



Cup Fever Hits Town


After the disappointment of last week's defeat at Peterborough United - a result those who were there wish to forget - we turn our attentions today to the romance of the FA Cup.

Our record in the Cup in recent seasons has not been the best - losing at home to Stevenage Borough in 1998 and Charlton Athletic last year - but one has to go way back before World War One to record our best-ever performances when we reached the semi-finals in 1910 and 1912.

The Cup, they say, is a great leveller and gives the minnows of non-league football the opportunity to create upsets. Later on in the tournament it then gives clubs from the Second and Third Divisions the chance to pit their skills against Premier League opposition. As a football fan I have memories of Colchester United's win over Leeds United in the 1970's, of little Sutton United's humiliation of Coventry City in the 8o's and of Chesterfield's amazing cup exploits in 1997 when they made it all the way to the semi-finals and took Middlesborough to a replay before eventually bowing out 3-0, just one stop from the Twin Towers.

I also have memories of teams like Woking and Yeovil Town from the non-leagues and of Sunderland and Southampton who won the cup in the 70's as Second Division sides. Of course our assistant manager Malcolm Crosby has great memories of the Cup as he led out the Sunderland side of 1992 against Liverpool in the final. Sadly for the Makems they lost 2-0 but I bet it ranks as one of the Crossers' best days out!

Despite sponsorship and the advent of live TV games spread over three days the romance of the Cup is still very much alive as we set out on



that long road to the final - this year to be staged for the first time at the magnificent Millennium Stadium in Cardiff.

They say that every club goes through a cycle of glut and famine and I believe this season could be our turn to once again experience the thrills of a cup run and the chance to play one of the big guns. Of course our visitors today should not be underestimated. Ilkeston Town play their league football in the Doctor Martens Premier League and are sitting well placed in the top six at the moment. Last season they beat Boston United in the first round before bowing out to Scunthorpe United after a replay. I am sure their band of supporters will be coming to the County Ground today hoping to celebrate 'their' cup final. A warm welcome to their directors, players, and supporters, we hope you enjoy your visit to Wiltshire, but as always, there's only one winner - Come On You Reds.



Good afternoon and welcome to today's FA Cup fixture against Dr Martens side Ilkeston Town.


I'm particularly looking forward to this match because it brings back a lot of good memories from my time as Manager of Mansfield Town. Ilkeston Town were very much on our doorstep and my Assistant Manager at the time, Keith Alexander (who I know well), actually went on to manage them for four years and has only just left for John McGovern to take over. McGovern has vast experience and an extensive knowledge of the

game. He is also a strong competitor - something that I can personally vouch for, having played against him!

During my time in Nottinghamshire I got to know the club very well and in fact their Chairman, Paul Millership, is a personal friend of mine. He's Ilkeston through-and-through and is very ambitious - his dream is to get Ilkeston into the Conference and then the Football League, and in turn make his son the youngest Chairman in the League. Over the past few years they have built up the club, made ground improvements and

turned it into a well-organised football club. I'm certain he is well capable of getting them there and I wish them the best of luck in doing so, but I hope they don't have a good cup run in the meantime!

We're not going to underestimate them one bit, I went to watch them in midweek and they look a good side, plus they have five players that once played under me. I'm sure they'll be especially up for it and out to prove a point. We are expected to win because we are a professional club but even that works against us.



It's their cup final already - they'll enjoy playing at a big ground, and on a better pitch plus they'll be very well supported. All that will work in their favour but what I always say to my players in this situation is that 'if your attitude matches the opposition's then your quality should win through'.

They are professional footballers playing in a much higher league and should win, but if their attitude is wrong then Ilkeston are well capable of causing us a lot of problems. I'm not thinking about last week's performance because that was a

totally different situation. It was against a team in our Division, where any team can beat another 4-o on a given day.

Today's match is against a Dr Martens Premier club and we do expect to win the match before we go onto the pitch. However, football doesn't always go to plan, as I'm sure there will be a few upsets this afternoon but we have to make sure it isn't at the County Ground.

I'm still keeping an eye out for more players, all I want to say is that I would like the opportunity to bring in some of my own players. Colin Todd had the chance to be judged on his choice of player and I would like to be judged on mine. Hopefully it will only be a matter of time before we see a couple of new faces at the club and we can get moving up the league table but I'd like to start with a cup win here today.

