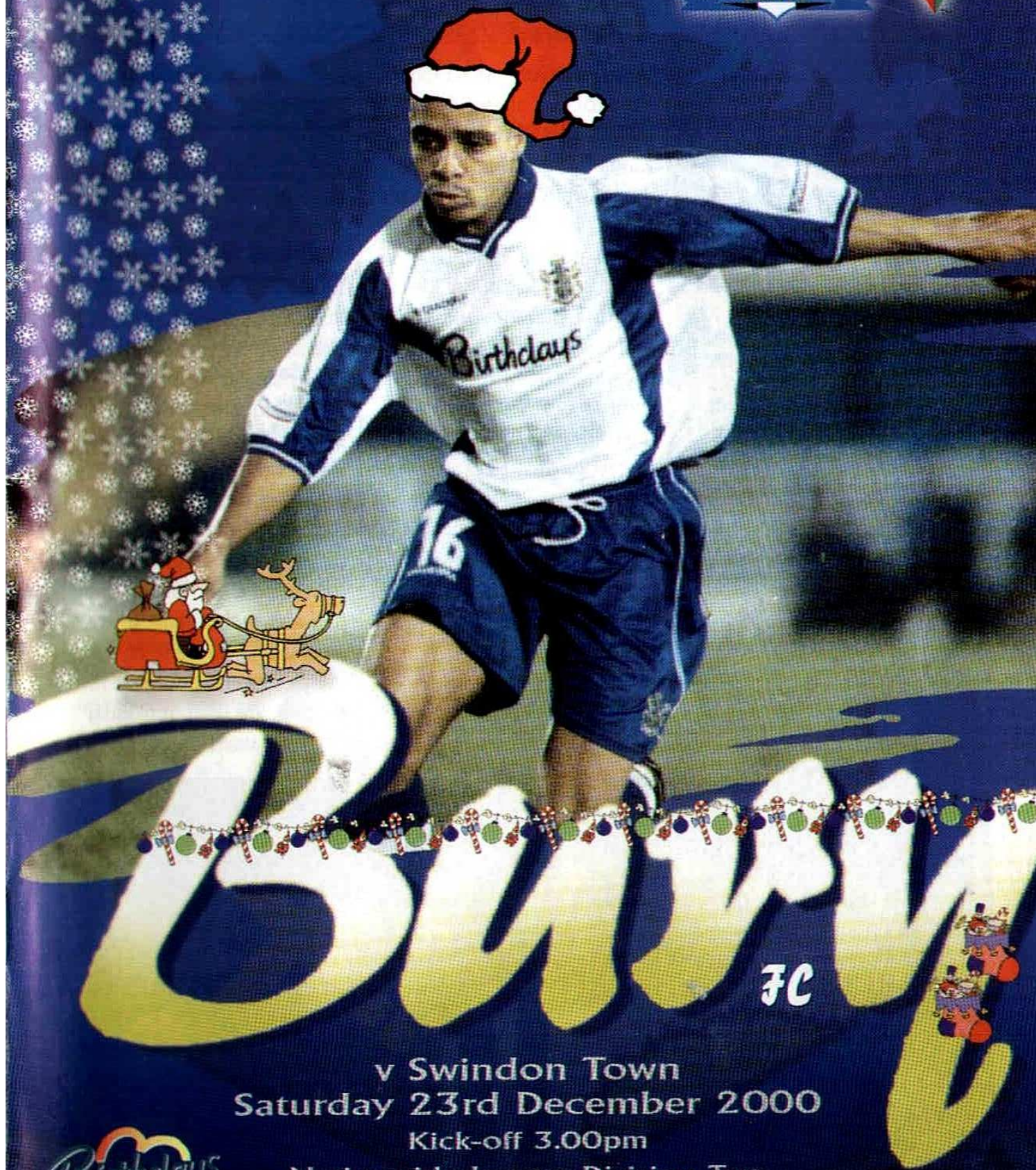

Last week we had a big crowd which made for a terrific atmosphere and really gave our side a boost.

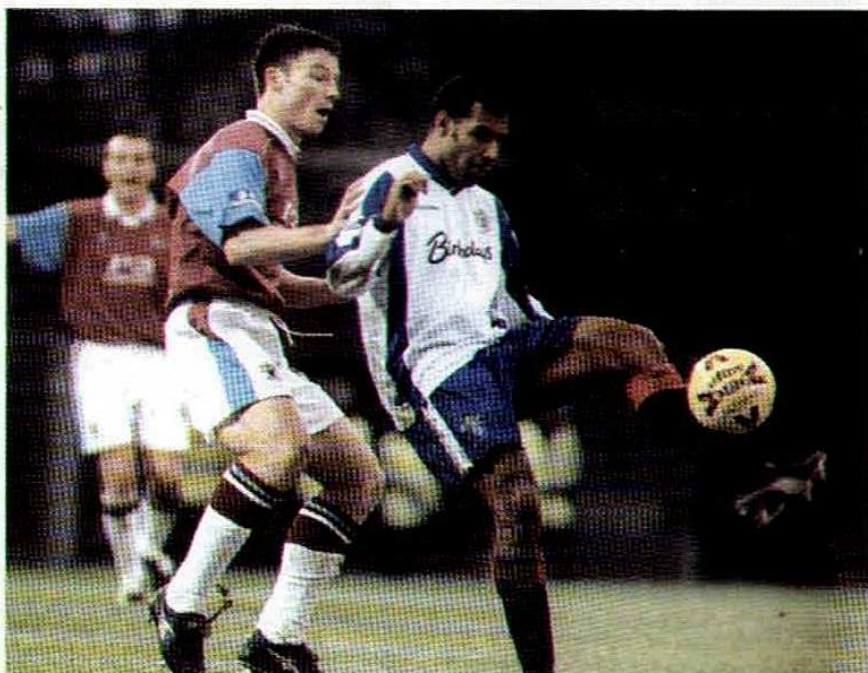
I felt the Oldham game was exciting and typical of a local derby.

It was great to see the crowd give Paul a standing ovation when he was subbed and that shows they appreciate his workrate.

