Good afternoon everyone and welcome back to the County Ground for today's visit of Swansea City.


It has been another good period of form for us, with two wins and a draw and three clean sheets in the space of two weeks. But we all know how quickly that can change and so we must not get carried away. Today's game is another must win match. Swansea, like us, are hoping that they can still avoid the drop come the end of the season. But we have struggled against sides below us in the league at home and so we must make sure that it doesn't happen again.

Last week we gave our travelling fans something to shout about with a 2-0 win against Oxford United. I think we were worthy winners at the end of the game, but I was disappointed with the way in which we played in the second half. In the first period we outplayed them. With eleven against eleven we were superb and should have been three up at the break. That was as good a performance I have seen since Wrexham. But in the second period we faced ten men and then nine and we seemed to get very complacent, something that has crept into our game recently and has cost us games.

I really wanted the lads to go on and express themselves, show people what we can do and go and win by four or five. I wanted us to keep possession and take advantage of the extra man, but maybe I was asking too much of them, after all it is sometimes harder to play against a

depleted side (something that Reevesy pointed out to me after the game!) But let us not forget the importance of those three points, I cannot take too much away from the lads because we got what we wanted, it continues the run of form we have been having and it bolsters squad confidence.

The squad has done everything I have asked of them in the last two games, but on Saturday there were some phenomenal individual performances. Ian Woan was superb. I often wonder why he is not still playing at a higher level because he is certainly the best midfielder in the division and he gives us that little bit extra and the players around him greater belief. He can affect the rest of the side because they are aware of his quality.



Steve Robinson is another player who affects the game, covering every inch of the pitch, tackling and getting into the box. We had spoken about getting on the score sheet before hand and he goes and scores two, the second a tremendous goal. Along with Hewlett, I believe that you won't find a better midfield in the division. I honestly believe that and that is without even mentioning the youngsters we have coming through.

But if we are talking about improving players then we have to mention Steve Mildenhall again. He had nothing to do all game until the second half and he made three crucial saves. He also had to put up with some disturbing behaviour behind the goal, but he probably

pocketed about £4.80 from that! That incident certainly gave Oxford a bit of impetus, but I think that was the only trouble that happened so all credit to the fans. It was an action packed derby in which both sets of fans played their part.

Dave Kemp, Oxford's manager is a great friend of mine and I knew that his side would come at us. By playing with three up front it caused them problems and alerted my players of my positive intentions. We started the game the livelier of the two sides, with Michael Reddy having an opportunity in the first minute. I don't believe you will find many more teams that will play like that away from home, but on the other hand we spoilt it with a poor second half performance. But the

team is growing with confidence and that can only be a good thing as we approach the most crucial stage of the season.

Finally may I wish the directors, management team, players and supporters of Swansea City Football Club a very warm welcome to Wiltshire. They will be hoping to achieve some kind of result in order to kick-start their bid for safety and so we will be up against a very resurgent side. Our support at Oxford was phenomenal and if you can get behind us in a similar fashion today, then we are half-way there to an important home victory.

Enjoy the game.







The Swans...

When former Robins favourite Frank Burrows resigned as manager of Swansea in 1995, it signalled a period of eight managerial changes in three years and boardroom upheaval that led to relegation to Division Three.


Having battled over four seasons to return to Division Two, it is a case of deja-vu for the Swansea faithful as the club is once again on the market, and the team are strong favourites for a swift return to the basement division. After John Hollins' young squad lifted the trophy at Rotherham last May, mid-table security seemed easily attainable this term. But, with only 51 goals last season and no cash signing for three years, it is little wonder that they have struggled to adapt. A steady first quarter included victories over Peterborough and

Notts County, and a convincing 4-o rout of Luton. But Swansea can look to September's 5-1 drubbing at Reading as the catalyst of their downfall. Two victories in twenty-four have followed, along with a long injury list. The most notable being the long-term absence of dependable full-back Steve Jones. The goals of on-loan Venezuelan Giovanni Savarese, and flair of French trio Mathias Verschave, Nicholas Fabiano (both loan) and David Romo. have sparked a recent upturn in form, but a tendency to concede last minute goals has left the Welshmen ten points adrift from safety. Having ground out an eventless draw at the Vetch in October, the Swans hope victory today will ignite a possible




Quaking In Their Boots?

prior to joining Arsenal made 592 appearances, scoring 69 goals for the club. Between 1968 and 1970 he made a record 167 consecutive first team appearances for


> Chelsea. Last season saw John voted Third Division

Venezuelan International striker who joined the Swans in mid-October until the end of the season.

