




Tuesday night was a big disappointment for everyone concerned at Swindon Town and we are all aiming to bounce back in our league match against Wigan today.

There was a great chance for us to progress in the League Cup and earn a decent tie in the third round, but unfortunately, the players did not perform in the first half and we were unable to pull things around in a much-improved second half display. I really do believe there is much we can take from that second half display and use it positively for today's match.

We have not won a game at the County Ground this season and the only way we are going to get the home form sorted is by doing more of what we did in the second half on Tuesday night. I admit the urgency should have been there from the first kick but the players have got to want it badly enough. They didn't have that in the first half, but I think the fans will have seen us go at Tranmere in a positive manner for the second half without really looking like we are going to get a goal. They will have seen the

improvement and we have got to take a lot of satisfaction out of that.

We have got to start like that come 3pm this afternoon. We have not done too badly in the league recently and I want to see that urgency, I want people to take the game by the scruff of the neck, make it happen and work hard for it. I am sure we will get that today because this is another big game for us against a good side.



Wigan narrowly missed out on promotion last season and my former Derby colleague Bruce Rioch will be keen to put them up there again this year for a crack at promotion to Division One. I said after the win at Luton last Saturday that we had three big games coming up. Tranmere was on Tuesday, Wigan is today and then next week we have the local derby against Oxford, a game which everyone will be looking forward to.

We have a good little run of away results under our belts after the enforced absence from the County Ground so it would be nice for us to continue that with two home wins in the next two matches. To do that, however, the players need to show that level of commitment, desire and passion that they have been

showing at places like Bristol City and Luton. That is very important for us to keep that level of consistency going. While we didn't get a shot on target during the game against Tranmere, I don't think John Aldridge's side, apart from their goal, were threatening at all either. We did get things right up front against Luton on Saturday but things were poor at the back. Against Tranmere we never really looked like conceding a goal but could not get things right going forward. If we can put it together in the way that we want then we could just get some joy.

We have played three home games, drawn one and lost two. While that is not the record that I would like, the only game which was alarming was the Walsall defeat. The Tranmere match was not an alarming defeat by any means.

The only way the players will start getting home wins is by going about their jobs in the manner that they did in the second half of Tuesday night's match. They need to take the game to the opposition and look to make things happen. It has been a while since we were last here for a league match and there has been a great improvement since the Walsall defeat.

I hope you can sit back and enjoy watching the team this afternoon.



Arriving at the County Ground brimming with confidence, Bruce Rioch's Wigan side will be looking to take three points home with them to Springfield Park today.

After narrowly missing out on promotion last season, they have started the new season where they left off and will be looking to move to the top of the division after today's results. The 'Latics' frontman Simon Haworth is flying and netted in last weekend's 2-1 win over Northampton and again in the cup in midweek. He is hoping to top his 20 goals of last season and if Wigan fail to secure a place in Division One, Bruce Rioch may well have a difficult job holding onto his talented striker.

Both managers renew a friendship that goes back a long way and rekindles memories of their playing days at Derby County under the guidance of a certain Mr. Brian

Clough. A man of great influence indicating why both managers have been successful and are held in such high esteem within footballing circles. Wigan are one of the league's new boys in comparison to Swindon. having only entered the fray back in 1978. But have moved on very quickly, with a record attendance of 27,500 (unbelievably in a non league game of 1951) and a current squad packed with experience in the form of Andy Liddell, Neil Redfearn and our old favourite at the County Ground Alan McLoughlin. Let's hope that if Alan plays today there's a 1-0 home win. Courtesy of an own goal five minutes from the end by an act commonly known as old pals act!'.

"Andy's goal was fantastic, there was a good response from him.'


Bruce Rioch

Bruce was appointed manager of Wigan Athletic in June 2000 after John Benson stepped down at the end of the previous season.


A highly experienced and well respected figure within the game, Bruce has established a reputation as a strict disciplinarian who has strong beliefs on how the game should be played. Much of this has rubbed off on our present manager Colin Todd for it was Rioch that first introduced Todd to a coaching role at Middlesbrough - who Todd went on to manage when Rioch left.

