Good evening and a warm welcome to the County Ground for tonight's league fixture with Oldham Athletic.

I think we are all hoping that we can put on a good performance in front of our home fans and make up for the poor defeat against Luton Town last week. Then 3-1 defeat was extremely disappointing for several reasons. Firstly, we didn't play as well as I know we can do and secondly, we have allowed a club below us to make ground on us in the league. I said to all the lads before the game that if we could win, we could really put some space between us, Luton and the other sides at the bottom. By beating Cambridge we had dragged them into the relegation mire. But it wasn't to be against the Hatters and for

whatever reason, we did not perform. We have to put that right tonight. By the time you read this, the outcome of Saturday's long trip to the JJB Stadium will be apparent. It would have been nice to travel up there with our unbeaten run intact, instead we have to try and start another little run starting against Wigan and continuing tonight against the Latics.

Wigan is a very tough place to go and get points, they are unbeaten at home all season, fourth in the league and high in confidence. It might help us that they have had a recent poor run of form and have lost Bruce Rioch, but then again it could go against us because the players will all be looking to impress the new manager. He could offer them a new

incentive and make it more difficult for us, but let's just hope that we gain three points or at least a draw.

Tonight's game is also set to be a tough one, Andy Ritchie has done a fantastic job on a shoestring budget and limited resources. They have had a fantastic home record as we well know, we went down 1-0 on our visit to Boundary Park. But they have done extremely well to climb away from the bottom, they were a club that were floating around the bottom of the table with us at the start of the season, but have gone on to recover the situation and now sit comfortable in mid-table. But instead of worrying about the opposition too much, we have to concentrate on our game and improving that so we don't have another situation like Luton.



I can't really understand what went wrong against Luton, we just didn't perform on the day which is surprising because it was such a big game. We have set ourselves a level of performance that I expect the lads to reach every game and it just didn't happen on Saturday.

You will always get the odd player that has a bad game but against Luton it was most of them. With the exception of Steve Robinson who I thought played very well in the first half, it was a very poor all-round show. From Stevie Mildenhall who has been superb recently in goal, to Michael Reddy up front, it just wasn't good enough. But you can't reflect on the past, after all it was just one game, as long as you learn from it and move on then you can

achieve something good out of a bad situation. I think the turning point in that game was Luton's equaliser on the stroke of half-time. Admittedly we started very slowly, but there was a period in the first half when we could have scored two or three, Michael Reddy had a couple of one-on-ones but we eventually took the lead with a fortunate goal from Gary Alexander.

I believed that if we could just hold on until half-time then I could sort out a few things in order for us to play better in the second half. Unfortunately they scored in the 47th minute and I then had to try and pick the lads up.

But it happens so often in football, a team scores late on and they have the confidence to take the game further. Just look at Birmingham on Sunday against Liverpool. Birmingham, a league below Liverpool, scored at the end of the game and then outplayed them in extra-time and should have won.

Still, we have to move on and I can assure you that we will be in a positive frame of mind tonight. It is another home game and it is from these that we should expect to be collecting more points. May I extend a warm welcome to the Andy Ritchie, his management team, players and supporters who have travelled down from Lancashire tonight.

Let's get behind our lads tonight and help them get all three points.




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

Monday night football at the Oasis with the lads from Advertiser Towers always reminds me of Oldham Athletic's heady days. Flippin' plastic pitch, chucking it down, freezing cold and some Ian Ormondroyd-like figure ambling across the surface.

I must confess to a degree of bias as I spent much of the 1980s watching Oldham regularly beat the team I used to watch before heading for southern pastures.

Joe Royle was the manager and possessed a strange obsession for the offside trap. I believe he preferred to call it 'condensing the field of play.' I preferred to call it something else. Those days are long gone and the Boundary Park side have been through some major changes since then. A couple of years in the Premiership was followed by an alarming slump and a slide into Division Two. The Latics arrive at the County Ground tonight in about as comfortable a position as you can be at this stage of the season. They aren't going up and they aren't going down. We certainly owe them

one after their late winner earlier in the season. Matty Hewlett will just be hoping for an injury-free evening as it was against the Latics that he suffered the challenge which put him out of action for more than three months. There is still everything to play for at this stage of the season. Optimism abounds for a couple of minutes before pessimism takes over for a spell. Finger nails get chewed away to nothing and tempers fray as the end of the campaign draws closer and wellintentioned relatives cry 'Ooh, they're not doing very well are they? Will they go down?'