I'd like to welcome Paul Millership, John McGovern and all of the Directors, staff, players and supporters of Ilkeston Town Football Club.



Ilkeston Town Football Club 2000/2001



The Robins...

Football in Ilkeston dates back to 1882 but it was not until 1945 that Ilkeston Town Football Club was formed.

The Derbyshire club who play in the Dr Matrens League, have come a long way in the last few years from bottom of the table obscurity to promotion. The Robins endured a season of relegation in 1995/96, but under the guidance of Keith Stevens, nearly made promotion straight away - missing out by one point. In 1997/98 Town finished second behind Grantham Town to crown their most successful season ever. They also reached the second round of the FA Cup for the first time in their history, losing narrowly to Scunthorpe United, Since then Ilkeston have exceeded all

expectations and gone from

strength to strength, finishing third in the Dr Martens Premier Division - the highest standing in the clubs forty-four year history. Chairman Paul Millership demonstrated his commitment to the Robin's cause by investing in brand new terracing, a cover behind one goal, new changing rooms and an office complex. The players repaid his generosity last season by beating Carlisle United 2-1 in the FA Cup First Round and for the second time in three years reaching the second round proper of the oldest competition in the world.


This historic victory was the Robin's first ever defeat of a League team. Let's hope that their second is not today!



Ilkeston Town's second chance of cup glory this season was ended in dramatic style last week by Altrincham.


The Robins were unlucky not to have made it to the second round, leading Altrincham 1-0 in the first game. Ilkeston had several chances to win




During his time at the Baseball

John returned to non league with Woking before joining Hull City as assistant to Walter Joyce. He joined Ilkeston in October this year, replacing Keith Alexander who has gone on to manage non-league Northwich Victoria.

A tall central defender Chris worked his way through the ranks at Mansfield Town and made over 40 league appearances for the Stags before joining Gainsborough.

1 Andy Love

Andy signed for his home town club Grimsby Town in 1996 and made his debut as a seventeen year old later that same season. He originally signed for Ilkeston on loan but joined permanently towards the end of last season and has shown that he has a safe pair of hands and should provide added stability to the Robin's defence.

2 Robert Gould

Nephew of ex-Wales manager Bobby Gould Robert joined Ilkeston from Rothwell Town at the start of this season. Previous clubs include Cogenhoe United, RC Warwick and Raunds Town. Has so far proved to be a very reliable performer with a knack of scoring vital goals.



12 Garry Middleton



Signed for Ilkeston from Arnold towards the end of the 1995-96 season. A very reliable performer, he has

become a permanent fixture since his arrival. Is presently Ilkeston's longest-serving player and has completed over 200 appearances in a Robins' shirt. Voted supporters' Player of the Year last season.

James Whitehead

James is a product of Ilkeston's successful youth policy and despite his age has been at the New Manor Ground for a number of years. James is now a qualified coach and his displays when called upon this season show a mature and educated touch.

Paul made 19 league appearances for After two League appearances he drifted out of the game. He spent nearly three years at Alfreton Town before becoming Ilkeston's record signing when the Robins paid £7,000 for his services.

Glenn started his career at **Eastwood Town** where he gained rave reviews. Eventually he signed for

Doncaster Rovers in the Vauxhall Conference. After two seasons at Belle Vue he joined Ilkeston and looks to be a shrewd signing by Keith Stevens.

A highly promising youngster who broke into the first team last season. A strong and agile front runner who finished last term as the top scorer for the reserves.

Paul Challinor

Born in Newcastle-Under-Lyme Paul started his career at Birmingham City. He then moved into the Vauxhall Conference with Telford United, Last season he had a short spell at Aberystwyth Town before joining Bury where he made one appearance. A solid performer who should further strengthen Ilkeston's defence.

John Knapper

John joined Ilkeston from Unibond League side Eastwood Town just before Christmas 1996 for £4,000. A stylish performer, John has become a regular in the Robins' side and has an excellent record as Ilkeston's penalty taker. Has had spells as captain and is one of the Robins' longest serving players.

Andy started his career with Barnsley in 1986, joining Sheffield Wednesday later that year. In 1993 he found himself at Rotherham United and Halifax before turning out for Bradford, Luton, Burnley and Notts County. Signed for Ilkeston Town in February 2000 and adds pace, skill and a deft touch to the Robin's attack.

