Last week I had the privilege to be


invited to speak at the STFC






The two years that I've been at the Club we have been knocked out in the first round both times so it would be nice to have a bit of a cup run this time around.






STEP 1. Approach defender with ball under close control.

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



A long time target of Exeter City, Alex was eventually secured on loan from Leyton Orient in February 2000, but sustained a fractured collar bone in his second match for the Grecians.

Alex, now fully recovered, signed a new deal with the City in June 2000 after turning down the chance of becoming player-manager of Leatherhead. Equally at home in defence, midfield or in

attack, Alex commenced his career with Watford where he progressed via their youth scheme to earn a full contract in July 1990. He had a short loan spell with Barnet, before moving to Orient in May 1995. Since then he has featured in nearly 150 matches, scoring 35 goals.

1 Arjan Van Heusden

Tall Dutch keeper who was signed on a free transfer from Cambridge United in July 2000. Had a trial with Barnsley, prior to joining the Grecians. Manager Noel Blake was keen to sign Arjan after his release by Cambridge. Entered the Football League with Port Vale in August 1994, who paid Noordwijk £4,500 for his services. After a loan spell with Oxford United, Arjan signed for Cambridge in August 1998.

5 Chris Curran

Chris became one of the small band of players who has appeared for all three of Devon's Football League clubs. He commenced his career at Torquay United where he made 152 league appearances. Made a £40,000 switch to Plymouth Argyle in December 1995 and on to Exeter City for £20,000 in July 1997. Chris once again proved last season that he was a bargain signing.

Darren Roberts

Keen to return to the Football League, Darren linked up with the Grecians from Conference side Scarborough in June 2000. An experienced front runner who began his senior career with Wolverhampton Wanderers, who had signed him from Burton Albion. Darren went on to play for Hereford United (loan), Chesterfield and Darlington and is a player who has been tracked by Exeter for some time.

10 John Cornforth

John was signed on an 18-month deal in February 2000 from Scunthorpe United, where he had been on a monthly contract since joining them from Wycombe Wanderers in the summer of 1999. A full Welsh international, John commenced his career with Sunderland and then signed for Swansea City for £50,000 in August 1991. After making 149 league outings he was transferred to Birmingham City for £350,000 in March 1996, but was on the move again nine months later, to Wycombe, who paid £50,000 for his services.

11 Andy Roscoe



A free transfer signing from Mansfield Town in June 2000, Andy featured in 250 League and Cup matches for Rotherham United

before making the move to the Stags during the 1999 close season. He began his career with Liverpool, such was the competition at Anfield, however, that he had to wait for his League debut until transferring to Bolton Wanderers in July 1991.

Moved to Rotherham for a fee of £70,000 in October 1994.


12 Jon Ashton

Made the short move from neighbouring Plymouth Argyle on a free transfer in June 2000. Jon had been associated with Argyle as a schoolboy, finally earning himself a full professional contract. Made his league debut in September 1998 and went on to feature in 43 matches. His first season at Home Park was interrupted due to injury, but now fully recoverd. A quick and determined ball winner.

14 Steve Flack

A former professional boxer who was signed by Exeter for a fee of £10,000 from Cardiff City in September 1996. He had previously played for non-leaguers Foxton and Cambridge City, moving to Ninian Park midway through the 1995-96 season. Was the club's leading goalscorer in 1998-99, and that attracted six-figure offers from Hull City and Bristol Rovers during the course of the campaign.

17 Graeme Tomlinson



Reunited with Noel Blake at Exeter following his free transfer move from Macclesfield Town in June 2000 - the pair having been team mates at Bradford City. Graeme made a

£100,000 switch to Manchester United in July 1994, but found first team outings limited at Old Trafford and therefore had loan spells with Luton Town, AFC Bournemouth and Millwall. Moved to Macclesfield in July 1998.

18 Robert Speakman

Leading scorer in the Exeter City under-18 team two seasons ago, Robert signed a one-year deal with the club after completing a period as a trainee with the club. He made his first team debut as a substitute at St. James' Park against Leyton Orient in April 1999 and scored his first League goal in the opening fixture of last season against Hull City.

Jamie, started his

career with Luton Town, where he made 36 League outings. He had loan spells with both Mansfield Town and Cambridge United, before signing for Barnet in July 1995. After over 70 matches for the Bees, he signed for Cambridge United in August 1997, where he enjoyed a regular run in their first team, missing just one game in two seasons.

27 Glenn Cronin

Capped by the Republic of Ireland at Under-18 level last season, Glenn has made excellent progress via the youth ranks at Exeter City, and on completion of his spell as a trainee was signed on a full contract during the summer of 2000. A regular member of the reserve and youth teams last term, Glenn is expected to become a valuable member of the first team squad this season.

30 Lee Zabek

Lee became manager Noel Blake's fourteenth summer signing as he agreed a two-year deal with the Grecians following his free transfer move from Bristol Rovers in August 2000. A central midfield ball-winner, Lee was originally a trainee with Rovers, gaining a full contract in July 1997. However, his first team outings have been limited to illness and injury, although was noted by Exeter after he scored against them in the FA Cup in 1998.

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First game of the season and we introduce a special deal in the Town End - 'lets do some face painting' they said.

You get the picture, lots of small boys grinning madly into the camera, Swindon Town logo vivid and symmetrical in the sunlight. In my experience 'the truth is out there' but it is rarely as we imagine it. My colleagues and I had offered our services in the mistaken belief that anything an ageing hippy (all cheese-cloth and nose rings) can do so effortlessly on Tesco fun days and church fetes, we could do 'only better' for our beloved club - wrong!