'interesting' end to the season. The lads still seem pretty confident that there is enough in the locker to ensure we pull clear of trouble and that is a positive sign. Let's just avoid any repeat of the Luton Town fiasco. Sadly I am unable to report any success regarding my audacious swoop to secure Michael Reddy's services. The bottle of wine is still available for Reidy but I have one or two loose ends to tie up before the the £5million part of the deal is sorted out. After tonight, we look forward to the big derby clash with Oxford United at the Manor Ground. The league table looks pretty grim for David Kemp's side but if there was ever a game our great chums were going to be 'up for' then it's this one. League positions mean nothing.

They thought they had done enough to secure a point at the County Ground earlier in the season until Graz stooped to head a great winner. Make no mistake, they will be hungry for revenge. The Latics...

When Swindon travelled to Boundary Park in October, they were looking to beat a side that was also struggling at the wrong end of the table in order to kick-start their season.

Instead, Town came away with nothing more than an injured Matt Hewlett and no points thanks largely to the Latic's 76th minute winner courtesy of Craig Dudley.

Oldham have not looked back since. Five wins in seven followed for Ritchie's young, home-grown squad and they now have the luxury of sitting comfortably in mid-table. But it could have been so different for the Latics had it not been for their remarkable tendency to draw games, notching ten already this

term, Ritchie's side could be mounting a more forceful play-off bid of only they were more clinical. The Lancashire side will be coming to the County Ground brimming with confidence, four wins in six (including a 5-1 drubbing of Wrexham and a last-gasp winner over Bournemouth) and just three defeats in thirteen have elevated the side to eleventh position, the club's highest all season.

The decisive form of Corazzin, Allott and Dudley has given the side an outside bet of the play-offs, If Ritchie can hold on the likes of Corazzin then the side has every chance of plotting their comeback to the Premiership whence they came.




History Repeating Itself?

Town supporters will be hoping that history repeats itself today.

If one goes back to the season of 1966/97, Swindon were languishing perilessly close to the drop zone and faced a resurgent Oldham side at the County Ground, a week before having to travel to the Manor Ground. The Latics were crushed 6-3 in a goal bonanza (Don Rogers contributing with a hat-trick) and Town went on to finish in eighth position above Oldham. In think most Town supporters would accept a 6-3 victory tonight followed by a win against Oxford next week, but perhaps more importantly eighth position at the end of the season!

Still registered as a player at Boundary Park, manager Andy Ritchie is now in his third season as boss of Oldham Athletic - a position he inherited from Neil Warnock. Scorer of 110 goals for the Latics in 250 appearances, Ritchie began his carer at Old Trafford with Manchester United under Sir Matt Busby.



Meet Andy Ritchie

After 33 outings with United and 13 goals, Ritchie moved on to the then First Division Brighton & Hove Albion for £500.000. His potent right foot claimed 23 goals in 89 outings before leaving for Leeds United in an exchange deal valued at £750,000. Elland Road


welcomed his 40 strikes, but Ritchie surprisingly agreed to join Oldham Athletic for a tribunal fee.

> The move was a blessing for the Boundary Park side as he went on to claim an incredible 105 strikes

in 250 games. Ritchie joined seasiders Scarborough in 1995 but after just 18 months on the NorthEast coastline, he answered a call from Oldham chairman Ian Scott who brought him back to the club as player coach alongside Neil Warnock.

Hodges should have extended the lead but his diving header found Griemink's arms. On 76 minutes, Reading should have wrapped up the game when the irresistable Harper chested Evers' cross and volleyed towards the Town goal. Griemink proved how good a shot stopper he is with a magnificent save.