Town reserves fared a little better on their visit to London Road with a 2-0 win against Peterborough reserves.

The victory saw Posh encounter their second defeat in a row as the Town struck early on to take a 1-0 lead. Town doubled their lead on half an hour to earn all three points.

Town threatened as early as the sixth minute when Steve Cowe headed just wide from a Heiselberg cross from the left. Peterborough ignored the warning signs from Town's bright start and Cowe opened his account two minutes later after tucking away a fumble from the home 'keeper on the edge of the area.

Town pushed hard for a second with the home side unable to reply. Vaughan in the Posh goal was this time alert to Heiselberg's well-taken effort and managed to hold on to his shot from 12 yards. The home side were given a second half mountain to climb when Town doubled their lead on 31 minutes after Cobian rifled in from all of 25 yards following a quickly taken Cowe corner. Posh striker Francis Green wasted a golden chance just 60 seconds later when he

shot wide with only Mildenhall to beat from 10 yards. Six minutes later Mildenhall kept him out again when he tipped the 20-year old's header onto the post. Town were put under pressure towards the end of the first half and the reflexes of Steve Mildenhall twice kept Posh midfielder Cullen at bay.

Swindon started the second half as brightly as they started the first and both Heiselberg and Cowe were denied by two fine saves from Vaughan who kept the score down to a respectable level.



Matches from Memory

After conceding goals in the ninth and eleventh minutes of their FA Cup First Round match with Bath City at the County Ground,

Swindon's hopes of progressing in the competition looked slim.

Two goals in the second half gave them a chance to survive, although with home advantage gone against a side that had put out both Millwall and Notts County in their progress to the Third Round the previous season, hopes were not high. The Town Manager, Bert Head, pinned his hopes on the fact that the heavy conditions in the first match had not helped his young side and on a better surface they might yet prevail.

Swindon made one change from the first game, bringing in Crooks for Sam Burton who was struggling with a shoulder injury. Rain began to fall as the game started but did little to spoil a classic cup tie with play switching from end to end. First blood was drawn by Swindon when Ernie Hunt set up David "Bronco" Layne to score in the 11th minute. Bath replied when Scottish International Charlie "Cannonball" Fleming latched onto a ball in a goalmouth scrimmage and evaded two tackles before slotting the ball home on 27 minutes. Three minutes before half time a Layne free kick gave Town a 2-1 lead at the interval.

Swindon increased their lead in the 48th minute when Ernie Hunt turned well having received a pass from Keith Morgan, giving Black in the City goal no chance. Swindon must have thought they had won the


game when Hunt scored again, this time prodding the ball home after a corner.

A misjudgement by Crook saw a free kick by Tony Book, later to earn fame with Manchester City, sail over the 'keeper's head and into the net. The greasy conditions were not easy for both 'keepers and a fumble by the former Scottish international goalkeeper Black at the other end allowed Layne to complete his hat-trick.

Within two minutes, first Fleming and then O'Neil scored for Bath and a seemingly impregnable 5-2 lead had shrunk to just a single goal and looked as secure as a Florida Presidential election result. Eight minutes from time, Layne headed his fourth goal to calm the nerves of Swindon fans in the crowd of 12, 818.

Surprisingly in such a high scoring match, R.C.E. in his match report singled out a defender, Maurice Owen, for the highest praise, particularly for his anticipation and tackling in the early stages that had held Bath at bay. Town's victory meant a second round home tie against Shrewsbury which was lost 1-o.





Nine of the team which featured in this cup tie stayed together into the 1962/63 season when Town won their first ever Football League promotion. The odd men out were Bronco Layne, whose career was to end in disgrace when he was jailed for match fixing when playing for Sheffield Wednesday, and Crooks, whose appearance in this game was to be his first and last. Even more remarkable, eight of the nine were home-grown talent, the odd man out being Arnold Darcy who was signed from Wigan.

Paul Bodin and Steve White were both members of the Town side that won promotion to the Premier League in 1993 and the two heroes have remained together in a new challenge - to manage Dr Martens side Bath City.



Paul returned to Twerton Park at the end of the 1997-98 season to become player manager of Bath City after leaving the club back in 1988.

Initially, he joined Bath in the summer of 1985 after being released by Cardiff and went on to make over 100 appearances, in a number of positions, scoring 53 goals in the process, finishing top scorer in 1986-87 and 1987-88. £15,000 took him to Newport in January 1988 and, just 2 months later, he moved here to the County Ground. After 3 successful years in the red and white he made a £500,000 move to 1st Division Crystal Palace.

