





Rallying Together

Supporters who don't believe in miracles, please take heart - they do happen and they happen at football clubs. How can I say that? Well, I've personal experience of a football tale that will gladden the hearts of every Town fan.

Back in 1996 I was associated with Braford City, a club at the time going through similar problems to ours here at the County Ground. They had dispensed with their manager Lennie Lawrence, were languishing in the lower half of the second division and crowds were hovering around the 3, 500 mark.

Chairman Geoffrey Richmond appointed Lawrence's number two Chris Kamara to the hotseat in the hope that things would improve. That was in November and by early March the side were still mid-table - a long way off what was hoped for.

Then the local newspaper ran a headline that read, 'Mission Impossible', a line that was to stir everyone at the club, including the former Town man Kamara. He photocopied it, enlarged it and pasted it on the dressing room wall - where it hung for the remainder of the season.

Suddenly something clicked and the Bantams went on an unbeatable ten-match run that saw them qualify for the play-offs in sixth place on the last day of the season. Now if that sounds remarkable in itself, please read on...

The club was drawn against Blackpool with the first leg at home on a Sunday afternoon. The Seasiders had finished the season three places higher and were favourites for the promotion place on offer.

Things did not go well that afternoon at Valley Parade as Blackpool easily won 2-0 and prepared for the return leg in confident mood. They even ran adverts in the local press for trips to Wembley! How foolish those actions turned out to be as Kamara inspired his troops to a stunning 3-0 triumph and booked their place under the twin towers.

That sunny Sunday afternoon in May is one I will never forget.

33, ooo Tykes descended on Wembley to witness a fantastic end to this fairytale of a story as the Yorkshire outfit beat Notts County 2-0 and on the wall of the Wembley dressing room that afternoon was plastered a giant copy of that now infamous headline.

This tale shows what can be achieved if we are all pulling in one direction and goes to prove that, despite our recent woes, anything is possible in football. The message is quite clear: Keep faith in this club and help us all to achieve our ambitions and dreams. On that day in 1996 a dream came true for a club led by a former Swindon Town stalwart. What odds for 2001?

Finally, a warm welcome to our visitors this evening, Wrexham. This game was due to be staged in September but had to be called off because the Welsh club had several players on international duty. Welcome to the players, directors and supporters, we hope you enjoy your visit - but as always, there is only one winner - Come on you Reds.




Swindon Town Football Club, Colin Todd and Derby


It would have been nice to follow up last Tuesday night's win against. Cambridge with another home victory against Wycombe but unfortunately things didn't quite work out as we had hoped. When we entered this string of three home games we were looking to take all nine points but on Saturday the performance was just not up to scratch.

I am looking for consistency from the lads. Against Notts County and against Cambridge we started playing like we know we can. Obviously the result against Notts County was not ideal but the performance was gutsy and we created chances. That carried on where we had left off against Cambridge, we managed to create a lot of chances and had people in the right places to convert some of them, but on Saturday a lot of those elements just weren't there.

In fairness to the lads, this game was always going to be the hardest of the three. Wycombe are a very good side who have started brightly and I probably would have settled for a point before the game if you had offered it to me. If we can play under par against a good side like Wycombe and come away with a point then we are obviously there or thereabouts. But I'm bit of a

perfectionist and not really happy unless my team wins, so hopefully we an eradicate these performances and play to a level which will win us games and get us up the table.

We were slow to come out of the blocks on Saturday and it took us a while to get involved which is a little bit disappointing. We have talked about starting quickly and getting ourselves ahead like we did against Cambridge. We changed a few things at half time and we looked like getting ourselves back in the game.



I wasn't too disappointed with the defensive display. In the last few games we've opted for something different with a threesome of Reeves, van der Linden and Willis working well as a trio. They have had to adapt their own game to suit this new system and I think they have done really well, with the defence looking just a little bit tighter.

So far this season it has just been too easy for our opponents. If we

can make it a little bit harder for them we are half way there. What disappointed me was the quality in the final third. We didn't really get the chances and space that we have been used to in the last two games, but then again we weren't finding the right positions.

Obviously we won't be able to bag two or three goals every game but at home I would like to think we could put the visiting defence under a little bit more pressure than we did on Saturday.