Town had chances to fight their way back into the game, Grazioli missed another shot on the turn before Tommy Williams' volley flashed across the front of the goal. Another disappointing result for Town's reserves as they now lose ground on the sides above them, including Reading. Next week they entertain Gillingham at the County Ground, kick-off 2pm.



You may have seen the Evening Advertiser last Thursday showing the action from the six-a-side finals that took place here on the pitch at the club.




Last weekend our Under-17's played Bristol Rovers at Allied Dunbar; a closely fought game concluded by an own goal in our favour.



I must admit Transfer Deadline day is always a sad time of year for me and many other Town fans. It was of course 5 years ago this month that we




of late and they have already beaten us once this season, a cold, wet and windy game up at Boundary Park if I remember? Hopefully we can put that result right tonight.





For the second time in a week, Gary Alexander's joy at scoring was dampened by Town's inability to hold on to a lead. Luton roared forward from the kick-off and Town struggled to get out of their own half. Six minutes before the break, Town took the lead, Ovendale dropped Robinson's cross and Alexander buried a simple header into the net. Three minutes later, Boyce attacked down the right and pumped in a cross which Rowland buried into the bottom corner of the net from eight yards. Luton started the second period as they had begun the first and they took the lead in the 70th minute. Rowland whipped in a free kick from the left and Boyce stooped to head beyond Mildenhall. With the match drifting into stoppage time, Peter Thomson raced clear before unleashing a shot that Mildenhall could only parry. The ball fell invitingly for Lee Mansell, who made no mistake from close range.



Joe Kinnear's Luton made it 12 points out of 15 after coming from 1-0 down to grab all three points.

First Keith Rowland nodded in an equaliser from Emmerson Boyce's perfect cross on 41 minutes, just three minutes after Swindon had taken the lead when Mark Ovendale dropped a cross onto Gary Alexander's head. Then in a thrilling second half, the same two Luton players created Luton's second, Emmerson Boyce this time crashing a thumping header home from six yards from Rowland's free kick. Swindon threw on an extra striker to try desperately for the equaliser, but all it did was leave space at the back. George ran into this space in stoppage time and fed a fine ball through to Peter Thomson, on for sub Stein five minutes earlier. The keeper got down well to smother Thomson's shot, but another sub, Lee Mansell, came roaring in from the edge of the box to crash in the rebound and seal the match. It was a great result for Luton, who started without the injured Douglas and then lost Fotiadis injured after only 12 minutes.

Odd Shapes and Sizes

It is ironic that, given the huge diversity of shapes and sizes adopted by football programmes over the decades, that the modern era sees almost exclusive adoption of a standard page size.

At the one extreme, we have had tabloid newspapers masquerading as programmes, and rarely a season goes by without at least one club adopting a brochure-sized production (in 1998/99 it was Bolton Wanderers and Bristol City).

For special matches, one or two clubs have issued a poster-size production folded twice to brochure dimensions and including on one side of the sheet, recognisable programme features, with a photograph dominating the reverse.

On the other hand, we have seen the tiny pocket-sized issues of the late 50's and early 60's and the slightly larger issues produced by Arsenal, Spurs and West Ham for much of the 1960's. Crystal Palace in the 1960's and Bristol City a decade later, favoured a very narrow programme, albeit as tall as other programmes of the era. The vast majority of British programmes have been A5 in page size. This is a particularly convenient size for those producers with one eye on the printing budget, for it is simply an A4 sheet folded.

It is very rare to find a non-league club or a lower league club in Scotland using anything other than this size. Occasionally, clubs have tried to freshen their production by stapling and folding the shorter edge, producing a 'landscape' orientation rather than the conventional 'portrait.'

One of the first to adopt this style was the pioneering West Bromwich Albion programme of the early 1970's, along with Crystal Palace a couple of years later. There have been a few isolated incidents in the following decades, notably with Hamilton Accies and Airdrie in Scotland.

Watford were also the most enduring users of the 'square page' format that had a conventional height but a larger width. This was by no means unattractive and a number of clubs followed, but only briefly.

In a notoriously competitive environment, it is something of a surprise that at least one British club has not gone out of its way to produce 'the smallest ever programme' on at least one occasion.