However, this move didn't work out and he returned to Swindon where he played for four more seasons, scoring the play-off goal that won them a place in the Premiership. During this time Paul made 23 international appearances for Wales.


He has now led City to two successive fourth place finishes on a shoestring budget, and is nearing 250 appearances for the club, although a back injury saw him miss the conclusion to last season.




Steve 'Chalkie' White made his first move into management when he arrived at Bath during the 1998 close season, becoming Bodin's

assistant, after a playing career that covered 21 years and 8 different clubs. After joining Bristol Rovers from Mangotsfield in 1977 Steve went on to make over 500 league and cup appearances for clubs including Luton Town and the Town. He scored 200+ goals during this time, twice playing at Wembley in play-off finals, and helping us to our one season in the top flight - winning the penalty that Paul Bodin converted.

He continued to play as he approached age 40 for Cardiff, becoming the oldest outfield player in the 1997-98 season, and still scored vital goals for the Welsh club. Steve continues to play when required, and the 12 goals he grabbed in his first season at Twerton Park showed he had lost little in his skill in front of goal.








Lucas Neill played an integral role in Millwall's 2-0 victory at the County Ground a couple of weeks ago and has starred in Millwall's impressive start to the season.

In fact, Lucas Neill was playing his fifth game of the season at the County Ground following his return from the Olympics and the Australian national side.



Lucas is a tall, yet elegant player who returned to the Millwall line-up last year after returning from injury. Signed from the Australian Academy of Sport on a free transfer, Neill is an excellent full back who is also equally at home on either side of midfield. He has a diverse range of impressive defensive skills yet can make incisive runs forward with a tremendous shot too. McGhee has made it clear that Neill is instrumental in his promotion plans despite the youngster attracting the attention of big clubs with his form. His place in the Aussie Olympic side followed a string of seven caps in the under-23's, otherwise known as the "Olyroos."


Mark Viduka Leeds United

Mark Viduka was signed by David O'Leary for £6m from Celtic and he has added much needed strength in depth to the depleted squad.

Descibed as the "V Bomber", Viduka received last season's Scottish Golden Boot and he has shown that he is capable of mixing it up in the Premiership since his move south of the border.

Viduka had become a free scoring sensation for Celtic, especially in Henrik Larsson's absence, but he wanted to prove that he was capable of the same form in England. His presence has been welcomed all the more because of David O'Leary's dramatic injury crisis.

Critics doubted whether or not he could repeat his form in England but a four goal brace against Liverpool at Elland Road two weeks ago silenced even the most ardent doubters. His four goals were of supreme quality too, his second a well timed header in full flight and fourth an intricate chip over the advancing Westerveld. Viduka, still only 24, is another hope for the future to add to O'Leary's promising batch of youngsters.



Graig Johnston Liverpool

Craig Johnston was part of the Liverpool side of the 8o's that dominated proceedings both at home and on foreign soil.

Johnston was perhaps more well known for his haircut, a free-flowing mass of black curls! He was also known for his love of surfing, an authentic Aussie pastime! But Johnston was a battling midfielder who loved to get forward and get into goalscoring positions, his most famous effort a goal against Everton at Wembley in an FA Cup final.



Johnston was also the creator of the Adidas Predator boot. The boot is now one of the most popular and well used amongst Premier League and lower league players with their ability to create more swerve and accuracy with it's ground-breaking fins across the top of the boot. Despite having retired from the game, with his boot, Johnston is still exerting a great deal of influence on the British game.

Harry Kewell Leeds United

Harry is arguably one of the biggest talents in the country with his unrivalled ability to score impressive goals and change games.

Leeds manager David O' Leary describes him as "...the best young player in the country by a mile. There are some outstanding young players in this country but Harry is

the most outstanding." And few would argue with him. He was unlucky not to win "Footballer of the Year" last year despite winning Leeds' Players Player of the Year, Fans' Player of the Year and Young Player of the Year.

He can play on the left side of midfield or up front and has the full repertoire of tricks up his sleeve: he has wonderful balance and ball control with a powerful left foot (witnessed against Roma in the EUFA Cup.)

Harry is a huge threat to opposing defences and is constantly leaving opposing defenders on the floor. Leeds fans will remember the way he left Tottenham and England defender Sol Campbell on his backside to pass the ball into an empty net at Elland Road.

