


Swindon Town's annual Christmas Carol Service will take place this year on Wednesday, December 20th at Christ Church starting at 6.30pm.

They are also very strong defensively and well organised, we know the task in hand and we will have to be at our best to beat them. It is a great stepping stone for us to see how well we are doing. We have two wins under our belt and two consecutive clean sheets so it is

important we keep that run going. Our attitude has been superb in the last two games and we need to continue that today. I would like to thank all the supporters again for their continued support. It really helps the players in difficult times when they have the crowd behind them. We have had to earn the right to get the supporters behind us but, hopefully, now we can play to a certain level and achieve the consistency that warrants your support.



The Millers...


Ronnie Moore brings his Rotherham side to the County Ground today second in the league (at the time of writing) and unbeaten in the last ten league games since their home defeat by Reading.

Revered by the Millmoor faithful as a player, Moore is fast becoming as popular as a manager having steered the club towards the top of the table, picking up a Manager of the Month award on the way. Not bad for a club that was last year playing in Division Three. But there is nothing like a promotion to act as the catalyst for success and that has been the Millers' case this season.

In October the Millers won five and drew one of their six games and in

November, a 3-2 victory over Millwall and another unbeaten spell saw them climb into the automatic promotion places. The Millwall victory has broadcasted to the Division that Rotherham are up there by merit. Despite having a squad of just twenty players, the team is confident it can go all the way, new signing Alan Lee declaring "We showed we can more than match one of the best sides in this division so we know we need fear no one."

Nevertheless, if Rotherham are to win today they must halt a sequence of results against the Town which has seen us win all four of the last meetings between the clubs.



He signed for Charlton Athletic in September 1983 before returning to Tranmere Rovers in July 1986.


He became Assistant Manager and first team coach at Prenton Park for nine years, taking them to Wembley five times in the Autoglass and Play Off finals.

His first appointment as Manager came at Southport in the Vauxhall Conference, however after just a few months he was successfully sought out to take over at Millmoor. A local newspaper had conducted a poll amongst Rotherham United F.C. fans asking who they would choose as the next Manager -Ronnie polled almost 80%.

He was once revered by the Millmoor faithful as a player and is now proving very popular as the Manager, having taken them to second spot in the division, unbeaten in their last ten league games.



Centre-back Darren was signed from Brighton on loan by Ronnie Moore to give him another option at the back. The former Sheffield United and Chesterfield man cost Brighton £25,000 when they signed him from Gillingham in July 1999, and had made 20 appearances before going to Millmoor.

Alan Lee

Alan signed a three and a half year deal last week for a reported record club fee. The 22-tear old former Eire U-21 international has so far bagged just one goal for the Millers, but has become a hit with both staff and fans alike due to his attitude and work-rate.



Bournemouth is probably best forgotten - it can sometimes be difficult to pick out opposition players, but it seemed to be Steve Fletcher every time! Tranmere in the Cup was watched from right up in the Gods - Luton was nearly not watched at all. A wrong turning and lengthy walk from car-park to Kenilworth Road left us struggling to make our 2 o'clock on-air kick-off time - we did, with seconds to spare - hopefully you wouldn't have noticed at your end of the wireless.

Oldham was just a long way! -Swansea was a long way up a vertical ladder to a BBC position away from everybody else where you had to haul up the equipment on the end of a rope. We actually sat above the most vociferous Welsh fans of them all - interesting accompaniment to our commentary if you were listening very closely!!

At Notts County,I recall sitting on an ordinary dining-room-type chair with "technical gear" balanced on another. Peterborough is another one to erase from the memory, while Northampton is the place for an extension-lead - we plugged in miles from where our press passes entitled us to sit.

In quite a complicated "rig", we also broadcast from the touchline before games and outside the dressing-room soon afterwards with the manager and his players - we do like to say BBC Wiltshire Sound Sport is always "where the action is". O'Halloran's opened the scoring on 17 minutes and doubled Town's lead in the 51st, striking again when a cross was only half cleared to the edge of the box and lifting a tremendous volley over Swan. In the 84th minute Young's cross was met at the near post by Steve Cowe who placed his header into the net at the Town End. Howe added his name to the scoresheet in the 88th minute, stabbing the ball home after an Alexander header was pushed out. Cowe added another when he swivelled in the box to lash home Town's fifth.

