders Charlton thanks to a fifth minute own goal by their keeper Dean Kiely.

With confidence boosted and Grazioli on the comeback trail after months out with injury, the Robins looked set to make a battle of the season's run in, but their hopes took a blow with Saturday's defeat at home to Wolves. With increasingly slim hopes of survival, both on the pitch and off, Swindon have it all to play for today.

Gareth Hall: Mr


Consistency over two seasons. Recently went on a goal scoring streak with two goals in consecutive matches taking him to fourth in the goalscoring charts. Recently

Charlie Griffin: Known as the Chippenham goal machine although appearances and goals in the first team have been


restricted due to his inexperience. His old club could be on the way to Wembley as they have reached the semi - final of the FA vase.



NOTTINGHAM FOREST

Journey

An early start coupled with a sensationally easy trip meant arrival in Nottingham well before 5.00pm, which at least made parking easy. Ground

With plans for an update of the Main Stand - the oldest in the ground - remaining on the drawing board, the City Ground was unchanged since our last visit. The away fans were, as usual, allocated half the lower tier of the Bridgford End, from where the view was excellent.

Home Fans

A combination of a half empty ground and struggling team was always likely to mean that the decibel level was going to suffer somewhat, and so it proved. Much like their team, the home fans started respectably and gradually tailed off, although they still managed to provide the match officials probably the three most clueless seen for quite some time with an impressive amount of abuse from time to time.

Away Fans

After the previous Saturday's disappointing performance and the excessive admission cost, a highly respectable following of 964 made the trip. As with the home fans, not much was heard in the way of noise, although a fine show of solidarity was evident in the abuse directed towards those match officials.

Policing/Stewarding

In common with previous seasons, Nottinghamshire police decided to arrest or eject at least one away fan for the most spurious of reasons. It's always been advisable not to shout too loudly at the City Ground, and this season certainly followed the expected pattern.

Team Performance

After an calamitous start which resulted in us conceding a goal almost before the referee had started the game (and we kicked off!), the team strengthened their resolve and Iwan's equaliser was ultimately well deserved. The second half produced little excitement with neither team creating many openings, although we certainly should have been much more positive for the 20 minutes that Forest were reduced to 10 men - bizarrely, we did just the opposite. The rejuvenated Mike Milligan's effort just before the final whistle was the closest anyone came to a winner, although that would have been slightly flattering.

On the Road To

QUEENS PARK RANGERS

Journey

With recent visits to Loftus Road being on Bank Holidays, this season's trip is potentially much more troublesome. With parking slightly easier than for many London grounds, it's still worth driving, although it can take a long while to drive through central London or down the A40.

Ground

Probably the most claustrophobic ground in the division, with all four stands tightly packed around the pitch. With no room for expansion anywhere, no further development is likely either. The away fans will be housed in the School End Stand which, for the first few rows, has uncovered seating in the lower tier. However, this is still a far better bet than the upper tier, which affords no view whatsoever of the near goal beyond the first five rows.

Home Fans

QPR fans are amongst the least confrontational in London, and so no problems should occur. Leaving the ground is usually more hazardous given the aggressive nature of drivers in West London, so it's best to stick to the pavements at all times, even if the road is apparently closed to traffic!

Policing/Stewarding

Stewarding has proved a bit troublesome in previous years, although things have improved on that front recently. The only minor irritation is the need to be searched before entering the ground, at which point the stewards can occasionally be a little bombastic. The police appear to be dragged from all over the capital, and should be relied upon for advice as an absolute last resort.

Past Record


Trips to Loftus Road haven't been particularly profitable in the victories department - last time we managed one, Dale Gordon scored. In mitigation, we have played there several times around Christmas recently, which obviously lessened the chance of victory considerably.

How To Get There

Unless you feel up to braving the traffic through central London it is probably easier to take the following route: A11, M11, M25 exit at J16 A40. Exit A40 after approx. 14 miles s/p White City A40. At traffic lights turn right (s/p Shepherds Bush) onto Wood Lane. At next junction, just past the BBC building, turn right into South Africa Road for the ground. As this is a Saturday fixture, parking is likely to be more difficult, so probably the industrial estate on Ariel Way represents the best chance.





A HISTORY OF NORWICH CITY FOOTBALL CLUB

Dave Stringer's first full season in charge of Norwich City was 1988-89 – and it became one of the most dramatic and successful in the club's history.

Sadly, there was no silverware at the end of it. But the Canaries were long-time leaders of the First Division and reached their first FA Cup semi-final for 30 years.

Before the campaign got under way, there was a blow for Stringer and coach David Williams. After twice being voted City's player of the season, Kevin Drinkell joined the growing English contingent at Rangers. He'd played 150 times for Norwich, and scored a very healthy 57 goals. The luckless John O'Neill played less than one match. He lasted just 34 minutes of his City debut at Wimbledon in December 1987 before suffering severe knee damage in a collision with John Fashanu. It was confirmed during the summer of '88 that his career was over.