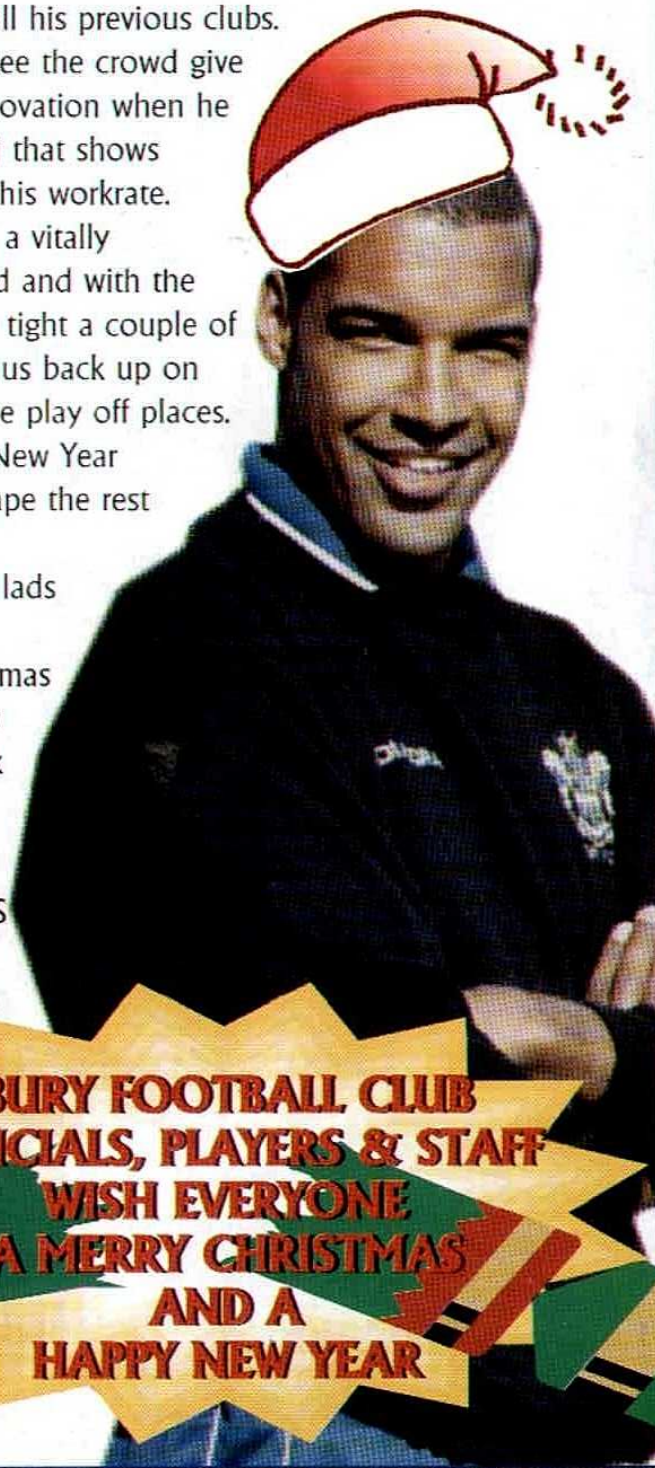
We are entering a vitally important period and with the league being so tight a couple of wins would see us back up on the fringes of the play off places.