He played for his country a week previously against Brazil. His last club was San Jose Earthquakes, and he has also played for New York Metro Stars and New England Revolution in the America Major Soccer League. In three seasons in the MSL, he scored 41 goals. During his playing career he has been capped by his country on 28 occasions, scoring ten goals. Swansea's first nine games saw Giovanni score seven goals, on three occasions two goals a game. Scored a hat-trick in the 5-3 defeat at Luton in late February. Carried off with concussion at Bury in early March, sidelining him for two weeks.




A fractured cheekbone in the penultimate game last season against Exeter City saw Steve miss the Championship run in at Rotherham United.


2 Steve Jones

Solid, determined left full back who has made the position his own since joining after a trial period in February 1998 from Tranmere. Over the last two seasons his consistent performances have seen him miss just eleven league matches.





4 Nick Cusack



Another player who was nominated last season by his fellow professionals for the Third Division's

representative side. An experienced campaigner, Nick's versatility saw him occupy a role as a striker as well as his normal midfield position last season. Joint top goalscorer with 7 league goals last season.

6 Matthew Bound

His consistency during the Swans' Championship winning season last term saw him named in the Third Division representative side. Signed a new contract with the club during the close season. Placed on the standby list for Wales in World Cup Qualifying matches against Norway and Poland.

14 Kristian O' Leary

Has the ability to play in midfield or defence. Called into the Welsh Under-21 squad last season, but injuries prevented him from representing his country. Strong tackler, his increased fitness over the last two seasons has made him a vital member of the first team squad.

5 Jason Smith



Jason has developed an excellent understanding with Matthew Bound in the middle of

defence. Signed from Tiverton Town for a fee in the region of £10,000, he had previously been on Coventry City's books. A strong competitor in aerial or ground challenges.

15 Damien Lacey

Possessing an enormous work-rate in the midfield engine room, Damien is a former trainee at the Vetch Field. Stress fractures to his right heel bone, restricting his ankle movement saw him miss the start of the season. Has kept his place since a reserve appearance against Cardiff's second string.

17 Stuart Roberts

Possessing pace and able to deliver good crosses from wide positions, Stuart's injury problems denied him further international honours at Under-21 level for Wales. Regularly used during October/ November on the right or left side of midfield.

18 Jason Price



Capable of playing at either right full back or on the right side of midfield, Jason's pace is

always a handful for the opposition. Signed from Aberamman's youth team in May 1995, Jason has been a regular inclusion in the Welsh Under-21 squad over the last two seasons.

20 Lee Jenkins

Welsh Under-21 International who, despite being unable to command a regular place in the first team line-up, remains a regular member of the squad. Still only 21 years of age, Lee made his first team debut whilst still a trainee in September 1996. Impressed at left full back when covering for the injured Michael Howard.

30 David Romo

After a week's trial at the end of September, David signed a two year contract for the Swans. The midfielder had impressed John Hollins during his trial period, and joined on a free transfer from French side Guingamp. His clever midfield play will be a useful addition to the Swans' midfield.




Swindon & Africa Unite

Children from Goddard Park Primary School and members of S.T.F.C's Rotary Club have raised funds in aid of preventing a school in Africa from closure.

The school had been threatened by landlords with eviction, but thankfully they can now afford a permanent plot of land. Everyone involved raised funds in the UK and in the school's twin city, Desai in Kenya and Swindon Town kitted out the school football team. Desai is a community-created school that has no electricity, yet children from the two schools send e-mails to each other with the help of another school in Nairobi.

Martyn Tobin in year five recently received Pius' photograph, also kitted out in Swindon gear (pictured here.) Pius and his friends cannot afford the local state primary, which costs £90 to be admitted. At Desai his parents have



a huge struggle to put him and his brothers through school at £2 each per month. Their Dad earns £20 a month as a night watchman and most of this goes on rent with a small amount of basic food each day. Education is seen as precious and the family goes without to place the children in school. Death is always present in the slums and many attending the school are street children who are being looked after following the loss of both parents.