I can't really have a go at the lads too much. After all, we didn't lose and when we went down to ten men, we worked extremely hard. This is the second time this season we have had to play with ten men and once again I don't think we deserved to, but the ref made his decision and you have to go along with it. No matter how hard you complain you can't change their decision (although you always try!) so we just had to dig deep and grind away. To get a result against a team like Wycombe with ten men is a good one in my opinion.

The game itself wasn't the most exciting to watch and I feel sorry for the fans in games like that. When we don't create chances and are under the cosh, it is very hard for the fans to get behind the lads. But despite the performance and the cold weather the fans got behind us and I can't fault them.

Even against Cambridge when there was only three and a half thousand, you really got behind us and it does help us. Hopefully tonight against Wrexham you can give us a bit more of the same and in return we can give you something to shout about!

The Robins...


Midway through last season the Robins were near the relegation zone. but an excellent run of form towards the end of the campaign lifted them clear of danger and they finished in 11th position on 62 points.

That good run included a superb end to the season as the Robins won all of their final five games without conceding a single goal. Although striker Carl Connolly departed to QPR in the summer, Flynn strengthened his side by bringing in Trinidadian internationals Hector Sam and Carlos Edwards, but there was a disappointing start to the season as the Robins crashed to a 2-o home defeat against Bristol City. Wrexham got their first win the following week though, and did it in style with an excellent 4-1 victory at Bury.

But another home defeat followed, 3-1 against promotion

favourites Wigan, and the tone for the Robins' early season had been set as defeat continued to follow victory. A convincing 3-1 win against Oldham was followed three days later by a 3-1 reverse against Rotherham, and Flynn's side recovered from a home defeat against Walsall to record a 2-1 victory at Bournemouth. Gaining consistency seems to be the key for the Robins, who have failed to build on their successes and as a result are hovering around mid-table rather than challenging for a play-off position. Flynn will also know that his team needs to address their disappointing home form. If the home form can improve, there is no reason why they can't make a challenge for the play-offs.





Bolton, who offered him a contract. But Lawrence wants to sign for Wrexham and link up with his international team-mates, Carlos Edwards and Hector Sam (pictured), who are both making a big impact.

Wrexham chairman Pryce Griffiths said today: "I have no objection to anyone coming to Wrexham to strengthen the team - provided we can afford it. There's a long way to go yet before this becomes a deal."





Now the third longest-serving manager in the League (behind Crewe's Dario Gradi and Manchester United's Sir Alex Ferguson), Brian Flynn has been in charge at the Racecourse Ground since November 1989, since when he has presided over nearly 600 fixtures.

He is assisted by former England international Kevin Reeves and ex-Liverpool defender Joey Jones.

When Flynn took over for his first managerial position, the Robins had been languishing in the bottom division of the Football League for six years. But Wrexham finished in the runners-up position at the end of the 1992/93 season to take themselves up into Division Two, and that is where they have staved

Flynn was one of the greatest players Wales has ever produced, a skilful, all-action midfielder who made 66 appearances for his country and also enjoyed a successful domestic career. He was best known for his performances with Burnley and Leeds, but he also had spells with Cardiff, Bury, Doncaster and Limerick before finishing his career with the Robins, leaving him in a prime position to take over the reins when Dixie McNeil departed the hot-seat

Darren Ferguson Son of Alex

Initially signed on a short-term contract a year ago following his return from a spell in Dutch football with Sparta Rotterdam, Darren Ferguson has now committed himself to a two year deal at the Racecourse Ground.

A cultured midfielder with good passing ability and an eye for goal, he has barely missed a game since moving to North Wales just over a year ago. Although born in Glasgow, Ferguson joined Manchester United as a youngster and progressed through their youth system to eventually turn professional in 1990. Under the management of his father Sir Alex, he made a number of first team appearances for United without fully establishing himself in the side, and he moved for £250,000 to Wolverhampton Wanderers in January 1994.





The 'keeper started his career with Spurs but chances were limited at White Hart Lane and he had loan spells

with nine different clubs before joining Brentford in 1993. After more than 250 appearances, injuries cut short his time at Griffin Park and he took up a new challenge with Wrexham in July 1999.

Brian Car**cy** Irish Skipper

rsbero

The 32 year-old Irishman started his career with Cork City before being snapped up by Manchester United in 1989.

After gaining first team experience in two loan spells with the Robins in 1991 he joined Leicester City for £250,000 at the beginning of the 1993/94 season.

Carey made 66 first team
appearances for the Filbert Street
club before moving on to join his
former loan team Wrexham for
£100,000 in the summer of 1996.
Has missed much of this season with
a cartilage injury.