In the end it proved to be a very comfortable win for Swindon as they over-Gateshead.

Swindon took the lead when O'Halloran picked the ball up from Invincibile and hit a superb shot into the top right-hand corner. His second was a high volley that looped over Swan. With fifteen minutes left Young's cross found Steve Cowe at the near post and his glancing header made it 3-0, Howe made it four when he was on hand to follow up a rebound. Just two minutes later Swindon concluded their scoring with a 5th goal and the second for Steve Cowe.

Andy King was delighted with the result and was delighted with the way Steve Cowe came off the bench to bag two goals.




"We started well enough and managed to keep it at 1-0 until the second half. After the second our heads went


















I was delighted with last week's result and obviously over the moon with my two goals.

TICKETING

- ▶ STFC will continue to strive for wider access to matches by offering a broad range of ticket prices.
- The club operates a scheme to enable supporters to pay for season tickets by instalment at a reasonable rate of interest.
- ▶ At least 5 per cent of tickets to each game will be made available to non-season ticket holders.
- Concessionary prices are available to junior supporters, senior citizens, students and the unemployed and concessions to senior citizens are available to both men and women from the age of 6o.
- > STFC will provide an area of the ground for the exclusive use of family groups and junior supporters.
- STFC will provide support for disabled supporters and their helpers. Mark Rogers, Ticket Office Manager, can be contacted for details of our disabled facilities and ticket allocation.
- The club will always make it clear to its customers buying tickets if these tickets are in a restricted viewing area.
- STFC runs a membership scheme for its Town End for home supporters. The benefits are the ability to watch a league game for £10.00 per match. Other loyalty benefits will be added to this scheme from time to time.
- The club's supporters are allocated tickets for away matches in order as follows: Season ticket holders, Supporters Club members, Town End members, general public. The home club always determines the cost of these tickets, although STFC will always communicate with the home club to ensure a fair pricing structure.


It creates additional pressure for the lads because you have to go forward and win, it is expected of you, especially from the fans' point of view. In the first half Gateshead


Today we face tougher opposition against a side that has not lost for two months and are second in the league. All the lads are looking forward to the game because the



A series of articles by the Editor of PROGRAMME MONTHLY & FOOTBALL COLLECTABLE magazine, describing how programmes have changed over a century and a quarter of Association Football.

No. 1 Isolated Excellence in the 1950's

Amid the plethora of 8 or 12 page advertising-dominated thin programmes of the 1950's, were a couple of shining beacons of high quality, notably from Chelsea and Arsenal.

The abiding thought is that if these two clubs could devote resources to produce interesting programmes, then why couldn't the other major clubs follow suit? Pre-war, Chelsea had never been ones for expansive programmes, although their 4 or 8 pagers were always packed with information (no adverts) and were invariably enlivened with an attractive cartoon. They quickly changed tack after the war, and by 1948/49 had established a substantial, conventional 16 page programme.

This was filled with features, information and photographs, both action and portrait, which could not be found in other programmes. The programme went through a number of changes in design and presentation until it settled into a

stylised 16 page issue in the late 1950's. Like their London neighbours West Ham, Spurs and Arsenal, Chelsea eschewed advertisements in their match programmes until the mid 1970's, but it was only the Gunners who matched the excellence of the Stamford Bridge programme two decades earlier. "Voice of Arsenal" on the first two pages became a feature of a trip to Highbury, and like Chelsea, there was a number of action photographs.

Arsenal reverted to a more conventional A5 size mid-decade, but still the content remained of a high quality and quantity. There were always four action photographs spread across two pages, a full page of pen pictures of the visitors opposite the team lines, a substantial article on general football matters ("Jottings by Spectator"), a team group photo of the visitors and a page on an aspect of the club's history. Few clubs could match the standards set by the

'Programme Monthly & Football Collectable' contains up to 150 pages each month on all aspects of programme collecting.