To start with the Swindon Town logo is not that easy to draw from memory on a clean sheet of A4 add the dimensions and changing contours of small boys faces and the degree of difficulty becomes more acute. We didn't start too well really, we had intended to do lots of practice faces and someone had seen a simple 'how to' book at Early Learning, which made the whole thing as easy as paint by numbers. However, as all our children are now grown up it had been some time since we saw the simple how to book on the shelves. This was doubley unfortunate, because we left it until the morning of the event

to go and get it, and it was unavailable as it was out of print in 1989! however a last minute substitution was on hand and as it was a large, grossly expensive, bound volume we felt it would 'do nicely' it didn't! This was a book of face painting so advanced that it would flummox the make up team of Star Wars. In fact, I think the first example was a 'wookie'. OK then chaps, we said tolling up our sleeves, we can always 'wing it'. I must admit my heart sank when I looked at our meagre collection of paint sticks. It is a valuable lesson to learn that when face painting at Swindon Town make sure that above all else you have a good supply of red and white paint!

Now men do not have the highly developed sense of colour and tint that women do. They have no need and certainly no interest to know the fact that tangerine and turquoise are totally different shades and that you can't wear blue socks with a black suit. When it comes to football colours they suddenly all develop the sensibilities of Jean Paul Gautier if their team play in a particular shade of red no other colour will do, no matter how young and inexperienced the fan is - pink or maroon will not be good enough if their home strip is scarlet.

As with home decoration an often overlooked and frequently bitterly regretted, one should always prepare the surface you are about to work, making sure it is both smooth clean and dry. It is therefore important to remember sharp angles will be distorted when drawn over pimples and spots. The residue of sugar and soft drinks will not take on any colour at all. By far the biggest pit-fall of this activity is a subject with a head cold - there is nothing worse than smearing mucus and tears coloured bright red on an expectant child's face and neck.

We felt that after 20 minutes or so and with only one child each with very wobbly Swindon logos (one back to front, one very smudged) and a queue stretching from us to the middle of the following week.

It was time to speed up the operation every other child was offered an England logo and in order to use a few colours up we instituted blue and black stripes as a sort of tribute to our away kit.

It was only when a five year old asked for the name of his local club on his face and that team turned out to be Forest Green Rovers, that we retired defeated.

When Colin Todd came in and offered me a contract with two


or three of the other lads that were in the same boat, although they were a bit younger than I am, we were really pleased. Not just getting the new contracts but also with the way the football club is shaping up. With the confidence and the buzz of a new manager coming in and then being appointed captain was a massive boost. I just hope that I can do the armband proud - as it were, and make a good job of it. I felt in good shape coming back after the summer break. Over the last three or four years, as I get a little older, I keep training over the summer, not really hard but I've kept my body ticking over.

With the investment in new players the squad seems to be shaping up very nicely. It's a young

inexperienced squad but I think it's got heaps of potential. I have stated before that we need to have a half-decent start just to get the confidence with the new players and help the team to gel. I believe that if we can make a good start then we can go on to good things this season.

The squad is shaping up very well indeed, I think it is essential for all the new signings like Juan Cobian



in the right back position to offer strong competition for first team places. Colin Todd has tried to get two players in every position and at present I think he's looking for another centre half and that's the

way it's got to be. It's modern football. There will be injuries and suspensions and loss of form and just because I've got the captain's armband I'm in no different situation to any of the other lads.

The first game was an important

one for us. After doing so well in pre-season everyone thought we would roll Colchester over and walk away with the three points, but it wasn't to be. Colchester were well organised on the day and we now

season. If we can make that good start as I have mentioned, I believe we can go onto good things.



David Cole was missing from Town's defensive line up and this led to a reshuffle of the Swindon back four with Paul Robert's taking over Cole's position in the centre of defence and Dave Hockaday moving to full back. Swindon took the lead on the halfhour when a surging 40-yard run by Charlie Henry attracted the attention of the Exeter defenders allowing him to set Brian 'Badger' Wade free on the right. Wade ran on to the by-line before pulling back a low cross which Peter Coyne was on hand to knock into the net. Steve Harrower nearly pulled Exeter level moments later when he hit a powerful volley which rebounded off the Swindon crossbar. Seven minutes later hesitation in the Grecians defence saw Colin Gordon dart in between defender and keeper and angle a shot into the net between covering defenders. Exeter, two thirds of the way down the



"Rarely have I seen an away side dictate a game as much as they did at St James' Park", was Clive King's comment on the match at Exeter on 4th March 1986 which saw Lou Macari's red and white army continue to re-write the Swindon Town record book.

Division Four table, had no answer. Every ball played forward seemed to find a Town defender and had the contest been a boxing match a towel would probably have been thrown into the ring.

The second half saw driving rain but it failed to dampen the enthusiasm of the Town supporters behind the goal on the open terracing. Coyne, Gordon and Barnard all went close but the Exeter team which had picked up seven points in their previous three games defended in a spirited fashion. Town fans had a further goal to celebrate in the 83rd minute when Leigh Barnard, who had spent a spell on loan with the Devon club the previous season, took a free kick. Colin Gordon got above his marker to head back across goal and Chris Ramsey was on hand to head home number three.

The victory was Swindon's fifth away win in a row breaking the previous best four achieved in both "1937/38 and 1958/59 seasons. Even more remarkably the clean sheet meant that Swindon had played eight hours and fifty-six minutes without even conceding a goal. With a four point lead over second place Chester and three games in hand as well, things were looking bright,

especially as a new deal with the Council would involve a reduction of the club's debts by £91,000.

Notable in the Exeter team of the time were their eccentric keeper John Shaw whose sense of humour often defused threatening situations, not least with his habit of picking up coins thrown at him and posing with them in his eye sockets. Also playing was Martin Ling later to enjoy two spells with Swindon.