The teachers all live in the slums and receive about £19 per month when enough money is available. With a drought in Kenya the last six months have been particularly hard. The children take the Kenva Certificate in Primary Education (KCPE) and this year children from Desai achieved up to 392 marks (250 marks is a pass) which was higher than the local state primary. Now it has the land the urgency is to raise funds to erect the school building. This will stop the need to pay rent and release funds to pay the teachers properly. We have raised £6000 and the target is £10,500. Let's help Pius so that children in Nairobi and Swindon can work together for a brighter future.


Let's make a right racket in the County Ground this afternoon, and shout Andy and the boys on for three much-needed points.

Glorious Technicolor

It is now very unusual to see a League match programme (in England) that does not have full colour reproduction on every page, but it is only in the last 20 years that such Technicolor coverage has spread.

The first full colour to be seen on programmes was at Wembley Stadium. The first match there, the 1923 FA Cup final between Bolton Wanderers and West Ham United. sported a full colour cover, albeit in design only and not in photography. For a number of years Wembley persisted with this style for Cup Finals and England v Scotland matches, the full colour sketches of the stadium, players and match action making up what they lacked in art appreciation.

The 1930's saw full colour abandoned by Wembley replaced by mono, or two-tone designs, some of them in the art deco style of the period. Sketches of the stadium and _ Initially, colour was confined to the match action re-appeared after the war, but the coloration was, at most,

three colour - usually a green background with blue and red detail, along with black print. One or two clubs came close to full colour. also featuring three colours in their cover designs. Wolves were notable in this respect, with their old gold complemented by the other colours of the club crest.

Full colour photographs first appeared in club programmes in the late 1960's, initially as inserts (at West Ham) and then included on a four page spread which was obviously printed separately from the rest of the monotone issue. The major clubs, with their huge print runs, were at the forefront of this development - notably Chelsea and Arsenal.

In the 1970's, full colour was still in its infancy, although most clubs had incorporated a number of colours in their front page design and occasionally throughout the issue. front page photograph. A national advertiser was invariably on the

same sheet (i.e. on the back page) thereby assisting with the considerable extra cost. The Scots were slow to embrace full colour in their club programmes, and indeed the honour of the first in that country fell to lowly Albion Rovers in the late 1970s, albeit the cover design and background stadium scene were of little artistic merit. Today, we take full colour photography and design very much for granted, and indeed developments in recent seasons have seen laminated card covers. and (notably with Sheffield Wednesday) partially laminated cover designs which add to the aesthetic quality and attraction of those splendid productions.
















Now at West Bromwich Albion as Assistant Manager to Gary Megson, Burrows previously played an integral part in the cup winning side of '69.

The Scotsman began his footballing career with the now defunct Third Lanark, but joined Danny Williams' side during pre-season in 1968/69, replacing Mel Nurse. Alongside John Smith, signed at the same time, Burrows became a regular member of the side contributing greatly. Together they set a defensive record of games without conceding a goal. As a player, Burrows was commanding in the air, determined and had a unique understanding of the game, an attribute that would later stand him in good stead as a coach and manager.

In the season of 1975/76, such was the disastrous state of the club on and off the field (with the new stand eating away at ailing gate receipts), Burrows was called in after a crisis meeting to take over first team training. Fortunately for him and the club, a 1-0 win at Aldershot on the last day of the term was enough to ensure Division Three safety for another season. Unfortunately this was not enough to secure him a managerial position at the club and he subsequently moved to Pompey's Fratton Park in 1979, a year after having left the County Ground.

At Portsmouth, Burrows took charge for three years winning an impressive 61 games in 138 earning them promotion. His glorious managerial career continued at Cardiff in another three year stint with 54 wins in 64, a run that also earned the Bluebirds promotion. A second, yet less successful spell at Portsmouth meant a swift move back

to Wales, this time to take charge of today's visitors Swansea City.
Burrows was at the Vetch for three years in which he won just 85 games from 230, a run of form that would see him return to Ninian Park, the home of arch-rivals Cardiff. Two years and one relegation later and it was off to the Hawthorns where he now earns his trade as assistant to Gary Megson. It would seem that his earlier success has now found him again, with the Baggies flirting with promotion to the country's top flight.