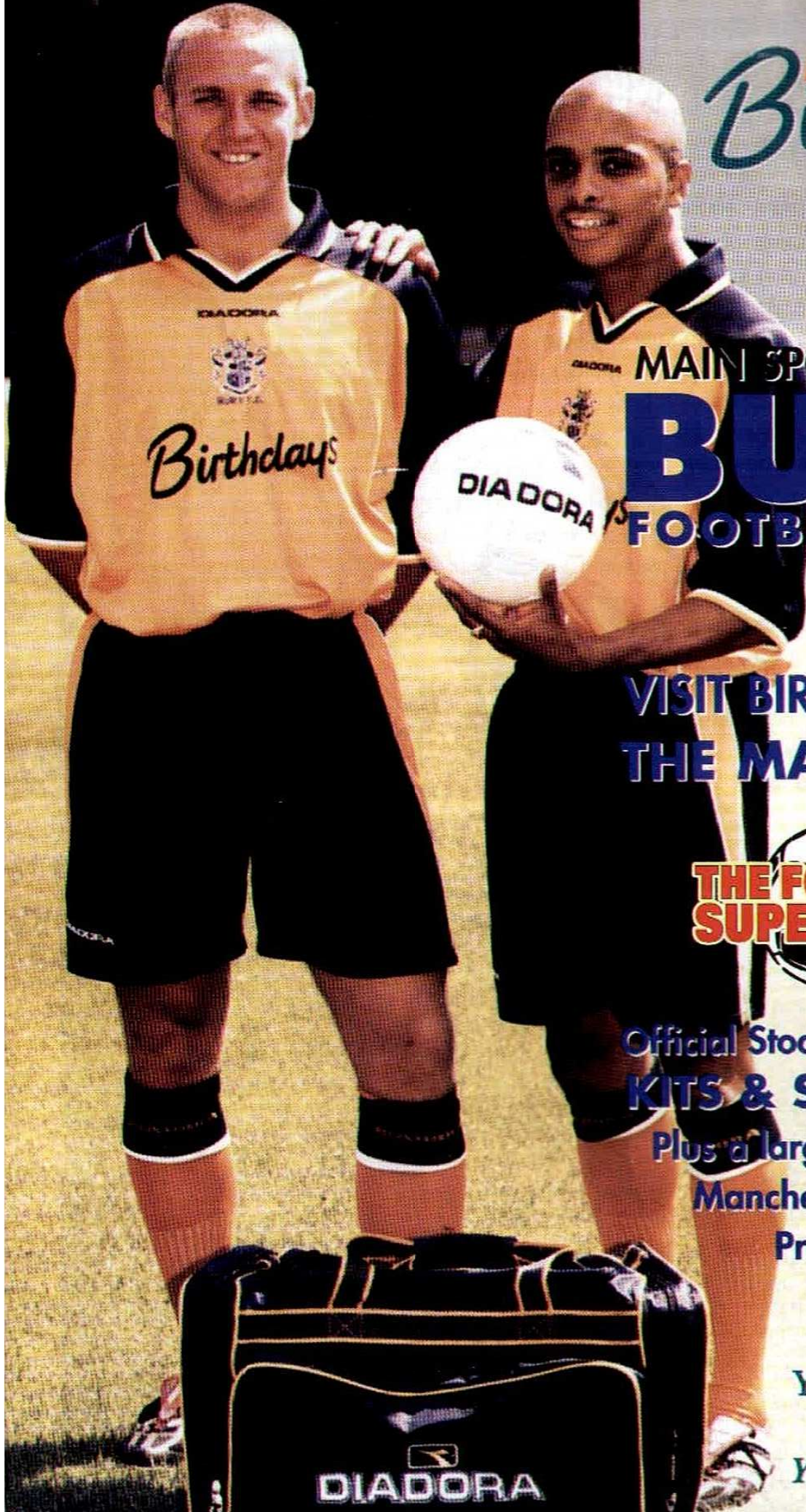

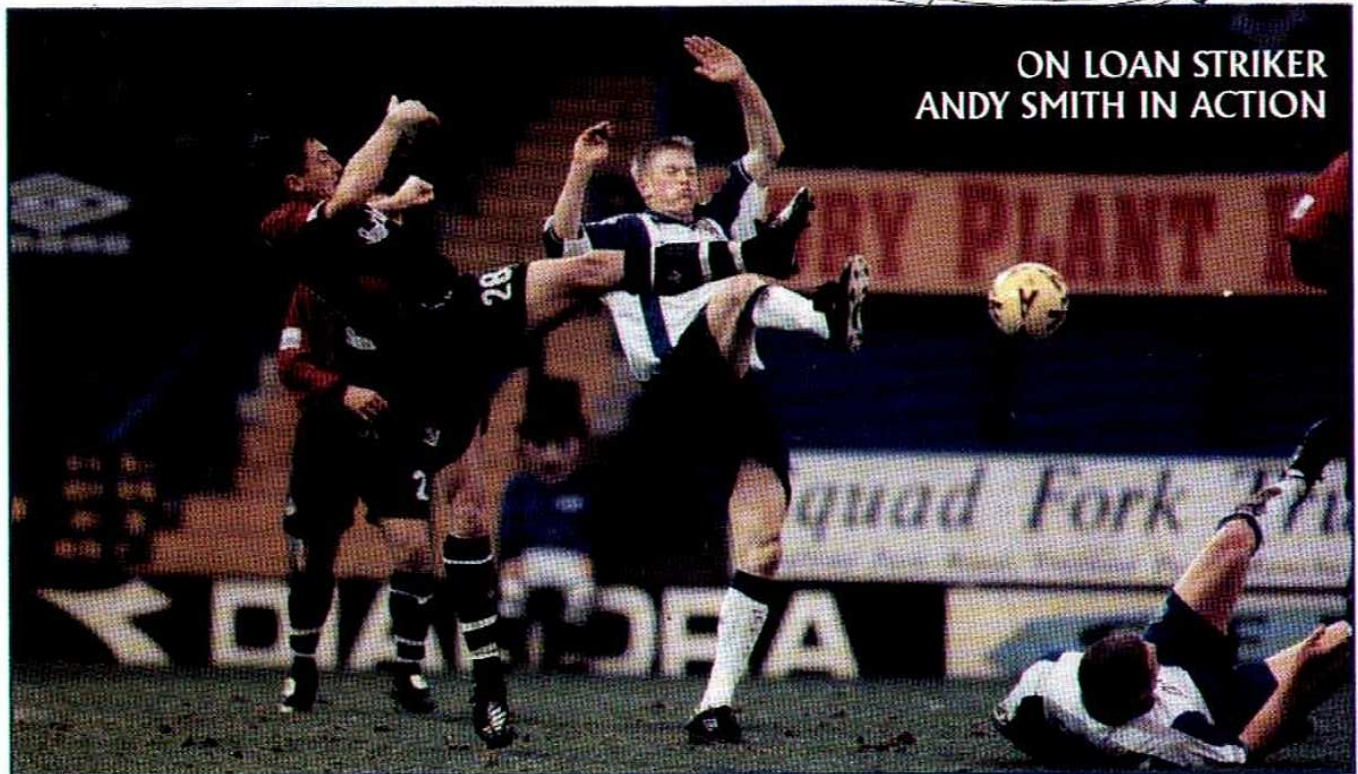

The Visitors

Swindon Town



Members of the Premier League as recently as 1994, Swindon Town Football Club has experienced something of a yo-yo existence in the years since. Relegation in successive seasons took Swindon into Division Two in 1995, but they bounced back as champions in 1996 and then spent the next four seasons desperately struggling to hold on to a place in Division One. The Robins finished in 19th, 18th and 17th positions before finally meeting with the dreaded drop after finishing in 24th place last season. To make matters worse, when new boss Colin Todd took over in May this year, the club was in deep financial trouble (sounds familiar!) before subsequently being rescued from the administrators by saviour and new owner Terry Brady. The new supremo at the County Ground has many plans to help boost Swindon's fortunes once again, including a new 25,000 seater stadium with shops, leisure facilities and a hotel. For now though, Brady's immediate planning must be more concerned with helping the Robins stay clear of trouble in Division Two - and avoiding the club's fourth taste of relegation inside eight years. Under Colin Todd, Swindon got off to a very poor start, winning just three of the opening fourteen games. The former Bolton manager then dropped a

bombshell in later October - and barely five months in the job - by agreeing to join Derby County as Assistant Manager. 'Caretaker' boss Andy King then guided the Robins to a fine 3-1 home win against Cambridge in his first game in charge and was soon rewarded with a permanent appointment. The result has been a run of just two defeats in nine games and a climb out of the bottom three. Last Saturday's 2-1 home success against Rotherham lifted the Robins up to 20th position, with the distinct feeling that better times lie ahead. Clear-cut FA Cup victories against non-league Ilkeston (4-1) and Gateshead (5-0) have also earned Swindon a money spinning tie at home to Coventry City in a few weeks time. King has also brought in three loan players from Premiership clubs since his appointment - and has shaken up his squad by telling seven players that they can move on. Of the new men, Ian Woan seems to be making the biggest impression. Initially signed for a month after being released by Nottingham Forest, Woan has since signed a contract until the end of the season and last weekend scored one goal and made another in the win against Rotherham. Manchester City midfielder

Jim Whitley and Southampton defender Richard Dryden are also on loan currently. In Division Two, Swindon have won three, drawn one and lost six away games. The wins have come at Bristol City (1-0) and Luton (3-2) in September and at Northampton (1-0) on 2nd November. A 0-0 draw at Swansea complete the 'away' points haul. Town's leading scorer currently is Danny invincible with 8 league and cup goals, whilst Keith O'Halloran - a summer signing from St. Johnstone - has claimed 4 goals.

THE OPPOSITION

Goalkeepers

1. BART GRIEMINK The 6 ft 4 Dutch goalkeeper played second fiddle to England Under 21 international Mark Tyler at Peterborough for the past couple of seasons. After only making 44 league appearances for The Posh he decided it was time for a new challenge when his contract expired during the summer. Bart spent a two-month loan period with Town last season and impressed in difficult circumstances.

23. STEVE MILDENHALL One of Swindon's home grown talents, Steve is in his fourth year as a professional after successfully coming through the Club's YTS system. Made two first team appearances in 1995/96, came off the bench to play as an outfield player in 1996/97 and made his full league debut between the posts for Swindon in October 1997. 'Mildy' made 6 (2 as substitute) appearances for Town last season. He spent most of the season in the reserves earning praise for his resolute performances, however, he was rarely relied upon to make the step up to the first team.