As a player, Bruce was a tough-tackling midfielder for Luton, Aston Villa, Derby, Everton, and Torquay where he started his managerial career. Renowned for his powerful left foot shooting he won 24 Scottish international caps before moving into management. He went on to manage Middlesbrough, Millwall, Bolton, Arsenal and Norwich before moving to the JJB.

During 1992 and 1995, as manager of Bolton Wanderers, Rioch took his side through two promotions and established Bolton as a team to be reckoned with. When Rioch left to take charge of Arsenal it was Colin Todd that once again took over the reins at Burnden Park. He has now been charged with the job of realising Wigan Athletic's Premiership dreams.

Simon Haworth on form

At £600,000 Simon is the club's record signing, arriving from Coventry in October '98.

Capped 5 times for Wales, he also became a regular in the Under 21 team. Started his career with Cardiff City for whom he once scored the winner against Wigan. Scored the Latics' first-ever goal at the JJB, one of a total of 19 he scored last season.



Scott Green Mr Versatile...

Scott signed for Wigan in June 1997

from nearby Bolton Wanderers for a £300,000 fee.

Scored on his Wigan league debut but then went over 100 games before netting his second goal against Bournemouth last season. A versatile performer, he has played at right-back, right wing-back, central defender, centre forward and in midfield. Scott signed a new three-year contract in July 2000.



1 Roy Carroll



A then club record £350,000 was paid to Hull City to secure the services of this outstanding

young 'keeper. The usual first choice for his country', Northern Ireland, he is the most-capped player in the club's history. Missed out on the play-off final last season after an emergency operation to have his appendix removed.

2 Carl Bradshaw



Club captain and very much a leader on the pitch, he lifted the Auto Windscreens' Shield at Wembley last April. Carl is a

very versatile player who signed for the club in Oct '97. His favoured position is right-back though he can play in midfield, and famously played in goal for 35 minutes when Roy Carroll was stretchered off against Wycombe, a game which Wigan went on to win.

3 Kevin Sharp

Signed from Leeds United in Nov'95 for a then record £100,000. Canadian-born Kevin is the regular choice at left back having made over 160 appearances for the club. Kevin was sent off at Wembley last May in the play-off final against Gillingham for a second caution.

4 Pat McGibbon



Pat is a Northern Ireland international who signed from Manchester United in July'97 in a deal which finally cost Wigan £380,000. Famously scored

the goal against Colchester in 1977 that secured Wigan's promotion to Division Two, and got the last-ever League goal at Springfield Park. Signed a new two-year deal in July this year.

5 Stuart Balmer

A £200,000 capture from Charlton Athletic in Sept '98, Falkirk-born Stuart made over 200 appearances at The Valley and helped the London club gain promotion to the Premier League. He is a consistently solid performer at the heart of the defence who became the first player ever to be sent off at the JJB stadium for a deliberate handball versus Millwall.

7 Andy Liddell



Hard-working striker signed from Barnsley for a bargain £375,000 in Oct' 98. Had spent his whole career at Oakwell and was part of the

side that took Barnsley to the Premier League. Won 11 Scottish Under 21 caps. His father Gary was a professional with Grimsby Town in the 1970's. Andy won the 1999/2000 'Player of the Year' award, voted by the Wigan fans.

8 Kevin Nicholls

Promising young midfielder signed in June'99 from Charlton Athletic - a deal which could net the Addicks up to £600,000. Kevin captained the England Under 12's side and came through the ranks at the Valley. Made only eight appearances last season because of a troublesome knee injury.

16 Roberto Martinez

Signed from Spanish Second
Division side CF Balaguer in 1995,
Roberto was the Latics' top scorer in
his first season in England with 13
goals. Twice named in the PFA
Division Three team he is the only
one of Wigan's 'Three Amigos' still
at the club.

18 Ian Kilford



Bristol-born Ian came to Wigan from Nottingham Forest in 1993 and is the club's longest serving player. Signed a new twoyear deal at the

start of this season, he is a quick player with an eye for a goal and can also play in a variety of positions.

21 Brian McLoughlin

Scottish left winger who signed on a free transfer from Dundee United in the summer of 1999. Spent most of his career with Glasgow Celtic and has yet to make himself a regular in the starting line-up.