London twins, although Manchester United's 1950's programme could find few critics. Shorter (by 4 pages, at 12 pages) and containing some advertising presence, the United programme offered more than the majority of 1950's programmes. There was a page of action photographs, a thoughtful piece by Manager Matt Busby, two substantial topical articles by journalists, and an entertaining full page cartoon. What the Arsenal, Manchester United and Chelsea programmes had in common was that someone had taken the trouble to devote time and imagination to their compilation, in contrast to the indifference towards their matchday issues shown by the majority of League clubs in the 1950's.


























Steve McMahon signed 23-year old Kevin Watson from Tottenham Hotspur in July 1996 on a free transfer.

The move was an attempt by McMahon to add some more flair and creativity in the centre of midfield to break down the resolute defences of Division Two sides - Watson's trademark was his ball control and sublime passing ability. Kevin drifted in and out of the side but when he did play, showed signs of the class that has made him Rotherham United's skipper and among the club's goal scorers this season.

Kevin is a playmaker, who likes to control the pace of the game and has the ability to create goalscoring chances with his range of passing and delicate ball skill. His most successful period came in 1996-97 when he figured in over 25 games and bagged 3 goals.

Before joining the Town, Kevin had been at Spurs and graduated through the trainee scheme. Unable to break into the first team for prolonged periods, Watson joined three clubs on loan in a period of 2 years, Brentford, near neighbours Bristol City and Barnet. After three years at the County Ground, Watson decided to move on to pastures new and joined today's visitors, Rotherham United.

Once again Kevin moved for a free transfer during the 1999 close season but it is with the Millers that Watson has had his most successful period. Watson adapted well to the side and has now become club captain and an intergral part of

Ronnie Moore's promotion chasing side. A highly accomplished ball player, Watson is also an excellent passer and was one of the best midfielders in Division Three last season. Kevin netted just one goal in 1999-2000 but it was certainly a memorable strike: a rebound from the half-way line after the 'keeper had miskicked his clearance in a game against Chester at Millmoor.


We welcome him back to the County Ground today, but let's just hope that today he doesn't play too well!

Wrexham boss, Flynn was left reeling last week after loan star Chris Killen had to return to Manchester City.



Bristol Bravery by Phillips


Bristol City goalkeeper Steve Phillips played in his side's 3-1 cup victory on Saturday despite a car crash before the game.

Matches from Memory




For Swindon the 1978/79 season had been characterised by some good displays of football that lacked the killer punch.

It was this lack of goals that persuaded manager Bob Smith to pay Watford £80,000 for Alan Mayes.

At a time when there were still only two points for a win, the gap between Town and second-placed Shrewsbury, seven points ahead seemed large but with two games in hand some hopes of promotion still remained. With Rotherham a point behind Town in the table and Mayes making his first team debut, the match at Millmoor was viewed with a great deal of interest.

The game was only twelve minutes old when a nasty collision took place between Brian Williams and Richard Finney that resulted in both players taking no further part in the contest. Home manager Jimmy McGuigan and Town boss Smith both came on to the pitch at this point, not to complain about this incident, but the fact that they were concerned about a colour clash! Rotherham were wearing their normal Arsenal style strip of red with white sleeves while Town wore a white strip with a diagonal red stripe. Although in Scotland no-one seems to worry about a team in green and white hoops playing a team in green with white sleeves, in England such a clash does not usually occur. The referee declined to allow the players to leave the field but by the time the second half began, Swindon had borrowed Rotherham's change strip and were



wearing all blue. By this time Swindon were one up, having scored on the stroke of half time. A move which had begun in Town's own half ended with Alan Mayes cracking a superb swerving shot from thirty yards.

It was a measure of Swindon's superiority that the Millers had not managed a shot on target until the 56th minute, but when they did, Trevor Phillips converted Alan Crawford's pass to bring the scores level. Swindon fans did not have to wait long to see the lead restored, in the 63rd minute Ray McHale pierced the Rotherham defence to find Alan Mayes. After drawing Rotherham's 'keeper away from his goal, he managed to slot home despite the best efforts of the defender to turn it round the post. Mayes completed his hat-trick just two minutes later following a long punt downfield by



Jimmy Allan. John Flynn got a head to it but it skidded off to Mayes who smartly rounded the keeper to make it 3-1. With Kenny Stroud and Steve Aizlewood in commanding form, the Town defence held on for what the Adver called an 'A-Mayes-ing' win.