Humphreys Blow For Beck

Division Two strugglers Cambridge have been dealt a massive blow with the news that new striker Richie Humphreys could be out for the rest of the season.

The former Sheffield Wednesday striker could only last ten minutes in the U's 1-0 defeat at Luton and it is believed that he has fractured a bone in his ankle having fallen awkwardly when shooting. United boss John Beck said: "We are fearing the worst.

"The physiotherapist thinks it could be a fracture of a bone in his ankle. If it is, he won't be available from now until the end of the season.

"The boy couldn't drive home and had to stay in a hotel locally, he's going for an x-ray and then we'll know exactly what's happened." Humphreys will be sorely missed as the club attempts to avoid relegation.





McKeever Given Nod by Pirates

Struggling Bristol Rovers have been given the go ahead to sign loan star Mark McKeever in a permanent deal.

The Sheffield Wednesday winger has revealed that the Division One side has given him permission to seek a switch to the Pirates after the sides agreed an undisclosed transfer fee

earlier in the week. Speaking after Tuesday night's 2-1 defeat by Northampton Town he said: "This was my last game on loan but I have been told that Rovers and Sheffield Wednesday have agreed a fee for me. I don't think there will be any problem and I hope to be in the squad for Saturday. I would love to stay here."

Garner Gutted After Leg Break

Rotherham has suffered a huge blow to their promotion aspirations following Darren Garner's leg break against Reading.

The Millers' key midfielder suffered a break in two places and he was carried off after just 15 minutes. Manager Ronnie Moore admitted that his side now face an uphill battle to finish in the top two of the division: "The ball was headed down in the penalty area and Darren went to shoot. His follow through hit the underside of James Harper's studs. Darren's bitterly disappointed and frustrated. It is a massive blow for us because he has been brilliant this season in an unfamiliar position a turked in

in an unfamiliar position - tucked in on the right side of midfield. We haven't got anyone else who can do that job."





Hatters Mad For Mansell

Luton youngster Lee Mansell is set to sign a professional contract.

The promising striker, who scored at the County Ground in Luton's 3-1 win, is set to be rewarded with the contract by Joe Kinnear. The 18-year-old YTS trainee has set Kenilworth Road alight since his rise from the youth team, scoring three goals in six appearances. Said Kinnear: "I had a long chat about his future and it is clear he is committed to the club. He is still on a YTS contract with a year left but I am looking to sit down with his parents and offer him professional terms on a longer basis."

Millen Misery as Wilson Turns to Calderwood

Bristol City will be without defender Keith Millen for the rest of the season after he underwent a knee operation.

The 34-year old defender announced that he was going to delay the surgery to avoid missing out on the Robins' push for promotion, but he could not delay it any longer. Keith has been playing well despite the injury but does not want to do injustice to himself by carrying on. Manger Danny Wilson said: "I don't know how much pain he has been in or how long the injury has been bothering him, but it is something that has caught up with him. Even if his fitness held up, it was not fair to expect him to be in the right state of mind to play as well," Wilson added. Wilson is now on the look out for a replacement and former Town hero Colin Calderwood has been one of the names mentioned. Wilson admitted: "I've spent last week on the phone without success and I'll be making more calls this week."

Matches From Memory

On Boxing Day 1988 nearly 17,000 crammed in to Vetch Field to see the clash between two of the promotion contenders.

The Robins had plenty of support with the club having chartered a 600-seat train, while many others had come to the ground in cars and coaches.

Swansea included no less than four ex-Liverpool men, perhaps most notably Tommy Smith the England International, but otherwise included many home grown players which were a testament to their scouting and youth policies. There was plenty of good football in the opening stages but the finishing did not match the quality of the approach play and both sides squandered chances. When Swansea did get the ball in the net it was ruled out for offside.

Swansea had lost their previous match and a lack of confidence seemed to show in their play.

Swindon on the other hand had a run of six consecutive wins behind them and this showed in the relaxed manner of their play. Ray McHale was particularly prominent breaking up attacks for his won. It was no surprise therefore when a minute from half time Town took the lead. Wyndham Evans failed to clear and Chic Bates was on hand to smash the ball in from close range.