34 Alan McLoughlin



Former Town captain and Irish international midfielder who signed from Portsmouth for a fee of £260,000 in Dec '99. Alan spent 13

seasons at the County Ground before leaving for The Dell in 1990 for £1m. Alan scored after just 52 seconds of his third game for the Latics in the 2-o victory over Gillingham.

6 Arjan De Zeeuw

Experienced Dutch centre-half who joined the club in July'99 from Barnsley. He helped them to promotion to the Premier League where he remained a regular in the starting line up. Scored three goals last season and was controv-ersially denied a fourth at Wembley when his goal-bound header crossed the line but was not allowed. Won the Players' 'Player of the Year' award last

season.



They need to take this opportunity with both hands if they are to succeed.



was knocked off his bike. Kieran sustained some bad injuries including a broken arm, but this didn't deter






Man on the mic

I'm greatly encouraged by the news that the Premiership's club chairmen are concerned as to what impact any potential change would have on clubs like ours in the lower divisions. I hope the status quo is maintained; if

Imagine a Premiership club approaching one of your team's star players - for example, Matt Hewlett receives an approach from Southampton ... or ... Simon Haworth gets a call from Coventry. Hardly glamour clubs, but nevertheless, the chance to play with (and against) the best. No money changes hands, they just leave. The financial lifeline which helps us to survive is taken away.

It would also mean that when players like Ginola, Fowler and Collymore become unhappy just keeping the bench warm, as Collymore himself stressed in his written transfer request earlier this week, they would be free to go elsewhere if they've had enough. No loyalty; agents would dominate ... and the heart of football in the lower divisions would be ripped out.

It's hard to imagine such a situation back in the seventies when today's opposing managers. Colin Todd and Bruce Rioch were players under Brian Clough at Derby County. "Kevin Hector's agent is on the phone, Brian. He's fed up and is moving to Manchester United under new European legislation."

Oh, to be a fly on the wall.

Two centres have Toy Libraries and Early Years Workers are developing the work with very young children.

The Swindon Centre in Old Town concentrates on therapeutic work, helping the victims of sexual abuse to recover and face the future. They work with groups and individuals depending on the need and age of the child or young person concerned. They also work with the non-abusing carers, usually the mother or any other person who has been in the role of carer.

Football Programmes Down The Years

A series of articles by the Editor of PROGRAMME MONTHLY & FOOTBALL COLLECTABLE magazine describing how programmes have changed over a century and a quarter of Association Football

4. Early FA Cup Finals

While the most important day in the football calendar has always been the FA Cup Final, for many decades the quality and frequency of its programmes were far behind those issued by clubs. Indeed, it was not until the late 1900's that the football authorities took some interest in FA Cup Final programmes, having previously stood back while outside publishers 'sponsored' matchday issues.

A number of 19th century Cup Final programmes were published by 'The People' newspaper. Printed locally, these Crystal Palace issues comprised a folded sheet with advertisements on one side, the People being prominent amongst sports outfitters; and team lines and more adverts on the reverse. They were sold as 'The only authorised programme' and so few have survived that they now fetch five figure sums at auction. Some doubts as to the 'only authorised' issue status of these programmes have been raised by the existence of another version of a 1901 Cup Final teamsheet. An

'Official Programme' for the Tottenham Hotspur v Sheffield United match, in the shape of a 7" x 5" blue card, has survived. This version is devoid of advertisements and one wonders if it was purely distributed to VIPs, as opposed to being on public sale.

The teamsheet for the 1904 'English Cup Tie' between Manchester City and Bolton Wanderers listed the players in two columns, and numbered them (1 to 22), re-introducing the original concept of a match programme - the identification of players by spectators. Curiously, the reverse side displayed the same names, and numbers, in 2-3-5 formation, along with the note: 'Any alteration taking place in the players' names, a board will be sent round the ground corresponding with numbers on the card.' It must have been a particularly large board to be seen by everyone in the 61,300 crowd at the old Crystal Palace ground. When Newcastle United played Bradford City at Crystal Palace in the 1911 Final, W.H. Smith & Sons issued a 'Souvenir Card' priced 1d. Colin Veitch of Newcastle United was

The refusal of the Football Association to become involved in programme production has not helped in resolving this unofficial/official debate nearly a century later. Similarly with programmes for representative and international fixtures, which were left to the host club. It was not until the Cup Final moved to Stamford Bridge in 1920 that a single, definitive football programme began to be published for the FA Cup Final.