Defenders

2. MARK ROBINSON Started his career at West Bromwich Albion, joined Barnsley on a free in June 1986 and such was his form there that Newcastle snapped him up for £450,000 in March 1993. After losing his place in the first team through injury, Mark is now the Town's longest serving player since Swindon paid a Club record £600,000 for his services in July 1994. He has been a consistent and versatile performer ever since, however, he could face competition from new signing Juan Cobian for the right-back slot this season.

21. GARETH DAVIES Was signed on a free transfer in March 1999, Gareth made the short trip down the M4 from Reading and despite being a firm favourite with the Royals' fans, he did not figure in Tommy

Burns' plans. Gareth is an infectious character but is well known for his commitment and aggressive style. However, Town fans only caught glimpses of him in action due to several injuries, mainly a problematic knee injury, wrecking his last campaign only making 16 starts in all.

5. ADAM WILLIS Adam was called into action from the reserves towards the end of last season to cover for injuries and suspensions. Adam worked very hard in the gym after training to improve his physical presence and it paid off. His confident displays earned him a place in the starting line-up on merit and he was rewarded with a new contract under Colin Todd after being previously told that he could leave the club.

22. ALAN REEVES (Pictured Right)

Quit Wimbledon's "Crazy Gang" in search of first team football with Swindon. Tall central defender, who cost the Dons £300,000 from Rochdale. Excellent header of the ball, 32-year-old Reeves can be an asset in attack on set pieces, scoring 2 goals in 24 appearances last season. Despite being linked with several clubs in the summer, Reeves is working hard to command a first team place under new manager Colin Todd.

3. SOL DAVIS Left-sided fullback back who was offered his first professional contract in the summer of 1998 after a series of impressive performances in the reserves. Made his league debut as a substitute at home to QPR, shortly after his 18th birthday. First start in a Swindon shirt came six months later in the heat of a local

derby clash away at Oxford United. Last season Sol made over 25 appearances for Town in both the fullback and wingback positions and his commitment was exemplified by some very tough tackling.

12. JUAN COBIAN Juan Cobian joined Aberdeen from Sheffield Wednesday on a free transfer in November '99. Cobian, a rampaging right-sided defender, made a promising start to 1998-99

with the Owls having joined the club for a nominal fee during the 1998 close season. This summer he moved, again on a free transfer, to the County Ground despite offers from a number of clubs. His

attacking style will be very much in demand in Town's new-look side.

6. ANTOINE VAN DER LINDEN

Central defender whose composure on the ball will make him a vital asset to

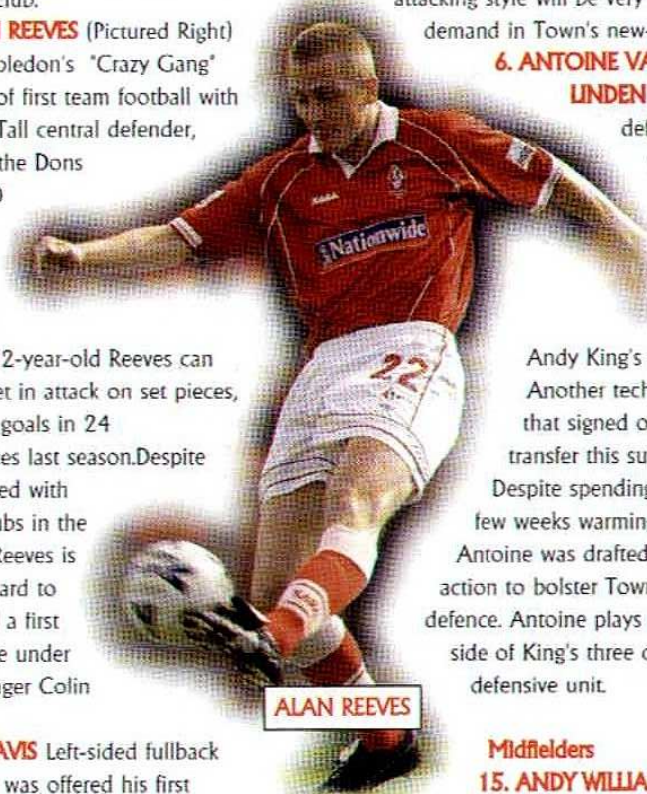
Andy King's team.

Another technical player that signed on a free transfer this summer.

Despite spending the first few weeks warming the bench, Antoine was drafted into the action to bolster Town's leaky defence. Antoine plays on the left side of King's three central defensive unit.

Midfielders

15. ANDY WILLIAMS Andy moved from Southampton in October 1999 in a £65,000 deal after an impressive loan spell at the County Ground. Andy is an extremely versatile player and has taken on a variety of defensive and midfield duties. Formerly a regular Welsh Under-21 international he

became a strong candidate for Player of the Season last term which showed how well he settled into the side. (Hernia operation in October '00, will be out until well after Xmas)

8. BOBBY HOWE Stephen, who likes to be known as Bobby, is an attacking midfielder who signed for Swindon in January 1998 from Nottingham Forest, where his first team opportunities had dried up. Bobby's confidence suffered last season and fell out of favour in the first team. However, after being told he could leave the club he has worked hard to re-establish himself in the side.

4. MATTHEW HEWLETT An attacking midfielder that signed for Town on a free transfer in July 2000. A hot prospect at local rivals Bristol City in 1998/99. At the time a succession of injuries meant that he missed most of the season and failed to live up to his potential. A fresh start may be just the challenge he needs and there will be no better place to impress and improve his performances than at the County Ground this season. If he can find his form he may just be the attacking spark the Town midfield is so dearly missing. (Knee injury Oct'00, will be out until well after Xmas).

11. DAVID DUKE Another young player with a great deal of potential. A left-sided midfielder, he was unable to command a first-team start at Premiership Sunderland after joining them in June '97 from Redbý. Impressed former boss Colin Todd in several pre-season friendlies and signed on a free transfer in July.

7. KEITH O'HALLORAN (Pictured Right) He made six starts for Middlesbrough where he came through the youth ranks before joining St Johnstone in March '97 for £50,000. Keith went on to make over 60 appearances for the Saints but

relished the opportunity of proving himself in England after a very successful period at McDiarmid Park. Despite being offered a new contract north of the border, he chose to join Swindon's new era under Andy King. The Town fans will be delighted to see a natural right-sided midfielder at the club after it became a huge problem position last campaign.

Forwards

17. DANIEL INVINCIBLE

(Pictured Right) Andy King believes that midfielder Danny Invincible can become a real star after completing a deal to sign the Australian on a free transfer in July. Former boss Todd moved swiftly to tie up a deal for Invincible after spotting the 21-year-old playing for West Ham in a trial match. The former Marconi Stallions star and former Australian under-20's, started predominantly on the right hand side of midfield, but King pushed him up front and the Aussie immediately scored five goals in four games.