2 Mark Mcgregor

Former Robins trainee who was captain of the youth team before moving up to the full-time ranks in 1995. He has since made nearly all his senior appearances in the right-back role. Still only 23, he has already moved through the 200 League appearance barrier.

L Gareth Owen

He joined Wrexham as a schoolboy and made his debut in 1989, since when he has been a key member of the team. Gained Wales under-21 caps and has also been called into the senior international squad.



6 Dave Ridler



Defender who has become a regular at the centre of defence in the last two years, with only

suspension forcing him out of the team. Has now made more than 100 appearances for the Robins and is a regular selection again this season.

10 Martyn Chalk

Brian Flynn signed this wide midfielder from Stockport as part of a deal that saw Kieron Durkan move in the opposite direction in March 1996. Came out of non-league football with Louth United to join Derby before switching to Stockport for £40,000 in 1994.

11 Craig Faulconbridge

Originally with Birmingham, the striker switched to Coventry and progressed through the ranks at Highfield Road but never played in the senior side and, with a year left on his contract, he moved to Wrexham.

12 Paul Barrett



Midfielder signed from Newcastle. His performances in the Pontins' League alerted Wrexham to

his talents and he signed a three year deal at the Racecourse. Progressed through the ranks at St James' Park but moved to Wales for first team football

15 Steve Roberts

Defender who broke into the first team last season and secured a regular place with some assured performances. He came through the ranks at the Racecourse, following in the path of older brother Neil. He is a Wales Youth international.

17 Andy Morrell

Initially injured in training, the striker returned to show enough promise to gain an extended trial and then a professional contract. Now looking to make an impact in the first team after a rich vein of form with the reserves.

21 Lee Roche



This Bolton-born right-back is looking to gain first team experience from his extended stay in North

Wales. He has already had one season as a professional at Old Trafford and will be hoping that his loan spell can help him towards United's senior squad.

19 Carlos Edwards

A current international (alongside Royal Tony Rougier), who has been involved in Trinidad's World Cup qualifying games. A tricky winger who can also operate in midfield, he has provided the Robins with new attacking options.

33 Emad Bouanane

Came from France for trials this summer and made a big impression in Gareth Owen's testimonial against Man United. A tall defender who gets forward as much as possible, he has learnt quickly in his new surroundings and has already become a regular member of Brian Flynn's first team squad.



Town's Two Move on to Pastures New

Swindon Town duo Charlie Griffin and Marko Tuomela have left The County Ground for pastures new.

Centre forward Griffin has joined Nationwide Conference side Woking for an undisclosed fee after a successful stint on loan at the Surrey club. The transfer is subject to both parties agreeing personal terms. Charlie signed for Town in February 1998 from non-League Chippenham Town where he he'd had a prolific season in the Screwfix Premier League. Charlie made ten starts and 21 substitute appearances during his Town career scoring two goals. His first goal for the club came against Barnsley in the last game of the 1997/98 season. The coaching staff thought Charlie would build on that goal and make the step up as a first team regular. Unfortunately, Charlie found getting to grips with the Second Division tough and, despite being a regular goal-scorer in the reserve team, was loaned to Yeovil and Woking before making the move to Woking permanent last week.

Finnish defender Tuomela joined the Robins in September on a short-term loan from Norwegian club Tromso. Town's caretaker manager Andy King has decided he does not fit in his plans and the tall Finn has returned to Norway.

I thought that we deserved a point against Wycombe on Saturday.

We went 1-0 down to an amazing strike that flew into the top corner of the net. Apart from that I think we were very strong defensively throughout the side. We didn't make our chances count at the other end and it was very important that we kept going and made the opposition work right up until the final whistle.

The sending off of our goalkeeper did not help us and, like Andy Williams' red card, it seemed like another harsh decision that has gone against us. The ball was hit long over my head and I just left it for Bart to pick it up. There was no danger from any of their players which made it very curious why he sent him off. A caution would have been fair but the referee chose to apply the letter of the law when common sense could have prevailed. That decision only served to spur us on and we knew from that

point we had to work a lot harder for each other. We put Wycombe under a lot of pressure and deservedly got the equaliser right at the death when we were taking chances at the back.

We didn't have a lot to lose so I'd been pushed up into the centre forward position to try to add a bit more aerial strength and I think it worked. After that I thought we were still a bit cavalier in our approach and should have been a bit more sensible and settled for the draw, especially with only having ten men on the field, but a point for us was a good result.