Town boss expresses his delight with the three points but believes that there is still room for improvement in the defence.




"The fans were disappointed and so am I. We gave goals away too easily. Mark Ovendale is one of the

Den deal far McGhee


Mark McGhee returned to management earlier this week when he took over at Second Division Millwall.

Sentencing Lavin at Guildford Crown Court, the judge added: "This case is sad to see.






As Eric the Eel and Paula the Crawler made their merry way to Olympic worst times in the 100m and 50m freestyle respectively it gave us all hope.

Matches from Memory

The match was the first leg of the Third Division semi-final play-off, five goals were scored and

fortunes swung dramatically.

Third placed Swindon and fourth placed Wigan had been drawn to meet, as at this time the third from bottom side in the league above was given a chance to save their skins. In this case it meant Sunderland, who in fact lost in the other semi-final to Gillingham who had scraped a play-off spot when a missed penalty saw Bristol City draws 1-1 with Swindon at Ashton Gate and missed out.

The game was only two minutes old when a twenty-yard shot by Chris Thompson gave Wigan the lead. Thirteen minutes later a free kick was taken Barry Knowles and Fraser Digby failed to hold on to the greasy ball. Bobby Campbell won the race for the loose ball and put the Lancashire side two up.

Although they were trailing 2-0, the travelling Swindon fans, that must have accounted for a good third of the crowd of 6,718 gave their team a tremendous reception as they came out for the second half. Digby made amends for his earlier error by taking a tremendous block to Paul Jewels blazing effort and Colin Calderwood tidied up the loose ball. It was a crucial turning point. Swindon were beginning to dominate the exchanges and a goal to narrow the margin in the second leg looked on the cards. It did not come until the 71st minute when. although Roy Tunks, who had

already foiled a Bamber attempt a minute earlier, managed to block Jimmy Quinn's effort - this time it was Bamber who met the rebound. The benefits of the army camp routines and runs up Liddington Hill inflicted on them by Lou Macari now began to reap their reward for The Robins. A free kick on the right was perfectly timed by Steve Berry to

find Jimmy Quinn rising among the defenders to head the ball in via the post. To have come from 2-0 down to nullify home advantage would have been enough for most teams but Town showed their killer instinct. Realising that the change in the tide of fortune had left Wigan physically and mentally drained they looked for more. Quinn found Mark Jones on the right and his centre was nodded home by Peter Coyne just two minutes from time. It was a great moment for Coyne who earlier in his career had been rejected by




Wigan but also for all the other Town players and supporters.

Manager Lou Macari rightly stressed it was only half time in the tie but the away leg was the real decider as a goalless draw at the County Ground took Town to the play-off final with Gillingham and eventually to a second consecutive promotion.


Although we suffered a set back mid-week against John Aldridges Tranmere side, we once again came through unscathed physically and with no injuries to report.


Before the match on Tuesday I thought we had a strong chance of winning the tie but we didn't produce the goods on the night.

Britain has always produced a certain type of player - the 'Hard Man'. Too many to mention them all but here's a quick look at Five of the Best....

5 VINNIE JONES

The former Wimbledon defender turned Hollywood actor had a reputation in the late 80's and early 90's as one of football's hardest players.

Such was his reputation, that he

has now been typecast as a violent gangster in cult films such as Snatch and Lock, Stock and Two Smoking Barrels! Vinnie started life as the orchestrator of Wimbledon's infamous 'Crazy Gang'. During his days at Plough Lane, Jones was a nononsense, tough tackling defender who was regularly

found arguing with one of the opposing players and/or officials. His disciplinarary record would make Patrick Vierra seem like a saint and many players dreaded squaring up to the cockney villain, hardly surprising when you look at the imposing figure pictured below, with crew-cut and the protruding veins on his forehead! Yet, despite his aggressive reputation, Vinnie was a player who

led by example as captain of Wimbledon and later Sheffield

United, Leeds and finally Wales. He would exemplify the pride and passion required by a skipper and he certainly added some much needed steel to the Welsh side.