10. GIULIANO

GRAZIOLI Signed in June 1999 on a free transfer from his former club Peterborough Utd. Giuliano's previous visit to the County Ground was in 1997 with Stevenage Town in the FA Cup 3rd round. His winning goal dumped Swindon out and handed Stevenage a money-making 4th round tie against Newcastle Utd. Missed most of last season through injury, but when he did play he was the shining light in a very dull season for Swindon. Following the departures of fellow

strikers Chris Hay and Iffy Onuora, 'Graz' established himself as the Town's main threat. If he stays fit, he will be a handful for opposing defences this season.

14. STEVE COWE

Steve is a nippy, darting forward with good vision and very quick feet. Rarely called upon under former manager Jim Quinn, Steve tried to find another club after he was told he had no future with the Robins. However, Steve was another player that came in from the football wilderness to finish the season strongly and do well enough to warrant a new contract.

24. MARTIN WILLIAMS Previous Clubs: Luton Town, Colchester United, Reading Left Reading in search of a new challenge. A firm favourite with the fans at the Madejski, he topped the scoring charts two seasons ago with 11 goals in 31 games until he sustained a knee injury three months from the end of the campaign. His strength and pace will complement both the guile of Giuliano Grazioli and the youthful endeavour of Gary Alexander. His move, which was delayed by another untimely knee injury over the summer, could solve Town's early goalscoring problems.

18. GARY ALEXANDER Highly-rated 21-year-old who joined the Robins in early August from West Ham United in a £300,000 deal. Gary spent most of last season on loan at Exeter City where he made a big impression - scoring 16 goals in 20 appearances and keeping The Grecians out of relegation trouble in the process. A powerful and hard-working forward, Alexander could be the one to watch this season.

26 Alan Young - 17-year-old forward with great potential.

31 Ian Woan - signed short-term contract.

25 Richard Dryden - signed one-month load deal in late Nov.

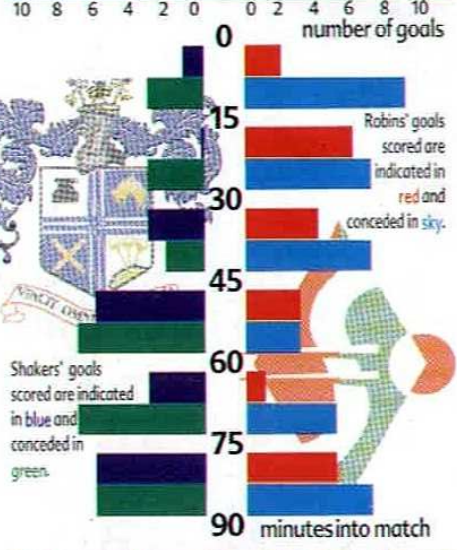

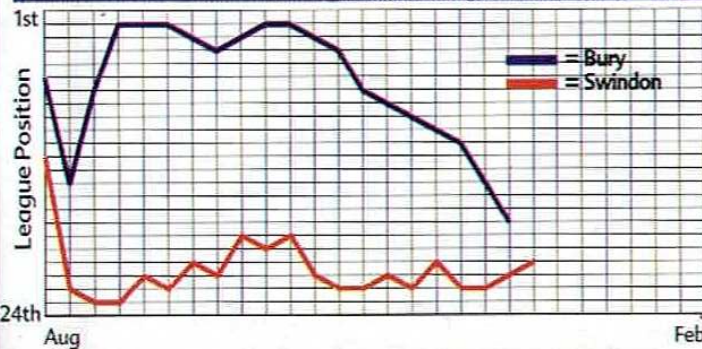

**BURY V SWINDON TOWN
DIVISION THREE
10TH SEPTEMBER 1960**

For what was eventually to be Bury's most successful season ever, the Shakers had made a decidedly ordinary start, winning 2 drawing 3 and losing 1 so far.

For this game Bury were giving a debut to 18 years old Tony Moulden, who came in to replace Bill Bradbury.

Former Bury player Bert Head was now manager of Swindon Town and he brought to Gigg Lane a very young and inexperienced side that contained seven teenagers. Four of the youngsters were only 17 years old and they included Mike Summerbee the future Manchester City winger, Ernie Hunt a classy inside forward who would play for Wolverhampton Wanderers, Everton and Coventry City. John Trollope was another 17 year old and he went on to play a massive 770 league games for Swindon. Leading the visitors attack and slightly older at 21 years was David Layne, more commonly known as 'Bronco', who later moved to Sheffield Wednesday and got caught up in the infamous early sixties bribery scandal and received a lifetime ban.

The full teams were :-

BURY : Adams, Robertson, Conroy, Turner, McGrath, Atherton, Calder, Moulden, Watson, Jackson, Hubbard.

SWINDON : Burton, Woolan, Trollope, Morgan, Chamberlain, Woodruff, Summerbee, Hunt, Layne,

Jackson (C), Darcy.

The referee was H.P.Hackney of Barnsley

There was little to choose between the two sides in the first half, but a single Bury goal, courtesy of a 27th minute strike gave them the edge. Bill Calder's shot was deflected for a corner by the visitors keeper Sam Burton and from the resulting kick the ball was cleared out to Eddie Robertson. He quickly lifted the ball over the defence and Don Watson raced in to head wide of Burton. The well below average crowd of 6,749 had to wait until the 58th minute before Bury forged further in front. The goal came after Swindon had nearly equalised with a Layne header that forced Frank Adams into fingertip save that just cleared the crossbar. Debutant Moulden was involved in the second Bury goal when he found Allan Jackson and his 30 yard shot took a wicked deflection off Peter Chamberlain to completely wrong foot Burton and sail into the corner of the net. The young Swindon were now struggling and Bury went further ahead on 64 minutes when slack defensive play allowed Calder to get in a shot from 10 yards that beat the keeper and a defender on the goal line.

Further chances were created and squandered with Calder bringing out a fine save from Burton and Watson failing to make contact in front of an open goal when just a touch was needed.

RESULT : Bury 3 Swindon Town 0.

On this day... 23rd December ... Bury have played just 9 league games, winning 2, losing 3 and drawing 4... League results include in 1899 a 1-1 home draw with Derby County in which Jack Plant was their scorer... In 1905 Sunderland were defeated 3-1 at Gigg Lane when the Bury scorers were Amos Kilbourne (2) and Billy Dow... A goal by Tom Kay against Everton at home in 1911 could not prevent the visitors winning 2-1... A 3-2 away victory at Brentford in 1933 was Bury's last victory on this day and featured goals by Arthur Buttery, Les Vernon and David Robbie ... Walsall beat Bury 1-0 at Fellows Park in 1960... In 1967 Bury drew 1-1 at home to Oxford United with Bobby Collins scoring in the first minute of the game... George Jones was the Bury scorer in a 2-1 defeat at Colchester United in 1972... Bury's last game on this day was also against Colchester and ended goalless at home in 1995.