Mayes scored eight more goals but it was not enough to win promotion, Town finishing three points and three places behind Watford. Rotherham fell away to seventh.





Improvements All Round

We have four players with us in the treatment room this week; Graz, Matty Hewlett, Andy Williams and Antoine van der Linden.

Graz is feeling a little bit better. He saw a specialist last Tuesday who checked him out - it is important that we see the specialist before we go any further. We have to be very careful with Graz, especially in these adverse weather conditions - they tend to aggravate the abdominal area. Statistically November, December and January are the toughest months for most clubs in terms of injuries, abdominal and groin injuries are very common.


Andy Williams saw the same specialist as Graz on Monday morning


and he was very pleased with the progress that he has made. He has given us the OK to work him even harder, do some quicker work. So far we have done a lot of long runs and we need to improve his speed and get him onto some ball work. We are hoping that, if he can continue to improve as quickly as he has done, that he can return to full training very soon, maybe even in the next week or two. It has been six weeks now so he is on course for a good recovery in the time scale that we set him.

Antoine was the only casualty from Saturday's cup game. He has a slight groin strain that he pulled at the end of the game. He didn't do all that much on Monday but he should be fine for today's game.

Finally, we have **Matty Hewlett** who has worked extremely hard this week. He went to Lilleshall on Monday. They have equipment there that we don't have, that measures leg strength and other things which are crucial in the planning of where we go from here.

He has been running very well and we think that he deserved a change of scenery. They will introduce some rotation work and take him on that little bit further. Hopefully he will be on his return to fitness some time in the new year, I am reluctant to put a definite date on him but we are fairly confident that he will return in January. At the end of the day he has to feel right in himself and we won't rush him until he reaches that point.





Swindon Town v Oxford United

For many Town fans, this is probably the most eagerly awaited fixture of the football season. Even this year, with Bristol City, Bristol Rovers and Reading all in the same division, it is this derby that excites supporters and players the most.

Unfortunately, in recent years, the Oxford derby has also become a 'six-pointer', with both club's having struggled in the respective divisions (as if these games were not tense enough already). None more so than this year's 2-1 win at the County Ground, with both clubs positioned in the bottom three at the time.

This derby is fuelled purely by the geographical proximity and the games between the two clubs have provided marvellous entertainment over the years. Home advantage also seems to be a major factor




Tottenham Hotspur v Arsenal

As if the London derby was not ferocious enough, former Arsenal boss George Graham joined Spurs to add fuel to the fire! Graham, league and cup winner with the Gunners, joined the Spurs in a move that infuriated both sets of fans.

Regardless of league positions, the North London derby has always produced close games, four draws in the last seven games. In recent years, Arsenal have been in the top three whilst Spurs have had to live with the fact that they are just not good enough to pose a threat to the Championship but you would never guess, such are the nature of the results.

In the 8o's players such as Adams, Mabbut and Rocastle epitomised the hard-working, tough-tackling player that fans used to love, home grown talent that understood how much the game meant to them. Now, the passion and fiery temperament of the games has not changed but it is a continental selection of players that now represents the two clubs. Arsenal currently lead in the number of matches won, having won 56 to 49.





3 Liverpool v Everton

As well as being a stone's throw across Stanley Park, the Merseyside derby is sometimes one of the most exciting, with a number of high scoring games. None more so than in the 30's when, in 1933, the red half celebrated a 7-4 victory and three years later, a 6-0 drubbing.

Despite continually finding the Premiership a tough nut to crack Everton have enjoyed the most success in this match in recent seasons, winning 7 out of the last 9 years. This derby is the embodiment of long-standing rivalry and unnerving passion. Visions of The Kop End at Anfield and The Gwladys Street Stand at Goodison Park will live long in the memory when the two clubs, as they have recently confirmed, finally relocate to more multi-purpose stadia later this

decade. It will be interesting to see how much of a bearing their current homes affect the traditional rivalry of all derby matches.



Manchester United v
Manchester City

Manchester City have had to live in the shadow of their great rivals for over a decade and have even had to wait for four years to play them again in a competitive match.