STEVE MCMAHON

Former Town boss McMahon showed just how much of a disciplinarian he was when he arrived at the County Ground as player manager in 1994.

In his first game for the Town, away at Roots Hall, 'Macca' was given his marching


orders leaving the fans with an element of doubt about his ability to handle pressurised situations.

McMahon had spent much of the 8o's terrorising opposing midfield's and defences for Liverpool after joining the Anfield club from Aston Villa. The balding midfield maestro was well known for bossing the middle of the park, but also for his tough challenges and constant arguing with the officials.

Nevertheless, his passion and commitment was clear for all to see. Although McMahon's arrival at the County Ground sparked feelings of optimism that he would bring some bite to the side, there was also an element of doubt, for his style of play had not been experienced before. In fact the closest Town had to a hard man before him was Luc Nijholt. His passion even got him sent off again, this time from the dugout in April 95; his arm waving antics became a familiar sight for Town fans.

It was well known that players who crossed him would do so at their peril, thus earning him a place in this issue's top five.

3 Dave Mackay



During his career with Spurs, which spanned almost a decade, Mackay made 268 league appearances, scoring 42 goals from midfield. He broke his left leg twice during that time, although what carnage he inflicted upon his opponents on those occasions (and others) is probably best not discussed here he certainly didn't incur those injuries by tripping over whilst putting the cat out.

His finest season came in 1960-61 when he was a member of the Lillywhite's squad that achieved the famous league/cup double - a squad captained by the legendary Danny 'Sporting Shredded Wheater' Blanchflower. Other contemporaries included The

'G' Men - Jimmy Greaves and Alan Gilzean - the silky-smooth winger John White, Pat Jennings and Terry Dyson. Dave was voted Scottish Footballer of the Year in 1958 and shared the English equivalent with Tony Book of Manchester City in 1969. Following the end of his playing career the wiry but stockilybuilt left-half replaced Brian Clough at the Baseball Ground as manager of Derby County and guided them to the League Championship in the 1974-75 season - a fitting finale to a truly magnificent footballing careerWilliam John Bremner was born in Glasgow on December 9th, 1942. He joined Leeds United, as an amateur, in 1958 and signed professional forms at Elland Road in December 1959. He made his debut for Leeds at the age of 17 as a winger, partnered by a certain Don Revie - a man almost twice his age. He went on to play 585 league games, latterly in midfield, for Leeds and scored 90 goals for them in the process. Under the managership of Don Revie he played alongside the likes of Gary Sprake, Jackie Charlton, Norman 'Bites yer Legs' Hunter, Peter Lorimer, Allan 'Sniffer' Clarke, Johnny Giles and Andy Gray.

Billy Bremner


A fearless, uncompromising, ginger-haired character - small in stature - with a fiery temperament, he was not a man with any inclination to take prisoners, both he and Norman Hunter were a physical, defensive partnership that scared the pants off opposing midfielders and front men during the 60's and 70's.


Both of them, inevitably, became very familiar with the luxury of hot, long, solo baths ahead of their teammates on many a Saturday afternoon.


Indeed, Bremner has the honour of being one of the first domestic players to be sent off at Wembley, along with one Kevin Keegan, following a vigorously disputed matter of possession of the ball in the 1974 FA Charity Shield.
He made 54 international appearances for Scotland, scoring 3 goals, and his attitude for the game was ideally summed-up by the title of his autobiography - 'You get nowt for being second'. He was voted Footballer of the year in 1970, won two league championship medals (1968-69 and 1973-74), an FA Cup winners medal in 1972, a League Cup winners gong in 1968 and two UEFA Cup winners medals in 1968 and 1971.

He eventually moved on to Hull City (1976) and Doncaster Rovers (1979), and at the latter he had two spells as manager at Belle Vue.

Billy Bremner died at the early age of 55 in 1997 but he remains, and always will, a sacred memory among the faithful at his his beloved Elland Road.