1 year ago this week... Bury beat Burnley 4-2 at Gigg Lane with goals from Andy Preece (2), Matt Barrass and Ady Littlejohn... Swindon drew 1-1 at home to Portsmouth with David Hay their scorer.

10 years ago this week... Bury lost 2-1 at Huddersfield in Division Three. They were leading through an early Charlie Bishop goal and Huddersfield's Keiran O'Regan had to go in goal to replace the injured Lee Martin. Bury then proceeded to throw the game away. Ronnie Mauge was sent off and O'Regan came out of goal to convert a penalty before Ewan Roberts won the game for the home side... In Division Two, Swindon beat West Bromwich Albion 2-1 at home. Ross MacLaren and Duncan Shearer getting their goals.

20 years ago this week... Bury won 2-0 away at York City with goals from Paul Hilton and Mick Butler... 30 years ago this week... Bury drew 1-1 at home to Walsall with John Connelly their scorer... 50 years ago this week... Bury won 4-2 away at Blackburn Rovers with Harold Bodle scoring twice and Dave Massart plus an own goal making up the total.

On My Opinion

Welcome to Gigg this afternoon for the traditionally poorly-supported pre-Christmas fixture. What? Poor support at Gigg Lane. Never!

A special welcome to the supporters and officials of today's visitors, Swindon Town, who will be disappointed with their season so far. May they start a revival - after today!

UNWANTED PUBLICITY

A couple of weeks ago, that excellent BBC2 programme "Back To The Floor" featured the Millwall Chairman Theo Paphitis.

As is the usual format, Theo tackled the various jobs normally undertaken by employees, including serving in the tea bar, changing lightbulbs, and cleaning the stadium.

One of the two featured games during the filming was the visit to the New Den of our very own Shakers.

Now whenever I go to away games, I am impressed with the behavior of Bury fans. I'm sure that most clubs welcome the travelling Shakers with open arms. Alas, that may no longer be the case.

Mr Paphitis slammed the visitors when he saw the damage resulting from the vandalism in the away end toilets, which had the place ankle-deep in water.

So there we were, with an ideal opportunity in these difficult times of showing an acceptable face of football supporters, and in particular those of Bury. And what we end up with? A reputation for wanton vandalism. Brilliant. Well done whichever Bury support it was who caused the damage. How about undergoing a brain transplant, for you obviously haven't got one.

BRILLIANT PUBLICITY

As a young lad of around 12 years of age, I still remember picking up the daily paper and seeing a photograph open the back page showing a huge open terrace with just a scattering of supporters dotted around. The warning headline went unheeded for a matter of days later, the club involved folded. That club was Accrington Stanley, and ever

since that club was held a strong fascination for me.

I'd never seen a game on the old Peel Park ground, but when I was old enough to drive, one of my early trips was to discover the remains of this former football league ground (that was probably the start of my interest in football grounds that has stayed with me to this present day).

I've got photographs taken in the late sixties of the derelict site and some much more recent, just as I have photos of the current Stanley club's Crown Ground from it's early days up to the present.

Strange then that the position that I, as a Bury fan in 1962 found myself in with sympathy for the Reds, should now be reversed.

Current Stanley Chairman and former Accrington player, Eric Whalley, well remembers those dim times, and upon hearing of our predicament, felt unable to sit back and watch a similar episode unfurl.

After a number of phone calls the previous week, Eric was due to meet Terry Robinson last Monday to finalise details of a plan to help raise money for the Shakers.

As I write this, it seems likely that a friendly match between the two clubs will take part in Accrington on January 16th and Eric has contacted all the Premier League sides in the hope that they will donate memorabilia to raise extra revenue on the night.

Words fail me.

With so much apparent apathy in Bury, isn't it heart-warming to receive such a gesture from a club from outside the borough.

I've always had a soft spot for the Stanley. Well done to all concerned. I only wish there were more like them in Bury.

SEASON EXTENSION

As you walk into Gigg today, the odds are on it raining. Have you ever known a winter, or should I say Autumn, like it? Winter has only just arrived, so goodness knows what lies around the corner.

A quick look at league tables, particularly non-league tables, shows some quite

frightening statistics.

Our neighbours Ramsbottom United, up to last weekend, had played just 11 league games, out of a total of 42. So as we approach the half-way mark of the season, three quarters of their games have not been played!

They are certainly not alone. The number of cancelled matches must be giving fixture secretaries up and down the land almighty headaches. And that is if no more games suffer similar fates. That in itself is highly unlikely.

Add a few cup ties, and already many clubs will need to play at least two games a week between now and the official end of the season in early May.

Many more downpours, or a hefty frost, and these games will pile up at an even more alarming rate:

What worries me is that the leagues will come under pressure from the FA to meet their existing commitments, and ensure all fixtures are complete by the afore-mentioned date.

Can clubs really be expected to play three or four times a week just to meet this deadline? It won't do the players much good. It won't do the already over-burdened pitches much good. And the lack of quality resulting from this sapping schedule will hardly do the fans any good, or the credibility of the leagues concerned.

Common sense must surely come into play, and the FA should immediately contact the various leagues giving them the option of extending their season to the end of May, thus allaying fears that are already coming to the surface.

Well, we are now just two days away from Christmas, so may I take this opportunity of wishing all you fans of real football the very best for the festive season. May it be a good one, and despite all the media efforts to persuade you that football starts and ends with Premiership, continue to support the likes of Bury and Swindon. You know it makes sense!