Every now and again someone uncovers a tiny page size from a foreign land and ponders whether there has ever been a smaller or larger programme published.


























Trowbridge born, Fitzroy developed his reputation as a tough tackling and industrious midfield player under Ossie Ardiles after emerging from Town's productive youth scheme in 1988.

His powerful and energetic style of play was rewarded with a regular starting place at the hub of Town's central midfield. Playing alongside former Town favourite Alan McLoughlin the pair soon struck up a well-oiled partnership which was central in the club's promotion push in 1990. Fitzroy stuck around for another two years before Manchester City tabled a £500,000 bid that the club could not refuse. He joined City after appearing 130 times for the club, scoring 10 goals in the process.

'Fitz' enjoyed a successful spell at Maine Road weighing in with a number of impressive displays but found it difficult to hold down a regular place at such a resourceful club, surmounting 82 appearances and four goals. In the summer of 1995 Fitzroy moved to the south coast to Portsmouth in a £200,000 deal where he would enjoy First Division football for four seasons making over 150 appearances. It was at Fratton Park that Fitzroy caught the eye of the Jamaican national coach, earning him a call-up to the Jamaican national team, the country of his parents' birth.

He joined up with the squad for their 1998 World Cup qualifying campaign and made a winning debut against Cuba -the Reggae Boys eventually qualified for France'98 against Mexico. In a competition full of great memories for the Reggae Boys, Fitzroy remembers his own special moment, he said: "To be honest, it was just walking out in the opening match against Croatia. I looked up at my wife and baby in the stands and

thought, oh my God, I can't believe it, I'm living a dream. It hadn't really sunk in until I walked out there."

Only a year after his return he was on the move again. This time to the opposite end of the British Isles, joining Scottish Premier club, Heart of Midlothian based in Edinburgh. A relatively small price of £100,000 meant that, as well as playing on the World stage, he could now ply his trade at the highest level in Scotland and, for the first time, play in a major European competition. The latter came this season as, after ousting IBV in the qualifying round, Hearts were drawn to play VfB Stuttgart in the 1st round proper of the UEFA Cup, losing the two-legged affair by the odd goal.

'Fitz' has captained the Jambo's this season but after starting the first seven games of this season he fell foul to injury and has not featured in the line up since.

McFarland Sacked by U's

Division Two fellow strugglers
Cambridge have parted company
with manager Roy McFarland last
week as a result of the U's dismal
run that has seen them drop to the
bottom six.

The pressure has been building on McFarland and not even the introduction of Sheffield Wednesday striker Richie Humphreys could stop the rot. The club now lie perilessly above the drop zone with just five points seperating themselevs and the bottom four, hence club officials have decided it is time for the fomrer Bolton boss to go. The club held an emergency meeting last Monday to discuss the worrying situation and they must now find a replacement willing to accept the challenge of keeping them up. McFarland's successor has not yet been announced but a spokesman for the club confirmed that they hope to name someone before this Saturday's game, Steve Claridge has already ruled himself out of the running.



Wigan Boss Walks Away

Bruce Rioch has mysteriously resigned from high-flyers and last Saturday's opponents Wigan Athletic.


The Lancashire club currently occupy fourth place in the league and are just two points off a promotion place. But according to an official club spokesman, the former Arsenal and Bolton boss has "...requested that he be released


from his position." An official statement read: "Wigan Athletic have today announced that Bruce Rioch will step down as manager. "After a marvellous career in football, things have unfortunately not worked out for Bruce at Wigan, and he has requested that he be released from his position. Colin Greenall will now take over as caretaker manager at the club."

Millwall's McGhee Manager of the Month

Millwall Manager Mark McGhee has won the second division's Manager of the Month Award for February.

His side achieved an excellent run of results that established a clear gap of six points between them and secondplaced Rotherham. McGhee has done a fine job since taking over the New Den's managerial reins earlier in the season, steering his new club steadily towards promotion. In February the Lions won four and drew the other two of their six games, four of which were away from home. They also boosted their goal difference by keeping clean sheets in five of those outings, their only slip-up coming in a thrilling 3-3 draw at Northampton. Millwall are now the undisputed favourites to reach Division One.