Historically, the two clubs could not have had more contrasting fortunes, especially in the last few years, with several seasons of decline culminating in two terms in Division Two for City, and a historic treble for Ferguson's United. This may explain why United have defeated City no less than 49 times as opposed to City's 32, with City's last win ten years ago in a rare 5-1 mauling of a United team led by Eric Cantona.

This season's encounter, eagerly awaited by both sets of fans was marred by the sending off of Danny Tiatto and the throwing of coins at United's David Beckham. Beckham silenced his critics in the best possible fashion, with the deciding goal in the early stages of the contest.





1 Celtic v Rangers

Anyone who witnessed the game between Celtic and Rangers two weeks ago will understand why we have made it this week's number one! Fast, ferocious, frenetic - I got tired just watching it!

No other derby in British football exudes such passion but also (unfortunately), such ill-feeling and tension. As well as the geographical proximity (in essence - the vital ingredient of a derby), the 'Old Firm' derby has political, religious and historical connotations, something that Gazza encountered a couple of seasons ago. Having scored a goal for Rangers, Gascoigne paraded himself in front of the Celtic fans playing the flute, a gesture that carries deep religious and political significance for many Celtic fans.

In recent years Celtic fans have had to endure a prolonged period of

dominance by their rivals, although it appeared at the start of this season that the tides had changed. Martin O'Neill's men not only defeated Advocaat's side 6-2 (the first big win since their 7-1 mauling of Rangers in 1957), but also raced 15 points clear at the top of the table.


Unfortunately for the Premiership, United came back in far better shape than they left and set about annihilating the remainder of the field to claim the title once again.

Brazil equalised prior to halftime and again England had to settle for a draw against South American opposition.

Victories followed against Ukraine and the mighty Malta and England headed towards Euro 2000 in high spirits. Little did they know of the troubles that lay ahead.



What a dawn to the new millenium.
Everything seems to be going wrong; the Dome, the American Presidential election, the railways, the price of oil, the weather etc. etc. and now, calamity of calamities, the New Wembley Stadium project has gone completely pear-shaped and the wheels have fallen off. As Frankie Howerd would have said: Woe!, woe! and thrice times woe!

The major international financial institutions that were considering investment in the stadium are, as one, showing a distinct lack of interest in a project whose budget and specifications have spiralled from approximately £250 million to a ludicrous £660 million and counting, let's face it, without the support of those institutions the new stadium will never be built because if it was, at that cost, the money would never be recovered.

At the centre of the controversy is a certain Ken Bates Esq. (surprise, surprise), chairman of Chelsea FC and also of Wembley National Stadium Limited. A major contributory factor to the massive escalation of the new Wembley's costs is the specification,

spearheaded by Mr Bates, that includes a huge hotel, extensive banqueting and conference suites and even an office block - a kind of new Stamford Bridge complex - but immensely larger and costlier. Hindsight is a wonderful thing, but the writing was probably on the wall when WNSL decided that the new facility would not cater for athletics, a decision that incurred the wrath of those government ministers concerned with sport in general in the UK. Let there be no doubt, we need a new national stadium · in order to be able to bid for international athletic events - as well as a a new home for the national soccer team, FA Cup Final, Rugby League Cup Final etc, but why build two?


I have many fond memories of Wembley occasions, May 1993 in particular, but none whatsoever for the stadium itself, I think it was an appalling venue. I found it uncomfortable and with shockingly inadequate parking, catering and toilet facilities. Many, many seats in it were badly visually-restricted and,

worst of all, it was situated in a totally inappropriate location - set in the middle of a grimy industrial estate where access by road, rail, bus and car was a complete nightmare.

Surely this new facility should have been planned to be built elsewhere, somewhere adjacent to the motorway and railway networks in the West Midlands or Greater Manchester, to allow ease of access to the whole of the country, not just to north Londoners, there can be no doubt that a major factor towards the Dome's failure was its ludicrous location.

Furthermore, surely it should be built to accomodate a very minimum of 100,000 spectators and the accent should be on providing an excellent, easily accessable facility for the whole country's grass-roots fans, not Roy Keane's 'prawn sandwich-eating', expense account dilettantes. We can only hope.