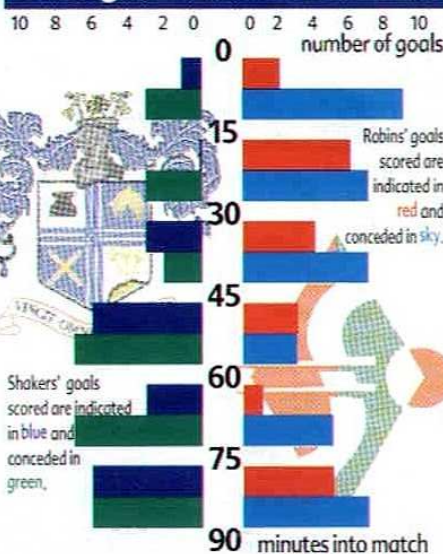

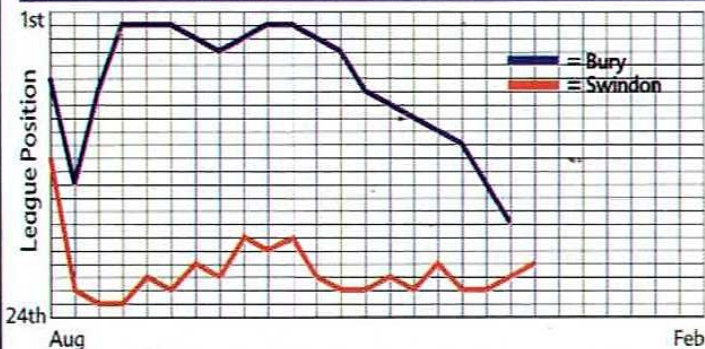

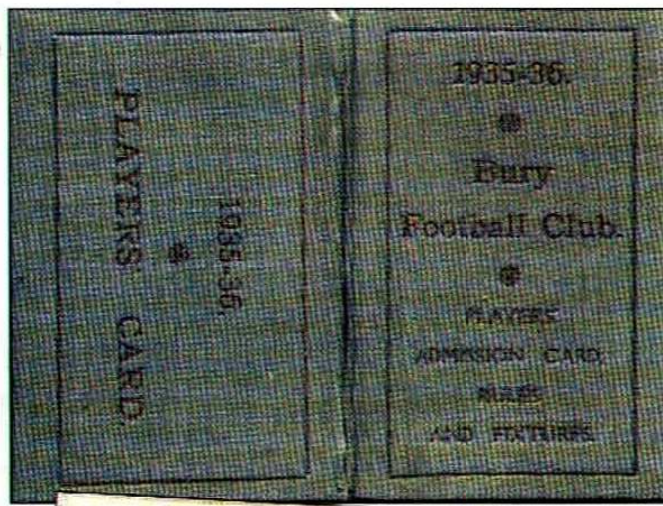

Second half goals by Dean Barrick, Rob Matthews and Andy Preece gave Bury a 3-0 First Division win on Swindon Town's last visit to Gigg Lane on 31st August 1998. Adrian Littlejohn's strike clinched Bury's 1-1 draw in the return fixture five months later. Swindon's last league victory here was 2-1 in November 1986 with goals from Jimmy Gilligan and Bryan Wade.

FIRST MEETING

The first league meeting between Bury and Swindon Town was at Gigg Lane on 22nd November 1958. The following Bury team was held to a 0-0 Third Division draw watched by 8,056: Frank Adams, Eddie Robertson, Bobby Conroy, Don May, Harry Hunter, Gordon Atherton, Jimmy Mercer, Don Watson, Bill Ritchie, Tommy Neill, Jim Lovie. The two sides also drew a blank in the return fixture at Swindon's County Ground five months later and the Robins triumphed in both league meetings during the 1959/60 campaign.

HIT FOR SIX

Colin Bell's hat-trick plus strikes from Tony Bartley, Billy Griffin and Roger Smart's own goal gave the following Bury team a thrilling 6-1 Second Division win over Swindon Town in front of 7,106 at Gigg Lane on 22nd August 1964: Chris Harker, Brian Gallagher, Brian Eastham, Brian Turner, Harry Hunter, Gordon Atherton, Tommy Claxton, Billy Griffin, Alec Alston, Colin Bell, Tony Bartley. Swindon triumphed 2-0 in the return fixture at the County Ground four months later with goals from Don Rogers and Keith East.

HIGH FIVES

Goals by Ronnie Phillips, Andy Rowland (2), John Hulme and Brian Williams gave the following Bury team an emphatic 5-0 Third Division win over Swindon Town in front of 5,737 at Gigg Lane on 21st October 1975: John Forrest, Steve Hoolickin, Keith Kennedy, Jimmy Nicholson, John Hulme, Tony Bailey, George Buchan, Ronnie Phillips, Brian Williams, Andy Rowland, Hughen Riley. Swindon triumphed 2-1 in the return fixture at the County Ground three months later with Kenny Stroud's strike and Billy Rudd's own goal.

RECORD VICTORY

Swindon Town equalled their record margin of victory in the league as goals by Ray McHale (2), Chris Kamara, Alan Mayes (2), Andy Rowland (2) and Billy Tucker gave the following team an amazing 8-0 Third Division win over Bury in front of 7,685 at the County Ground on 8th December 1979: Jimmy Allan, Russell Lewis, Andy Ford, Ray McHale, Billy Tucker, Kenny Stroud, Ian Miller, Chris Kamara (Roy Carter), Andy Rowland, Alan Mayes, Brian Williams. The two sides drew a blank in the return four months later.

LEADING MARKSMAN

One-time Swindon Town striker Ken Beamish was Bury's leading marksman in the 1978/79. Moving to Gigg Lane from Port Vale for 35,000 in September 1978, he played alongside Dave Gregory in Bury's attack and netted 20 goals in 49 Third Division games for the Shakers prior to re-joining Tranmere Rovers in November 1979. He joined Swindon as player-coach in August 1981 and made two appearances for today's visitors, then was manager at the County Ground from March 1983 until succeeded by Lou Macari in June 1984.

EVER-PRESENT

Former Swindon Town left-half Gordon Atherton was ever-present five times for Bury. Moving to Gigg Lane from Bury Amateurs in September 1955, he starred in Bury's 1960/61 Third Division title triumph and 1962/63 League Cup run. He joined Swindon in December 1964 and made 31 league appearances for today's opponents prior to re-joining Bury for 2,000 in January 1966. Scoring 13 goals in 334 league games overall for the Shakers, he moved to Irish side Drumcondra on a free transfer in September 1966.

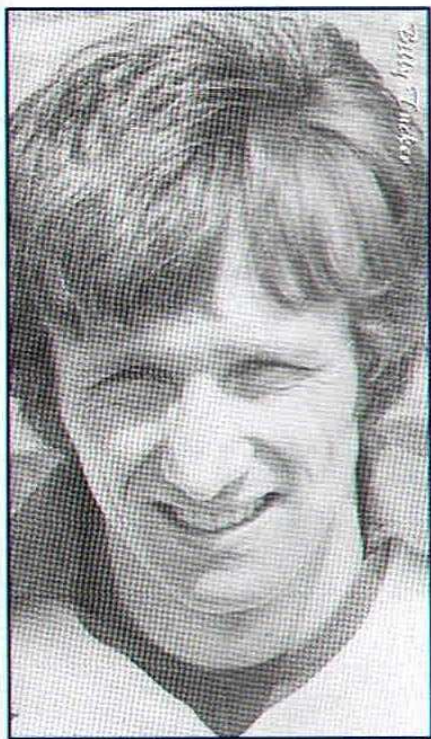
PROMOTION WINNER



Ex-Swindon Town left-back **Brian Williams** starred in Bury's 1973/74 promotion success. He was Bury's youngest-ever league debutant at 16 years 133 days in the 4-0 win at

home to Stockport County in March 1972 and scored 19 times in 159 league outings before being sold to QPR for 70,000 in July 1977. Moving to Swindon Town in June 1978, he helped them to reach the League Cup semi-finals in 1979/80 and netted eight goals in 99 league games while at the County Ground prior to joining Bristol Rovers in exchange for Gary Emmanuel in July 1981.