Turner to Take Over at Rovers

Hartlepool boss Chris Turner has emerged as the hot favourite to take over the managerial reigns at Bristol Rovers according to sources close to the West Country club.

Speculation has arisen in the local press that Turner heads a short-list of candidates for the vacancy and that club officials are preparing to make an approach to the Third Division side asking for permission to speak him. Chris Turner has remained tightlipped about the rumours, stating that: "The most important thing for me is how well Hartlepool United are doing and I am not interested in going anywhere else." Hartlepool's Chairman added "Chris has done an excellent job here and we want to keep hold of him for as long as we can," he concluded.

Motherwell's McCulloch & McMillan Head South

Motherwell have accepted a £1.35m bid from seond division high-flyers Wigan Athletic for striker Lee McCulloch and defender Steven McMillan.

Despite Rioch's departure the deal still looks set to go ahead. Chief executive Pat Nevin confirmed: "As far as we know they are still interested in taking both players. "They have made a bid and we have accepted in principle. It is now up to the players to see if they fancy it." Motherwell turned down a £1m bid from Hearts last season but that was before chairman John Boyle abandoned his ambitious - and expensive - plan to make the Steelmen the third force in Scottish football. Left-back McMillan, almost joined Bradford City earlier in the season.



Hatters Seal Land Deal

Luton Town have purchased a plot of land and their plans for a new 15,000 all-seater stadium can now go ahead.

Hatters officials have secured a 55 acre site near junction 10 of the M1 to build a new complex as they look to move away from Kenilworth Road.

"This demonstrates our long-term commitment to once again make this club a major force in football," said chairman Mike Watson-Challis.

"I will work exhaustively over the coming months to secure appropriate planning permission. "I believe our dream and vision can become a reality and begin a new era for the town."

Penrice and Thompson to Join Hoops

Speculation has arisen surrounding the futures of Gary Penrice and Garry Thompson at Bristol Rovers.

Rumour have arisen linking the two with lan Holloway who has just taken over at Loftus Road.

Vice-chairman Geoff Dunford has moved quickly to dispel rumours that the pair are to follow former manager Ian Holloway to QPR: "We would not be interested in any approach for their services. We will not be letting anybody go."

Matches From Memory

The 1966/67 season had not started well for Swindon.

Their gates had shown the biggest drop in Division Three while their visitors had invested heavily in new players and seen their gates double. All was not lost however, for Swindon had shown something of a revival winning four of their previous five matches and were unchanged for the sixth game in a row.


The game started badly for Town, only twelve minutes had elapsed when Frank Large (a former Town player) was left unmarked and headed home. Swindon's inside right, Dennis Brown was small of stature but packed a fierce shot that had earned him the nickname "Bullets" and he certainly lived up to it when he crashed home a shot from a half cleared centre by Don Rogers to bring Town level after 18 minutes. Seven minutes later Town were in front. A lofted pass by Bruce Walker saw Rogers beat Ron Swan to the ball and dribble back round the Oldham 'keeper before slotting the ball home.

Reg Blore fired a good shot just wide for the visitors, but after 50 minutes Swindon increased their lead. Bruce Walker crossed to Rogers and the man from Midsomer Norton made no mistake having time to gently slot the ball home. A late goal avalanche began in the 66th minute when a fine through ball by Willie Penman found Brown for Swindon's fourth goal of the

match and his 17th of the season. Three minutes later it was a role reversal as Rogers found Walker who blasted home to give Town a 5-1 lead. Oldham had looked a useful team in the early stages of the match and in the late stages they converted some of early good football into goals. John Collins scrambled the ball home following a corner by Blore after 79 minutes and a few minutes later, a fine shot on the run by Ian Towers gave the Lancashire side some hope of gaining a point. However, another Swindon goal came from Rogers after he latched onto a Roger Smart's saved effort to make the final scoreline 6-3.