Leeds have missed Kewell this season through injury and the side has struggled as a result. Manager and fans alike await his return with bated breath.



Danny Invincibile Swindon Town


People all over the country still spell his name wrong, but there is no doubting the impact the "Brisbane Bomber" has had at the club since his arrival in the summer.





Having won promotion last season from Division Three, Northampton have more than held their own and are chasing the promotion pack in seventh position.

A series of articles by the Editor of PROGRAMME MONTHLY & FOOTBALL COLLECTABLE magazine, describing how programmes have changed over a century and a quarter of Association Football.

War Time Finals and Representative Matches

Just as clubs were subject to severe paper-rationing, and had to reduce their programmes to single or folded sheets, so were the football authorities, despite being encouraged by the Government to keep football operating for the purposes of the nation's morale.

Most Cup Finals and representative matches played during the war years were of this style, and it was little short of scandalous that the authorities saw fit to charge 3d on 6d for these flimsy pieces of paper. Scotland published a series of attractive little programmes which, although single sheets, were folded twice into narrow 8-page issues. One or two colours added a splash of good cheer to these items. For England internationals and war-time finals at Wembley, the chosen colours were invariably patriotic red and blue, on white paper. Characteristic of these programmes was the "Air Raid Precautions" warning printed on the front cover. When England played Wales at

Anfield in September 1944, the host club issued a 4 page, small-sized folded sheet, printed blue on white paper with flags in full colour on the front cover. Price for this was a more reasonable 2d. The problem of paper supply was illustrated by a notice in the England v Scotland match at Wembley in February 1944, headed: "Waste Paper Salvage". It read: "If you do not wish to retain this programme, or the part of your ticket you retain after entering the Stadium, please place them in any one of the many receptacles provided for clean waste paper as you leave the ground."

As with club football, normal international football was suspended, albeit the home international countries continued to play one another in "Red Cross" internationals, with the gate proceeds going to war charities. There was a plethora of other representative games, mostly involving the various sections of the armed forces and small, single

sheet programmes were invariably produced for these games. The R.A.F. played Scotland at Hillsborough in November 1944 and a small 4 page (folded sheet) programme was issued with a blue and white striped cover, priced 1d. Pen pictures of both teams were included - the R.A.F. forward line was Matthews, Carter, Drake, Mortensen and Smith (Brentford) while Scotland included the Liverpool pair Matt Busby and Billy Liddell. This illustrates the fascination of team line-ups in war-time programmes, with famous players popping up in the unlikeliest of fixtures.


Let's get behind Andy and the boys this afternoon for the full 90 minutes and help shout them into Round 2.

Nick John looks back at how footballers used to overcome prejudice

Prejudice within the game of football comes in all shapes and sizes and will almost certainly be a problem that confronts the next England Manager.

At such a time when this ignorance is encountered and doubts over strength of character came to the fold, a good piece of advice would be to look at the career of a German gentleman called Bert Trautman who played in goal for Manchester City after the Second World War. The club, despite encountering a huge wave of criticism from the general public, maintained "That sport should be a means of reconciliation." The fact that they were signing an excellent goalkeeper as well probably helped.

Bert Trautman was a huge man, standing well over six feet and found himself at the age of 15 volunteering for the German Armed Forces. This he maintained, was a natural reaction and as many Englishmen did, he wanted to fight for his country. At an age when most of us were sampling

our first alcoholic beverage, the young German soldier went off to war! After five medals for bravery he was captured and kept prisoner at a P.O.W. camp in Cheshire.

When the war ended, he remained in the north of England and signed as an amateur for St. Helens, ironically working for a bomb disposal squad at the same time. His performances in the Lancashire Combination resulted in Man. City signing him in 1949. This began a tense period, where season ticket holders threatened to withdraw their support, followed by numerous street fights and sympathisers to Bert Trautman having their windows smashed.

Swindon Town's Alan Fowler, who was top goalscorer in the 1934/35 and 1937/38 seasons, along with William Imrie and Dennis Olney were three players never to return from action in World War Two. In these days all Germans were Nazis and he was the perfect target for abuse. It is to his eternal credit that he lived

through these troubled times and poison pen letters with great dignity, eventually winning over the whole country by using the one thing he knew best - his skills as a goalkeeper.