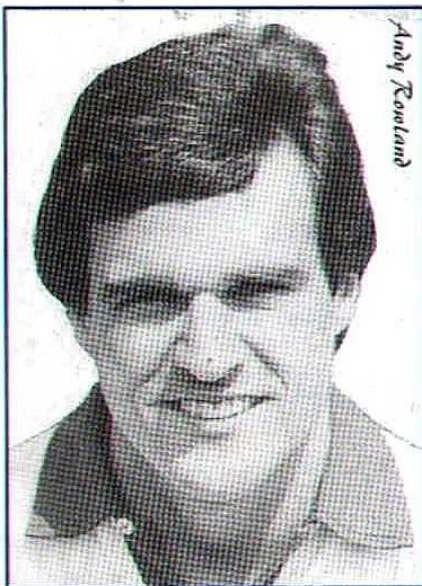
CLIP HERO



Former Bury central defender **Billy Tucker** featured prominently as Swindon Town reached the League Cup semi-finals in 1979/80. Moving to Gigg Lane from Hereford United for 5,000 in December 1976, he scored eight times in 96 Third Division games for the Shakers prior to reuniting with Andy Rowland at Bobby Smith's Swindon for 15,000 in June 1979. He netted four goals in 35 Third Division outings while at the County Ground before moving to Cheltenham Town on a free transfer in July 1980.

TOP SCORER

Former Swindon Town striker **Andy Rowland** was Bury's top scorer in three successive seasons. Moving to Gigg Lane from Derby County for 7,000 in August 1974, the England Youth International featured in Bury's 1977/78 League Cup run and scored 58 times in 174 Third Division games before following Bobby Smith to

Swindon for 80,000 in September 1978. He helped them to reach the League Cup semi-finals in 1979/80 and netted 80 goals in 287 league outings prior to joining the coaching staff at the County Ground.

MANAGING TO SUCCEED

Bobby Smith achieved managerial success at both Bury and Swindon Town during his career. Moving to Gigg Lane as coach in August 1973, he succeeded Allan Brown as manager in November 1973 and plotted promotion that season. He remained in charge of the Shakers until sacked in October 1977, then managed Swindon from May 1978 until October 1980 and guided them to the League Cup semi-finals in 1979/80. The likes of Darren Bullock, Tommy Henderson, Vince Jack, Barry Lowes and Kevin Moore have played for both clubs since the war.

Third Division Aston Villa beat Manchester United 3-2 on aggregate in the League Cup semi-final and will face Spurs in the Wembley final.

1971

Following lengthy negotiations, England midfielder Alan Ball moves from Everton to 'double' winners Arsenal in a record 220,000 deal.

1972

Tommy Docherty succeeds Frank O'Farrell as manager of First Division strugglers Manchester United and starts with a 1-1 draw against Leeds United.

1974

Under-fire Newcastle United manager Joe Harvey buys Geoff Nulty from Burnley and Tommy Craig from Sheffield Wednesday for 120,000 each.

1976

Reigning champions Liverpool are beaten 2-0 at West Ham and Bobby Robson's Ipswich Town are displaced them as First Division leaders.

1977

Non-League Wigan Athletic win 1-0 at home to Jack Charlton's Sheffield Wednesday in the FA Cup second round with a goal by Maurice Whittle.

1978

Watford splash out 200,000 for Leicester City's central defender Steve Sims, a club record fee and all-time high for a Third Division club.

1983

Third Division leaders Oxford United beat last year's finalists Manchester United 2-1 in the Milk Cup fourth round second replay.

1986

Steve Hodge moved from Aston Villa to Spurs for 650,000, while defender Graham Roberts leaves Spurs for Glasgow Rangers in a 450,000 deal.

1990

Arsenal and England central defender Tony Adams is jailed for nine months, five of them suspended for a drink-driving offence.

1992

Liverpool suffer their worst defeat for 16 years, losing 5-1 at Coventry City in the Premier League after Jamie Redknapp is sent-off.

1995

Jack Charlton announces his retirement as manager of the Republic of Ireland after a glorious ten year reign and 93 international matches.

DOUBLE SPEAK

I'd love to have been a fly on the wall of the West Ham dressing room after the 1-1 draw with Everton last Saturday when Paulo di Canio caught the ball with the net at his mercy, after keeper Gerard fell down injured. Anyone who watched the after match interview with manager Harry Redknapp would have been impressed with his support for the striker who sportingly refused to put the ball in the back of the net but you can only wonder what he really thought about it and how he will feel if the Hammers miss out on Europe by the odd couple of points. The only reason I question whether or not he is being totally open is because of his response to the question regarding his interest in Henning Berg, the former Manchester United Player. Berg has joined Blackburn Rovers and played in that 2-0 victory over arch rivals Burnley last Sunday at Turf Moor, after apparently being watched by West Ham - or was he? According to the official Harry Redknapp website he never said that he was interested in Henning Berg. That is unless you read his equally official website where he says, "There are two players here at home who interest me a lot. I'm keen on Christian Dailly and the other is Henning Berg. It just goes to show that you can't believe everything you read."

LOST IN PRINT

The idea of producing a souvenir reproduction of the Crystal Palace programme against Sunderland on August 13 1969, when they had their first win in the old First Division must have seemed really good at the time. The intention was to have the reproduction as an insert in the match day programme for the Worthington

Cup-tie at Selhurst Park a week or so ago so that fans could relive past glories. Unfortunately for the club they use the same printers as Charlton Athletic and the insert found its way into the programme for their game against Manchester United. The mistake was realised and most of them were removed in time although some of them are bound to have been missed and there will be one or two special programmes out there at the moment. As if to add insult to injury though the rain played its part and the Game against Sunderland was postponed leaving the club with the decision whether to use them for the re-arranged game or not.

DATING GAME

This being the time of the year that everyone seems to need a calendar, most of the football clubs produce one, which includes photos of their favourite players. The decision to include players generally rests with the marketing people and they must decide who will attract the biggest sales, but over the Pennines in Leeds they have more of a problem than most. Sanity stepped in when catering manager Monica Quinn pointed out that if they were let loose with the implements than he would have to ensure that various items from the first aid kit could well be needed.

AND FINALLY

England may have lost in the bid to host the World Cup finals in 2006 but one former FA executive is now helping the Germans to prepare for the tournament after they won the right to stage the games. Phil Carling was the FA's commercial director until he left last autumn to join sports marketing agency Octagon, which has a 49 per cent stake in German club Eintracht Frankfurt. His new role includes ensuring that the stadium is ready to act as one of the venues for the tournament.