Six minutes into the second half the visitors increased their lead. McHale played the ball into the path of the advancing Paul Gilchrist who ran through to score. Swansea were

increasingly relying on playing high balls to their big strike force of Alan Waddle and John Toshack. This proved successful on the hour when Toshack headed home to set up a thrilling final half-hour. That Swindon survived this period was largely due to a powerful display by Steve Aizelwood who dominated the big Swansea strikers while Ken Stroud tidied up loose balls on the ground.

Aizelwood's performance was even more creditable in that he played part of the match with a broken nose. Despite this handicap, Swindon's defence which had conceded only two goals in seven matches hung on for a well-deserved victory.

The match ended with Swindon just two points behind Swansea with two games in hand. With a new identity card system addressing the problem of hooliganism and the installation of a new floodlighting system things



were certainly looking brighter for Swindon Town. Sadly, for Swindon supporters, although they enjoyed a good season finishing in fifth position with 57 points it was Swansea who gained promotion clinching the third promotion spot alongside Shrewsbury and Watford. It was to be the beginning of a rise to the big time, which would see Swansea pay a brief visit to the top Division and which accounts for the somewhat lopsided nature of the Vetch Field, with one corner looking ready for Premiership football, while the rest retains the more homely air of an earlier age.



replay, and apologised wholeheartedly to the entire Leeds contingent for his error. The recording is to be assessed by UEFA and Raul is nervously expecting the retribution for his action.


Peter McParland Aston Villa

McParland scored two 'dodgy' goals in Villa's FA Cup Final victory of 1957.

Earlier in the game he had clattered into Manchester United's 'keeper Ray

Wood so violently that the unfortunate last line of United's defence was carried off dazed, with a fractured cheekbone and blood pouring from his head. In those days a goalkeeper with the ball in his hands was fair game and McParland was not cautioned, or reprimanded in any way, for what would be deemed today a heinous, sending-off act of foul play. Wood did return to the field later but he wandered around, badly concussed, on the wing whilst centre half Jackie Blanchflower deputised for him between the sticks. McParland put both his goals past the hapless central defender as Villa went on to a 2-1 victory - those were the days!







The fifth round FA Cup tie between Sheffield United and Arsenal in 1999 was the scene of utter uproar after the home side had kicked the ball into touch to allow an injured player to receive treatment.

Arsenal's Ray Parlour took the re-start throw in and, in a gesture of sportsmanship, propelled the ball towards the Blades' goal line. But, horror of horrors, the ball fell to the feet of Arsenal's newly-arrived Nigerian import Nwanko Kanu who, instead of letting the ball roll over for a goal-kick, passed it to Overmars who tapped the ball into Sheffield's goal. Pandemonium erupted, the United players, and manager Steve Bruce went ballistic, accusing the Gunners of cheating but, after the game - which Arsenal went on to win - Arsene Wenger bowed to the pressure and graciously agreed to a replay, which Arsenal also went on to win!

Sir Geoff Hurst England

A big man made for the big occasions. Strong and deceptively fast, Geoff Hurst made history by becoming the first, and only, player to score a hat-trick in a World Cup final.

That was achieved, of course, at Wembley in July 1966 in England's 4-2 thrashing of West Germany. Almost 40 years later the validity of his second goal in that game is still embroiled in controversy. His fiercely-struck left foot shot hit the underside of the cross-bar and rebounded directly downwards. 'Over the line' claimed England, 'in front of the line' retorted the Germans and the referee, thankfully, judged in favour of the home team. The film of the incident is often shown and analysed in great depth, but is wholly inconclusive. It was the turning point of the game and England went on from there to earn a thoroughly deserved victory.

Diego Maradona Argentina

An immensely gifted player, Maradona's second strike against England in the 1986 World Cup quarter-final tie in Mexico City is hailed as one of the greatest individual goals ever scored.

However, his first in that match was scored with his hand in an obvious - to everyone with the sole exception of the referee - and blatant act of professional cheating. In a post-match interview he denied the offense and referred to it as the intervention of 'The Hand of God'. His subsequent decline into the sordid scenario of drug addiction and abuse led to two world-wide playing bans and is regarded by many English fans as retribution for his outrageous cynicism and ruthless flouting of the laws of the 'beautiful game'.