The game ended with Oldham in fifth position and Swindon still with only six teams below them in the table. It is interesting to look at these sides in that, while Workington have gone out of the



league and Middlesborough have risen to the Premiership, two others, Swansea and Oxford are in a similar position today. Another coincidence is that the following fixture for Swindon involved a trip to Oxford's Manor Ground. By the season's end Town had climbed up to eight spot and finished two points ahead of Oldham. 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


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Davis Eager to Return




Harry and Jamie Redknapp

A father and son duo of, respectively, Upton Park and Anfield heroes.

Jamie's father, winger Harry, was apprenticed by the Hammers and signed pro forms in 1964 before going on to make 146 league appearances in the claret and blue between 1965 and 1971. He subsequently moved to Bournemouth in August 1972 where " he made a further 96 league outings and after a very brief spell at Brentford he returned to Dean Court as team coach in 1982. Harry is, of course, now back as the boss at the Boleyn Ground where he nurtures the talents of, among others, Frank Lampard, the precocious Joe Cole

and Michael Carrick, the trio recently given the nod by Mr Ericsson. Harry's son, 27 year-old Jamie, is a well-established stalwart of Liverpool's midfield and has earned himself 17 full England caps to date. He is a product of AFC Bournemouth's YTS programme and signed for the Reds from them in January 1991 after making 6 first team excursions for the Dean Court side. To date he has made 246 league appearances for the Reds and his distinguished father is, we suspect, rather proud of him.





Brian and Nigel Clough

Brian Clough is a north-eastern man through and through.

Born in Middlesbrough in 1935, he signed for his beloved 'Boro in May 1953 from local side Great Broughton Juniors and went on to earn himself legendary status on both Teeside and Wearside. In a playing career that was sadly curtailed by a knee injury in 1964 he played 274 league games for Middlesbrough and Sunderland, scoring 251 goals in the process but, amazingly, only 2 England caps came his way.

As a stroppy, belligerent, physical and bustling 'old style' centre forward he was far too much for most of his opposing defenders to handle. He took no prisoners on the park - a trait that he later took into his managerial career. With henchman Peter Taylor at his side he won the first division title at the Baseball Ground in 1972 and


twice more at the City Ground in 1977 and 1978. He also guided Forest to two consecutive European Champioships in 1979 and 1980 and the European Super Cup in 1980. He was, and still is, a confrontational and uncompromising character, a trait that does not appear to have rubbed off onto his 34 year-old son Nigel. 'Cloughie' junior, now achieving considerable success as manager of non-league Burton Albion, had a distinguished playing career under his father at Forest and later. Liverpool and Manchester City, 380 league appearances, 113 league goals and 14 full England caps bear testament to that and I somehow think that we haven't heard the last of this family yet.

Mike and Nicky Summerbee

Say no more, a father and son who both graced the County Ground and followed similar paths when they left Wiltshire for 'pastures new'. Nicky's father Mike, himself the son of a professional footballer, signed up with The Robins in March 1960 from Cheltenham Town. He made 218 league appearances for The Town before moving to Maine Road in August 1965. He later had spells at Burnley, Blackpool and Stockport before quitting playing in 1979.

His son, Nicholas John, was a YTS lad at the County Ground and was taken on as a professional in July 1989. In June 1994, he followed his father's footsteps up the M6 to Manchester City and quickly established himself as a firm favourite of the Maine Road fans.

He moved on to Sunderland in November 1997 but will long be remembered at Swindon as a swashbuckling, attacking, left-sided defender/midfielder who wrought terror in the hearts of opposing defences with his incursions into their territory to deliver scything, pin-pointedly accurate crosses to his strikers. As they say, like father - like son.



Bobby and Jack Charlton

Our most famous and distinguished footballing brothers were born, two years apart, in the mining village of Ashington in County Durham in the mid-1930's.

Elder sibling Jack - by some two years - was, in his playing career, a oneclub man. He went through the youth development scheme at Leeds United, signed pro forms with them in May 1952 and went on to make 628 first team appearances before hanging up his boots in 1972. He also earned 35 full England caps in the meantime, including one in July 1966 to which we will refer shortly.