Wycombe are a good side near the top of the table and we have to accept - and be very happy with - a draw at this stage of the season, especially when a lot of our players are still getting used to the English Second Division. I hope it shows that we are forming a strong defensive unit. I've been given my chance in the side and I'm pleased with the way I have performed and I'm not going to give up my place in the starting line-up without a fight. We've been conceding a lot of goals but we are starting to tighten up defensively and look stronger. I'm sure it has a lot to do with the fact that we are now playing with three central defenders and two wing backs. It gives us more cover at the back and also gives the wide players more options going forward.

Like many of the players, I think that Andy King is doing a great job. The players like working with him, he is a good coach and, more importantly, he knows how to get his ideas through to the players. We're starting to see the benefits on the pitch, in the last three games we have created more goal-scoring chances than perhaps we did all last season. Hopefully we can win the match against Wrexham on Tuesday and add a little more weight to his application for the manager's job.

drought of County Ground fixtures in September, but that's one of the reasons we are here tonight.



No. 1 War Time Finals Team Sheets

It took football programmes about 20 years to recover from the Second World War, because it was not until the mid 1960's that programmes returned to the size and standard they enjoyed before 1939.

The main set-back came with wartime paper rationing, and it is to the credit of most clubs that they continued to publish something during these difficult years, although it usually amounted to little more than a teamsheet. The initial confusion of early war-time football saw clubs issued greatly slimmed-down issues, dropping to 8 pages for Regional League matches in 1939/40.

As the exigencies of war hit home the programmes shrank again, to single or folded sheet issues. These constituted poor value for money for the buyers - they were invariably priced at 1d - only half the price of standard 1930's issues which were certainly more than twice the size!

A prime example of this was the excellent Queen's Park Rangers programme of 1939/40, 8 pages with a striking cover, which a year later was a single sheet with teams on one side and results/fixtures on the reverse. Sheffield Wednesday settled for a single sheet (printed both sides) with barely a paragraph of text - in common with other programmes of the era, priority was given to team lines, results and fixtures, league tables and half-time scoreboards. Doncaster Rovers started off with a large size four pager but after a year dropped down to a single sheet, while Huddersfield Town and Leeds United strove manfully to sustain a 4 page (folded sheet) programme.

Manchester United settled for a single sheet which contained only results/fixtures and team lines and the same format was used, with the inclusion of some text and a little more information, by Millwall and Newcastle United. One has to admire the dogged determination to carry

on despite the enormous disruption of the war, exemplified by these programmes. Team lines were obviously subject to great change as players came and went from the forces, or were available from reserved occupations, and guest players abounded. Not the least of the attraction of these programmes is the existence of famous names in some unlikely team lists.

Those few advertisers who remained in the greatly slimmed down programmes are fascinating. A four-page Sunderland programme of 1944/45 for instance, carried four adverts - George Younger's Prize Medal Ales, Shop at Binns for everything - walk around any time - no obligation, a Consulting Optician and a local store which sold radios, bicycles and prams, re-conditioned pianos and utility furniture.


























Rogers, scorer of that winning goal in 1969, is now 55 years old and has now settled in the Swindon area, continuing to develop his sports shop business, which he began in his playing days, as well as manager of Ryman's League Hungerford Town.

Rogers, a then quiet lad from the old Somerset mining town of Midsomer Norton, made his debut for the Town on the 17th November 1962 in a match which saw them defeat the visitors Southend United by four goals to one. He made only six further appearances that season and the signing of the England Youth international Graham French might have indicated his future at Swindon was not bright, but such were Don's performances that he became a first-team regular while French was consigned to the reserve team.

The following season was to see Swindon relegated but it also saw the Town's FA Youth Cup final appearance, which owed much to the skill of Rogers. In front of a crowd of 17,000 at the County Ground he scored Town's goal in the 1-1 draw and outshone the great George Best. Back in Division Three in the 1956-66 season Don notched 18 League goals and the following season he was Town's top scorer with 24 goals in the League. He bagged a further 7 in an FA Cup run which took Swindon to Round Five. It included a victory over West Ham United, World Cup stars and all.

Many top League clubs began to show an interest in Don but he remained at Swindon, finishing top scorer three seasons in a row. The third season saw Swindon lift the League Cup and Don score perhaps his most famous goal, racing from the half way line to round Bob Wilson and clinch Town's extra time victory over Arsenal at Wembley.

