

SIGHTS SET ON FINAL GLORY

This year that Final will be played at the Millennium Stadium in Cardiff, a tremendous venue and one at which I'm sure our players would enjoy playing. Again this evening's game will give an

opportunity for one or two key players to get a game under their belts. In our case, whatever team I put out will hardly constitute a weakened side, because we've got the likes of Lucas Neill. Marc Bircham, Steven Reid. Stuart Nethercott and Richard Sadlier, all experienced first team players, who just haven't been in our starting lineup over the past few games because other players have been doing so well. Certainly I would expect the team that plays tonight to be

As far as Swindon are concerned, I spoke to Gordon Strachan, whose Coventry side played them in the FA Cup on Saturday, and he has given me as much help and information as he could. Clearly we don't know whether they might see this as the opportunity to rest one or two people, but I'm sure they'll come here and give us a very competitive game.

FINAL CHANCE - LIONS GET REVENGE MILLWALL 3 SWINDON 1 TUESDAY MARCH 24th 1984

Millwall gained revenge for an earlier FA Cup defeat to reach the Associate Members Cup Semi-Finals at The Den. They are away to Plymouth or Exeter for a place in the Final. However, manager George Graham wasn't altogether happy with their performance. He said "We didn't play as well as we can. But we got the right result. It's a habit I learned at Arsenal - to win when not at our best, but I like to win in style. Some of our players were not up to our usual standard but

Paul Sansome did well for us. He made saves at vital times to keep us in the game, he's been playing well in the last few games. We won a cup last season, so we may as well keep up the good work."

The Lions were put on their way to victory in the 31st minute when Swindon keeper Scott Endersby came out to gather the ball but sliced his clearance. The ball went to Anton Otulakowski whose shot was helped into the net by Gary Emmanuel. Steve Lovell scored the second Millwall goal from the spot after Paul Batty had handled.

DEMANDS

Gary Nelson moved onto a Batty pass to pull a goal back for Swindon on the hour. Sansome had distinguished himself earlier on from Andy Rowland and Batty, and was equal to the demands made on him when Swindon went all out for the equaliser. Kevin Bremner, who like Dean Neal was not at his best, wrapped up the game for The Lions when he headed in

Otulakowski's corner in the 73rd minute.

King tinkering to find winning formula

SWINDON TOWN fans

have suffered what can best be described as a nightmare last 12 months.

A painful struggle to hold their own in the First Division last season came to a close in May when they were relegated - and any hopes of a quick return have been dashed by a string of inconsistent performances on the field.

Throw in the fact that The Robins also saw manager Colin Todd depart to Derby County in October and are undergoing a transitional period with new boss Andy King at the helm, and it's easy to see why they are still finding their feet in Division Two. King, well remembered for his goal-scoring days as a midfielder at Everton, has

been tinkering with Town's formation since taking charge to try and find the best system suited to the players he has. And the number of different game plans he has employed would be a statto's dream - 5-3-2. 4-5-1 and 4-3-3, although he has been known to opt for the good old tried and tested 4-4-2 as well!


One player who has been a regular in King's starting line up is Dutch goalkeeper BART GRIEMINK -

regular, that is, unless he is sent off. Signed from Barry Fry's Peterborough United during the summer, the 6ft 4in shot-stopper has twice been red-carded this season and his sending-off on Boxing Day is likely to see former youth team player STEVE


MILDENHALL handed a chance to face The Lions. If King opts for a straight four at the back, another product of the County Ground's youth set-up 21-year-old SOL DAVIS, will be hoping for another top notch display at left back. The Cheltenhamborn defender's displays have been one of the high points of the season so far. He is composed on the ball and always quick to add his support in attack. Argentinian JUAN COBIAN, formerly with Boca Juniors and Sheffield United, will be battling with MARK ROBINSON to fill the right back berth. Robinson started the campaign as first choice, but a dip in form saw the ex-Newcastle United youth team from the sidelines after being dropped for Town's match with Walsall.

Commanding

The experienced figures of ALAN REEVES and RICHARD DRYDEN are likely to provide the pairing at the heart of Swindon's defence this evening. Skipper Reeves, now in his third season with the club after signing on a free from Wimbledon, is a commanding figure who likes to lead by example. Always strong in the air defensively, the 33year-old has a good eye for scoring goals as well as helping prevent them, with four to his name so far this season, Like Reeves, Dryden is a no-nonsense centre half.

strong in the tackle and quick to make his presence felt. Although he is currently on loan from Southampton, Saints boss Glenn Hoddle gave him permission to play in Saturday's FA Cup Third Round tie with Coventry and is unlikely to deny him the opportunity to taste LDV action against Millwall. Moving into midfield, IAN WOAN has strengthened Town's ranks by signing until the end of the season. Formerly with Nottingham Forest, he was regarded as one of the best crossers of the ball the club had during his nine year spell at the City Ground. Woan has again proved to be a cut above the rest on numerous occasions this season, with his deft touch and superb passing skills not quite being utilised by his team-mates as well as they could have been. JIM WHITLEY, on loan from Manchester City, is an option for one of the two central midfield roles, although the Northern Ireland international faces a late test on a troublesome shoulder injury.

Emergency

One player eager to make a good impression and please the Swindon fans is BOBBY HOWE, who has become something of a target for the boo-boys this season. A hard-working player, Howe's commitment to the cause can - not be questioned, but his final ball forward has sometimes not been as accurate as he or the supporters would like. One player who has proved to be Town's 'Mr Consistency' on the right flank is former St Johnstone man KEITH O'HALLORAN, signed from the Scottish club during the summer. The Republic of Ireland ace is equally at home operating on the flank or in a more central role, and has



shown his range of shooting skills from both positions this season.

When not having a pop at goal himself, O'Halloran has been a key figure in creating opportunities for top scorer DANNY INVINCIBLE. who has bagged nine goals so far. Aussie Invincible arrived from Marconi Stallions last year and has proved to be a real handful to opposing teams. His real strength lies in running at, and past, defenders, as he has managed to do on a regular basis this term. Sometimes he may seem to take on one player too many and fluff his final shot, but when it works successfully, his goals have often proved to be spectacular. A shoulder injury to strike partner MARTIN WILLIAMS has meant that

the duo have not enjoyed as

fruitful a time as they would like. Experienced former Reading front man Williams has struck just three goals since his move from the Madeiski Stadium, but there's no doubt that when he regains full fitness and his scoring touch, they will prove to be a real handful. Manager King can also call on the services of ex-West Ham United striker GARY ALEXANDER, a £300,000 signing from Upton Park who caught the eye last season when he smashed 19 goals during a loan spell at Exeter City. DAVID DUKE, who started out at Sunderland, could also be involved, as might big, bustling Dutchman **ANTOINE Van Der** LINDEN, who normally plays in defence but has filled in as an emergency striker recently.