FIFA have gone on record since to defend the "most brazen piece of gamesmanship" to be seen in the World Cup Finals. In the July 1986 Issue of 'FIFA News', the official publication of World Football's governing body, an article exclaims that "Diego Maradona's football in Mexico was honest." Maradona's 'honesty' will be talked about for years to come.

A Lead of Old Balls

Any readers who, like myself, are in the latter stages of the inexorable, 65 year-long slog towards retirement will remember it. That most fundamental element of the game of soccer which, during my schooldays, was at times a fearsome, injurious projectile to be avoided at whatever cost - the dreaded leather football!

The second half of the last century saw many changes to the ball in football, and thank heavens for that. Rudimentary forms of the game were played with the inflated bladders of domesticated animals; goats, sheep and pigs mainly, and the material, size, shape and weight of the ball were not stipulated within the original laws of the Football Association in 1863. A standard football was introduced originally only for all FA Cup matches, in October 1872, and it has evolved over the years into the synthetic, lightweight item of modern times. The Brazilian club Sao Paulo FC pioneered the

universal white ball by painting a brown leather ball white for an evening floodlit game in the early 1950's. It quickly found favour worldwide and the English Football League introduced the

white ball a few years later.

concept of the now-

However, I digress. Back to the nemesis of my sporting youth. Made of stitched leather panels it contained a rubber inner-tube which was inflated with a bicycle pump - if anyone had remembered to bring one! The opening through which the inner-tube was inserted was closed with a thick lace, a lace that, if you were hapless enough to have it come into contact with your

head, could inflict concussion, severe lacerations and copious loss of blood. The leather ball also had a particularly vindictive characteristic, it's rate of water-absorbency was light years ahead of blotting paper and, on a wet day, its weight would increase tenfold at least. This phenomenon also applied to the above-the-ankle leather boots of that time.

On regular occasions you not only had to contend with a ball that Nelson could have used to great effect at Trafalgar but also with footwear more applicable to deep-sea diving than the beautiful game. Picture this - the ultimate nightmare scenario for a schoolboy footballer in the 50's. A bitingly cold gale force wind with monsoon-like, continuous rain blasts across the pitch. Your side are on the attack and the ball is at the feet of the only boy in your team strong enough to get it airborne with his foot. From the wing, with super-human

strength, he launches the missile downwind into

the opposition's goalmouth. Then, realisation strikes like a thunderbolt

- you have been so asinine as to have witlessly wandered into the opposition's 6-yard box and the projectile is coming, absolutely unavoidably, your way! Slow

motion kicks in - time stands still even - as football's very own Sword of Damocles hovers malignantly above you. There is no escape, but to head it would be suicidal with decapitation a distinct possibility and severe concussion an odds-on certainty. In a flash of inspiration you decide to take a couple of paces back to chest the ball down. But your feet are rooted to the ground, your exhausted legs unable to extract your boots from the cloying

mire. All you can do is duck and every breath of air in your body is smashed out of you as you are violently hurled to the ground by football's equivalent of a 25 inch naval howitzer shell. To this day such memories occasionally sneak their way into my dreams and I'm startled from my sleep, finding myself sitting bolt upright in bed, trembling and sweat-soaked at those vivid and painful recollections. However, on a more serious note, the lace-up leather football is creeping back into the headlines. There is growing medical evidence that these balls caused longterm, serious injury to many footballers in the 30's, 40's and 50's, particularly among the professional ranks. The great John Charles of Wales, Leeds and Juventus fame during this period was a giant of a man, but he is well documented as flatly refusing to head the ball during training. He is quoted as saying that "It was not unknown for players to be knocked unconscious from heading the ball. They were like iron in those days". Research is indicating that there is a strong link between the routine heading of heavy balls throughout a footballing career and dementia-related illnesses in later life. The likes of Stan Cullis, Joe Mercer and Bob Paisley, all immensely gifted players of that era and, later, incredibly successful managers, all spent their latter years in the oblivion of one form of dementia or another. There is growing evidence, not yet conclusive it must be added, of higher-than-average incidences of these illnesses among footballers of those years.

It is widely accepted nowadays that boxers, by regularly incurring heavy blows to the head, are much more likely to suffer from pre-senile dementia. If the regular heading of a heavy football isn't incurring heavy blows to the head then I don't know what is.








Goalscoring Head 2 Head