Poor results and increasing financial problems with keeping up payments on the North Stand led to the sale of Rogers to Crystal Palace. Here he was hailed by Geoffrey Green of the Times as a young Lochinvar come out of West as he scored on his debut and starred in the Palace team that

thrashed Manchester United 5-1. Don was unfortunate enough to move to Queens Park Rangers just before the manager who had bought him left and found himself something of a misfit. In March 1976 Swindon were in dire straits; gates were falling, cash was short and the Club was facing the threat of relegation to Division Four.

Don returned to provide salvation. An exchange deal for Peter Eastoe brought Town much-needed cash and a legend who brought the crowds back. A goal on his return thrilled the much-increased gate and the corner was turned. Suffering increasingly from the hip problem that was to force his retirement, Don's appearances were limited but his return created the enthusiasm that helped keep Town up. 


Kemp Named as New Boss







Matches from Memory

It was the dawn of the Lou Macari era and the omens were not looking good.

On the first day of training only eleven players turned up and three pre-season fixtures had to be cancelled due to the state of the County ground pitch. By the first game of the season, Lou Macari had begun taking steps to turn things around.

Mike Graham and Kevin Baddeley, two players released by Blackburn Rovers as a tribunal award for Jimmy Quinn, meant a little more money could be spent. Some of it was paid to Hyde United for Peter Coyne, a former Manchester United and England schoolboy striker. Coyne had a goal a game record at United one goal one game!

The crowd of 3,591 that turned up to watch the first match of the new season had pay increases of nearly 20% but Chesterfield at £1.60 and Hartlepool at £1.70 were still the only clubs with a cheaper admission price than Swindon's £1.80. The visitors Wrexham were featuring in the European Cup Winners' Cup but travelled to Swindon without the previous season's leading scorer David Gregory, who was out with an ankle injury. Many fans were annoyed at having to pay 45p for a programme with just a blank space printed where the Swindon team should have appeared. "I don't want any of my team thinking they are automatic choices" was Lou's explanation.

The grumbles increased when, after 31 minutes, Wrexham's John Muldoon was let free on the right and his cross was headed home by big Jim Steel. It should have been



2-0 immediately afterwards but Andy Edwards side-footed wide from six yards. Lou Macari got Swindon level five minutes later, a cross by Paul Batty was only just inside the area but Macari got to it and sent a looping header over Stuart Parker in the Wrexham goal.

Andy Edwards twice had chances to put the Welsh side back in front but with new signing Peter Coyne coming on as substitute it was Swindon who began to look the more likely side to score. A fine cross from David Hockaday was headed just over by Alan Mayes. It was Mayes again who nearly scored when he beat the off-side trap and kept his feet after a tackle only to



see Parker smother the ball. It was Mayes who had the last laugh when, just four minutes from the end, Hockaday crossed to give Town's number 10 a simple tap-in goal.

Macari was not carried away by victory. "Amateurish" was how the chirpy Scot described Town's performance and he frankly admitted, "the best team lost". The season ended with Town in eighth spot, 12 points below the last promotion spot. Wrexham's performance was even more disappointing as they finished in 15th position with 54 points.




Southampton Liverpool (2000)

Birmingham Swindon Town (1993)



Despite being one of the favourites to go down, Peterborough have managed to hold their own in the middle of the table in Division Two.




ourselves competing at this stage of the competition but, whoever the opposition, the F A Cup still retains the element of uncertainty that has given the competition magical moments over the years.

 "Mother!", he shouted, "did grandad really have an Irish passport?".




88 appearances later and Cascarino was reflecting on life as the most-capped player in the history of Irish





Clinton Morrison equalising in the
90th minute. Five goals at home for
both Arsenal and Man Utd. Backed

against strugglers Oxford Utd, in a
game that swung both ways.

But listen to Italian football pundits talk, you'd think that Serie A was a gift from the heavens. Well it's not. No wonder they need 90,000 supporters at a match - it's the only way they can generate any atmosphere. So come on, let's appreciate what a wonderful institution British football is and for this mere mortal who still relies on terrestrial television for his fix of football. I would dearly love to see a good English game on a Sunday afternoon instead of the uninspiring stuff from Serie A on Channel 4. That is if the wife doesn't mind if I wash up a bit later on, that is!