Graeme Souness, although remembered for his steel and twofooted over the top tackling, was probably the most gifted footballer of our today's 'Five of the best'.

His ability to spray the ball around that successful Liverpool side of the late seventies, with either feet, was a vital ingredient for Bob Paisley's multi-talented team. He weighed in with a good tally of goals scored from

midfield and generally drove in from the edge of the box in spectacular style. Souness enjoyed his best moments at Liverpool with League, F.A. Cup and European success and this was was followed by moves to Serie 'A' side Sampdoria before returning to his homeland as playermanager of Glasgow Rangers.

Souness' tough Scottish upbringing was certainly to hold him in great store in those old Division One days, competing with, and more than often coming out on top of, his rivals for that central midfield possession. However, there were a trio of players in that Liverpool changing room with .. Souness, in the form of Kenny Dalglish and Alan Hansen, who formed a clique and were forever 'on a wind up' with the rest of the team, in particular poor fellow Scot Steve Nichol, who took the brunt of their humour in fine style. Graeme Souness took his role in football deadly

serious. But he will be forever immortalised in his T.V. appearance alongside Sammy Lee as themselves next to that well-known actor Bernard Hill, more easily remembered as Yosser Hughes. Those cherished lines "You look like me" by Yosser to Souness showed everyone a more light-hearted side to his dour demeanour.

After his playing days were finished he could not resist taking on the high-pressure role of management. This took him back to his native Scotland with Glasgow Rangers, followed by Liverpool, Southampton and Galatasaray. However his type of intensity nearly became his downfall when he suffered a heart attack needing open-heart surgery. But with typical Souness determination he has overcome adversity to remain in management with Blackburn Rovers and is looking to take them into the Premiership once more.

'What goes around comes around...'

Nick John takes a look down memory lane and suggests that things might not be all bad for Colin Todd's men...

This weekend thirty five years ago, Stanley Matthews had recently become the 1st professional footballer to be knighted, Muhammed Ali was about to defeat Floyd Patterson and retain his World Heavyweight Championship title and Swindon Town F.C. were 9 games into a new season, having been relegated from the old Division 2 only five months previously.

"And your point?" I hear you say. Well, hold on one second, let's examine exactly what was happening down at the County Ground all those years ago in more detail. To begin with, we note that the reserves were looking a strong outfit and had travelled the opposite" direction to the 1st team and secured promotion to Division 1 of the Football Combination, taking Chelsea reserves to the cleaners in their previous weekend's home fixture of September 11th 1965, duly winning 6-2 in front of an attendance of 3, 500 (can you

imagine that amount of people turning up for a reserve game now?).

The first team began the season well, but were showing signs of inconsistency after losing Mike Summerbee to Manchester City and Ernie Hunt to Wolves in pre-season and slipping to 9th position after 10 games.

Now, along comes some interesting parallels thrown up by football's trivia and pointing out that Colin Todd's team are actually on their way to a rich vein of form spanning the next decade.

To begin with Danny Williams was brought in to replace Bert Head for the start of the 65-66 season (shades of Colin Todd for Jimmy Quinn) and immediately signed goalkeeper Peter Downsborough from Halifax Town to replace Tony Hicks (Griemink for Talia). This was followed closely by securing contracts for Joe Butler from Newcastle Utd and Mel Nurse from

Swansea. Mr Williams was now regularly playing Roger Smart and Rod Thomas, having both come of age, alongside two survivors of the previous season - the legendary Don Rogers and John Trollope.

Considering the financial restraints, this was followed by Williams signing Stan Harland, Frank Burrows, Peter Noble, Willie Penman, John Smith and Don Heath over the course of the next two seasons. The equivalent of Colin Todd's wholesale changes of today's world.

Which of those heroes of yesteryear relate to the present squad - well I'm not too sure. Perhaps Danny Invincibile is to be the next Don Rogers or Marko Tuomela a Stan Harland of the future, who knows? But if the old saying 'what goes around comes around' is true, then the trophy cabinet over the next five years will be filled with equivalent silverware from a promotion, a League Cup win and an Anglo-Italian cup final win.