There was some consolation for City. Welsh international striker Malcolm Allen signed from Watford, and just two days before the season started, Andy Townsend moved to Carrow Road from Southampton in a \$300,000 deal. Townsend was a Norwich player for less than two years but proved an inspired purchase.

And so inspired was the Canaries' start to the season that Townsend had to settle for a place on the bench in the early stages. They won their opening four matches against Nottingham Forest, Middlesbrough, Queens Park Rangers and Newcastle to become



the early pace setters.

Although they briefly lost the leadership after a surprise home defeat against Charlton, it was splendidly regained by virtue of successive wins over Derby, Tottenham and Manchester United. The Old Trafford result was magnificent – Phelan and Townsend striking glorious late goals after a belter from Mark Hughes had given United the lead.

Stringer was fortunate to be able to rely on a settled side. But how well his players rewarded him with a series of wonderful performances which indicated City's lofty position was certainly no fluke. Townsend weighed in with a series of vital goals, none more spectacular than the one which earned a 1-0 win at Liverpool on December 17th.

That underlined their genuine Championship credentials. They remained top over Christmas when Gordon and Townsend scored in a 2-1 victory over West Ham, and all of a sudden there was the very real prospect of a small, unfashionable club running off with the League title.

Despite surrendering top spot over New Year they remained in contention. Sadly, successive defeats by Liverpool, Nottingham Forest and Coventry in April, effectively killed off their challenge. But they were still going strongly in the Cup after wins over Port Vale, non-League Sutton United (City won 8-0 against the side who'd just eliminated cup holders Coventry) Sheffield United and West Ham. Norwich were through to to an FA Cup semi-final for the first time in 30 years.

The Canaries headed for Villa Park with high hopes but the loss of Robert Fleck following the death of his father on the eve of the match cast a shadow over the whole squad. For the record, Everton beat City 1-0 but the day will always be remembered for the tragic events at the other semi-final when 95 Liverpool supporters were crushed to death at Hillsborough.

For some weeks afterwards football had very little meaning. Eventually, Liverpool beat Everton in the final, Arsenal pipped Liverpool for the championship and Norwich City finished a very creditable fourth — their highest ever position. For the third time they were denied European football

because of the continuing ban on English clubs.

During the summer Stringer's midfield resources were diminished when Phelan departed for Manchester United and Putney for Middlesbrough. Both served City well: Phelan's adaptability had been a key factor, Putney eventually won over Norwich supporters initially suspicious of his Portman Road roots.

Again the City manager came up trumps in the transfer market, capturing David Phillips from Coventry and Tim Sherwood from Watford. Both adapted well to the marvellously inventive brand of football Norwich were playing and it proved another exciting season.

Inevitably, it lacked some of the drama of the previous campaign which had been one of the greatest in City's history. But there was still a league double over Manchester United, and an incredible seven-goal thriller at Highbury which had expensive repercussions for both Arsenal and Norwich.

2-0 and 3-2 ahead, Norwich eventually lost 4-3 to a highly controversial last minute penalty. As Lee Dixon scored from the rebound after Gunn saved his initial spot kick, all hell let loose.

Most of the players on the field were involved in a highly publicised scuffle which resulted in both clubs appearing before the FA on charges of disrepute. Arsenal were lined £20,000, Norwich £50,000. No wonder City felt aggrieved at what they considered a sense of injustice at Lancaster Gate.

Tenth place in 1989-90 was followed by 15th the following season when the Canaries recovered from a poor start to easily preserve their First Division status. Stringer's task was hardly helped by the million pound departures of Linighan to Arsenal and Townsend to Chelsea, but he countered these with the addition of John Polston from Spurs and Paul Blades from Derby.

Gradually, the young brigade was making its mark. Jeremy Goss began to win a regular first team place and towards the end of the season, Chris Sutton, Daryl Sutch and Robert Ullathorne all made their debuts.

It stood Sutton in good stead because he made a real name for himself in 1991/92 when City again went agonisingly close to a Wembley Cup Final appearance. He confirmed himself as both a central defender and striker of rich potential, and it was his extra-time winner against Southampton in a quarter-final replay that earned the Canaries a place in the last four.

Although Dale Gordon had become the third Norwich player to move to Rangers, Stringer had boosted his resources by signing utility player Rob Newman and splashing out a record £925,000 on Darren Beckford from Port Vale.

Despite Beckford being ruled out of the semifinal, Canary fans headed to Hillsborough confident that Norwich would see off the challenge of a Sunderland side struggling near the bottom of Division Two. Sadly it was City's most insipid performance of the season and they were on the wrong end of a huge cup upset. John Byrne scored the only goal of the game to leave the fans angry and frustrated.

They fared little better in the league, losing six successive games which put their First Division status in jeopardy. A Robert Fleck strike against Wimbledon earned the point that guaranteed survival but it was an undignified end to a season which once promised so much.



Call me a traditionalist, old fashioned even, but I would like to pose one question. Whatever happened to the inflatable Canaries and bananas seen at Carrow Road in years gone by?