Bert Trautman earned a reputation as a great saver of penalty kicks and, the story goes, team-mate Don Revie (ex Leeds' Boss) once deliberately handled in a friendly against Frankfurt to test his loyalty and ability. True to form he saved the spot kick. He became as famous as the man he deposed in goal - Frank Swift, becoming the 1st German to play in an FA Cup Final and voted Footballer of the Year. The big amiable goalkeeper's athletic prowess certainly went a long way to healing the wounds from the 1939-45 war.

Sven Goran Eriksson, being Swedish, will undoubtedly not encounter such racial problems but, nevertheless, let's hope for the national side's sake, people can forget their narrow-mindedness.

Oops! For the Cup

Here we go again, the FA Cup 1st round proper, the round when part-time and amateur non-league clubs take on the full-time professional football league sides from the second and third divisions and, with un-nerving frequency, it's the no-hope donkeys that leave the thoroughbreds trailing in their wakes as they progress on to later rounds against even more illustrious opponents.

Today we welcome Ilkeston Town to the County Ground who, after a 3-1 victory away at Folkestone on Saturday, lie 5th in the Dr Martens Premier League. Another upset on the horizon? Who knows, football can be a funny old game can't it. Rest assured, this weekend will see some profound shocks inflicted on sides that, on paper, are racing certainties. It's well worth remembering that Tottenham won the cup in 1901 as a Southern League side!

This season's competition, the world's oldest football tournament, began back on August 26th when some of the 510 non-league clubs began contesting the extra preliminary qualifying round. In total, 602 clubs had entered the competition (1920-21 saw the record entry of 674), each paying a £75 entry fee. Clubs applying to enter the competition must comply with, among others, the following; they must have a recognised league status, play on an enclosed pitch with a protected walkway for the players and officials, have suitable floodlights, produce a matchday programme and have the facility to collect admission charges (a £3 minimum was stipulated in 1998-99). The inaugural competition attracted

15 clubs and the first final was played on 16th March 1872 when Wanderers defeated the Royal Engineers by the only goal of the game at Kennington Oval. Several other venues have staged FA Cup final matches including; Lillie Bridge (London),

Fallowfield (Manchester), Old Trafford, Goodison Park, Crystal Palace, Stamford Bridge and, of course, Wembley.

Since 1872 there have been four FA Cup trophies. The first was stolen from the holders, Aston Villa, in 1895 and was never retrieved. The second was presented to the FA President of 21 years, Lord Kinnaird, in 1911 in recognition of his record 9 final appearances between 1872 and 1883. The first winners of the third trophy were Bradford City in 1911 and it was replaced in 1992 after being retired to Lancaster Gate.

Manchester United with 10 victories (8 at Wembley) head the table of FA Cup winners followed by Tottenham (8), Aston Villa and Arsenal (7 each), Blackburn and Newcastle (6 each) and Everton, Liverpool, Wanderers and West Bromwich (5 each). In 1998 the FA declared that drawn final ties would no longer be replayed, but instead decided by extra time followed by penalty shoot-outs. The longest tie ever saw Alvechurch victorious over Oxford City in the fifth replay of their fourth qualifying round tie in 1971. Since 1992-3 all ties, other than finals, have been restricted to one replay followed by extra time and penalties,

so that record will never be surpassed. Four players won 5 winner's medals in the early years of the competition but Mark Hughes with Manchester United and Chelsea earned 4 winner's medals at Wembley. When Cardiff City lifted the trophy following their 1-0 win over Arsenal in 1927, it was the only occasion that the Cup left England. Wimbledon are the only club to have won both the FA Cup (1988) and The FA Amateur Cup (1963). Tottenham (1961 and 1962), Blackburn (1890 and 1891) and Newcastle (1951 and 1952) are the only clubs to win the trophy in consecutive seasons. Bury's 6-o thrashing of Derby in 1903 is the highest winning margin in a final.

The list of statistics, quirks and twists in FA Cup folklore is endless, but nothing is more likely to cause palpitations of the hearts of football league managers than to remind them today of FA Cup results such as; Colchester 3 Leeds 2 (1971), Bournemouth 2 Manchester United o (1984), Wrexham 2 Arsenal 1 (1992) and Hereford 2 Newcastle 1 (1972), there are too many to list here. Who said football's boring? - it's not when there's a cup up for grabs, definitely not.