"Our Kid' Bobby, as a youth, shunned the north-east and chose to cross the Pennines and head south to Manchester where, after going through United's youth set-up, signed forms with them in October 1954. 604 league outings later he moved on and spent a season with United team-mate (and World Cup colleague) Norbert 'Nobby' Stiles at Preston North End before calling it a

day in 1974. Bobby turned out 106 times with the 'three lions' on his shirt at full international level and, as we all well know, he and his brother were together vital components of the England side that went on to beat Germany at Wembley in the July of 1966.


Jack went on to endear himself to the people of the Republic of Ireland as their extraordinarily successful national team's manager and Bobby, now a director of Manchester United, and his older brother have become legends of the game - and deservedly so.

Oxford look certain to fall through the division's trap door, but you can rest assured that Dave Kemp's side will take delight in attempting to bring Swindon down with them.



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Next year will see Japan and South Korea hosting the World Cup finals. Looking forward to it? you might not be in the coming weeks, because it may also see fans in the UK having to take out contracts with satellite or cable TV companies - and paying up to £100 each to watch the games!

The German owners of the European television rights for next year's World Cup finals, and the 2006 tournament to be staged in Germany, want to make them Pan European pay-toview. At present our Broadcasting Act stipulates that certain top sporting events, including soccer World Cup finals, must be available free to viewers, be it on satellite, cable or terrestrial TV. But they are preparing to challenge this in the European Court. They believe that they could realise upwards of £180 million from the UK alone by inflicting this upon us. If the status quo is maintained they would receive a mere £40 million from the BBC and ITV.

However, our Broadcasting Act is endorsed by the European Commission, but they accuse them of being in breach of their own competition rules by this endorsement. The worrying thing is that seemingly every week we see some really bizarre decisions made in Europe that impact upon our traditional values and priorities, so don't be surprised if they prevail. The government are taking up their cudgels to challenge this German cosh that threatens our hallowed rights. Culture minister Chris Smith

is quoted as saying "I am determined that viewers should be able to enjoy the cup. It's their right and it continues to be so". Oh well, as a contingency, best start saving up right now, it's less than a couple of quid a week for the duration and, if it turns out to be free on the day, it'll buy a few extra six-packs to enjoy in the armchair, or a few rounds in the pub.

A few weeks ago in this column I commented on the agonies suffered by fans attempting to attend a Rugby Union international staged at Cardiff's New Millenium Stadium. I went on to express a hope that this situation would be addressed before May when the FA Cup Final visits South Wales.

To date nothing seems to have changed, Cardiff was completely gridlocked again in the hours running up to, during and after the Worthington Cup final between Liverpool and Birmingham 10 days ago. Only just over half the expected number of coaches carrying fans actually arrived and the numbers predicted to travel by rail failed to materialise. As a consequence the number of cars anticipated was hopelessly underestimated and the park-and-ride facilities laid on were inundated hours before the kick-off. That started the hunt for parking spaces which resulted in complete gridlock and, although the start-time was delayed by some quarter of an hour, huge numbers missed it and hundreds didn't even gain access to

the stadium until after half-time. Parking tickets were dished out like confetti as desperate fans abandoned their cars where they shouldn't have, in order to get to the game.

As I've said before, I think it absolutely ridiculous to build new, major stadia in inaccessible city centres with hopelessly inadequate parking facilities. The fact that the Millenium Stadium is virtually adjacent to Cardiff's central railway station cuts no ice given the current state of Britain's railway system. Fans simply did not, and will not, trust our rail services to get them quickly, and on time, to the venue of some of the most important single football games of the season and the relevant authorities should take steps to accomodate the fans choosing to travel by road.

I reiterate, surely we could have lived with Wembley for a couple more years whilst its replacement was built at a central, easily accessible location somewhere on the motorway and rail network. Cardiff rubbed its hands with glee when Wembley was knocked on the head and relished the thought of having 70,000 plus visitors from England spending their money in the city centre, before and after the games, from time to time over the next three or so years.

'We'll keep a welcome...' they sing. What a welcome it's turned out to be so far.

Swindon Town Study Centre - Playing for Success

Swindon Town Study Centre is part of a national project 'Playing for Success' that operates at 39 other Premier League and Nationwide league clubs. Swindon Town F.C. were one of the first clubs to adopt the project in 1998.