At the moment there is quite a good match atmosphere at Carrow Road, but it surely could not match the sea of yellow swaying "to and fro". It may simply have been that everything seemed better in Walker's hay-day and that I was imagining things better than they actually were.

Not only did these large inflatables add colour to the stands, it also further united the legions of Canary supporters intent on cheering their side onto glory. Opposing players must have been a little more than put off by this fearsome sight when stepping up to take a free-kick or penalty.

The inflatables were among City's most loyal supporters. They were there against Bayern Munich and Inter Milan and they were there against Swindon Town on a cold wet Tuesday evening.

This is an impassioned plea to the Club and if there is a way they could re-introduce the popular feature, I would be eternally grateful.



I understand that some fans were upset at the organisation of some of the policing although, credit where due, there were only a small number of arrests in a crowd of almost 22,000. If you stand that up against the number of arrests at, say, a rock festival or New Year celebrations at Trafalgar Square, it shows that yet again the vast majority of people were very well behaved. However, if you have any reason to feel aggrieved at the way YOU

were dealt with, drop me a line and I'll pass the message back.

At the Crystal Palace game, we gave permission for the Palace fans to hold a collection in the visitors' section of the ground. Palace, as you may know, face a bleak future, and are currently in administration.

> We haven't had any feedback as to how much was raised, but I chucked a couple of guid into their bucket. The Crystal Palace Supporters Trust are aiming to raise £10 million, but they'd settle for raising £3 million and becoming a partner with others for the future of their Club. One paragraph of the brochure states "Are Palace too big a Club to die? Don't you believe it. One day, we fear, a Club of this size will go out of business - and it could be ours." There are lessons for the whole of football to learn from what has gone on at Selhurst park. We would all do well to heed them.

I can report that Season Ticket sales are going remarkably well, with sales reaching 5,896 as at Tuesday morning, and generous discounts still being available until April 30th. Over 1,200

people took advantage of our easy payment scheme, as well as 215 who bought 'three year tickets'. In the current season, we have 10,720 season tickets - almost a 6% increase on 1998/9 season, and the two seasons before that were 7,700 and 6,600. A solid season ticket base is the bedrock of a Club's support, and we would like to thank those who have invested in next season already, without knowing the outcome of this one.

Finally, a pat on the back for Tara Colman. She 'endured' a call on reception from Beach FM, who were trying to wind up both Tara and her opposite number on the reception at Ipswich. Although agitated she dealt with her 'customer' very professionally. We hear that Tara's opposite at Portman Road slammed the phone down. Another derby victory in the bag!



IWAN GIVES FANS "something to shout about"

Picking a Norwich City 'Man of the Match' from Sunday's comfortable 2-0 derby victory over Ipswich is not an easy task. On a day when the whole team performed superbly every single player who wore a yellow and green shirt could have a justifiable claim to the title. However, if picking a City 'Man of the Match' would be nigh on impossible there was little doubt who would be grabbing all the headlines. As as been the case so often this season, striker Iwan Roberts stole the limelight with his first half double strike which gave the Canaries the three points and made sure the 'Pride of Anglia' mantle stayed firmly in Norfolk.

The Canary caught up with Iwan immediately after Sunday's game and the big striker, who was also called up to the full Wales squad last Friday, was quick to realise what the result meant to Norwich supporters. "We've had great support down here" said Iwan, "and there was a full house at Carrow Road as well so it was important to everybody concerned. We haven't played well recently, but hopefully now we've given the fans something to shout about over the next few weeks. It gives the whole Club a massive boost and we've needed that. To be honest the game couldn't have come at a better time for us with what happened with Bruce in the week. I really am pleased for the fans. They've been tremendous, we haven't given them much to get excited about over the last few weeks, but hopefully today will make up for it a little bit."

In typical fashion Iwan was also quick to praise his team mates on the day. "Everybody was outstanding." The two centre halves have headed everything, the midfield five have worked their socks off and Andy Marshall made a couple of crucial saves in the first half when there was only a goal in it. I think the way we've played we've caught them on the break and won 2-0 - kept a clean sheet which we are really

pleased about and in the end it could have been more."

And in the fashion of all true centre forwards the big Welshman was happy to describe how he scored his goals. "I've caught the first one really well. The lads were pulling my leg saying it was going wide, but I think if it hadn't hit someone's back it would have gone in the top corner anyway. It only took a slight deflection. A slight deflection! The second one I was well pleased with. We've caught them on the break like we did all afternoon and it was a great ball by Paul (Dalglish) and I knew that the momentum of the defender was going to take him past me, and I've trapped it on my thigh and put it in so I'm well pleased. My target for the season is to get past that 20 goal mark. I think that's important for any striker."

If Iwan carries on his form from Sunday for the rest of the season there is no doubt that he will reach his target, although ironically he is suspended for tonight's game, but in the meantime Norwich City fans everywhere will be savouring Iwan's derby brace which certainly has given them "something to shout about."