OBJECTIVES

"Motivate young people from primary and secondary schools who are underachieving or at risk of doing so"

"Contribute to the raising of standards in Literacy and Numeracy in the Borough of Swindon"

"Develop ICT and Key Skills Provide a supportive learning environment"

Students from four primary and four secondary schools attend study support one evening a week for ten weeks, Monday - Thursday (the centre is shut on match days/evenings.) The students work in teams on a series of challenges issued by the club and present their ideas to an invited audience on the final evening. Over 2100 school students have worked in the study centre since it was opened.

The Study Centre is fully booked for the academic year 2000-2001. The number of primary schools wishing to participate in study support far exceeds the number of places available. The centre also runs three, four-day courses for local children during the summer holidays and also supports summer literacy and numeracy schools by working with the students for a day at the club.

Adult Training

In partnership with Swindon College the study centre provides IT training for adults in the local community. The centre offers the City and Guilds 7261 certificate and diploma courses in computer applications, and the European Computer Driving License. Over 1,000 Adult Students have used our facilities from January 1999 including some of the players (Ty Gooden and Keith O'Halloran to name two.)

The Study Centre is situated in the Nationwide Stand in what used to be a supporter's bar. The Centre now has 30 networked computers with a scanner and four printers on height adjustable furniture. In reponse to the overwhelming success of this centre, came the expansion into the Arkell's Stand. The new facility cost £120,000 and is dual purpose, operating as a 20 computer centre during the week and by the club at weekends. The new facility allows us to meet the demands from local primary schools and provides the family enclosure with an excellent facility on match days.

Staffing

Martin Turnbull and Denise Ryan work with Sheila Diccox, our Admin Officer and Fil Came, Director of Learning Works, to produce the study support programme. A group of local teachers and the centre staff are visiting Derby County to review our programme and develop it further.



This week we speak to Management Accountant Robin Humby about life at Swindon Town Football Club.

How and when did you join Swindon Town?

Well, I have been a Swindon supporter since my parents bought me a season ticket when I was eight-years old and I had worked with Burmah, the club's old sponsors previously. In 1999 I was living in Swindon but commuting to Aylesbury and I was looking fro something closer to home. This job at Swindon came up and thankfully I got it.

What do you do?

As management accountant I deal with all areas of accounting, bank administration, paying creditors that need to be paid and other bits and pieces including dealing with administrators. I don't really deal with players contracts as such, more the commercial finance. Things such

as sales and liesure, credit control and finanacial reconciliations.

Describe your average day?

My first job normally involves dealing with any bank details or loose ends that need tying up. After that it can be a wide range of things, from producing financial accounts to answering the phone. Each day can throw up different situations, but I generally deal with all things financial! I seem to do an endless amount of reports.

What do you do on Matchday?

Matchdays can sometimes be the longest days! I normally come and help out on reception, answer phones etc. I get to see the first half but I have to duck out a bit earlier to get all the half time scores for Kieran (match day announcer.) The second period is when I really get started, compiling enough information on

ticket sales to do a report on the days attendance. This continues after the game, and then we have to wait for ticket evaluations to come over and reports from the shop before we can close up shop. On weekday nights, I can sometimes stay until ten or maybe even later, but then so do most of the staff.

Most memorable moment at Swindon?

There have been so many highlights since I started working here. The first one is quite embarrassing, but it was when Terry Brady announced that I was Employee of the Year at the Christmas party.

On the pitch, promotion to the Premiership was great and before that, there was a cup game against Arsenal in which there was a huge crowd. That was a special atmosphere and there must have been nearly 30,000 people here? When I worked at Burmah I had the privilege to meet Glenn Hoddle and he was a nice bloke and a decent manager.

Lowest point at Swindon?

There have also been a few of those as well! Going into administration was a difficult period, at one stage I had to pay £15,000 for a lot expenses. Even this year, we had to stump up some cash for the lads to stay in a hotel away at Port Vale.

Other than that, the relegation's are always bad moments, first the demotion and then last year's relegation. Even when Colin Todd left last year, that a very surreal and odd time. He just sort of walked in and said good bye and that was it.
